## WINS PRECINCT 2 POST WITHOUT RUNOFF

# Green Is Re-elected



GEORGE GREEN

George G. Green successfully fought off two challengers to win another four-year term as Lubbock County Commissioner, Precinct 2, to highlight an otherwise dull Democratic primary in Slaton Saturday. Green escaped a runoff with a clear but close victory, polling 175 votes than his two foes combined. The incumbent commissioner had 1,585 votes to 927 for Jim Benton, and 483 for Harvey Griffith. Slaton's three boxes tallied only 855 votes, following a trend of light vote turnouts in the county and state. The unofficial count showed only 12,105 ballots cast in Lubbock County. All races were settled on the county level with exception of the contest for state representative, place 2, in which a runoff was forced.

Elmer Tarbox, Lubbock businessman, led in the three-man race, polling 5,605 votes, followed in order by attorneys Bill Gillespie with 4,024 votes, and Denzil Bevers with 2,102. Tarbox and Gillespie will meet again in the June 4th second Demo primary. Tarbox and Gillespie ran neck-and-neck in Slaton with Tarbox leading in the three city boxes by 343 to 339. Slaton voters followed county trend in favoring incumbents in the county and state. The only state runoff occurred in the attorney general's race, where Crawford Martin led the three-man ticket. Slaton voters favored Martin over runner-up Franklin Spears, 358-244. Slaton went against the trend in the Court of Criminal Appeals race, giving W. T. McDonald a slight edge over winner John Olson. In other contested county races, Jane Rieger won over Hub O'Neal to remain as county treasurer; Roy Boyd was returned as county school superintendent by defeating Jim Williams, and Alton Brazzell edged Buss Brown to keep the Commissioner of Precinct 4 office.

In the state representative, Precinct 1, race, Reed Quilman was an easy winner over N. J. Murdock. In the precinct 2 race, Green carried 12 of the 15 voting boxes, while Benton claimed (See GREEN, Page 1)

### HEADSTART GETS OKAY

An appropriation for a summer "Headstart" program has been approved for Slaton Independent School District, it was revealed Tuesday in a telegram from Congressman George Mahon. The telegram to The Slatonite read: "The Office of Economic Opportunity has approved appropriation for Slaton Independent School District for summer Headstart Program. Federal share is \$18,470. Non-federal share \$2,096 for 100 children -- George Mahon."

Slaton was one of the first schools to receive a grant last summer for the program, which is designed to train preschoolers in work from the kindergarten level to the first grade level. It is for children from less-fortunate families. Slaton's grant has apparently been doubled over last year when the federal share was \$9,113 and the local district's share \$1,650. T. C. Martin was director of the program last year with four teachers and four auxiliary helpers included in the project. The Headstart program, one of the War on Poverty projects, was also conducted at the Roosevelt School last summer.

### Light Shower Recorded Here

Violent thunderstorms and tornadoes skipped across the South Plains Tuesday night, but Slaton and the area escaped the turbulent weather. A light rain, accompanied by strong winds, swept over the city late Tuesday afternoon and left about .20 of an inch of moisture. No damage was reported Wednesday.

Tornadoes and cyclonic winds were reported in the Hale Center and Plainview areas late Tuesday, while damaging winds were also felt around Brownfield. Rainfall measured about .75 around Brownfield and up to two inches at Plainview. Heavy hail was also reported near Brownfield.

Weather forecasters said there was a chance of scattered showers Wednesday. Rains caused postponement of a Babe Ruth baseball game here, but a Little League game went in the books after five innings.

### 50th Birthday For Teague Drug

Teague Drug is celebrating its 50th year in Slaton! Joe H. Teague Jr. came to the little townsite of Slaton in 1911. In May of 1916 he established Slaton's first drug store -- or back then it was known as a confectionary. The store has always had fountain service.

The store was first located on the north side of the square, just west of the present location. Back then it was on the corner, but now the block is longer and it would no longer be on the corner. Two years

later, in 1918 Mr. Teague moved his store to its present location.

