Slaton residents will be presented the question sometime this summer of new City Hall construction, via route of a bond election for that purpose, Mayor L. O. Lemon has announced.

Need of a new City Hall building has been discussed on the street and before civic organizations during the past weeks, with the question brought into focus Monday night when a petition bearing more than 500 signatures was presented to the city commission at its regular meeting, requesting that the commission call an election for the issuance of not more than \$75,000.00 in bonds for city hall construction.

Discussion at the meeting culminate with the body voting unanimously in favor of motion by Commissioner Robert Hall Davis and second by Commissioner J. E. Eckert, Jr. to ask the architectural firm of Haynes and Kirby to be present at next regular city meeting for preliminary discussion on plans for a city hall building.

Actually, much groundwork is required before date for the bond election can be called, hence actual voting time is indefinite.

The present city hall, erected in 1922 at a cost of some \$25,000, is now free of debt, last bonds being retired in April of this year after a 40-year payout period.

Current auditor report on file shows the City of Slaton now having \$562,500.00 outstanding bonds. None of these are revenue bonds. Slaton is one of the few towns having no revenue bonds.

Rule-of-thumb estimate of a sensible bonding program by

municipalities generally concedes 10 per cent of total property valuation as safe indebtedness. Local valuation is pushing \$7 million, leaving a safe margin between the present \$562,500 and suggested maximum of \$700,000.

Last bonds voted in Slaton were in 1959 when \$150,000 was allocated for water and street improvement.

News from Neighbors Events Opinion

HEREFORD — Hereford the center of a mining area. Never, you might say. But those who heard Carnegie Hughes in a talk here Monday night disagree.

They came away convinced that the Panhandle vast wealth of minerals and most of them haven't been considered.

Unlike many areas of the country which are rich in their natural resources, this area hasn't even been touched. At least, that is Hughes' contention.

The reason, he says, is that the area first was sitting atop a vast reservoir of oil and gas, with some sulphur thrown in for good measure as mere by-products. The same time, water was found in huge quantities in formation, one of the four major strata beneath the surface.

Between petroleum and agriculture, the economy is so good that no one even had to consider what other resources were to be had.

But Hughes says that the territory now needs to be looked at other areas. Even with rigid production controls and oil won't last forever. And water may someday be plaguing farmers.

The next frontier then might be in development of materials that are found in varying abundance.

Hereford's own tile and brick factory is a good example of using natural resources. The factory utilizes clay in manufacturing both brick and tile for local use. They are just one of many such materials mentioned by Hughes that other clays are ideal for making bricks.

Others, Hughes told the meeting, are Fuller's earth in commercial quantities and used for drilling mud in the oil industry.

Within the various formations are several good building stores, such as dolomite, Caliche, sand and gravel. They have been dug out of natural formations here for many years.

But most residents don't know that there are some deposits of gypsum, used in wallboard, some forms of common opal.

Other minerals found here in greater or lesser amounts include potassium, copper, manganese, barium and some active ores. Commercial amounts of uranium have been found as close as Silverton.

Known presently for its petroleum, cattle and sheep, Panhandle may soon also be recognized for its minerals. It is hoped to fully utilize other natural resources.

DENVER CITY — A \$325,000 bond election for the Yonkum County Hospital here has been called for Friday, May 18.

The action was taken by county commissioners when bearing some 450 signatures was presented at the commissioners court meeting the preceding Monday. They actually requiring only 215 names, was declared valid by the commissioners at the special Friday session.

ness kept the commissioners working far into the night Monday.

On motion by Davis and second by Eckert, the commission voted unanimously to pass a resolution authorizing Mayor Lemoh to execute a contract for acquisition of an 8-acre tract of land from the heirs of John W. Jarrot when a price has been set by an arbitration board.

George D. Willis, water and sewer superintendent, met with the group, presenting several policy items in his department. On question of charging heavy users of water a higher deposit than the usual \$10, the commission requested that average monthly bills of heavy business users be computed and presented at next meeting prior to any action.

Police Chief Eugene L. Martin presented bids on leasing of patrol cars from Kendrick Pontiac, Crow Chevrolet and Slaton Motor Company. Bids involved furnishing of two patrol cars and their maintenance for a 2-year period, to be paid on a monthly basis. Action was deferred until next meeting, upon motion by Davis and second by Gonzales.

Commissioner Eckert reported that complaints had arisen on dogs running at large and he suggested that efforts to control the situation should be intensified. Discussion revealed that 318 dogs had been impounded and destroyed within the last 13 months.

