Demos, GOP Slate Elections All Precincts

Heavy Turnout Over State Is Forecast

Two factors are present in the local election picture that should guarantee a large turnout at the polls this Saturday. For the first time in several years, local Republicans are holding first primaries in all precinct boxes. On the Democratic side, the large number of choices submitted for key state offices has attracted wide interest that likely will insure heavy turnout for the marking of that ticket. Oldtimers observe that seldom has an election without keen competition at the local level promised a heavy vote as is forecast for May 5th.

Local precinct boxes will be located at the clubhouse, at the Aostin school and at the Jr. High School. Both parties will have polling places at these locations, operating at separate ends of the buildings. The polls at Posey will be located in the Fred Stolle barn.

Democratic precinct chairmen are J. C. Smith, Jr., Box 26; Chas. H. Whalen, Box 27; and Joe Walker, Jr. Box 28. Presiding judges at the Republican polls will be S. O. Henry at the clubhouse; Clark Self, Jr. at the Jr. High School; and J. E. Eckert, Jr., at the Austin school.

Precinct conventions are slated by both parties on day of the election.

A footnote of both ballots will be referendums on horse racing betting and poll tax repeal. Another issue, listed only on the

Sixty-eight absentee votes were cast in Slaton before the Tuesday night deadline, indicative of a heavy turnout at the polls Saturday.

Republican ballot, will be question of preference in establishing a National Senshore Area or State Park on Padre Island. These are not offered as firm propositions, but rather as referendums for guidance of legislative action, actually only public opinion poll.

Low Water Rate Afforded Locally

Summer residential water rate discounts are in effect for Slaton consumers. Records from the office of City Secretary J. J. Maxey reveal that even the regular rate are lower than most localities over the state. Regular minimum fee is \$2.50 for the first 3,000 gallons, \$2.90 for over 4,000 gallons, and \$3.20 applying to 5,000 gallon users; all above delivered at cost of 25c per 1,000 gallons.

Under the annual 6-month summer reduction, residential consumers are granted a 5c reduction per 1,000 gallons above 5,000 gallon consumption.

With present water supply limited, local residents were among the first to explore an endorse participation in the Canadian River Dam Water Authority, a project that should materially solve Slaton water problems upon completion of the dam.

At present some 25 local wells are being pumped into the city mains. With these drilled red bed at depths from 115 to 215 feet, further development necessity must come from the use of Canadian surface water it is pointed out.

Swimming Pool To Open May 12

The Board of City Development met Monday night and renewed their lease with Truett Fulcher as pool manager. Opening date is set for Saturday, May 12. Requirements for admission to the pool are that everyone have an annual membership obtainable at a nominal fee, and a health certificate issued by a local medical doctor. Swimmers are encouraged to get their health certificate immediately to avoid last minute rush, officials point out.

Wind Damages Local Elevator

Turbulent weather last Thursday night was credited with an estimated \$5,000 to \$7,000 damage at the R. C. Young Seed & Grain Company elevator in east Slaton, officials of the firm said. Owen Gilbreath, partner in the firm, said that the tall elevator leg was blown over, despite guy wire support, and that the screw conveyor consequently fell, damage resulting to both conveyor and leg. Repair work is scheduled to commence immediately. The 1/2-million bushel capacity local elevator has been in operation since September of last year. It was built by converting the old fuel oil tank of the railway here, with 18-ft. height being added, together with a steel roof.

Local Civilian Defense Group Has Prepared for Emergency Operations

(Editor's Note: One of the most comprehensive and informative bulletins that has passed across our desk is the Disaster Guide, a plan for civil defense in Slaton. This factual booklet was prepared by Judge L. R. Gregory early this year and contains much pertinent data regarding an organized plan that could save innumerable lives in the area in event of any disaster or mass hysteria.

Beginning with this issue, we will present a series of articles based upon this booklet. We suggest that you read them and clip the pertinent data of names, phone numbers, and directions for particular situations — that will appear in subsequent issues.

We are indebted to both Mr. Gregory and all Civil Defense workers in making this series possible.)

The City of Slaton has a definite Civil Defense plan designed to provide, in cooperation with the state and federal governments, a workable outline that can save the most lives, minimize damage, restore and rehabilitate both society and property in any civil defense emergency.

floods, winds, etc) or man-made ones (atomic attacks, etc.) are possibilities. And without exception it is the community that has made preparation that emerges with least casualty.

Slaton is Strategic Position

In event of an atomic attack by an enemy of the nation, Slaton will serve as a traffic control point for evacuees from Lubbock who will be channeled to points to the south and southeast, thus compounding the responsibilities of the local workers. Also the city will be responsible for providing for its own residents, either to evacuate or to establish resources control for the emergency period if actual evacuation is not necessary.

Machinery already has been set in motion by planning committees to establish the controls necessary to minimize the damage and to provide for human welfare.

