As we see on every hand the encroachments of socialism we realize that you and our-selves have evidently "goofed," failing to carry that torch of early Americanism as we larned it at the knees of our forefathers

What do our younger children know of individualism in business, in society, in economics, in government?

If you think we are unduly excited, affected by the heat and wind of the last few days, we point out the


following for consideration: Nationalism as opposed to individualism is popular. It must be so, else it could not have made the inroads
