City Lets Bids On Sewer Work; To Sell Bonds In Monday Meeting

Hemphill Construction Company of Lubbock will get started on sewer work in north Slaton "right away," after being awarded the bid at a Monday night meeting of the Slaton City Commission.

Only two bids were received for the job with Hemphill, the low bidder at \$15,114.85, getting the nod over Panhandle Construction Company, also of Lubbock, which submitted a \$15,945.00 bid.

The price is for work only

and does not include engineering fees.

In other action Monday night, the commission awarded a contract to L. C. Kurtz of Tulsa, steeplejack, for work to be done on a water storage tank.

Kurtz will clean, repair and paint, both inside and outside, the 440,000 gallon tank at pump station number three, in southwest Slaton. Cost of the work will be \$2,645.75.

The commissioners also canvassed the city bond election

and passed a resolution approving the results as reported by judges. A called meeting will be held next Monday night at which bids will be taken on the sale of the bonds voted Tuesday of last week.

Other city news includes a reminder by city representatives that there exists an ordinance against popping firecrackers inside the city limits. Violators will be prosecuted, it was pointed out.

Union Thanksgiving Services Are Set Thursday; Program Outlined

Union Thanksgiving Services will be held at 9:30 a. m. today (Thursday, Thanksgiving Day) in the First Christian Church.

Various members of the Slaton Ministerial Alliance will take part on the program with special music to be provided by the First Baptist Church.

The general public is invited to attend these services. The sermon, "We Give Thanks," will be delivered by Rev. Rollo Davidson, pastor of the First Methodist Church.

Jack Nowlin, choir director of First Methodist, will lead songs for the service and Mrs. O. D. Kenney will be organist.

The Call to Worship will be taken from Psalms 100:4, 5, "Come into His gates with thanksgiving, and into His courts with praise; give thanks unto Him, bless His name. For the Lord is good; His loving kindness endureth forever; and His faithfulness unto all generations."

The invocation will be by Rev. H. E. Summers, pastor of the Bible Baptist Church. A "Litany of Thanksgiving" will be led by Rev. Leroy Deans, pastor of the Grace Lutheran Church.

An Old Testament reading, Psalms 65, will be given by Rev. Wendell Thomas, pastor of the Trinity Evangelical Methodist Church, and a Prayer of Thanksgiving will be uttered by Rev. Clarence Wylie, pastor of First Presbyterian Church.

New Testament scripture will be read by Rev. C. M. Fields, pastor of Westview Baptist Church, and will be taken from Luke 17:11-19.

Rev. Ted Gaze, pastor of First Baptist, will have charge of the offering and will give the prayer dedicating the offering, which will be used by the Ministerial Alliance for emergency relief work in Slaton.

The Prayer of Consecration will be given by Rev. W. E. Rhodes, pastor of the Nazarene Church and the benediction will be by Rev. E. E. Malone, pastor of the Church of God.

A week of favorable weather for cotton ginning saw the 10 gins in the Slaton area boost the total for this year to 26,702 bales.

Most ginner reported that they had a steady run all week and had "more than we could do."

The total shows an increase of 5,494 bales over last week's mark. The week before, the gins rolled out 5,524 in a period hampered by bad weather.

Probably the reason the latest report falls under the previous one is because the former report was received on Monday and the latter was taken on Tuesday.

Slaton And Its Traffic Problems

The Slaton record for traffic mishaps and injuries is most favorable and there are few towns and cities which can match it for safety. But there are one or two flaws that seem rather prominent and it does not seem out of place to bring them to the attention of the public.

One of them is the blinking traffic light on South 9th St. It was changed from a regular traffic signal to the blinker.

It did seem a little inconvenient, but it served the purpose of slowing down traffic that seemed almost out of control as it came into or went out of town. True there were a great many trucks that came cannon-balling through and when they stopped there were ear splitting roars and when three or four were lined up, waiting for the light to change, it must have been a great abomination to the residents of that area but it could not have been nearly as rough as it is in the big cities, where the truck traffic is far heavier.

