In addition, here are tornado safety rules generally issued by safety experts: 1. Safest place to be during

a tornado, is underground in a storm cellar. Next bestis within a reinforced concrete or steel - framed building, near an inside wall, away from all win-

2. At home, if no storm cellar is near, a corner of the basemen nearest the approaching tornado is safest, particularly in wood frame houses. If in a basementless house, seek shelter elsewhere -- even an open

ditch offers some protection. 3. Avoid auditoriums, gymnasiums, other buildings having large roof areas poorly supported.

4. In open country, move at right angles to the tornado's path. A person in an auto can usually outrun one, If there's no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest ditch.

5. In a strong building, stay inside, away from windows. Stay near an inside wall on lower floors when possible. Keep calm, don't run outside; you may be hit by flying debris. Don't touch loose or fallen





Thirty - three Slaton women were interested enough to spend one hour of their precious time last Thursday to attend Women's Division of a Community Workshop sponsored by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce,

I looked for a larger turnout, but the group that did attend was full of good suggestions and ideas on how to make Slaton a better and friendlier place to live.

On suggestions cards which were filled out at the meeting, many expressed their desire that something be done to make newcomers feel more welcome to Slaton. Getting people to move to Slaton is important, but keeping them here is also important.

At the present time, the Chamber of Commerce is getting a list of newcomers from Pioneer Natural Gas, making a list for merchants and the Slatonite is publishing the list in the paper. How the merchants take advantage of the list is entirely up to them.

As far as I know, newcomers are not being officially welcomed to the City of Slaton personally. But for someone to visit you one time and say "welcome" just doesn't seem

I feel something more constructive needs to be done in Slaton to make our newcomers feel a part of the community. Am I alone in this feeling? I think not ... but is anyone willing to do something about it?

There must be a solution to this problem, I'm certainly no authority on the subject, but we have lived in Lamesa, San Angelo, Brownfield, Littlefield, Lubbock, Andrews and Midland in the past 15 years and at the time we moved to each town, each had some sort of welcome that was extended to us personally by a visit to our home. Most were in a form of a "welcome wagon" with merchants sending free gift certificates, etc.

We've never lived in El Paso, but have heard about an operation they have there, . and there's nothing commercial about it, A friend of ours, Mrs. Dorrance Guy, whose husband is with the El Paso Times is president of the newcomer's group. They moved to El Paso from Lubbock over three

The newcomer's group is known as the Hospitality Club and has been going great guns for the past eight years. It's purely social. There are no advertising gimmicks, Eligible for membership are those women who have lived in El Paso for two years or less at time of joining; but they can continue to hold membership for so long as they please after getting in. The cost of belonging to the El Paso club is \$3 per year, with the money going into fund from which expenses, such as

bookkeeping, stationery, stamps, etc. are defrayed. The club meets each month, sometimes for "Dutch Treat" affair and sometimes for bridge. About twice a year the club sponsors an evening social function in which husbands are included.

A Program of Work will soon be worked out by the Chamber of Commerce using suggestions and ideas received from the meetings last Thursday. I feel quite sure a chairman will be named to head a newcomer's committee. And most likely it will be a woman ... cause after all, who could do it any

The chairman named will most likely call a meeting of interested residents. If you are interested in this project, watch for a notice on such a meeting.

In the meantime, I would like to encourage presidents of all women's organizations to appoint a "newcomer chairman" in her group and when this meeting can be set up ... maybe we'll have enough there to acquire suggestions and ideas. I would especially like to see some newcomers at







Agave family of plants, are very strong. Abernathy pointed out that high winds swayed the plant but did not break or even crack the stalk.

The century plant's leaves and stalk have long been considered a natural resource in Mexico. Indians developed many uses for the desert plant,

The leaves hold a liquid that is fermented with other native herbs to make pulque and mescal. The liquids are famous for the mysterious legends of their intoxicating effect.

Fibers from the leaves and stalk are woven into ropes or into threads for cloth. The fiber is strong and can be woven into material for shirts, blankets or shelter covers.

are not really interested in the intoxicants or the ropes they can get from the century plants. -- They both have pointed out that the plants appear to be dying. Dead leaves can be found around the bottom of the leafy cluster.

Many authorities claim the plants will die after blooming. They consider the growth cycle from seed to bloom to be the extent of the century plant's life span.