Mr. Joe H. Teague Jr. died in 1961 and his widow, Mrs. Teague, resides at 55 W. Garza. A prescription department was put in the store in 1924. From 1947 to 1965 Charlie Walton and Joe Teague III were partners in the drug store. Joe Teague now operates the store after purchasing Mr. Walton's interest. Mr. Walton has since retired.

The drug store is now in the process of having a big sale to celebrate its 50th anniversary.

### Trustees Okay Cafeteria Plan At West Ward

Preliminary plans for a new cafeteria at West Ward School were approved during a special luncheon meeting of the Slaton School Board last Friday at Bruce's Restaurant. Trustees set the location of the building on the south end of the east wing of the present school building. It will contain about 5,000 square feet of floor space. The board decided to add two rest rooms to the proposed plans. This marks the second phase of the recently approved building improvements program to be undertaken by the board. Plans and specifications for a new high school gym were approved about two weeks ago, and final plans should be ready when bond money is available. The two projects are part of the \$500,000 improvements bond election approved by voters earlier this year. Football stadium improvements and a new elementary school are also included in the program.

medians on Texas Avenue; --Voted to discontinue the services of an attorney on delinquent tax collections; --Adjusted the salary of City Atty. Carroll Smith to make it \$100 per month; --Decided against taking any action in connection with Sunday funerals; --Voted to extend KCAS Radio lease for transmitter tower.

A public hearing was conducted prior to the start of regular business. The hearing was called as part of the procedure in the city's decision to annex about 200 acres of land in northwest Slaton. After the hearing, the commission unanimously moved to annex the land, as well as some 1.6 acres of land to be annexed voluntarily.

Commissioners decided to buy one Ford and one Chevrolet after reviewing four bids submitted on the new police cars. Smith Ford was low bidder but an alternate bid, calling for air in one unit, was so close that the commission decided to purchase that unit from Don Crow Chevrolet.

The city has been leasing its vehicles and had no trade-ins. One unit was awarded to Smith Ford for \$2,167.81. The other, with air conditioner, went to Don Crow Chevrolet for \$2,431.95. Davis Olds bid an Oldsmobile, without air, for \$2,809.26. Kendrick Pontiac bid the Pontiac, without air, at \$2,591.05. (See CITY, Page 1)

