The long, hard hours spent by other groups in setting up a comprehensive Civil Defense organization for operation in events of disaster . . . these efforts, too, have




e join your family, friends and this entire community in wishing each of you well in whatever endeavor you may plan for the future. Your grad-

James Russell Lowell expressed it eloquently: "It was in making education not only common to all, but in some sense compulsory on all, that the destiny of the free republics of America was practically settled."

In other words, only an educated people treasure and strive for freedom. Contrary to what the propagandists preach, the great masses of the communist world are not educated. The selected few are allowed to continue their education after elementary school and enter a profession of their choice. You, on the other hand, have a free choice and thus become the master of your own destiny. You are, then, the master of the destiny of your country. What it will become in the next two or three decades depends almost entirely upon you. To keep your beritage, your freedom, and self respect will require your greatest effort. We wish you well and ask God's blessing upon your endeavors.