Situations and Assumptions

Potential enemies of the United States have the capability of hitting targets close to Slaton with nuclear weapons. Lubbock, the Reese Air Force Base and the Santa Fe railway yards at Slaton are assumed targets.

Assumptions can be categorically listed as follows: Lubbock and Clovis are primary targets in this area, and in event of nuclear attack, these cities will be attacked. Slaton, according to accuracy of the attack, is in various fallout zones and possibly in the blast zone.

The General Plan

The entire city is one complete civil defense zone and will be under the control of Civil Defense Coordinator L. O. Lemon.

Other officers of the organized plan are: L. R. Gregory, assistant coordinator.

Curtis Dowell, deputy supervisor and fire marshal. Maytr pro-tem J. E. Eckert, assistant supervisor and fire marshal.

Team captains are Eugene Martin, police and communications; Dr. M. Jay McSweeney, ambulance and first aid; M. J. Rushing, fire-fighting; J. J. Maxey, emergency welfare; and all members of the fire department.

Operations

In instance of emergency following general functions will be set into action.

Warnings received and disseminated. Immediate mobilization of civil defense forces.

Recommendations made for evacuation or taking of cover. Declaration of martial law necessary.

Restoration and continuous control of local government at pre-determined locations. Receipt, care and forwarding of evacuees. Provision of direct support attacked communities if feasible. Determination and warning radiological hazards.

Does the Slatonite have opinions on whom should be elected to the public offices that are the rewards in the forthcoming elections?

Certainly we have our definite choices — both as to personalities and to principals involved.

But we are not imposing these selections upon our readers, nor are we so presumptuous as to think our recommendations would swing any election. When we are tempted to say a word along this line, we humbly remind ourselves of a bit of homespun but unmistakable wisdom uttered in our presence some years back. A friend of our, dotting grandfather, bless him, seized upon every excuse to reach for his wallet and show pictures of his two grandchildren, a maneuver inevitably followed by long, long periods of repetitive discourse.

So finally it happened: He asked his new acquaintance, "Have I shown you the pictures of my grandchildren?", getting this reply which we consider classic, "NO, and I appreciate it!"

We are in no sense ignoring the election and the great democratic principals for which it stands. But it boils down to this: Neither you or ourselves can be wholly ignorant of issues involved in any modern-day election. We join in the ranks who analyze these, then trying, often ineptly, to winnow the claims, the publicity, the propaganda, too, to discern what candidates truly represent our desires.

We believe that Texas politics again this year presents a slate of candidates, the multitude of which insures at least one man leaning toward any "ism," "tenet," or philosophy of your choice.

Among choices noted this year are liberals vs. conservatives, spenders against savers, states right or Washington blessing, the "ins" against the "outs," the bureaucrat against the individualist (who may find it tempting to become a bureaucrat himself once he is elected).

And then there is that ever-present choice of "good ol' Joe, my old school chum" against the stranger from Middleboro.

Then, upon weighing or sifting this hodge podge of pre-election falderal, showmanship and a sprinkling of statesmanship, we are behooved to exercise that great American prerogative of casting our secret vote.

We offer no apology in flatly saying that the paramount criteria in our own selections will be, "Is he a spender or a saver?" We invite you to think along this line with us. It is wise to elect a spender who would be a liability in a private business? Would you want a manager of your own firm that would spend you into bankruptcy? If conservative, frugal, and honest in our own endeavors, then in the name of all that's holy, let's voice a conservative vote at this and every opportunity.

Now, we do take the liberty to emphatically urge your expression at the polls. No one can cast your vote but yourself; if you fail to make the effort, then the opportunity to stand up and be counted is lost, to say nothing of the loss of privilege to grouse until next election!

Notes from Neighbors: Events, Opinion, Deeds

RANKIN — In explaining the salary mentioned last week in the Rankin News on city councilmen, city secretary Vacie Grimm has pointed out that it is not a salary in the sense of a monthly payment but that the councilman must attend the regular monthly meeting of the city council in order to receive payment. A city commissioner gets \$25 for attending the meetings while the mayor receives \$50 — payable on a monthly basis.

It was further explained that this action was taken in order to encourage the councilmen and the mayor to be present at each meeting. Previously, it was difficult to secure a quorum for business transactions. Since the fee was established, only one councilman has failed to attend each meeting of the council.

CROSBYTON — "The first thing you must sell your people is that an airport is not just for the few plane owners in Crosby County. It is for those thousands of business men, recreation seekers and others who own planes who might want to use adequate landing facilities here if you had them."

This was the suggestion of Cliff Green, executive director of Texas Aeronautics Commission, in urging the completion of an airport for Crosby County. He was in Crosbyton Wednesday to speak at the Lions Club and talk with interested persons.

With the land for an airport already donated to the county by Mrs. Percy Lamar and Marie, Mr. Green urged that the county pitch in and build a landing strip.