### Tiger Band In Concert Monday

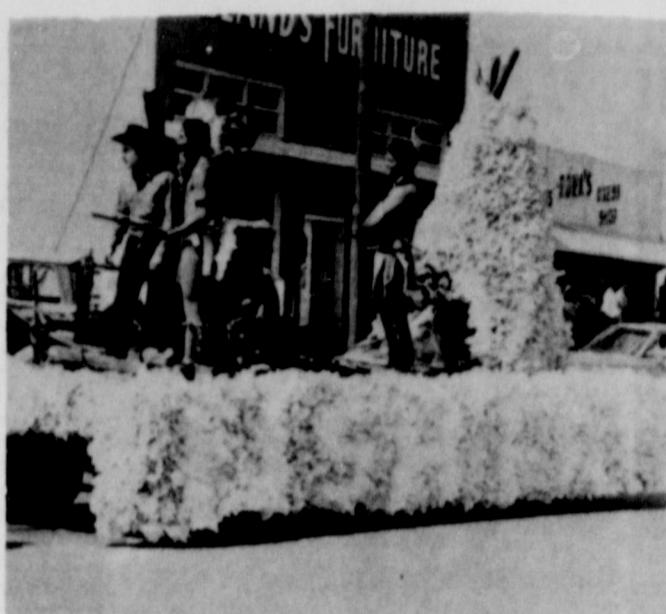

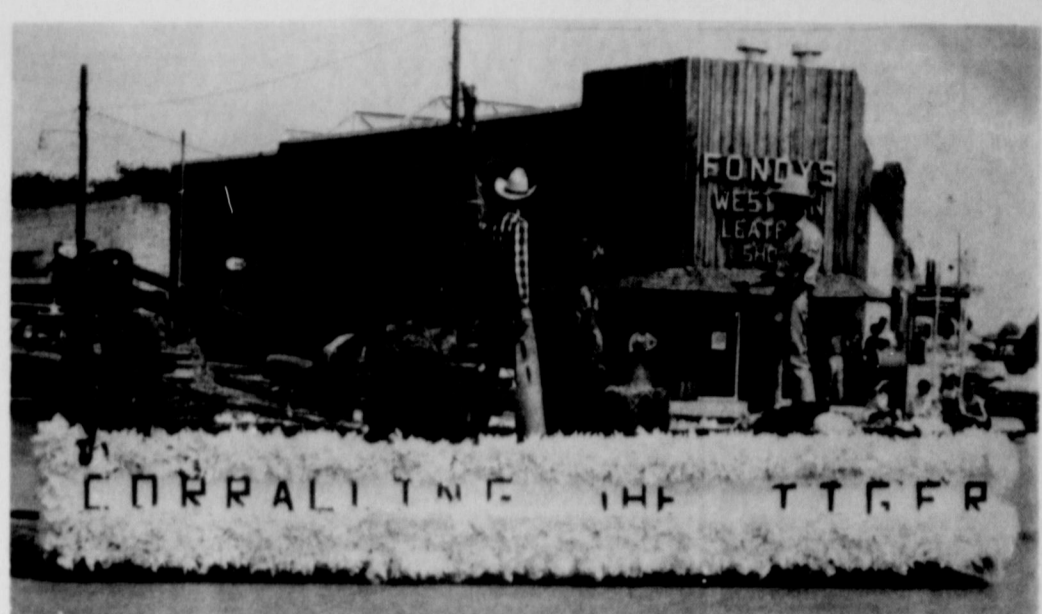

All units were bid according to police specifications with "police package" equipment. Landowners Harold Wilson, T. H. Basinger and David Hughes appeared for the public hearing on the annexation, with Wilson voting several objections to the action. The annexation ordinance includes four tracts of land.

One tract, including about 75 acres, lies west of Englewood Cemetery and between Cemetery Road and the old Lubbock highway. Business property in the area includes Triangle Manufacturing, Slaton Implement and Hughes Veterinary Clinic.

Tract 2 contains about 100 acres and is located west of the overpass and south and west of US-84 bypass. Major landowner there is Lon Porter. Tract 3 takes in 400 feet on both sides of Cemetery Road, from US-84 west to the first section line. Tract 4 is a similar strip on FM-41.

The voluntary annexation was for 1.6 acres just west of West Englewood Cemetery. Immediately after it was approved, Bud Englund requested the property be changed from R-1 (residential) zone to B-2 (business), for the purpose of building a mortuary. Commissioners approved the zoning board recommendation to make the change.

On the recommendation of Duff, the commission discontinued the services of Claude Cravens in delinquent tax suit matters, it was pointed out that a local attorney too often would be called on to file suit against some of his own clients. The city probably will employ an out-of-town attorney for these services.

On the recommendation of Mayor Cain, the commission "adjusted" the salary of the city attorney, raising it from \$75 a month to \$100. The mayor pointed out that more was being required of the attorney in city affairs, and he cited Smith for "doing a fine job."

In connection with discussion the past several months, the commission went on record as being opposed to taking any action on prohibiting use of the city cemetery on Sundays.

Dee Bowman, manager of KCAS, appeared before the commission to request extension of a lease contract with the city. He said purpose of the request was to make the studio lease and the city lease expire at the same time. The station has a five-year option on the land leased for a transmitter tower and the extension, in effect, gives them an additional two years.

Reasoner opposed the action, saying he was against having radio equipment and a baseball field on city cemetery property. (A baseball practice field has been cleared off on a portion of the property). The commission approved the extension on a 2-1 vote, with Reasoner voting against.

