**Weather Variety
Plagues Farmers**

Cotton farmers of the area have weathered a hectic week with the newly planted crop subjected to several days of continuous blowing wind, some grinding dust, and scattered rain and hail.

Hard rain last Wednesday pelted some localities in all directions from Slaton. Some 6 fell in town, with 1 1/2" reported west. Small to medium size hailstones did some damage west and northwest of Slaton, but prime damage has occurred from dust and wind.

Actually, several thousand acres are estimated to have been replanted in cotton, according to J. E. Gray, manager of the Slaton Cooperative Gin Company. Unseasonably dry weather, delaying planting, probably has prevented more extensive damage to crops. Planting of the cotton crop locally often extends to mid-June, with exceptional instances of planting until July 1st.

Slatonite Ownership - Operation Assumed by King

Purchase of The Slaton Slatonite by John H. King, II, of Robert Lee, was told this week in joint announcement by King and former publisher, Francis E. Perry.

King, who has been in the publishing, and newspaper field since 1947, assumed ownership of The Slatonite on Monday of this week. He has commenced active operation of the paper, and his family will join him here within a few days.

No policy or personnel changes are anticipated by King, who has expressed great satisfaction in both the Slaton area and in the prestige enjoyed by the Slatonite here.

"Mr. Perry has provided the community here even a better paper than they might realize," King stated, "and it will be my policy to attempt continuation of these high standards, boosting the many worthwhile enterprises of the town and area, and providing a weekly factual presentation of news.

The continued cooperation of the community is sincerely solicited."

In introducing the new owners, Perry is highly enthusiastic, noting that "The Kings are just mighty good people, as well as being distinguished in newspaper circles. He is a top editor and advertising man. Mrs. Perry and I feel that the Kings will be an asset to the community for years to come; we would not have sold to them had we not had this utmost confidence."

Mr. and Mrs. Perry purchased

The Slatonite in 1953, operating it until 1958 when they moved to Ballinger to take care of business interests there. They again bought the Slatonite Feb. 1st of this year; and since that date the paper has had a steady growth capped with the recent subscription campaign.

The Kings came to Slaton from Robert Lee, Coke County, Texas, where he has owned and operated the Robert Lee Observer since August, 1960.

King, 36 years of age, is a graduate of San Angelo High School and San Angelo College where he majored in journalism. A U. S. Navy veteran of World War II, he served 18 months in the Pacific theatre. He was recalled for the Korean conflict in 1950 and served until March of 1952.

While attending San Angelo

College he commenced his very successful career in newspapering, working as advertising manager and feature writer for the Sheep and Goat Raiser's Magazine, later serving for a short period as ad manager for the Southwestern Crop and Stock publication in Lubbock. He was advertising manager for the Lamesa Daily Reporter for two years, and in 1950, just prior to being recalled to the navy, he was employed by the Big Spring Daily Herald, a member of the Harte-Hanks group of 10 newspapers. Upon discharge from the navy he returned to the Herald as national advertising director. He left that association in August of '60 to purchase the Robert Lee newspaper.

King is a past director of the Big Spring Downtown Lions

Club, past chairman of the Big Spring American Legion Post youth activities; and at the time of the purchase of the Slatonite was president of the Robert Lee Board of Community Development. He currently is a director of the West Texas Press Association.

A native of Fort Worth, King moved with his parents to San Angelo in 1937. Mrs. Stella King, his mother, now resides in Big Spring. His father, Liell C. King, died at San Angelo in 1957.

King was married in March 1947, to Miss Merle McLeod of San Angelo. She had graduated from San Angelo High School and attended San Angelo College. They have one daughter, Debra Gayle, age 8, who will enter the local 4th grade school in September.

The Kings are members of the Presbyterian Church.

Breakdown of arrests reveals the following charges, according to files in the office of Police Chief Eugene Martin: Eleven charges for being drunk; two traffic warrants; six charges of possession of alcoholic beverages by minors; three disturbance; six gambling; one simple assault; and one juvenile held for parents.

**Mercy Hospital Gets
Accreditation Status**

Mercy Hospital in Slaton has been announced as an approved hospital, receiving this envied stamp of approval after achieving and maintaining a high standard of service and facilities.

Accreditation notice was forwarded to Sister Mary Mercedes hospital administrator, and to Dr. Glen B. Payne, chief of staff by the Joint Commission of Accreditation of Hospitals. Member organizations of the commission are the American College of Physicians, American College of Surgeons, American Hospital Association, and the American Medical Association.

