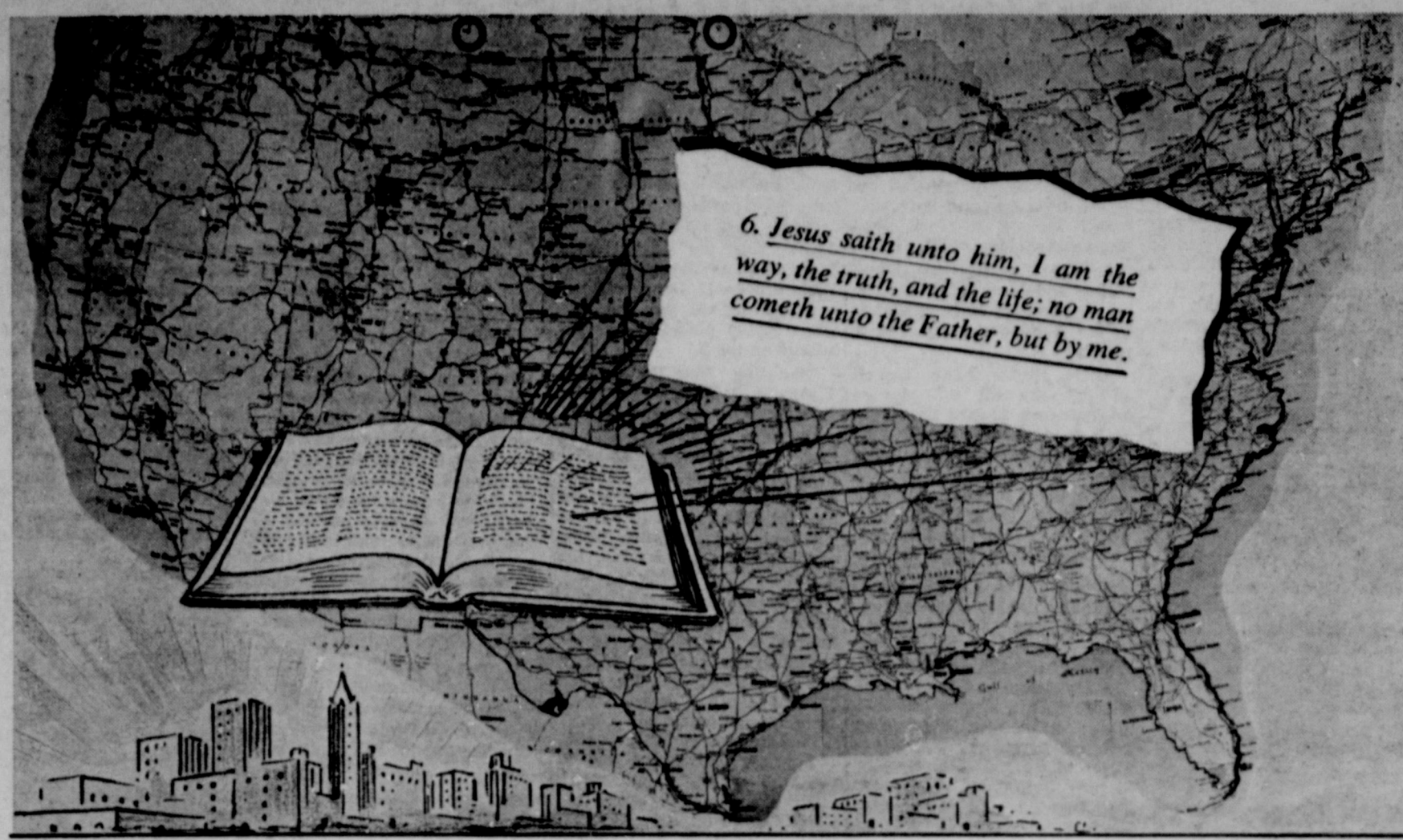

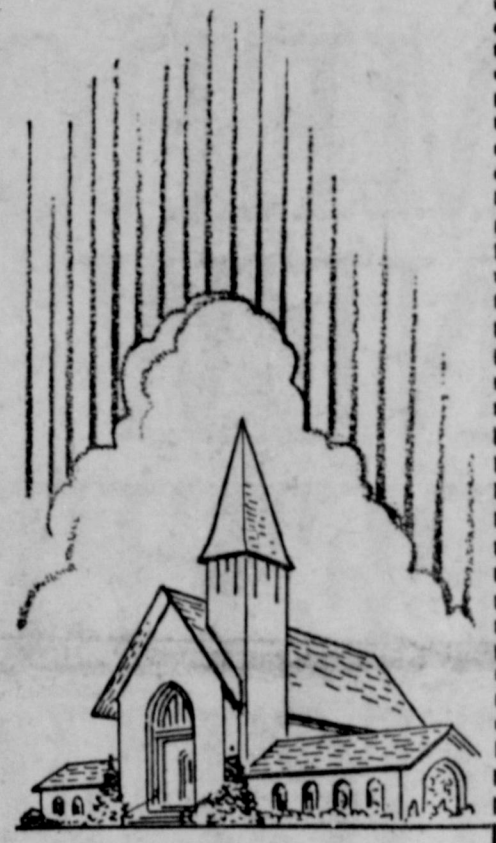

Bowling Club Opens Officially Saturday

Grand opening at Slaton Bowling Club will be Saturday and Sunday, after the establishment has been operating for more than a month.

In its first month before the official opening, the club has kept its 12-lanes full almost constantly.

Owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Dub Williams, the club boasts all-new automatic AMF pinspotters.

"We built the alley with the goal of making it West Texas' finest and believe we have accomplished this," Williams says.

The club also contains a snack bar, which will be operated by Mr. and Mrs. Howard Strubling. It has a stainless steel kitchen and matches the alleys and lobby area of the club.

Also, the club has locker rooms, where bowlers may rent lockers for the year for their own equipment. Bowling balls, shoes and uniforms are stocked or can be ordered by the club.

The building was constructed by H. C. Lewis Construction Co., Lubbock. Williams designed and planned the building.

CAL, a Lubbock corporation, owns the building and Williams leases it.

The equipment is owned by Williams except the pinspotters which are rented. Williams estimates each alley represents a \$10,000 investment.

"The early pace, makes it seem that 12 lanes will not be enough, but Slaton's population justified only eight according to national bowling experts. We decided to build it larger than they advised and will expand if the early pace is maintained."

Williams said.

The club already has six leagues participating. Three are men's loops and three are composed of women's teams. Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday nights are league nights. Two women's leagues share the lanes on Thursday mornings.

League bowling has caught on fast in Slaton. Sixty teams participate in the league activity, with some 300 individuals involved.

Some 60 boys 8-15 bowl on Saturday mornings.

