"Luxury goods means any article of tangible property selling for an amount in excess of \$50, and which may be seen, weighed, measured, felt or touched, or which is in any other manner perceptible to the sen sea. Luxury goods does not include real property."

Seeligson refers to his tax plan as a \$50 deductible tax. Under the plan, if you purchase a \$55 luxury item you would only pay the two per cent tax on the amount over \$50. The tax applies to each separate sale.

To prevent evasion, the bill would require that any seller that sold units separately when actually the units were all to be used together would be guilty