There have been more traffic mishaps there than at most of the other traffic controls in the town. As it is, the cars and trucks pay no more attention to the blinker than they did before the signal was installed. If the folks want to keep the highway going through Slaton, something should be done to make South Ninth Street less noisier and the traffic slower.

Slaton is unique in its arrangement and it would take a gang of Philadelphia lawyers and most of the qualified traffic experts to figure out a set of rules for the traffic of the town. It is because of this confusion that our traffic accident record has been so good. Most of us know that one must watch out for himself and be courteous to our fellow atom-smashers. It pays to give the other fellow the right of way when you see he is going to take it whether it is his by law or not, and as there are few regulations that would fill the bill here in Slaton, we know what's good for us and watch the corners. Whether the light on South Ninth street stays as it is or not will probably make no great difference because most of us will do our best to drive safely. But those folks who come through here who have been out on the road driving seventy and eighty miles per hour need something to slow them down before they get into the middle of town and that signal light might do it if it were changed back into a regulation red and green one.

The Lubbock business men certainly should appreciate the traffic that comes to them from Slaton for there is seldom a business day passes that a large number of solicitors do not visit Slaton from Lubbock and the Slaton merchants are in constant competition with those in Lubbock. It is not a one-way road to Lubbock either, for there are a number of people living in Lubbock who work in Slaton. The trend in the way business is done in Lubbock, and the larger cities, is more toward the way it is done in the smaller towns with shopping centers springing up like mushrooms in the most unexpected places. Most of the shops and super markets in these shopping centers operate about like the shops do in a smaller town and they offer no better selection than those in Slaton and other smaller towns. Lubbock will soon be just a collection of small towns scattered all over the South Plains. We are all in one bucket together and the better we get along together the better we will all be.

forcement comes to a pitiful, grinding halt. Because he's under 17 years of age, the judge is powerless to proceed further against the youngster.

And a few hours later, young Jimmy was bragging to his friends about how the "cops can't lay a hand on you."

That's just about the situation that existed here until Monday of this week when court and law enforcement officials got together and mapped ways and means of punishing consistent, persistent juvenile offenders.

Jimmy can still get by on his first two violations . . . but after that both he and his parents are in deep water. On the third offense Jimmy's parents can be fined up to \$500 or confinement in jail up to six months or both.

And on the 4th violation, young Jimmy himself can be

taken from control by his parents and placed under the control of court to be probated under constant surveillance or sent to Gatesville or Gainesville institutions.

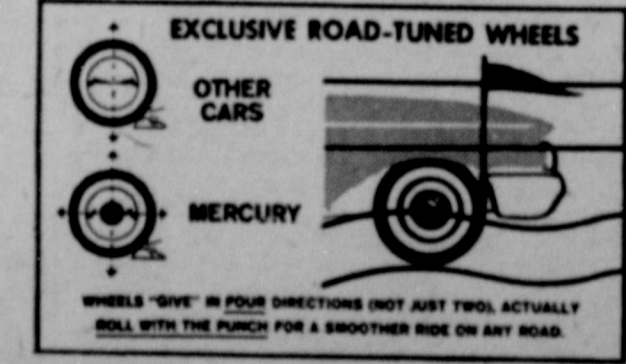

JUST TALK

As a missionary of better eating, I have undertaken to spread good advice among the young wives I see here and there. It is my sincere belief that they of the future will never know what good food is unless some of us old rockheads get busy and lead the young women of the day into the right paths. Of course, it is too much to

expect or hope that frozen food will ever be knocked off the list but to give up entirely is hopeless and it is, my intention to do the best I can to find out which ones of the frozen things are good and which ones are not. My first experiments were with cakes. To my surprise, and disgust, I found one line that is as good as mother used to make, and to be perfectly honest, I must hide my head in shame and admit the cakes are even better than mother used to make and when I say that, I have in mind some mighty fine cakes.

The frozen pies are a mighty disappointment and if there is anything worse than frozen mashed potatoes, you'll have to find it in the garbage after it is one or two days old.

If it were not showing favoritism I'd mention the brand of cakes that I consider so good, but let the customers find out for themselves or phone me.