"You can do without a bond issue or costly financing," he said. "Let your citizens know the advantages of an airport and they will help you."

Mr. Green pointed out the tremendous increase in civilian air traffic in Texas. In 1942 Texas had 2,445 civilian aircraft, while today it has increased to 9,000. In 1945 there were 9,000 qual-

ANDREWS — A special election to allow voters to decide on the question of a free public kindergarten was set by the school board for Saturday, May 19, at a called trustee meeting Tuesday night.

A memorandum from school business manager M. O. Woolam stated that the 39 pages of signed petitions asking for the election had been checked and 954 names were certified as qualified voters.

The certified number more than satisfies the legal requirement which forces the school board to call an election. The ballot will contain only the question "For or against free public kindergarten." Details as to handling a kindergarten within the school system would be left to the board.

After calling the election, the board went on record as saying that if the election passes, it will take steps to make attendance in the kindergarten program compulsory.

Slatonite Routs Prowler, But Fast

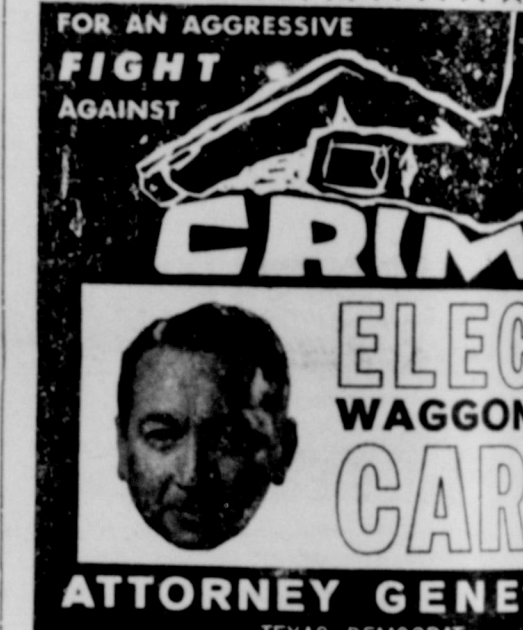
Television posses aren't the only westerners handy with the trigger finger.

"Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life." That is to say, the issues of life depend upon the condition of the heart. A pure heart, enthroning a holy purpose, opens the door to high living in every activity of life. We can't be good to ourselves and deny ourselves the power of a compelling purpose.

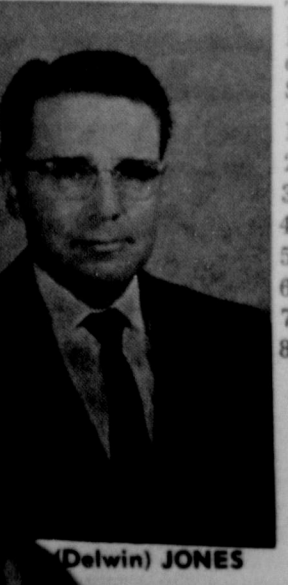

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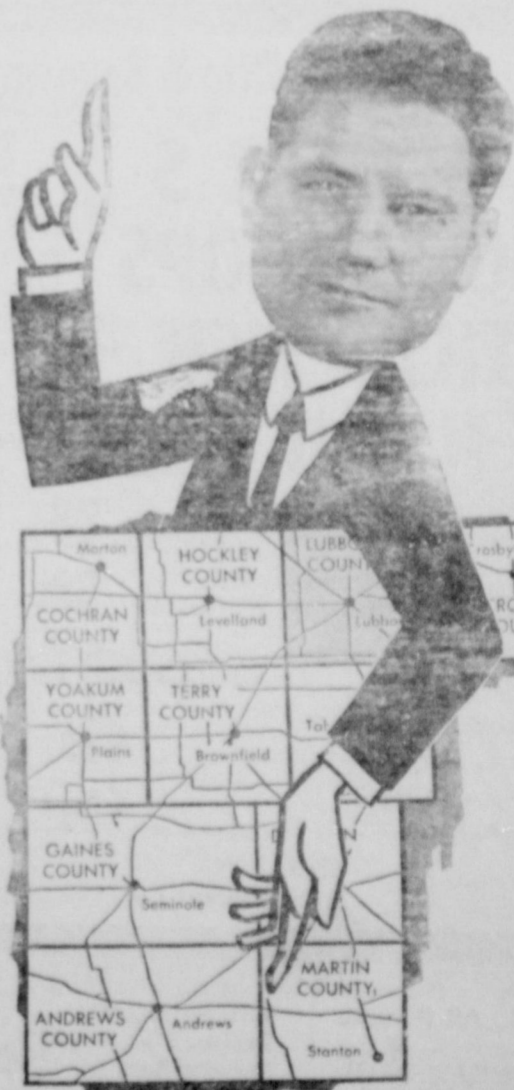