"A town that plays together stays together," Williams says. He believes league bowling will help people get better acquainted with their neighbors and stimulate friendships.

"When you compete with your neighbor, you'll usually like him better afterwards," Williams said.

Currently the club is trying to

establish a couples league that would bowl from 9 to 11 on Wednesday nights. Interested couples should contact the club.

Williams says bowling has good reasons for its rapidly growing popularity as an American pastime.

"Bowling is a healthful recreation but it also provides mental recreation. Concentration is required to bowl a good game so the mind is also put to work in a relaxing way."

"The sport knows no seasons and any time of the day is a suitable time to bowl. Our club is air conditioned in summer and heated in winter."

Cooperation in maintaining the club has been good so far according to Williams. For the most part bowlers and spectators have been careful with the carpeting and other furnishings.

The club seats 60 bowlers and 60 spectators.

Mary Swanner, 155; and Peggy Quinn, 379, took the single and three-highs for individuals.

Another women's league, the Bowlettes, have a team with a full game lead over the runner-

ups. Bowling Grill has a 10-2 record and Sanders Grocery is close behind with 9-3.

Pat Kenney swept both individual top spots with 175 for the top single game and 440 for the best series.

Town and County has three teams with 7-1 records. Forrest Lumberjacks have the top spot on total pins. Other front runners in order are Axes and Piggy Wigly.

Les Adams nabbed both individual honors last week with a 573 series and 205 in a single game.

The Slaton Tiger's ended the season on a winning note with a 22-6 victory over the Post Antelopes Friday night.

Led by co-captains David Bishop and Jerry Allen the Tigers stood of an early challenge by the Antelopes and moved to victory.

