A memorandum from school business manager M. O. Woolam stated that the 39 pages of signed petitions asking for the election had been checked and 954 names were certified as qualified voters.

The certified number more than satisfies the legal requirement which forces the school board to call an election. The ballot will contain only the question "For or against free public kindergarten." Details as to handling a kindergarten within the school system would be lft to the board.
