## Former Slaton Teacher Dies After Mishap Here

John Clayton Shedd, 32, was dead on arrival at Mercy Hospital Saturday after being injured in a two-car crash in west Slaton. A former distributive education teacher at Slaton High School, Shedd taught here for two years. Also injured in the accident were Rev. Clarence Nelson Wiley, 85, a retired minister of Lubbock, who Wednesday was reported in good condition at Mercy Hospital. He suffered lacerations on his right arm and knee, and on the back of his head. Wiley is a former pastor of the Presbyterian church here and was on his way to Slaton at the time of the accident. Slaton police said the mishap occurred about 1:30 p.m. at US-84 bypass and Cemetery Road in west Slaton. Investigators said Shedd was traveling northwest on U. S. 84 and Wiley was headed east on Cemetery Road, when the broadside collision occurred in the intersection. Both men were driving late-model cars. The car Shedd was driving belonged to Jerry Massey of Lubbock. They were taken to Mercy Hospital by Williams Funeral Home ambulance. While living in Slaton, Shedd wed his wife, Paula. They moved from here to Mesquite about 1 1/2 years ago when Shedd took a similar teaching job. At the time of the accident, he was returning to Lubbock from attending the funeral of a niece. The funeral had been held in Post. He was a graduate of Post High School and North Texas State College, Denton. He also was a U. S. Navy veteran, serving from 1955 to 1959. Funeral services for Shedd were held Monday at 2 p.m. in the First Baptist Church at Post with the Rev. Joe Vernon, pastor, officiating. Burial was (See FORMER, PAGE 6)

## Intent-to-Pave Action Approved by City

Slaton City Commission, in regular session Monday night, approved an intent-to-pave ordinance around the low-rent housing project, appointed a committee to work with Slaton School District on a proposed re-evaluation program, and approved purchase of a flat-wheel street roller. The commission also approved closing a portion of Murray Street, approved a list of couples as directors for Slaton Youth Center, approved bills and discussed routine matters. At the request of school Supt. Lee Vardy, a committee was appointed by Mayor Jonas Cain to meet with school officials to consider a tax re-evaluation program. Cain, Earl Reasoner, Hugo Mosser and Henry Bollinger are to serve on the committee. Commissioner Rudy Dominguez declined to serve on the committee. After short consideration, the commission passed the intent-to-pave ordinance to take in streets around the new low-rent housing project in southeast Slaton. Streets included in the project are Jean, from 5th to 6th and from 2nd to the alley east of 2nd; Powers, from 9th to alley east of 2nd; Edwards, from 7th to alley east of 3rd; 7th, from Edwards to Powers; 6th, from Edwards to Geneva; 5th, from Powers to Jean; 4th, from Edwards to Powers; 3rd, from Edwards to Powers; 2nd, from Powers to Geneva. A separate intent to pave action included the 1200 and 1300 blocks of E. Knox. The commission approved closing 20 feet of Murray between 9th and 7th. The street is 80 feet wide, leaving 60 feet right of way. Need for a flat-wheel roller was outlined by the mayor, and offer of a used machine for \$4,500 was quoted. The commission approved a time purchase on the 10-ton roller from Plains Machinery Co.

## Burglars Enter Local Offices

Burglars hit the Southwest Bell Telephone office and TG&Y here Saturday night, inflicting more than \$300 worth of damage at the phone office and taking about \$100 worth of merchandise at the variety store. The burglars failed in their attempts to break open a safe at the phone office, and were unable to remove a coin box after tearing a public telephone off the wall. Police said the burglars apparently first went to a store-room behind the building where they got two sledge hammers and a pry bar. Entry to the main building was gained by breaking out a rear window. Burglars broke into a rear door at TG&Y, stealing a television set, a pair of walkie-talkies, two transistor radios, an AM-FM radio, and a pillow slip. Nothing else was missing.

### SUMMER WEATHER MAKES SHOWING

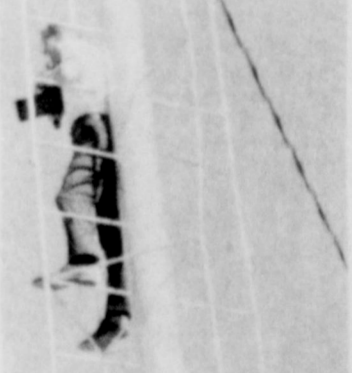

## (2) INTRODUCING: A CHILD'S WORLD Choose Toys For Child Not Dad's Amusement

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles on child development by Ruth Rucker, Texas Tech student from Roosevelt. She is majoring in home economics education and child development and is an honor student in college.)

