

FOUR DAY SPELL LEAVES 1.7 TO 6 INCHES

Rainfall Soaks Area

Four days of "near perfect" rain, ranging from 1.7 to 6 or 7 inches, drenched Slaton and the area from Friday through Monday, leaving moisture that could be worth millions of dollars to upcoming cotton and grain crops.

The general rainfall soaked area croplands, coming just before planting time, and fell in such a manner that thirsty farmland absorbed almost all the beneficial moisture.

Most rain gauges in Slaton agreed on about 4 inches for the four-day period. Larger amounts were reported around Posey, Roosevelt and Acuff. The lightest amount was recorded in the Gordon area where 1.7 inches was reported.

Spotted areas around Roosevelt and Acuff had as much as 6 inches or more for the rainy spell. Posey showed 4.85 while

Wilson recorded 2.8 inches. Rains measured from 3 to 4 inches between Wilson and Union and about 3 to 4 around New Home and Lake View areas.

The South Plains area escaped violent weather that hit farther down state. No hail or damaging winds were reported anywhere in the area.

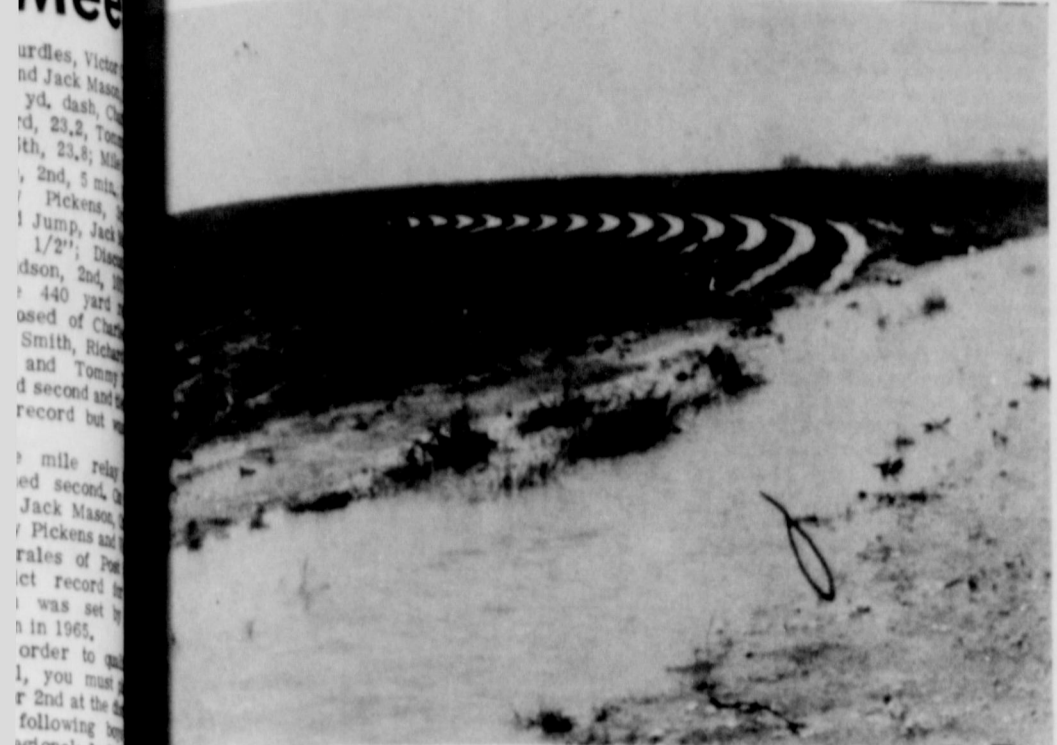
The rain set in here early Friday morning, with the heaviest showers coming Saturday and Monday mornings. The general rainfall boosted the crop prospects all around the area with most farmers agreeing that the rain was "just what the doctor ordered."

Lubbock reported the rainfall being the heaviest April showers since 1957. Skies cleared Tuesday with forecasters wondering what another frontal system moving in from the Rockies would bring to the South Plains.