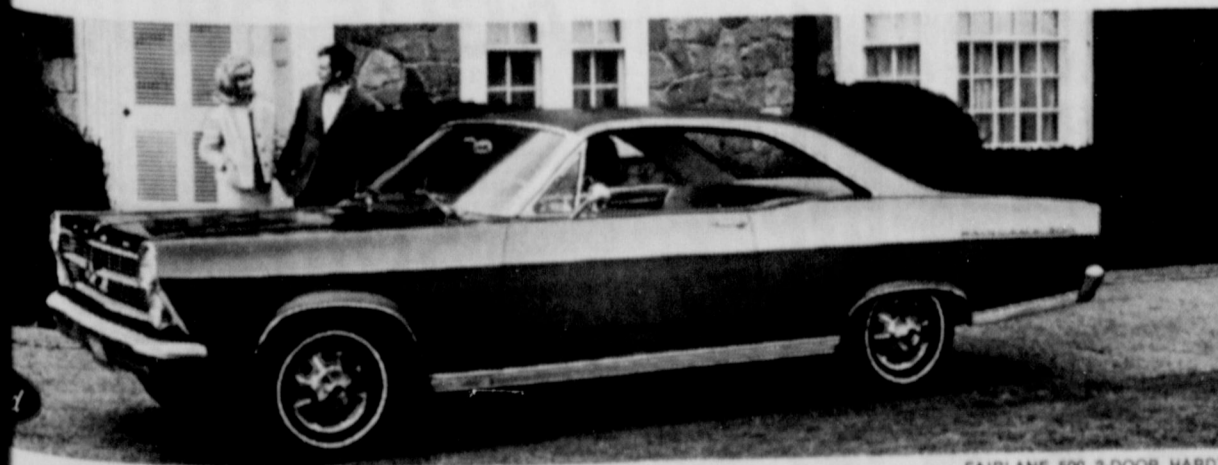

# Soil Stewardship Week Proclaimed

The week of May 15 - 22 has been designated as "SOIL STEWARDSHIP WEEK" by the United States Department of Agriculture. Ministers of the different churches are being encouraged to preach at least one sermon on SOIL STEWARDSHIP, either on Sunday, May 15 or May 22.

The newspapers, radio and TV news media will have special articles and programs throughout the week to call attention to the necessity of conserving our Greatest Natural Resources, "soil and water."

The theme of Soil Stewardship week this year is, "Crisis in the Countryside."

However unevenly it may be distributed, no other nation in history has been blessed with such abundance as our own. For better or worse, we live in

an "affluent society." As a nation, we are better than well-fed. More Americans worry about being overweight and about dieting than about hunger.

The evidence of present plenty in the bulging supermarkets and shopping centers of the country dulls the sharp edge of urgency in the call for soil stewardship -- for the conservation, wise use, multiple use, and orderly development of vital soil and water resources. The land is the source of our ample food supply and since there anything but a shortage of food, why worry about the land?

It is a frequent human failing to live for the day along, and insofar as the land is concerned millions of Americans find it easy to indulge in this delusion. The hard facts of a sharply rising population and a

mammoth economic growth, with the clear and imminent prospect of unlimited demands on limited resources, are conveniently brushed aside.

The supermarkets are still full.

We forget the condition is temporary. We delay the time-consuming, exacting work of soil stewardship, of watershed protection, of land-use planning. What's the rush?

The supermarkets are still full.

Widespread public indifference toward resource management is a price we pay for present plenty. It is also a root cause of the impending resource crisis in the countryside.

Cotton is used to make a host of items: cloth, food, industrial materials, chemicals.