The fact that there has been no progress made on a franchise agreement with the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company again was discussed and the group voted unanimously on motion by Eckert, second by Gonzales, to ask the phone company officials to be present at next regular meeting of the Commission.

The new fire contract with the County of Lubbock was discussed, resulting in agreement that this contract be sent to the City of Lubbock for examination and approval since each town in the county is affected by the same contract.

On motion by Davis, second by Gonzales, unanimous approval was given to delegate authority to the City secretary for supervision of City Hall care and maintenance, care of the City Hall grounds and of the Santa Fe Park.

Mayor Lemon reported that he had been approached by a local businessman regarding closing and acquiring of North 18th street between Hale and Hockley streets. It was pointed out that this street had never been used as a street and was serving no purpose at this time. On motion by Davis and second by Eckert, the Commission voted to set a price of \$1,000 on this property with the buyer satisfying rights of the other adjacent property owner.

GO TO COLLEGE . . . OR GET A JOB

Which Is Right Choice for High School Grad?

About Going to College Question: Should I go to college? Answer: Yes—if your high school grades were good enough; if you can pass an entrance examination; if you can afford it. Question: Why should I go to college? Answer: To continue your education and place yourself in a better position in your chosen field. Question: Will a college degree guarantee me a job and a high income? Answer: A college degree certifies that you have completed a specified course of education. You still have to get out and get yourself a job, just as a high school graduate does. And you

have to "earn" your way to the top. Question: Then, why shouldn't I go ahead and get a job right now? Answer: You can get a job right now—but a job that re-

quires no more than a high school education will not pay as much as a job which sets a college degree as a requirement. As we said earlier, a college degree puts you into a position to realize a higher salary for your services.

Question: If I start now, with some good company, isn't it possible I might receive several promotions in four years, and by then have a good start on a career? Answer: It's possible. It's also possible that four years from now you will discover that a co-worker, with a similar salary and similar pay, is fresh out of college—and you must compete with him for future promotions.

Question: Is a college education really so important in getting a "good" job and is it such a factor in company promotions? Answer: Simply stated, the best jobs go to college graduates because employers believe the college graduate is better qualified to accept a position of responsibility. If a high school graduate has outstanding qualifications, he may do well in any field; but another individual, with equal qualifications, plus the added recommendation of a college diploma, is certain to do better. As to the matter of promotions in business, put yourself in an employer's position: If you had two men of equal ability and talents, except that one had a college education, which man would you promote?

Getting a Job Now Question: I don't want to go to college. I want to get a job right away. How do I go about it? Answer: Decide the type of job you would like to have . . . factory work, office work, selling, etc. Once you have chosen the type of work you wish to do, make a list of the companies in your community which might hire you. Visit the personnel office of each and fill out an application for employment.

Question: Is that all there is to it? I just go around and make an application? Answer: That is the beginning. When you make application for employment, you let a prospective employer know that you are available. He may not need you today or tomorrow. Next week, however, an opening may arise and he will be looking through the job applications filed with the personnel office to see it a likely candidate for the job is available.

Question: Then, if I am suited for the job, they call me and tell me when to report to work? Answer: Not exactly. The job application that you filled out at a company personnel office does not always tell an employer all that he would like to know about you. The job application provides general information. If you are considered for employment, you will be asked to come in for a job interview at which time more specific questions will be asked.

