In September of 1957, the present owners, Sam Ellis and C. E. Basinger, bought Slaton Implement Company.

The establishment does a \$150,000 business per year. Since Mr. Ellis and Mr. Basinger have owned the firm, business has doubled. They still handle International Harvester parts and implements as did the first owner.