Kenneth B. Babcock, M. D., director of the Commission, stated in a recent letter, "The Board of Commissioners has approved the recommendation that Mercy Hospital be accredited for a period of one year or until a subsequent survey is conducted. This is the result of the evaluation of the hospital survey conducted on April 9, 1962, by Peter D. Ward, M.D., a field representative of the Commission."

Babcock further informed "Plans will be made to conduct another survey in a year's time... the Commission's policy is that if a hospital has been granted accreditation for one year on two successive surveys, it must achieve accreditation for three years on the third survey visit or be reduced to non-accreditation. The Commission wishes to commend you for maintaining standards deserving of accreditation and for your constant effort to improve the quality of patient care."

**Convicted Slayer
Given Additional
Term for Robbery**

Guadalupe Pina, 19, recently assessed a life term, along with two other companions, for the murder of Norbert Sokoll of Slaton, was handed still another sentence this week in 140th District Court. He was assessed a five-year penitentiary term on a robbery by assault charge filed in late November by Slaton police. His involvement in the murder of Sokoll, who was stabbed and slashed some 4 times, occurred Feb. 20th during an attempted robbery.

The five-year term given Monday resulted from a guilty plea of robbing Dan Maldonado, 51 of Slaton, taking \$14.

Arnold Aguirre, charged in the same robbery, is out on bond awaiting trial.

William Marcus Gosdin, director of a research project on State Parks at Texas Tech, and a team of associates to outline the answers to needs for public recreation and parks for West Texas and Texas now and in the future;

Former Mayor, Longtime Resident**

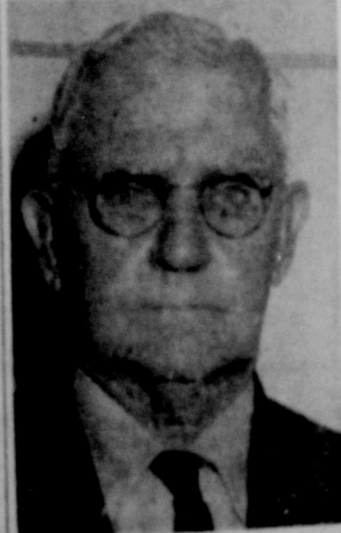
Funeral services for O. N. Alcorn, widely-known Slaton resident for over 40 years, were held Sunday at 2:30 p.m. at Baptist Church here.

Open House Scheduled May 25 At Highway District Offices

How does the Texas Highway Department use tiny glass beads to make your driving safer? Why do highway engineers cut circular holes in brand-new highways?

These are only two of the many fascinating aspects of highway engineering and maintenance that local citizens may explore on Friday, May 25.

On that day the Highway Department will hold "Open House" at the District Office, as

part of National Highway Week (May 20-26), announced District Engineer Oscar Crain. Any interested resident of the area may visit the District Office at 601 Slaton Road, Lubbock, during the hours 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and observe the daily functions of the public agency which is responsible for the care of a complex highway network of 4,000 miles in this District. District Engineer Oscar Crain said the Open House will show the public how the Highway Department operates on a normal working day.

"I would like to extend a most cordial invitation to the citizens of this area to visit our Open House," he said. "Your neighbors who work for the Highway Department would like to show you through and facilities and demonstrate a few of the many tests and operations we conduct daily to care for the highways."

Visitors to the Open House will see examples of two-way radio communications; shops where new highway signs are made and old old signs repaired; and the various machinery and laboratory testing apparatus used to determine the quality of new highways being constructed and to maintain existing roads in smooth riding condition.