Slaton received the kickoff and put the ball into play on their own 32-yard line. Fullback David Bishop fumbled on the first play and Post recovered.

Two plays picked up a first down on the 11-yard line. Three tries at the line failed to gain and a 4th down try into the center of the line failed to pick up the needed yards.

Slaton took possession on the 6-yard line. The Tigers again fumbled on the 3-yard line and Post recovered, but the favor was returned on the next play when Slaton picked up a Post miscue on the 5.

Operating from their 6 the Tiger's in 4 plays picked up a first down on their own 48.

Halfback Randy Sanders broke around end for 42 yards to the 10-yard line and the first down. Halfback Bill Barry carried for four yards and Sanders went over tackle to the 2. Bishop carried over center for the score.

The try for extra points failed. Post returned the kickoff to their own 31 yard line. On the next play tackle T. L. Blizzard broke through the line and brought the ball carrier down for a 10-yard loss.

Two more plays failed to gain and a punt moved the ball to the Antelope 45.

Bishop broke over center for a first down on the Post 35.

Barry carried over tackle for three yards and Bishop went over tackle for a first down on the 20. Bishop again carried for a first down on the nine.

Two plays resulted in a three yard loss to the 12. Quarterback Gary Ward passed to end David Bednarz for the touchdown. The try for point was no good, and the Tigers owned a 12-0 lead.

Post took the kickoff on their own 43 and in three plays moved the ball to the two yard line. A drive over tackle carried for the tally, a running try for the extra point failed.

The half ended with Slaton leading 12-6.

The third quarter was scoreless and played in the center of the field with neither team able to move the ball with any success. Post fumbled the ball on their own 37 late in the quarter.

End Jerry Allen recovered for the Tigers. Sanders carried a round end for 17 yards to the 20 yard line. Barry picked up 8 to the 12 and Bishop moved for the first down on the nine. Sanders moved to the one yard line and Bishop carried for the score.

Sanders scored the two extra points.

Post moved the ball to the Slaton 16 yard line late in the game, but lost the ball on downs.

The win gives the Tigers a season record of two wins, seven losses and one tie.

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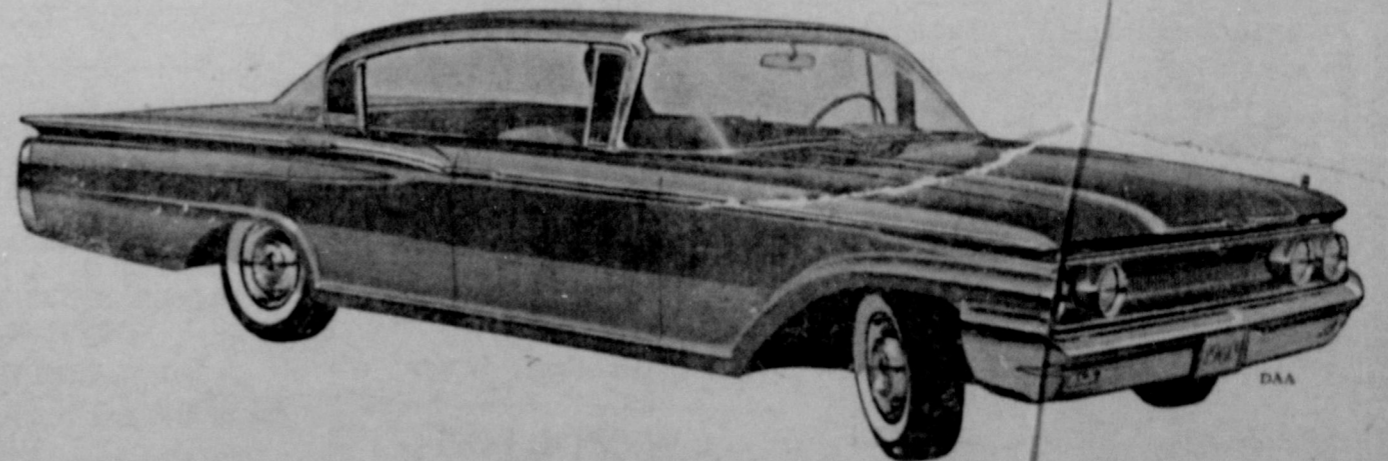