New City Golf Course Open Here Saturday

The new nine-hole course, located several miles northeast of town, will have its formal opening at 9 a.m. Saturday with Mayor Jonas Cain, Don Crow, J. S. Edwards Jr., Max Arants, Carl Lewis and Bill Ball scheduled as the first men to tee off.

Dr. Don Hatchett, president of the Slaton Golf Course Assn., will be out of town, but Arants, Edwards and Crow are directors. Lewis and Ball were instrumental in planning and preparing the course.

A color, schematic diagram of the course can be found on the back page of this section. It was drawn by Bill Ball and printed courtesy of Citizens State Bank.

Plenty of local golfers are anxious to try out the new course, and it is expected to be a popular place Saturday and Sunday.

Also expected to be on hand for the opening Saturday morning is Doug Galassini, former Slaton Chamber of Commerce president, who is credited with initiating the drive to obtain a municipal golf course. The Chamber, feeling the need for additional recreational facilities, contributed \$5,000 to the project.

City Okays Summer Water Rates

Slaton City Commission, in a productive session Monday night, approved a residential water irrigation rate for the summer, okayed a six-month budget report, approved a policy on lease of city equipment, elected Curly Martindale as mayor pro-tem, passed an annexation ordinance on second reading and studied several other matters.

An irrigation rate devised to benefit more people was drawn up and approved by commissioners. The rates will be lower for all citizens who use more than the 3,000 gallon minimum, and the special rates will be in effect from June 15 to Sept. 15.

The irrigation rate last summer didn't go into effect until usage passed the 15,000-gallon mark. The present water rates are: \$3.50 for first 3,000 gallons; 60 cents per 1,000 for the next 7,000 gallons; 50 cents per 1,000 for the next 10,000 gallons; and 40 cents per 1,000 for all over 20,000 gallons.

The irrigation rates this summer will be: \$3.50 for the first 3,000 gallons; 55 cents per 1,000 for the next 7,000 gallons; 45 cents per 1,000 for the next 5,000 gallons; and 35 cents per 1,000 for all over 15,000 gallons.

Martindale was elected by the commission as the new mayor pro-tem. He replaces Earl Reuser and will take over duties of mayor in the absence of the city chief.

The second reading of the annexation ordinance was passed, calling for a public hearing May 9 on annexing land in northwest Slaton. It will include some 200 acres in four tracts. A legal description can be found in a public notice inside today's Slatonite.

At the request of the mayor the Planning & Zoning Board met with the commission to clarify its recommendation on annexing the land. Chairman Don Crow explained that it was "Primarily to protect and guide future growth of the area in question." Also present were Hack Lasater, Phil Brewer, John Dodson and Edwin Heinrich.

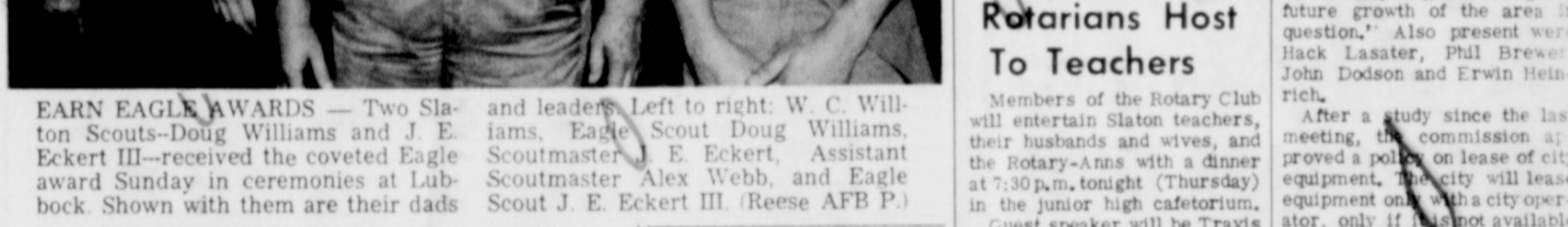
After a study since the last meeting, the commission approved a policy on lease of city equipment. The city will lease equipment only with a city operator, only if it is not available from an independent contractor.

