

Burglars Enter **Local Offices**

Burglars hit the Southwestern Bell Telephone office and TG&Y here Saturday night, inflicting more than \$300 worth of damage at the phone office and taking about \$100 worth of merchandise at the variety

The burglars failed in their attempts to break open a safe at the phone office, and were unable to remove a coin box after tearing a public telephone of the wall.

Police said the burglars apparently first went to a storeroom behind the building where they got two sledge hammers and a prying tool, Entry to the main building was gained by breaking out a rear window.

Burglars broke into a rear door at TG&Y, stealing a television set, a pair of walkietalkies, two transistor radios, an AM-FM radio, and a pillow slip. Nothing else was missing.

Officials at the feed mill commended the firemen for their efforts in containing the blaze and for their long vigil at the scene,

Fire Chief Don Kendrick expressed the department's gratitude for the 'outside help' of citizens at the fire and for "excellent cooperation' by all citizens. The firemen also expressed appreciation for sandwiches and drinks brought to them Sunday

destroyed the Supreme Feed Mill Inc. plant here Sunday afternoon as hundreds of spectators watched fireman concentrate their efforts on preventing the blaze from moving into an adjacent brick building containing storage bins.

The alarm came at 5:35 p.m. Sunday, and Slaton's Volunteer Fire Department had little chance of saving the main unit of the mill as strong west winds whipped the blaze rapidly through the building. Firemen battled the blaze for several hours, and some stayed at the scene until midnight to extinguish small fires which kept erupting from the wreckage of the building.


Robert Hall Davis, president of the firm, which manufactures Top-Flite feeds, said his first estimate of the damage would be approximately \$250,-000. He said the firm, which employs about 25 persons, would be rebuilt "as soon as possible." The building was insured.

The metal building which was destroyed housed the firm's offices, mixing equipment and a stock of finished feeds. Cause of the fire is unknown, Davis said a boiler in the building was relighted Sunday afternoon after being inspected, but he had no way of knowing if something conn ected with the boiler caused the fire.

Fire had broken through the roof of the metal building by the time firemen arrived, and it collapsed into a pile of twisted, charred metal as the wind helped whip the flames through the structure. As the building fell, firemen were able to put more water on the flames and keep it from breaking through to the next building.

Some small fire got to roofing material and feed in storage bins in the adjacent building, however. Some bins were flooded with water to keep the blaze from erupting into the next building.

Firemen were called back to the smoldering site several times this week, one truck being sent out as late as Wednesday just before noon.

Choose Toys For Chil Not Dad's Amusem

the second in a series of articles on child development by Ruth Rucker, Texas Tech student from Roosevelt, She is majoring in home economics education and child development and is an honor student in college.)

Three year old Billy sits on the floor of his room, surrounded by toys -- there's an electric train, minature steam engine, a three foot stuffed tiger, model ships and planes that are faithful plastic replicas of real ones, and a fresh addition of 'creepy crawlers'. After sitting listlessly for a time, looking at the collection of gifts that were bestowed upon him at a recent birthday party, he strolls into the kitchen and asks hims mother plaintively, 'What can I do?'' Ever happen to you?

Americans are living in a endless age of opportunity to develop their children. The variety of toys and educational facilities available are greater now than ever before, yet parents are continually plagued with the rhetorical question, "What can I do?" Why is this? Parents must learn to choose

toys for the child, not himself. Gelols McHugh, child psychologist at Duke University, says that too many gifts represent a form of self - indulgence by parents. Such acts gratify the adult ego rather than please the child. For example, many fathers will select a toy which he wanted as a child, failing to see that it may not be appropriate for his son, who has his own needs and interests.

Your Child from 1 to 6, printed by the United States Children's Bureau, advocates another reason, "Toys can be a means of pushing a child away. A parent may give his child an assortment of toys, hoping he will take himself off somewhere to play. Or a Games were played following parent may buy toys in an effor to make up for things he hasn't done well. A mother who works, for instance, may shower things on the child with whom she can spend little time.'

Parents smother their children with toys. Some are hoping the child will humor himself; some are trying to regain their own childhood; others are seeking to make apologies for not being better parents, and some even trying to buy their childrealize the effect this may have on the child.

The youngster with too many toys and not enough love becomes dissatisfied, J. E. Seen, Yale University Child Study Denter director, teaches that when a child has too many toys there is a danger of his becoming so blase that no toy can succeed in exciting his interest. Some children become so frustrated by their aray of toys that they become destructive. He isn't satisfied -- he doesn't enjoy his toys -- so he deliberately breaks them. It is really a matter of defending himself from his parents. Remember that a child who is fond of his toys does everything in his power to protect them from harm.

There are real dangers to the child who has too many toys. First of all, he has much less opportunity to use his imagination, to pretend. He has less urge to be resourceful, to invent or make things. When a child is surrounded by toys, he fails to see the play possibilities of each toy. But when children have fewer in number and a more well-balanced variety of toys, he is likely to use them more, and to be fonder of them, and to discover more