Something else I would like for the young women to learn is how to fry bacon. Nearly all women are too restless and feather-minded to watch bacon close enough while it is cooking. They don't turn it often enough and it sticks to the pan, burns to a cinder on one end and is as raw as uncooked hog liver on the other. While my wife is burning the toast every morning, I watch the bacon with an eagle eye, and even if I do say so myself, it is cooked to a lovely brown and as crisp as a newly-plucked lettuce leaf. It takes thick-sliced bacon to have a real flavor and a mean and forceful disposition to get it cooked as it should be. My advice to young husbands and men who cannot get their bacon just right is to cook it themselves.

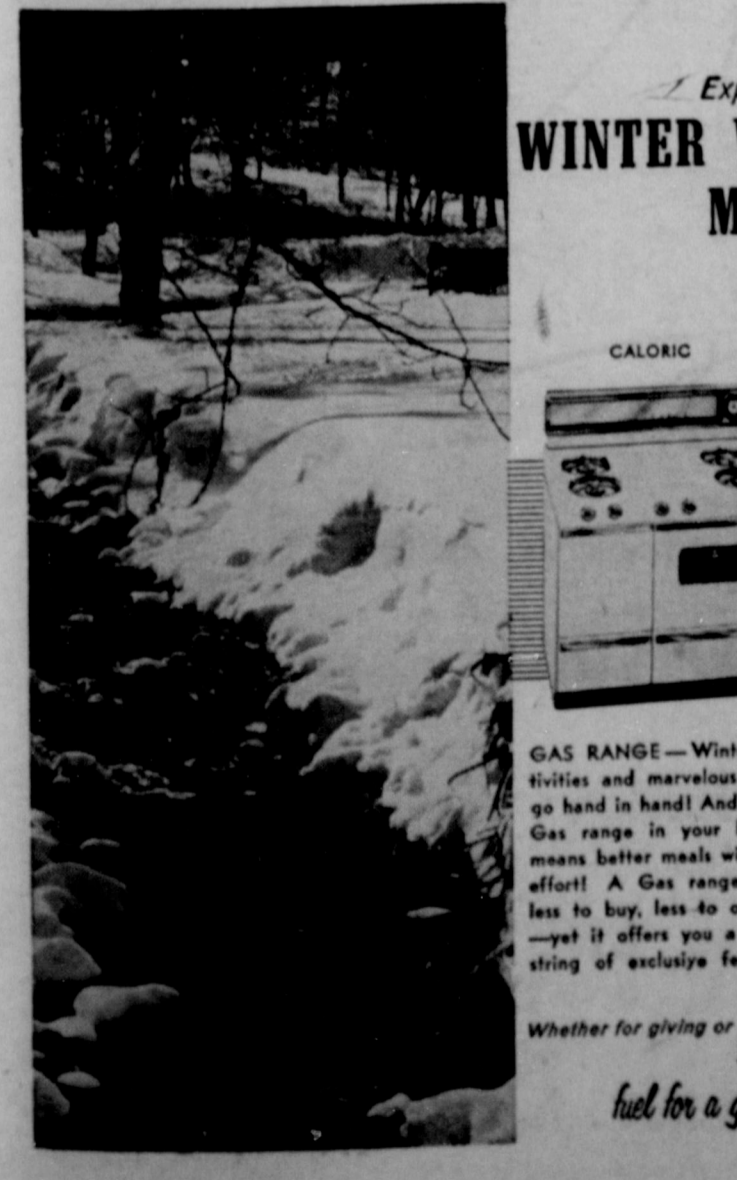

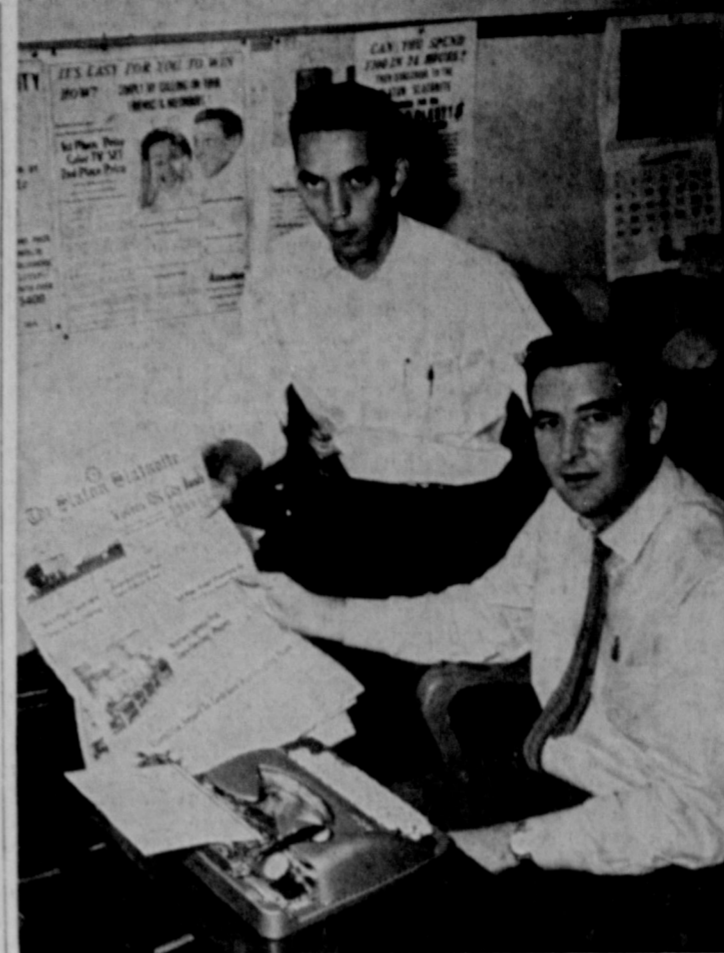

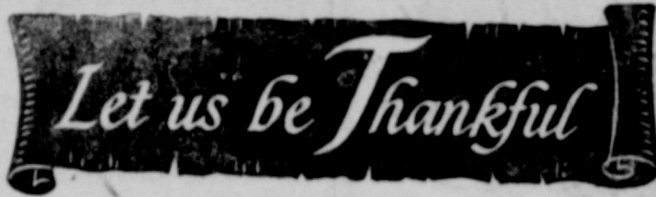

**Census To Bring
Up To Date
Farm Statistics**