Quilliam Named To Attend Top Solon's Parley

State Rep. Reed Quilliam of Lubbock has been selected as one of 36 legislators in the nation to participate in a week-long conference on state government to be held this summer in Florida, it was announced earlier this week.

The conference, to be conducted by The Eagleton Institute of Politics of Rutgers University under a grant from the Carnegie Corporation, will bring together two leading state legislators from each of the 18 most populous states for the purpose of discussing the problems of state government and their possible solutions.

Quilliam, 37-year-old Lubbock attorney, will be bidding for re-election in the May 7 primary to the seat in the Texas House of Representatives to which he was first elected in 1960.

Roy Boyd, candidate for reelection as County School Superintendent of Lubbock County, has authorized the Slatonite to announce his candidacy for the office subject to the May 7 Democratic primary.

He holds life membership in the National Education Association, is a member of the American Association of School Administrators, is an active member of the Texas State Teachers Association and is in "Who's Who in American Education". For several years he has been the Texas representative on the Planning Committee for County Superintendents of Texas.

Pre-School Signup Set Here May 6

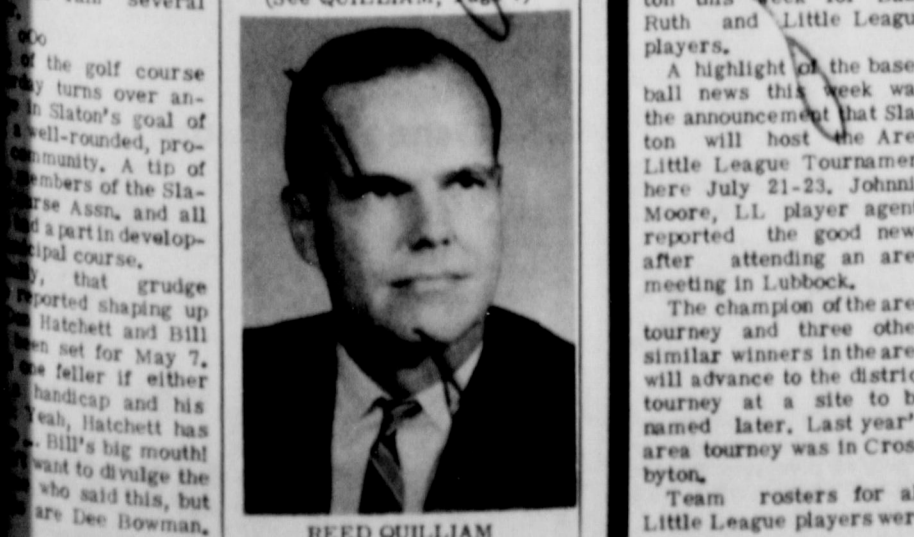
Friday, May 6, from 1:30 - 2:30 p.m. has been designated as pre-school registration day for children who are six or seven years of age and entering school for the first time.