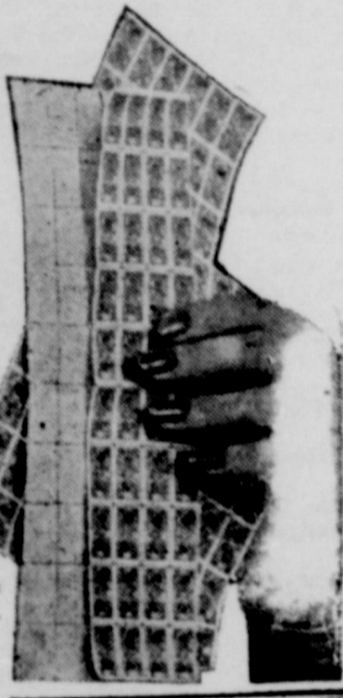

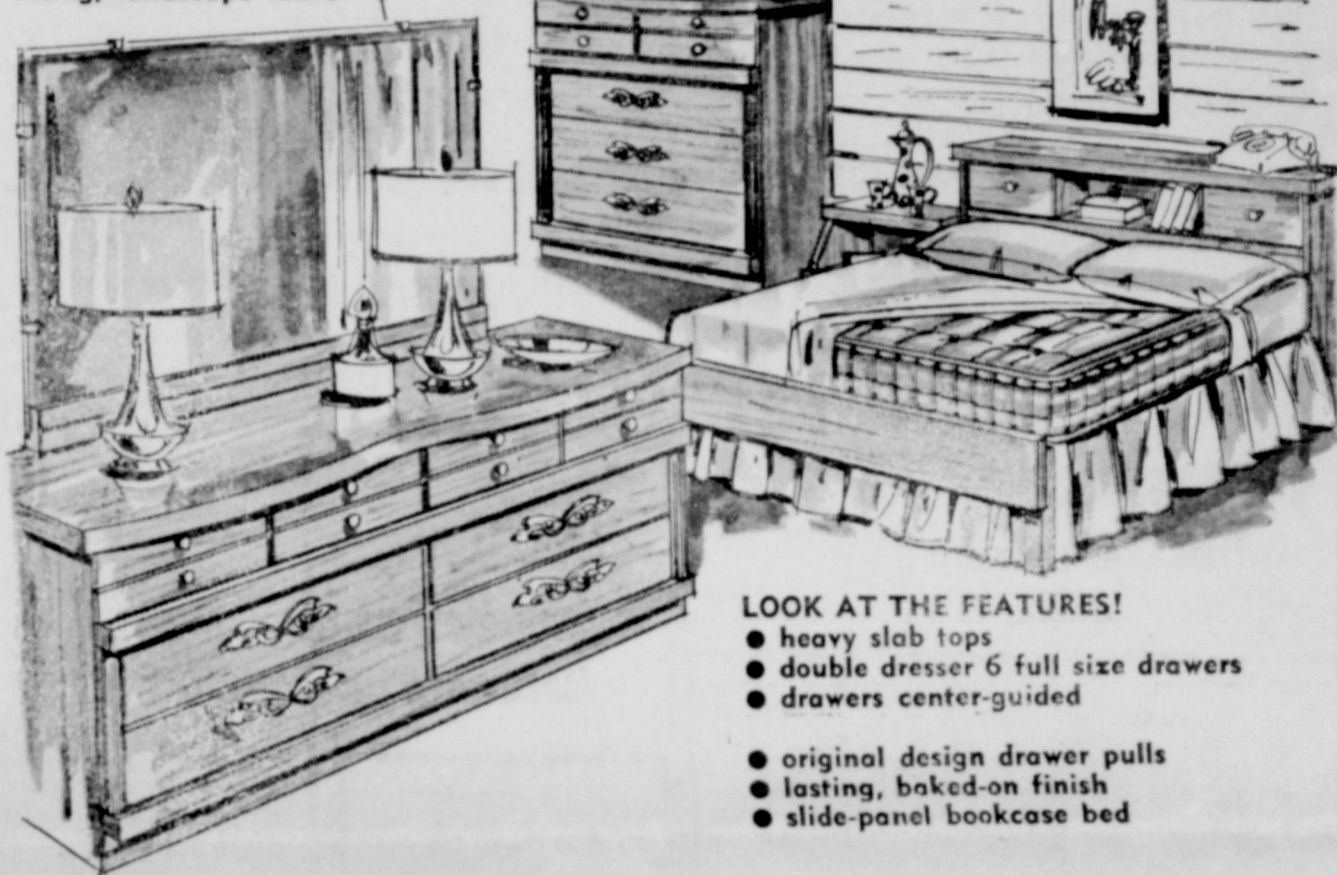

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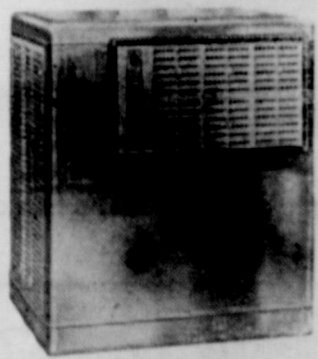

Mercy Hospital has been serving the area since 1929, now providing 31 beds plus 10 bassinets. Four local doctors are on the staff, together with some 24 consulting physicians in Lubbock.

The hospital was dedicated on Thanksgiving day, 1929, and since that time has been operated by the Sisters of Mercy.

Accreditation of hospitals is given only after determination that the institution has met the high standards deemed fundamental. Basic principals must be met in administration, in the medical staff and in the nursing staff.

To qualify for a survey for accreditation, a hospital must have at least 25 adult beds. It must be listed by the American Hospital Association, permitting only doctors of medicine to practice in its facilities.

accreditation, though always voluntary, has today become the symbol of patient safety. Physicians, nurses, and allied medical personnel seek the best environment in which to follow their professions; hence more high caliber people are attracted to an accredited hospital.