Important Safety Factor Water District Urges Covering For Irrigation Pump Drive Shaft-Engine

The High Plains Undergr... Water Conservation District, says that, one of the most dan... gerous omissions that an irri... gation farmer can be guilty of is... that of leaving the drive shaft... between his irrigation pump and... engine exposed.
We all remember the recent... story that appeared in our na... tions' newspapers which told of... a 12-year old girl whose pony... tail became entangled in the... moving parts of a potato-digging... machine. As a result of this

tragic accident, she lost her ears, eyebrows and scalp. Death ultimately claimed this 12-year old. This was a terrible thing, and we found ourselves asking how such an accident could happen and why the moving parts on the digger were not covered to prevent such an occurrence.
Well, the answer as to "why" may never be evident; however, one thing is certain—the potentially dangerous gears, etc. of that particular potato digger are no doubt adequately guarded today. The regrettable thing is that the safeguards came too late and

the cost of delay was too expensive.
Parallel this incident with the picture here in our own backyard. We have literally thousands of irrigation wells in the southern High Plains of Texas that do not have any form of cover or guard that offers protection from contact with the high speed drive shaft that transmits power to the pump from the engine.

If any model, of the many guards that are manufactured to cover exposed drive shafts, were expensive, an irrigator would perhaps be excused for not having one on each well that he operates, but all are probably priced under \$10. Therefore, the expense involved is not a valid excuse.

What then is the reason for these many drive shafts remaining exposed?

Probably the principal reason can be traced back to our old friend "complacency." He can be a bitter foe. We simply cannot feature tragic things happening to us. Oh, sure, these things occur every day, but always to someone else.

That's probably what a lady who lives in Lubbock today until her hair became accidentally entangled in an irrigation pump drive shaft back in 1948. This particular woman was observing a pumping well on her husband's farm near Anton in Hockley County at the time of the accident. She leaned in to get a better view of the water being pumped from the well. The next thing that she remembered was regaining consciousness in a Lubbock hospital. The agonizing pain that she felt was caused by the fact that one of her eyebrows and her entire scalp had been ripped from her head by the irrigation well's treacherous drive shaft. For weeks she lay at the brink of death. When finally the ordeal of facing death itself had passed, the months of expensive and painful plastic surgery began.

This is not a fictitious story. It actually happened, and it happened here in the High Plains. Don't shrug your shoulders and say to yourself that this is a one-chance-in-a-million occurrence. You have children who are looking to you for the proper action in this matter. Consider them—their very lives may well depend on your decision. Consider also the adult friends who come by your well to watch and visit. Their safety too may depend upon the decision you make.

Today, put a protecting guard on every irrigation well drive shaft that is exposed on your farm. This might well be one of the wisest things that you will ever have an opportunity to do. The Water District asks you to think carefully about this matter—then act.

Woman Loses Fast 144 Lbs.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 14—A woman volunteer in a University of Tennessee Medical School research program has peeled off 144 pounds of fat in 39 weeks.

Dr. I. Frank Tullis, chief of the school's division of medicine, said the woman—who weighed 473 pounds at the start—has existed on a milk shake-like formula plus black coffee, tea and water in prescribed amounts.

She is one of three "seriously overweight" volunteers taking part in the program delving into the cause of fatness and what happens when people lose weight.

The volunteers are fed the formula four times daily. It has a dried milk base with adequate protein, fat, carbohydrate, vitamin and mineral content.

The preparation, METRECAL, is produced by the Meade Johnson Company, pharmaceutical firm financing the obesity study.

Physical activities of the volunteers also are tightly controlled. Their caloric output is measured with a bicycle exerciser hooked up to an electric generator.

Periodic tests also are made of the patient's blood and waste products.