Three year old Billy sits on the floor of his room, surrounded by toys -- there's an electric train, miniature steam engine, a three foot stuffed tiger, model ships and planes that are faithful plastic replicas of real ones, and a fresh addition of 'creepy crawlers'. After sitting listlessly for a time, looking at the collection of gifts that were bestowed upon him at a recent birthday party, he strolls into the kitchen and asks his mother plaintively, "What can I do?" Ever happen to you?

Americans are living in an endless age of opportunity to develop their children. The variety of toys and educational facilities available are greater now than ever before, yet parents are continually plagued with the rhetorical question, "What can I do?" Why is this? Parents must learn to choose toys for the child, not himself. Gelols McHugh, child psychologist at Duke University, says that too many gifts represent a form of self-indulgence by parents. Such acts gratify the adult ego rather than please the child. For example, many fathers will select a toy which he wanted as a child, failing to see that it may not be appropriate for his son, who has his own needs and interests.

Your Child from 1 to 6, printed by the United States Children's Bureau, advocates another reason, "Toys can be a means of pushing a child away. A parent may give his child an assortment of toys, hoping he will take himself off somewhere to play. Or a parent may buy toys in an effort to make up for things he hasn't done well. A mother who works, for instance, may shower things on the child with whom she can spend little time."

Parents smother their children with toys. Some are hoping the child will humor himself; some are trying to regain their own childhood; others are seeking to make apologies for not being better parents, and some even trying to buy their children's love. But few parents realize the effect this may have on the child.

The youngster with too many toys and not enough love becomes dissatisfied. J. E. Seen, Yale University Child Study Center director, teaches that when a child has too many toys there is a danger of his becoming so blasé that no toy can succeed in exciting his interest. Some children become so frustrated by their array of toys that they become destructive. He isn't satisfied -- he doesn't enjoy his toys -- so he deliberately breaks them. It is really a matter of defending himself from his parents. Remember that a child who is fond of his toys does everything in his power to protect them from harm.

There are real dangers to the child who has too many toys. First of all, he has much less opportunity to use his imagination, to pretend. He has less urge to be resourceful, to invent or make things, when a child is surrounded by toys, he fails to see the play possibilities of each toy. But when children have fewer in number and a more well-balanced variety of toys, he is likely to use them more, and to be fonder of them, and to discover more

play possibilities than you could have thought possible. Parents need a greater understanding of the importance of toys in a child's development.

One of the chief purposes of toys is to give the child a chance to express himself and exercise his abilities. Children need toys. They need them for fun; they need them to satisfy the ever-present urge to be active, to be up and going. They need them for all of the investigating, exploring, experimenting, discovering, manipulating, creating that is so much a part of growing up.

Toys should allow a child to learn and develop physically and mentally; they should stimulate the imagination. Dr. Harry Joseph tell parents that proper toys develop independence, self-reliance, and initiative, and above all they should encourage a child's participation. "That is why mechanical toys which are too complex for the child to operate, are not desirable."

Jean Grossman, Director of Parent Education, has one of the best criteria for judging toys. In summary, the author states that toys must be suitable to the child's level of development. They should be meaningful to the child and help him to learn about the world around him. Toys should encourage new skills and in-

terests; they should not be generalized. And a child's toys should be in your house, for himself, and to develop his independence, his self-reliance, and initiative, and above all they should encourage a child's participation. "That is why mechanical toys which are too complex for the child to operate, are not desirable."

Play is one of the ways for parents to enjoy each other and their children's priceless discovery of youth and re-creation of the living.