## Volunteers Needed For Lubbock Clinic

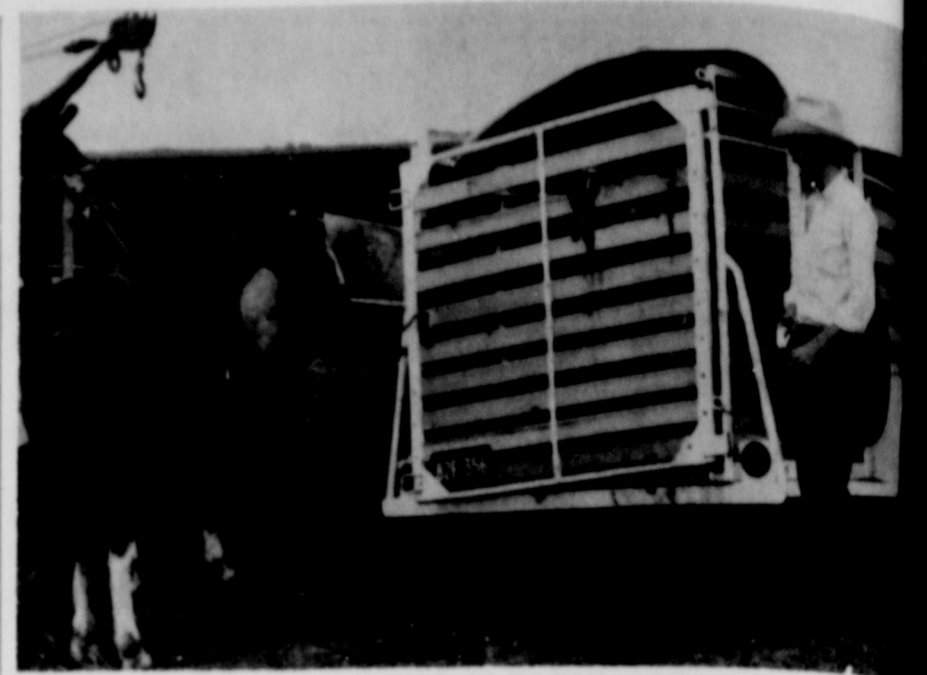

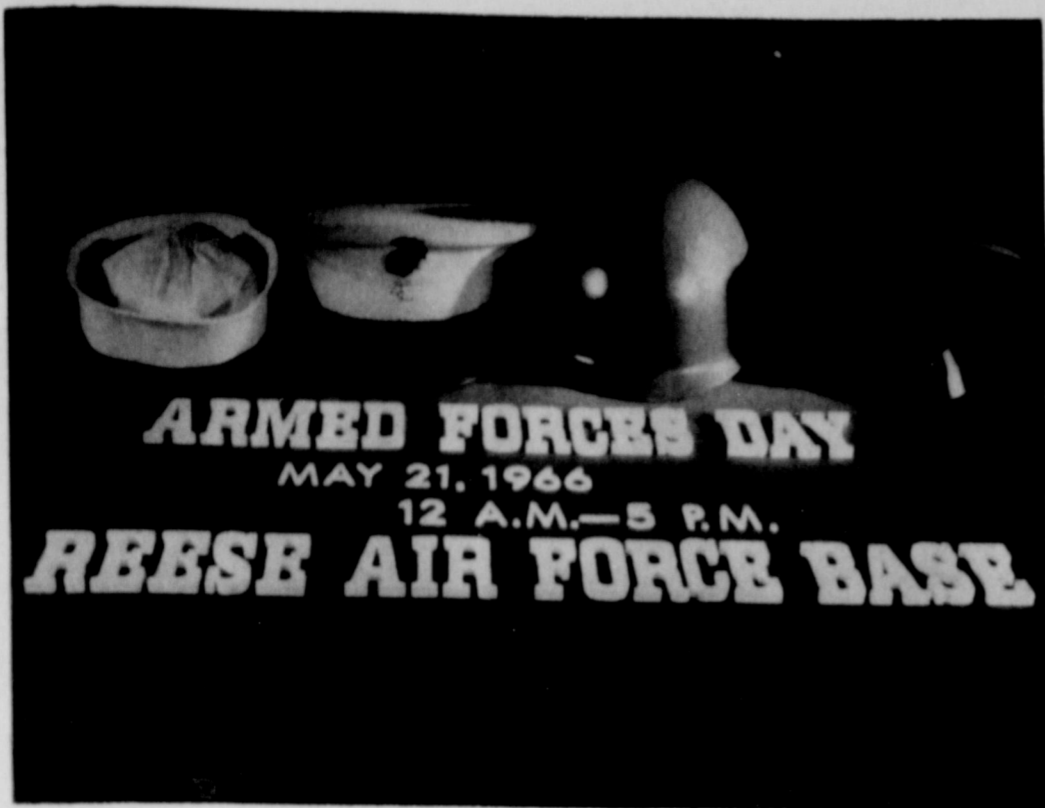

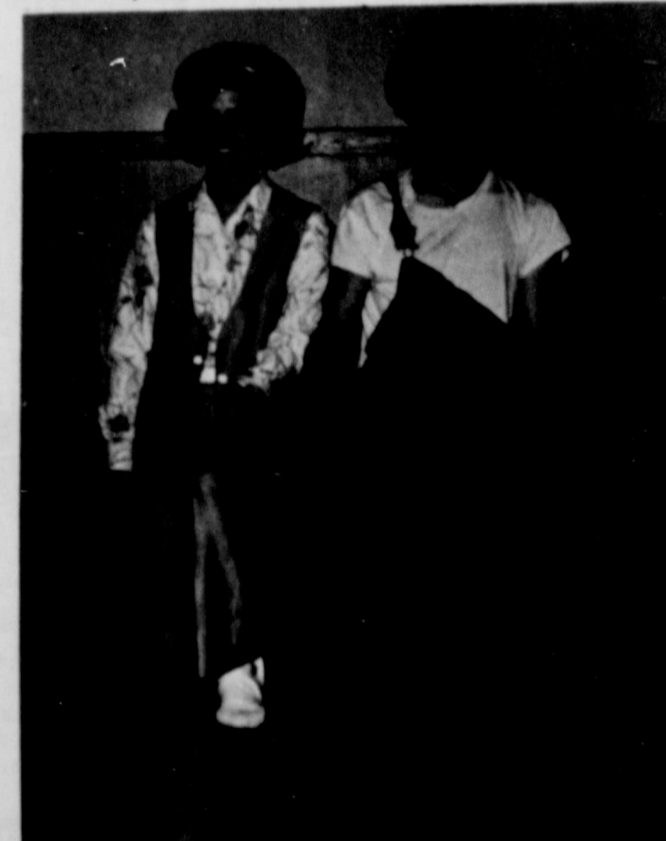

# COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

Farmers in the plains counties up to plant 500,000 acres of cotton in 1966, less than the 570,000 acres planted in 1965. This will be the lowest planted area in many years.

Planting intentions for 1966 by the State Stabilization and Service office at Lubbock. The figures show a decrease from county to county in farmer sign-up for the cotton program in 1966. The actual cotton program in 1966 was extended to 500,000 acres, but virtually all farmers who intended to plant in the program by April 1, so far, have not done so.

Not included in the acres producers intend planting in 1966 are any that may be planted under the export acreage provisions of the program. But these are not expected to total enough to materially affect the Plains output for 1966. Also to be considered is the fact it isn't too late for allotments to be placed in the cropland adjustment program. But this isn't likely to have any great effect either.

There are some who predict that substantial increases in per-acre yields from the reduced acreage this year will soften the effect on number of bales produced. Others maintain that, with a big portion of their income from direct government payments, producers will cut to the bone costs on planted acreage and per-acre yields may actually go down. Both schools are probably right in some instances and wrong in others.

So, for such an early production estimate, it's probably just as well to assume yields similar to those of 1965 and reduce production by the same percentage as the indicated acreage cut -- 28.2 percent.