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, now under way in Lubbock County, will bring up to date farm statistics last collected in 1954, when the farm census revealed the following facts:
The value of products sold in 1954 by farm operators was \$48,862,502.
The value of all crops sold was \$47,144,843 and included \$47,014,781 for field crops, \$30,809 for vegetables, \$553 for fruits and nuts, and \$98,700 for horticultural specialties.

The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$1,717,659 and included \$255,424 for dairy products, \$399,224 for poultry and poultry products, and \$1,063,011 for livestock and livestock products.
The value of forest products sold from the county's farms was no data.

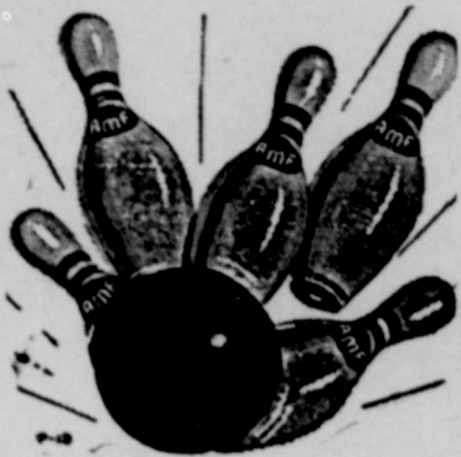

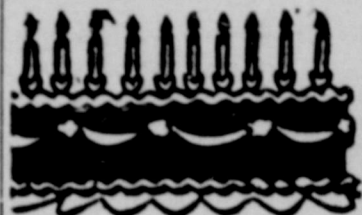

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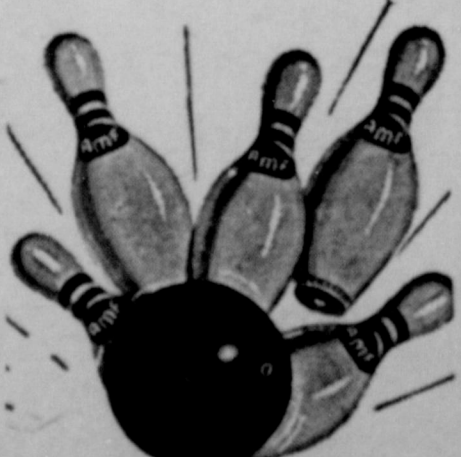

