



Not a Question of Patriotism . . .

A scheduled maneuver of armored divisions in Central Texas has been called off because the army couldn't lease enough land between Fort Hood and Brownwood to stage the training exercise. At the going rate of \$1 per farm or ranch, the army signed up about one-third of the land needed.

Ranchers and farmers in the area who didn't sign up have come in for a lot of undeserved criticism, mostly from merchants in the Fort Hood-Central Texas area who are afraid of losing this army facility and the hundreds of millions of dollars

Although the army promised prompt fair payment for damages incurred, ranchers were skeptical because of a similar maneuver held ten years ago in which they generally came out on the short end of the stick in damage payments.

There are a hundred reasons for not letting two divisions of armore 4 vahieles rampage across ranch and farm land - and none of them have to do with lack of patriotism. How can one estimate the camera a broken fence might do to the bloodlines of a registered hard that was many years in building? Or when a rut on a hil'side might turn into a gully?

Why not take the armored divisions to government land somewhere in the western states for their maneuvering? Well. the army said it would take \$9 million extra to do this and that

The answer to this is simple. If it takes \$9 million more for vital training, let all ampayers across the nation share in this cost. Why place the entire burden on a few farmers and ranch-

If the wife of a high official of the government of Ghana can afford to hiv an \$8,400 gold-plated bed (part of it no doubt paid for by our aid dollars), and if this same official (who before Ghana's independence was a \$22-a-month debt collector) can afford several villas outside the capital city of Acera (one of them in the \$200,000 range), then the U.S. government can afford to pay our landowners more than \$1 each for vital training areas.

However, the lease money is not really the issue. In a national emergency, not one rancher would refuse such use of his land. There is no more patriotic group of people alive than those good folks who inhabit the rural areas of Texas.

The 18cent-per-bushel support increase will be paid in-kind based on the normal production of the farm's harvested acreage. The voluntary program, Secretary Freeman said, gives wheat farmers an opportunity to continue to make needed adjustments and thus protect the gain made this year under the 1962 program.

Under the voluntary reduction provisions for 1963, farmers will be able to divert from 20 to 50 percent of their wheat acreage with special diversion provisions for small farms. On diverted acres, a payment will be made at 50 percent of the county loan rate (reflecting the \$1.82 per bushel national average) on or county ASCS offices. the normal production (1959-60 average yields) of the divtrted wheat acreage. The minimum diversion for participation is 20 percent of the wheat allotment or in the case of small farms 20 percent of the allotment or the average 3-year wheat acreage (1959-60-61), whichever is larger

Of the \$2.00 per bushel 1963 average support price to participating farmers, \$1.82 per bushel will be available through loans or purchase agreements and 18 cents per bushel in the form of a payment in-kind based on the normal production of the harves-

Farmers may receive 50 percent of their acreage diversion payment at time of sign up to participate in the program. Remainder of the acreage diversion payment and all of the pricesupport payment will be made after compliance is checked.