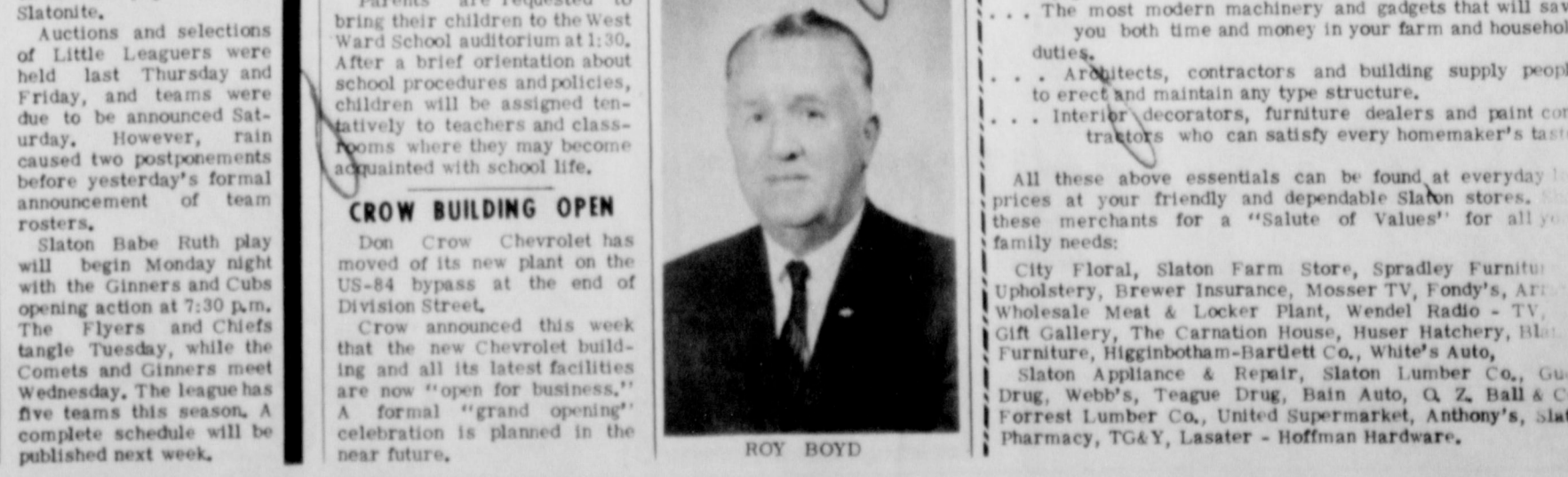
CROW BUILDING OPEN

When Hack was in the service and stationed in California where fresh fruit was plentiful, he started experimenting to make a salad to suit his and his wife's taste.

Hack and his wife, Norma, came to Slaton in 1939. He came here as assistant Piggy Wiggly manager and was later manager and after 15 1/2 years bought interest in Lasater - Hoffman Hardware.

HACK SALAD
4 bananas
1 can medium fruit cocktail
1 small can mandarin oranges, drain

1 medium can pineapple tidbits
1 can Freestone peaches
1 cup miniature marshmallows
1 cup of melon balls
1 cup apple balls
1 dash salt
1/4 c. coconut
2 T. Delaware Punch base (concentrated)
1/4 c. chopped nuts.

Use fresh fruits in season such as peaches, cantaloupes, watermelon, grapes, cherries, plums, dates, etc.

For best results do not add sugar and use juice from canned fruit (all but oranges). Always use fruit cocktail and pineapple to keep other fruits from turning dark. Cut some of the fruits with a melon ball spoon. This salad will keep for days, but Hack suggests you add the bananas the day you serve the salad.

Something bright is afoot this summer. It's colorful cotton sneakers, available in a wide range of fabrics matched to sportswear styles. To clean sneakers, use a scrub brush dipped in detergent and water, then in dry baking soda. To dry sneakers without puckers, stretch them on shoe trees.

Give old solid-color curtains a distinctive new look by trimming them from top to bottom with rows of cotton curtain fringe. Choose fringe in a gay coordinated color and sew it on in equally spaced rows, as close together as you like.

The only real cotton is 100 per cent cotton.

To make dry, brittle hair manageable and glossy, give it a simple oil treatment before shampooing. Warm half a cup of salad oil and apply with cotton cosmetic balls to scalp. Part hair at intervals to soak roots with the oil. Wrap your head in a towel for about fifteen minutes. Then shampoo with three latherings.

How lucky can you get? That's what 4-H Club members are asking when they talk about a new 4-H medal designed with a four-leaf clover encircled by a horse shoe.

For the first time annual awards will be offered in the 4-H Horse program on a county, state and national basis. Another lucky break for the young horse lovers is a chance to learn from horse experts.

The Cooperative Extension Service, which supervises the program, will select the 1966 award winners. Projects and activities will be directed by local volunteer leaders.