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Santa Fe Gets Award Freight Salesmanship

The Santa Fe Railway's vigorous campaign for better freight salesmanship has won it the 1959 Modern Railroads Golden Freight Car Award. The announcement was made in the November issue of the magazine, a leading industry journal. The publication sponsors an annual award contest to give recognition to railroads that perform outstanding work in promoting freight sales. The object is to stimulate better selling of freight service and thereby to help railroads increase their share of the nation's freight business. Besides the Santa Fe, four other railroads were awarded awards of merit in this year's contest. They are The Atlantic Coast Line Railroad, The Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad, The New York Central System, and The Southern Railway System. The Golden Freight Car Trophy for the Santa Fe and plaques for the runner-up railroads were presented at a luncheon at the Palmer House, Chicago, Nov. 17. The presentation was made by David R. Watson, president, and Frank Richter, publisher of Modern Railroads. The Santa Fe's winning story described the railroads throughgoing campaign among its own salesmen on the theme of "The Three K's of Transportation Salesmanship." The Three K's are: Know your company; Know

you competition; Know your customers. The Coast Line's "Traffic Round-Up" program won for it one of the Honorable Mention Merits Awards. C&O's campaign to stimulate foreign freight forwarder traffic; NYC's new Centralized Rate Bureau Service; and the Southern's strong 1958 freight advertising campaign were also judged of merit award caliber.

Competition was keen among the entries submitted, and a variety of approaches made the judging a tough job. The judges selected for their "know how" in traffic, sales promotion and advertising, were Richard J. Brown, sales promotion manager of Pacesetter Homes, Inc., and president of the Sales Promotion Executives Association; James W. Murphy, advertising manager of Allis-Shalmers Manufacturing Co.; and Theodore C. Brand, traffic manager of the Chicago Tribune.

Commenting on the entries, Mr. Murphy said, "These entries indicate that work is being done in these areas by railroads that compares with the best in sales management and sales promotion. Both the entries and the Golden Freight Car Award should stimulate other railroads to follow suit."

Mr. Richter added, "The entries are outstanding examples of how railroads can effectively combine sales work, sales management, sales training and advertising to help get more business."

Abilene Police Chief Warren Dodson at the Texas Law Enforcement Foundation's banquet in Austin. It pinpointed one of the reasons for TLEF's existence—to effect a better partnership between the public and the law enforcement agencies. Public sympathy, it seems, is inclined to go out to the criminal, putting him in the role of "underdog," the hapless victim of hard-hearted policemen and prosecuting attorneys. "Texas Legislature has a poor record for crime fighting," Gov. Price Daniel charged at the meeting. "Of 27 law enforcement bills proposed last session, only three were passed—and these were partially crippled." Governor Daniel warned that crime is increasing three times as fast as the population, and it is the state's most serious social problem. During the first six months of this year, lawlessness flourished at the rate of three murders, three rapes and 125 burglaries each day. TLEF is a privately financed organization of outstanding citizens over the state. All The Way For LBJ—Governor Daniel announced he will support Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, not only for the presidential nomination, but for chairman of the Texas delegation to the Los Angeles national convention. Senator Johnson and former Gov. Allan Shivers fell out over who should be state delegation chairman in 1956. Johnson won. Daniel says he wants Johnson to be chairman, but that he (Daniel) will take an active role in working for the senator both

here and in other states.

Save The Seed— State Board of Education has gone record as being unanimously opposed to spending anything but the income from the \$400,000,000 Permanent School Fund.

Funda has been built up over the years, principally through sales of mineral rights on the school lands. It has been invested in government and municipal bonds which have an income of about 12,500,000 per year.