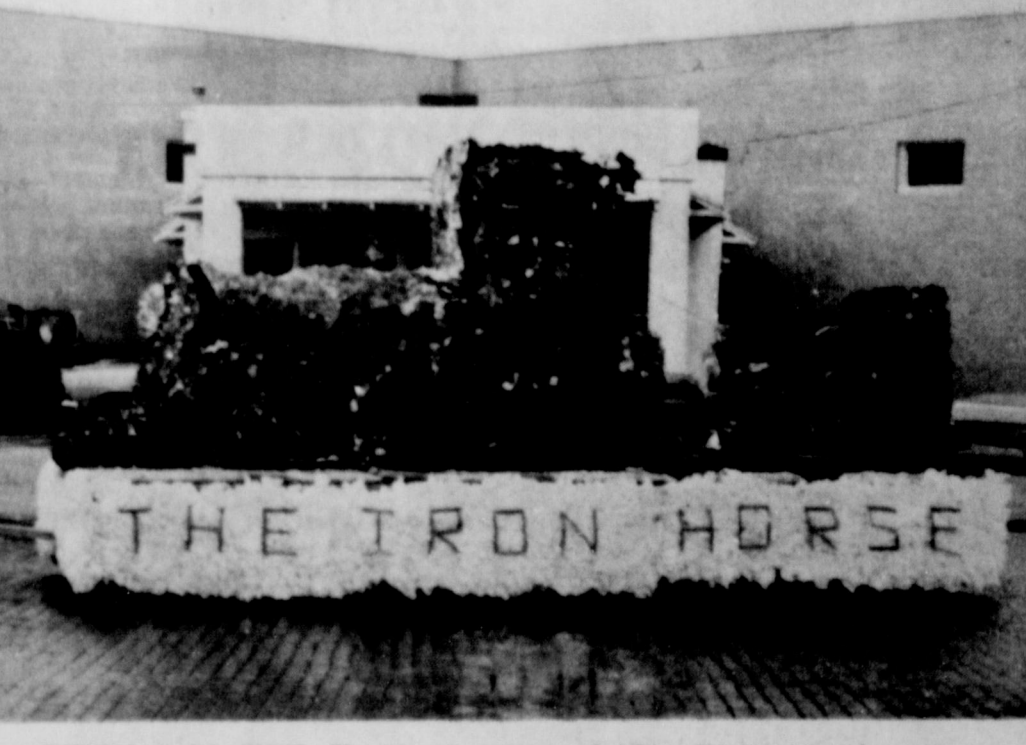

### Armed Forces Day Program Set at Reese

Reese Air Force Base, again this year, will be the focal point for the May 20 observance of Armed Forces Day on the South Plains.

An open house will be held from 1 to 5 p.m., that Saturday, with emphasis on the undergraduate pilot training program at Reese. South Plains residents are invited to visit Reese and tour all areas of the base which will be open to the public.

Various aircraft will be on display, including the T-37 and T-38. There will be flyovers and numerous displays by the Army, Navy, Marines, National Guard, as well as the United States Air Force.

Displays and demonstrations will include: a parasail demon-

stration; ejection seat display; fire fighting and crash rescue demonstration; parachute jump; medical display; the Lubbock Police Department K-9 sentry dogs in action; recreational and sports activities among others.

Refreshment stands will be available, as well as bus transportation around the base. Motion pictures will be shown, free of charge, at various locations at Reese, and a first aid station will be set up.

Reese, almost continually since 1942, has been training pilots for all commands of the U. S. Air Force and has turned out over 18,000 highly qualified pilots.

"On Armed Forces Day for 1967 we are extremely hopeful that South Plains residents will

take a close look at our training base," Col. Ernest T. Cragg, wing commander, commented.

"Power for Peace" is the theme of Armed Forces Day throughout the Nation, and most military installations will have open house, with the public invited. Project Officer at Reese is Lt. Col. Bennett P. Bowder Jr., base executive officer.

### Reminder To Notaries Public

Secretary of State John L. Hill announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1967 and ends June 1, 1969, must pay the required fee and file a new application, oath and bond with the County Clerk at Lubbock before May 15.

He emphasized that notaries should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State.

Each person applying for a commission as Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the United States and of Texas, and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The required application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

Secretary Hill further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term should apply to his County Clerk before May 20.

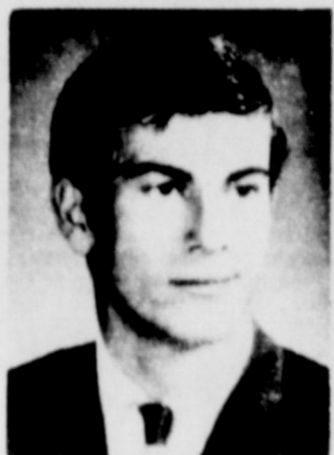