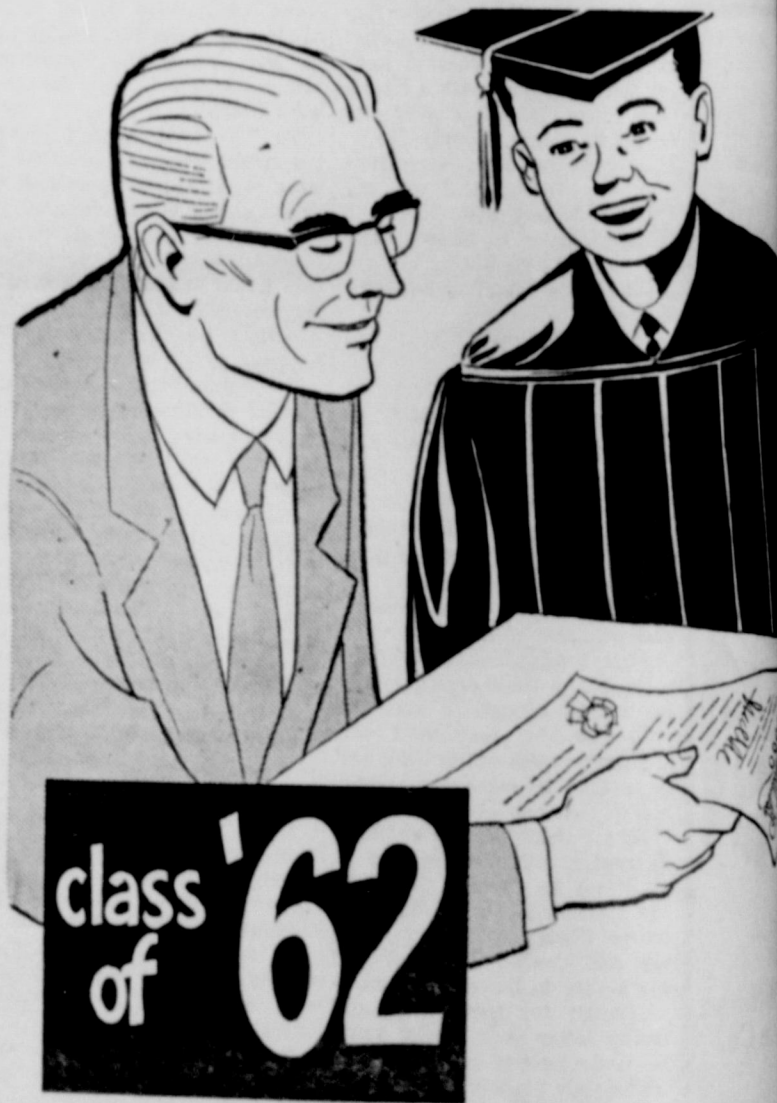

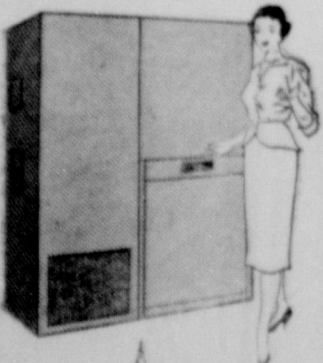

Seven Million Cattle On Feed

A total of 7,200,000 head of cattle and calves was on feed for slaughter market in the 26 major feeding States April 1. This number is 1 percent more than the 7,100,000 head on feed in these States April 1 a year earlier, but down seasonally from the 7,862,000 head on feed three months ago (January 1, 1962). In 28 States (26 States plus Georgia and Alabama) having quarterly data, there were 7,291,000 head on feed April 1, 1962 compared with 7,990,000 head on feed the first of the year, according to the Texas Co-Op and Livestock Reporting Service.

Cattle and calves placed on feed during January-March this year in the 26 States totaled 2,806,000 head, 1 percent above the 2,766,000 head during the same period in 1961.

Cattle feeders in the 26 States intend to market 47 percent or 3,376,000 head of the April 1 inventory number during April, May, and June. If intentions are carried out, the marketings would be 2 percent below the 3,438,000 head marketed the second quarter of 1961 from the April 1, 1961 number on feed.

Speed Warnings Contribute To Safety Record

The war on speed that has been declared in many parts of the United States by law enforcement officers, safety groups and others has apparently brought gratifying results for the second year in a row statistics reveal.

The annual report on highway deaths and injuries, compiled each year since 1931, except for the war years by one insurance firm shows that during 1961 there were 710 less deaths attributed to speed than a year ago.

Still tagged as the number one cause of fatal highway accidents, speed was blamed for 10,260 deaths last year as compared with 10,970 the year before. This comes on the heels of a drop from 12,980 caused by speed in 1959, the report stated. Traced to this same violation were 946,600 personal injuries—down more than 50,000 from a year ago.

From all causes, automobile accidents were blamed for 37,600 deaths and 3,057,000 injuries, about one per cent less than a year ago — the first decrease in total casualties since 1954.

Showing increases in fatalities this past year were accident resulting from non-collision (up 200 deaths); collision with fixed object (up 250 deaths) and car-bicycle accidents (up 20 deaths).

Decreases were reported in collision with another auto (down 300 deaths); car-pedestrian (down 500 deaths); collision with train (down 70 deaths) and collision with other vehicles (down 40 deaths).

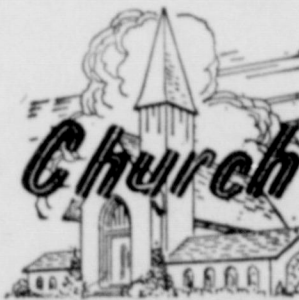

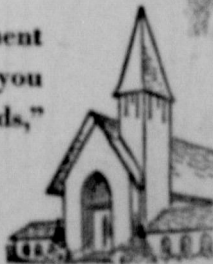