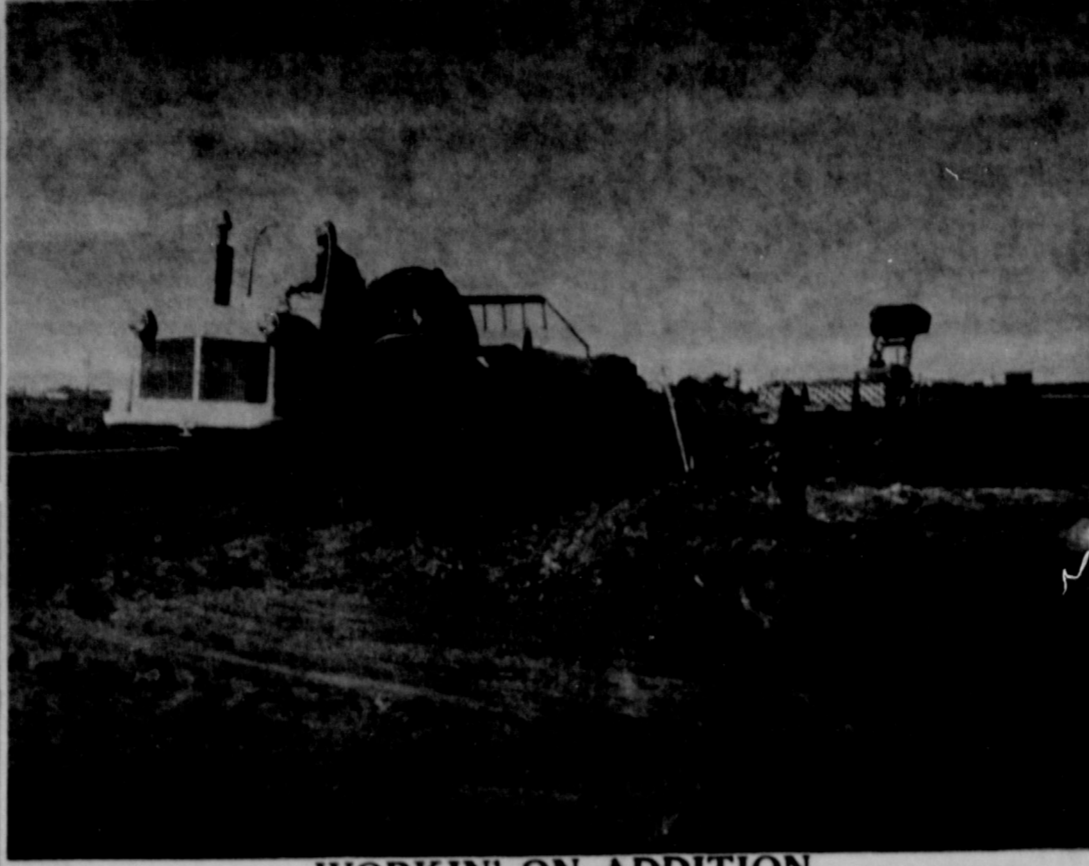

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN—Typical of the tangle of interests and viewpoints that confront Texans when they set out to "solve the water problem" is the current hassle over Trinity River water.

Trinity development poses special problems. This second largest river in Texas (in volume of water) has a 455-mile channel that meanders through or near three major population centers—Fort Worth, Dallas and Houston. All are directly concerned, not to mention the smaller cities along the way.

In the current hearing before the State Board of Water Engineers, Houston and the Trinity River Authority jointly seek permits to build two dams, both near Houston. One would be a reservoir at Livingston; the other, a salt water barrier at Wallisville.

At first, Houston alone sought the permits with stiff opposition from TRA. Then the two agencies compromised and agreed that both would build the dams with Houston footing 70 per cent of the bill and getting 70 per cent of the water.

San Jacinto River Authority, which supplies part of Houston's water, contends the city should stick with the San Jacinto. North Texas Municipal District and the Municipal Service Company are worried about their own future water supply from the Trinity.

Southern Canal Company, which long has sought irrigation rights downstream, is opposed to the plan as various landowners whose property would be flooded by the new reservoir.

Testimony is complex, often heated and expected to be quite lengthy.

Some of the data presented on future water needs provides a glimpse of the possible Texas of tomorrow. An engineer, appearing for Houston, predicted the nine-county area around that city will have a population of 6,750,000 by the year 2010—more people than the whole state had in 1940. Water needs will be a staggering 2,682,000,000 gallons a day, he said.

Uranium Promotion Studied—
House Investigating Committee has been looking into the money-raising methods of a man who claims to have a device to upgrade uranium ore.

John Milton Addison faces charges in state and federal courts of using illegal financing methods. He has purportedly borrowed \$1,000,000 at 10 per cent interest in unsecured loans.

