
The next meeting is scheduled for 12:30 p.m., July 6 at the Slaton park for a noon-time family picnic.

Thirty-three Slaton women were interested enough to spend one hour of their precious time last Thursday to attend the Women's Division of a Community Workshop sponsored by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce.

I looked for a larger turnout, but the group that did attend was full of good suggestions and ideas on how to make Slaton a better and friendlier place to live.

On suggestions cards which were filled out at the meeting, many expressed their desire that something be done to make newcomers feel more welcome to Slaton.

Getting people to move to Slaton is important, but keeping them here is also important.

At the present time, the Chamber of Commerce is getting a list of newcomers from Pioneer Natural Gas, making a list for merchants and the Slatonite is publishing the list in the paper. How the merchants take advantage of the list is entirely up to them.

As far as I know, newcomers are not being officially welcomed to the City of Slaton personally. But for someone to visit you one time and say "welcome" just doesn't seem to be enough either.

I feel something more constructive needs to be done in Slaton to make our newcomers feel a part of the community. Am I alone in this feeling? I think not...but is anyone willing to do something about it?

There must be a solution to this problem. I'm certainly no authority on the subject, but we have lived in Lamesa, San Angelo, Brownfield, Littlefield, Lubbock, Andrews and Midland in the past 15 years and at the time we moved to each town, each had some sort of welcome that was extended to us personally by a visit to our home. Most were in a form of a "welcome wagon" with merchants sending free gift certificates, etc.

We've never lived in El Paso, but have heard about an operation they have there. . . and there's nothing commercial about it. A friend of ours, Mrs. Dorrance Guy, whose husband is with the El Paso Times is president of the newcomer's group. They moved to El Paso from Lubbock over three years ago.

The newcomer's group is known as the Hospitality Club and has been going great guns for the past eight years. It's purely social. There are no advertising gimmicks. Eligible for membership are those women who have lived in El Paso for two years or less at time of joining, but they can continue to hold membership for so long as they please after getting in.

The cost of belonging to the El Paso club is \$3 per year, with the money going into fund from which expenses, such as bookkeeping, stationery, stamps, etc. are defrayed.

The club meets each month, sometimes for "Dutch Treat" affair and sometimes for bridge. About twice a year the club sponsors an evening social function in which husbands are included.

A Program of Work will soon be worked out by the Chamber of Commerce using suggestions and ideas received from the meetings last Thursday. I feel quite sure a chairman will be named to head a newcomer's committee. And most likely it will be a woman...cause after all, who could do it any better?

The chairman named will most likely call a meeting of interested residents. If you are interested in this project, watch for a notice on such a meeting.

In the meantime, I would like to encourage presidents of all women's organizations to appoint a "newcomer chairman" in her group and when this meeting can be set up... maybe we'll have enough there to acquire suggestions and ideas. I would especially like to see some newcomers at such a meeting.

If you are a newcomer who has been invited to church but hasn't gone; has been asked to help with Girl Scouts or Cub Scouts, but just doesn't have time; drives to Lubbock to do most of your shopping, because you don't know the merchants here anyway...I have an idea you won't attend this meeting, because you'd just rather sit home and gripe about how unfriendly Slaton is.

STRICTLY PERSONAL
Painting Masonry
When painting masonry floors, decks, porches, or patios, any rubber base floor and deck enamels or catalyzed coatings may be used. Paint may not adhere well to a smooth, troweled finish. Before painting new floors, etch them with diluted hydrochloric (muriatic acid) followed by thorough water rinsing. Wear rubber gloves and goggles to avoid acid burns.

Her recipe is as follows: HEAVENLY HASH

Place 2 cups marshmallows in a bowl; add one flat can crushed pineapple drained over them. Let this set overnight. The next morning, prepare one package lime jello. Let partially jell, then add marshmallows, pineapple, 1/2 cup cream (whipped), and 1/2 cup pecans. Place in mold and chill.

Thunderbirds Slate RFBF Show June 25

The World-famous United States Air Force Thunderbirds, flying breath-taking precision maneuvers, will etch the Lubbock skies with white smoke during a performance at Reese Air Force Base on June 25 at 10 a.m.

In conjunction with the graduation ceremonies of Class 66-H of the Undergraduate Pilot Training Program at Reese, The Thunderbirds will offer South Plains area citizens an opportunity to see a precision aerial demonstration at its best.

Flying their North American F-100 Super Sabres with wing tips overlapping three feet and separated vertically by a scant five feet, The Thunderbirds knife through the sky for nearly 30 minutes, their trailing smoke painting graceful loops, corkscrews and curves.

Yet despite the awesomeness of their precision maneuvers, The Thunderbirds are not a group of stunt pilots, but are a team of highly skilled professional men of the Air Force helping to illustrate to the people of the United States and of our allies around the globe the Air Force mission of "Aerospace Power for Peace."

