

Now virtual civil war erupted in the territory. In the seige of Lawrence in December 1855. Holliday was made a Colonel and placed in command of the Second Kansas Regiment.

In 1859, in the midst of this chaos, Colonel Cyrus K. Holliday drew up the charter of what was to become the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad and presented it to the legislature which accepted

Englishman Fred Harvey Made Millions On Railroad Restaurants

Took Action Against Deplorable Conditions In RR Restaurants

now better known to American travelers than that of any railroad builder.

Fred Harvey, an Englishman who came to America in 1850 and worked first in a restaurant and later as a railroad mail clerk well knew the deplorable conditions under which travelers of that suffered day at what meals they could get.

In 1875 he approached Charles Morse, superintendent of the Santa Fe, with his idea of a cooperative working agreement between the railroad and him. Morse, who appreciated good food, liked the idea and so began a partnership, sealed with a hand-shake, that existed for years on a verbal agreement and would probably still have no agreement on paper were it not for the government regulations requiring such formalities.

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

Marshall also reveals that out of the lawyer, merchants and farmers who dreamed, built and operated it, the Santa Fe made not a single millionaire. But, like other granger roads, it created enough wealth out of almost nothing to make thousands prosperous.