But lenders appearing before the House committee said they had faith in Addison and felt he had been "persecuted" by law enforcement officers.

Rep. H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock heads the investigating panel. Other members are Reps. Joe Burkett of Kerrville, Tom James of Dallas, Carl Conley of Raymondville and John Allen of Longview.

Court To Move—
Texas Supreme Court holds its last session in the 71-year-old State Capitol building this week.

But it may be a month before the high court gets all its records and huge library moved and gets settled into the splendid new quarters in the just completed Courts Building.

On Nov. 18, however, the judges are to sit at the new marble bench. Furthermore, they will add a new tradition to Texas judicial history by wearing black robes.

Union May Be Sued—
State Supreme Court has ruled that a labor union may be sued for damage by one of its members.

It reversed the holding of a lower court that the union could not be held responsible. This clears the way for a plumber to seek \$19,039 in damages.

H. J. Borden, the plumber, charges that an agent for the United Association of Journeymen and Apprentices of the Plumbing and Pipefitting Industry barred him from work.

Asleep?—
Texas Conservatives heard a familiar voice tell them they have become "lazy."

Speaking to a Chamber of Commerce audience, former Gov. Allan Shivers said, "In Austin, the conservative element has little or no leadership . . . has lost its initiative . . . its incentive."

Shivers, long a Conservative standard bearer, recommended development of a program for the general welfare rather than fighting isolated battles for business interests alone.

He urged a coordinated Conservative program. Opposing forces, he said, have the "perfect set-up"—generating fervor for their causes through a tax-free organization, the AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education.

Motorists Speed Up—
Texas drivers are bearing down on the accelerator more this year, a State Highway Department survey shows.

Study showed average highway speed at 54.8 miles per hour in 1959 compared to 53.4 for 1958. Passenger cars are traveling at an average 56.2 miles per hour; trucks, 50.3; busses, 60.7. Legal rate of speed for busses is 55 miles per hour.

According to the sampling, 21.9 per cent of passenger cars are exceeding the legal rate of 60 miles per hour. Last year only 15.2 per cent were above the legal speed.

Highway Department's survey was made with camouflaged radar equipment at 24 representative locations on rural state highways.

New DWI Tests Urged—
It's so hard under present law to prosecute a driving-while-intoxicated charge that most law officers settle for a lesser charge, says the head of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission.

Speaking to the Texas Safety Association, Brad H. Smith urged passage of laws allowing for chemical tests to determine drunkenness.

Private Raps Lawmakers—
Private research agencies have done a good job of fact findings, but the Legislature has been slow to carry out recommendations, Gov. Price Daniel said at the Texas Research League's annual meeting.

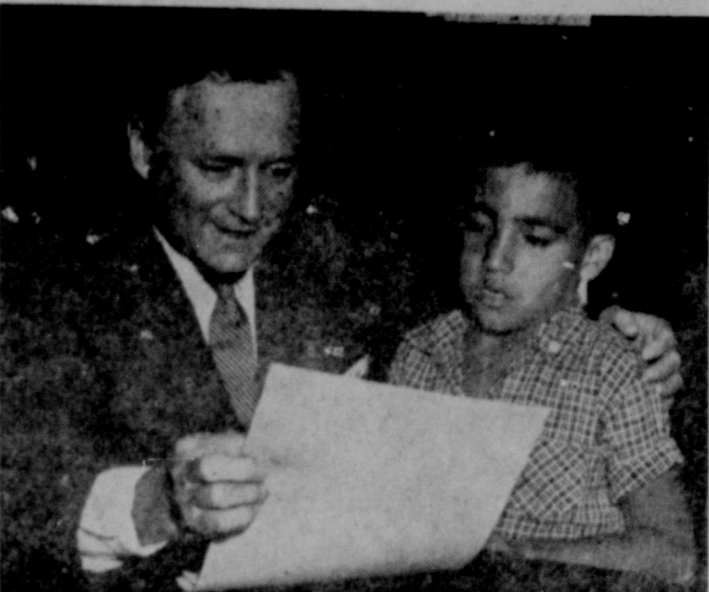
He cited law enforcement and traffic safety as areas of legislative foot-dragging and implied there has been an effort to undo Insurance Department reorganization.