When the team was established at Luke AFB, Ariz. in May 1953, it was given the mission of "promoting a better understanding and appreciation of the air power" and assisting in "the effective advancement of our national policy objectives."

Carrying out that mission in the succeeding 13 years has taken The Thunderbirds to 45 countries where their aerial artistry has been witnessed by more than 60,000,000 spectators.

Traveling as much as 175,000 air miles a year and presenting a hundred or more demonstration pilots are backed by a hand-picked crew of officers and enlisted men, each an expert in his field and each a volunteer who has been selected from as many as a hundred other applicants for his position.

In capsule form, The Thunderbirds demonstrate the mobility and self-sufficiency inherent in any Air Force unit, as well as the high degree of skill and training necessary for a first line Air Force in an era of rapidly advancing technology.

The four pilots who make up The Thunderbirds' diamond formation epitomize the beauty and grace of precision flight, while the team's two solo pilots show the maximum performance characteristics of the harmonious blend of man and machine.

Sometimes apart, sometimes joining together, in five and six-ship maneuvers, appearing before the spectators with a new maneuver every 30 seconds, they offer vivid testimony to the fact that the United States Air Force's tactical fighter arm is a strong one indeed, as was proved in Korea and as is daily being demonstrated in Vietnam.

SLATON CENTURY PLANTS BLOOMING

HE kept telling them century plants were bloom! But after 20 watching and waiting, Eubanks and M. L. had begun to ignore the prognostic scene changed! Eubanks reported a cluster developing in the Mexican agave. The plant was going through similar growth stages. He noticed the change in the cluster of fleshy leaves. A large post - like structure shooting into the air. They grew and grew -- at the rate of an inch a day. Eubanks measured his plant for several days. The average was a half an inch a day. The plant was to a height of more than 10 feet in only a few weeks. The plant have grown out of sections of the stalks. One of each branch is



a cluster of buds that form the century plant bloom. The stalk and branches of the century plant, from the Agave family of plants, are very strong. Abernathy pointed out that high winds swayed the plant but did not break or even crack the stalk. The century plant's leaves and stalk have long been considered a natural resource in Mexico. Indians developed many uses for the desert plant. The leaves hold a liquid that is fermented with other native herbs to make pulque and mescal. The liquids are famous for the mysterious legends of their intoxicating effect. Fibers from the leaves and stalk are woven into ropes or into threads for cloth. The fiber is strong and can be woven into material for shirts, blankets or shelter covers.

Mrs. Eubanks and Abernathy are not really interested in the intoxicants or the ropes they can get from the century plants. -- They both have pointed out that the plants appear to be dying. Dead leaves can be found around the bottom of the leafy cluster. Many authorities claim the plants will die after blooming. They consider the growth cycle from seed to bloom to be the extent of the century plant's life span. Still other authorities say the plant now seen will die after the blooming stage is completed. But they pointed out that a new plant has developed under the present clump of leaves. The second plant to come up

will go through the same twenty year growth cycle and die after blooming, they say. Only time will tell whether the Slaton century plants will end their final chapter soon -- or can Slatonites look forward to another picture story 20 years from now?

sidential and agricultural, airport project; expanded hospital facilities; seeking cotton-related industries, and extended area telephone service. Willie Heinrich headed this discussion group.
Carroll McDonald was chairman for the services and trades session, which drew eight men. An active industrial foundation, airport project, and creating a better image of Slaton around the area were the top projects suggested by the group.
Other suggestions which showed up more than once included: better facilities for Junior Stock Show, work for overpass on FM-41; seek a junior college; fine arts program, including community theater and summer band concerts; seek to organize Community Chest or United Fund; Seek "unique" eating place; trade or vocational school; beautification downtown and entrances to city; create more employment opportunities, especially for youth in summer; promote more outlets for farm products, and continued paving and street light improvements.



Are weird insects "bugging" your garden plants and household? If so, take the bug or the affected plant to the Insect Disease Clinic at the Art and Garden Center, 4215 College Ave., June 29.

The clinic is designed to help Lubbock County residents with insect and plant disease problems. Bring the insect or plant to the clinic where it will be identified and control measures recommended, stated Lee H. McElroy, Lubbock County Agricultural Agent.

County Home Demonstration Agent, Mrs. Mildred Patterson, said household insects and diseases and insects affecting flowers will be exhibited and control measures recommended.

On hand to identify the diseases and insects and to recommend control measures will be Emory P. Boring, entomologist, and Dr. Robert W. Berry, plant pathologist, Extension Service.

Area gardeners are urged to bring insects and plants to the clinic said Mrs. Patterson. Insects can be brought in small pill boxes and portions of diseased plants or the entire plant can be brought in a plastic bag.

There will also be a display of insects and plant diseases with control measures. Home owners, rural and city, can benefit from the clinic by discovering new methods of controlling and eliminating plant insects and diseases.