This investment income is used for school operating expenses. It is dipping into the principal—the \$400,000,000—that the Board opposes.

Board resolution compared the school trust fund to seed corn which "our forefathers saved to plant instead of grinding it for use as food."

There has been some talk of tapping the permanent fund to meet current demands for a teacher pay raise.

Board of Education approved the holding of a county-wide election to see if Cooke County residents would be willing to support a junior college at a study of the feasibility of establishing a junior college in Midland also was approved.

Textbooks in seven subjects were adopted by the Board, including, for the first time, journalism books.

Rule His 'Corporate Optometry' Within the next few weeks Texas optometrists will vote on a proposed new rule prohibiting under any name except the name under which the optometrist is licensed.

Before polling the optometrists, the Board of Examiners in Optometry got a ruling from Attorney General Will Wilson stating that the regulation would be legal and valid.

While the board is not bound by the results of the balloting, it was predicted that a favorable response would almost certainly result in adoption of the rule. This, because there are hundreds of individuals engaged in optometry as compared with firms so engaged.

If adopted, the rule would prohibit practice "under an assumed name, corporate name, trade name or any name other than the name under which the optometrist is licensed."

This would mean the end of such firms as Texas State Optical, and Lee Optical, where glasses are available at considerable savings to the general public.

Hospital Problems Studied— State Hospital Board has under way studies aimed at three of its current problems.

One is to find a way, other than providing expensive mental hospital facilities, to care for some 2,700 patients whose only ailment at present is old age. Two plans are being considered. One is state assistance toward the cost of caring for the oldsters in private nursing homes. Other is providing for state nursing homes.

Under law, the state is not responsible for giving institutional care for the aged. But these patients were all admitted on court order as mental cases. Now they're too infirm to be "turned out."

Another problem under study is that of tuberculosis patients who go "awol" from TB hospitals before they are completely cured. Danger is not only that they will relapse, but that they will infect healthy outsiders.

Third matter under study is the facilities needed for present and future care of mentally retarded children under school age.

ways to cut school costs without sacrificing necessities.

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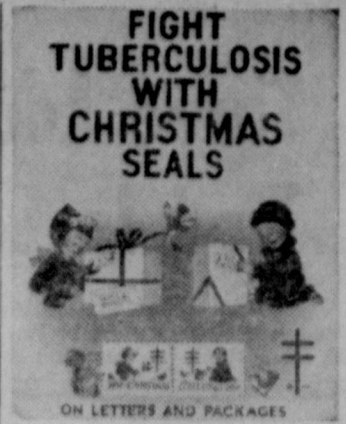

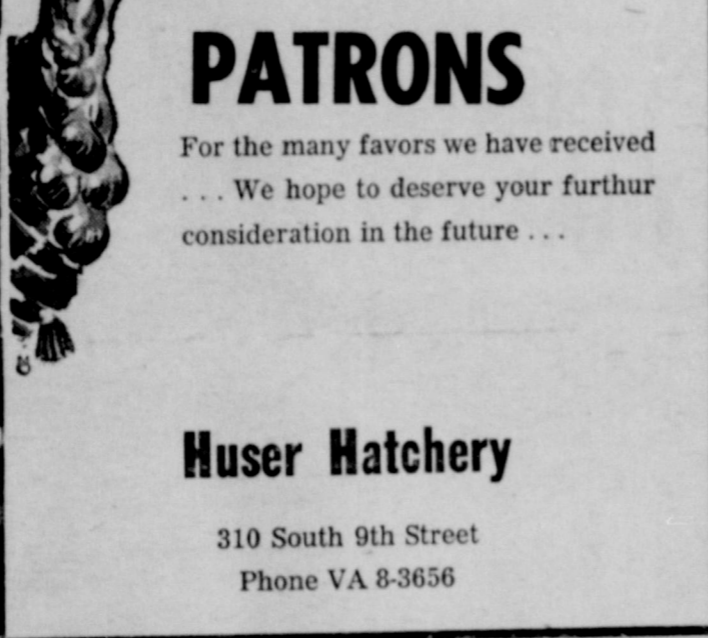

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'Individual Freedom' Rates High Among Texans, 'Values, Ideals' Survey Shows

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of articles on the studies and findings of the Governor's Committee for the 1960 White House Conference on Children and Youth.)

