The Tigresses of Slaton high school again proved themselves mistresses of the court Tues. night, defeating their ancient and worthy rivals from Southland 25 to 27 in one of the most thrilling nerve racking basketball games ever played by the two teams.

Southland drew first blood by ringing a goal early in the game, but Slaton came back and knotted the count. The first quarter was a very hectic and bitterly fought affair, ending in a 4-4 deadlock. Two crip shots early in the second stanza gave the visitors a point lead that loomed big for a while, with the Sbuthland guards going great guns! But the clever passing and neat scoring of the Tigress forwards could not be completely smothered, and finally Bengals rallied to again tie the count at 10 all in a whirlwind finish of the second period.


The third quarter opened with a rush, with Southland getting the better of the fray, but Captain Banks called time out, and the Jungaleers came back with fight that swept all before them, The comeback threw fright into the locals, however, for the spirited banks went out on personal fouls. 


The celebration of the Two Hunlreth birthday of George Washington the Father of our Country started off nicely as per schedule.







> STUDYING THE STATE GOVERNMENT

A Committee appointed by the 42nd Legislature is starting a study of all the departments of the state government, with the object of collecting data and statistics upon which to base legislation to achieve greater efficiency and economy. The Committee will have at its command experts in various lines, it will hold hearings, and probably create a few volumes of figures and information.

But what will it all come to? The Legislature periodically authorizes these investigations, high sounding in their aims, expensive to the taxpayers, and negative in recults. By the time the Committee completes its labor another Legislature will have been elected. Not one in ten of the members will make an exhaustive study of the reports and the accompaying data. Not one in ten will even look at it. At any rate that has been the fate of similar reports in the past.

Further, it is a safe hazard that nine-tenths of the information that will be put into the report is already known.
