





manently and totally disabled by reason of mental or physical handicaps.

HOSPITAL DISTRICTS IN BRAZORIA COUNTY AND HOME FOR THE AGED IN TITUS COUNTY

This amendment would permit the Legislature to authorize the creation of two hospital districts in Brazoria County, one to include all or part of West Columbia, Brazoria and Damon Independent School Districts, and the other coterminous with the Sweeny Independent School District, providing for a possible consolidation of the two, providing a mode of funding and also authorizing construction, equipping, maintaining, and financing a home for the aged in Titus

10. PERMITTING STATE EMPLOYEES TO SERVE AS CONSULTANTS OR ADVISERS

This amendment would permit state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees or as members of Public School Boards (provided they are not members of the teaching profession) or with other agencies of this state or its political subdivisions or the Federal government, if approved by their administrative heads and provided there is no conflict of

11. SALE OF LANDS REMAINING IN VETERANS LAND FUND

This amendment would permit the resale of lands of the Veterans Land Fund remaining unsold after having been first offered for sale to veterans. Such sales would be governed by existing laws regarding terms.

12. DELEGATION OF ZONING POWERS TO BEACH

This amendment would authorize each local county or governing agency which controls the surrounding land of the beaches of the Gulf to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on these beaches, and also control littering.

13. INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT TAXES IN DALLAS COUNTY

This amendment would authorize independent school districts in Dallas County to continue the levy of previously-authorized taxes and the sale of previouslyauthorized bonds without the necessity of an additional election following a change in their boundaries.


This amendment would authorize the Legislature to provide for trial de novo on all appeals to the courts from actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions. It would permit a complete new trial on all the evidence and details of an administrative or regulatory order, regardless of previous rulings on similar cases.



▶ In 1937, before Connally graduated from college he was working Johnson's first race for Congress. Following Johnson's election, Con to Washington as Congressman Johnson's assistant.

Mayor Clyde McFarland lashed out strongly this week when questioned by a Sentinel correspondent relative to rumors that future meetings of the city council would be closed to visitors. A rumor, reportedly started last week, spread over the city like a range fire, uncontrolled.

It was stated that an order had been handed down from the Doug Meador Says - - mayor's office, that no visitors would be allowed to attend future meetings of the governing body.

It was also reported that the council had issued an ultimatum to city employees that they would face immediate dismissal if discussion of a city council meeting was repeated in outside conversation. Also, employees of the city were instructed not to hand out advance information of any council meeting, revealing time or place.

Contacted this week by The Sentinel, Mayor McFarland stated, "We haven't had a closed meeting in the past 17 years, and we don't intend to start now.'

Added the newly appointed mayor, "The only time there would be occasion for an executive session (closed meeting) would be if we are discussing a personality, his morals or his conduct. This we would certainly want to keep private to protect

Knowing that closed meetings of elected officials are contrary to law, residents of the city were up in arms when the story first broke last week.

Citizens were preparing a mass visitation of the next city council meeting to protest the reported secret sessions, and several taxpayers were preparing a slate of nomines to run in the next city election in April.

However, Mayor McFarland's statement to the press this week is certain to quash any further agitation on the subject. -Big Bend Sentinel