What are the most important "values and ideals?" The overwhelming first choice among Texans, is "individual freedom."

Questionnaires and opinion polls on this subject were distributed and tabulated by the Governor's Committee for the 1960 White House Conference on Children and Youth. The committee findings will be a part of the Texas report to the Washington conference, March 27-April 2, and to the Governor's Conference in Austin, December 5, 1959.

A total of 116 delegates will attend the conference from the Lone Star State. Their report on "values and ideals" will show these choices among Texas adults:

1. Individual freedom—the right of the individual to religious, political, economic and other freedoms.
2. Respect for rights of the individual—an individual should be respected for what he is, regardless of social and economic status, race, religion or sex.
3. Respect for law and order—Obey the law, obey your elders, and anyone else in authority.
4. Morality—Actions in private life, relationships with friends and in business should be guided by moral and ethical codes derived from our religious principles.
5. The monogamous family—The family is the keystone of our democracy and society.

The findings were announced by Dr. Guy D. Newman, President of Howard Payne College, Brownwood, who is chairman of the Governor's 154-member Committee. Dr. Newman pointed out that the questionnaires, widely distributed throughout the State among the local-level White House committees, organizations and clubs, sought to determine what values and ideals hold the greatest meaning for the most people in Texas.

Each person was asked to name his choices from a list of 16 possibilities. From sixth to tenth choices were religion, humanitarianism, equal oppor-

tunity, success and status, material wealth and comfort.

Receiving the lowest number of votes was "group conformity." The tabulations indicated that Texans generally feel this is an undesirable trait and that there should be less of it.

As a part of the Committee's studies, in preparation for the White House conference, views were obtained on how these values and ideals can best be transmitted to children and youth.

Participants also were asked: "Who should be responsible for teaching them to our children?" The responsibility, according to the tabulations, was clearly established in the home, the Church and the school, in that order; and the suggested ways to teach values and ideals were, in the order of importance, as follows:

1. Parents setting good examples of behavior and regular attendance of the family at Church.
2. Sunday School attendance, and adults other than parents setting good examples.
3. Setting more stringent rules and tighter control on children's behavior at home.
4. Character-building courses in school.

The findings revealed from the questionnaires closely paralleled the opinions expressed in two public polls—one by Governor Daniel through the newspapers, radio and television; and the other by the Belden Associates.

All the polls and research on which the Governor's Committee based its report clearly revealed that the top problems facing today's children and youth are lack of adequate parental care and guidance, and bad examples parents set for children. Common types of bad parental examples were drinking alcoholic beverages, using profanity, quarreling in the children's presence and showing disrespect for each other.

When asked, "What can be done to help people become better parents," the largest group answered "to rely on spiritual influence of the church; spend more time with children and do more things together as a family."

Based on the findings of the

"values and ideals" study, the Governor's Committee made the following recommendation:

"In view of the fact that the home is the basic unit of all society, and in view of the general conviction among Texans that the home has the basic responsibility for teaching values and ideals to children, we recommend that those responsible for the direction of the other institutions of society (school and Church) look carefully at their present programs with a view to helping fathers and mothers in the home do their job well. Some of our present confusion in the realm of values and ideals

can be traced to the competition between these institutions; and we must remember for the sake of our youth that we are not competitors but laborers together. Where parents and the home have been down-graded, let us determine to encourage, help and upgrade them."

The Committee goes further to state: "Heretofore families and homes in the midst of a world in travail have been left largely alone to shift for themselves and go on the rocks. We believe that family and marriage counseling services deserve a significant place in our communities."

Many new training aids and new methods of instruction are

used in these clinics, also actual brake installations are made on vehicles.

There are many local mechanics as well as Light High School students taking the basic course of 3 nights from 7 to 10 p.m.

Mechanics also fill the advanced course which is 2 nights, 7 to 10 p.m. This advanced course is mainly power brake trouble shooting and service.