Helping to make all this possible is Merck Chemical Division of Merck & Co., Inc., Rahway, N. J. The firm will provide scholarships, educational trips and medals. It will also be host to their state and national winners at the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago next fall.

(Continued from Page 1) in town, and will lease only motor graders and dump trucks.

Rates were also set by the city -- large motor grader at \$20 per hour, small grader at \$15 per hour, and dump trucks at \$10 per hour.

The city also approved a policy on farm taps on the Canadian River water line. The policy, in general, states: person must own at least 80 acres through which CR line passes; no tap larger than 3/4 inch will be made and only one per 80 acres; rate shall be 1 1/2 times the rate inside the city limits.

The commission also approved a repair job on a small horse house located behind the fire station. A question on moving the house was decided to be impractical.

In another policy move, the commission decided to drop the lease method of obtaining police cars and to buy cars when the lease expires July 1. City Administrator Buford Duff said he thought the city could purchase cars for about the same expenditure and still have salvage value at the end of two years.

An ordinance providing a Housing Code for the city was passed on first reading as an emergency measure.

Canadian River Project Outlined to Rotarians

Progress of the Canadian River Project was outlined to Slaton Rotarians last week by Dess Chappelle, resident engineer at Lubbock for the Bureau of Reclamation, Department of Interior.

Target date for delivery of Canadian River water to South Plains cities is late 1967, he told the club. While generally covering the entire CRMWA Program, Chappelle said being constructed.

Sanford Dam, a \$18.8 million facility at Lake Meredith, is completed and two recreational areas have been opened to the public. Eight sites are to be developed at the lake.

The aqueduct system, largest ever contracted by the Bureau, is 322 miles in length. Contracts for installing the system were let in four portions. A total of 212 miles of the line had been completed at the end of March.

Size of the aqueduct ranges from 96 inches to 10 inches. Lateral lines into Slaton are of 16 and 14-inch sizes. The engineer also reported the treatment plant at Lubbock, which will serve the seven South Plains cities, is progressing on schedule.

Chappelle pointed out that the initial estimated cost of the CR project was in excess of \$96 million, with some \$93 million set for repayment by member cities. The current estimate is about \$15 million less, with total cost tabbed at \$81 million and repayment at some \$77 million.

The project was authorized by Congress in 1950 and the member cities went into contract in 1960 on the repayment plan. As authorized, the CR project is for the principal purpose of furnishing water for municipal and industrial uses; controlling floods and sediment; and providing recreation and fish and wildlife benefits.

The 11 cities to be served are Amarillo, Borger, Brownfield, Lamesa, Levelland, Lubbock, O'Donnell, Pampa, Plainview, Slaton and Tahoka.

Chappelle was introduced by Howard Hoffman, Slaton director to the CRMWA.

itol correspondents conducted by United Press International. He gained particular acclaim for this work in solving the state's financial problems and putting the general revenue fund, faced with a 63 million dollar deficit when Quilliam took office, in the black, where it has consistently remained since 1961.

Quilliam's period of service in the Legislature has also been marked by Texas Tech's rapid progress toward achieving status as an institution of the first rank, and he, along with other Lubbock County representatives in state government, has been instrumental in the college's remarkable strides.

Texas Tech's general revenue fund appropriation has been increased from \$8.87 million at the time Quilliam took office to the \$20.5 million appropriation for the school for the current biennium. Quilliam also played an important role in obtaining the law school for Tech which will open its doors in September, 1967.

During the last session of the Legislature Quilliam was co-sponsor of the bill establishing a new district court in Lubbock County, and of the teacher salary increase legislation. He was also one of the leading advocates of the constitutional amendment, to be voted on in November, which would prohibit taxing authorities from assessing farm land based on its commercial potential so long as the land is being used for agricultural purposes.

Quilliam holds degrees in government, business and law from The University of Texas, and is a former member of the Texas Tech faculty. He has been active in Lubbock civic affairs, and is a lieutenant commander in the Naval Reserve.

He, his wife, Myrna, and their three children were members of the First Presbyterian Church in Lubbock.

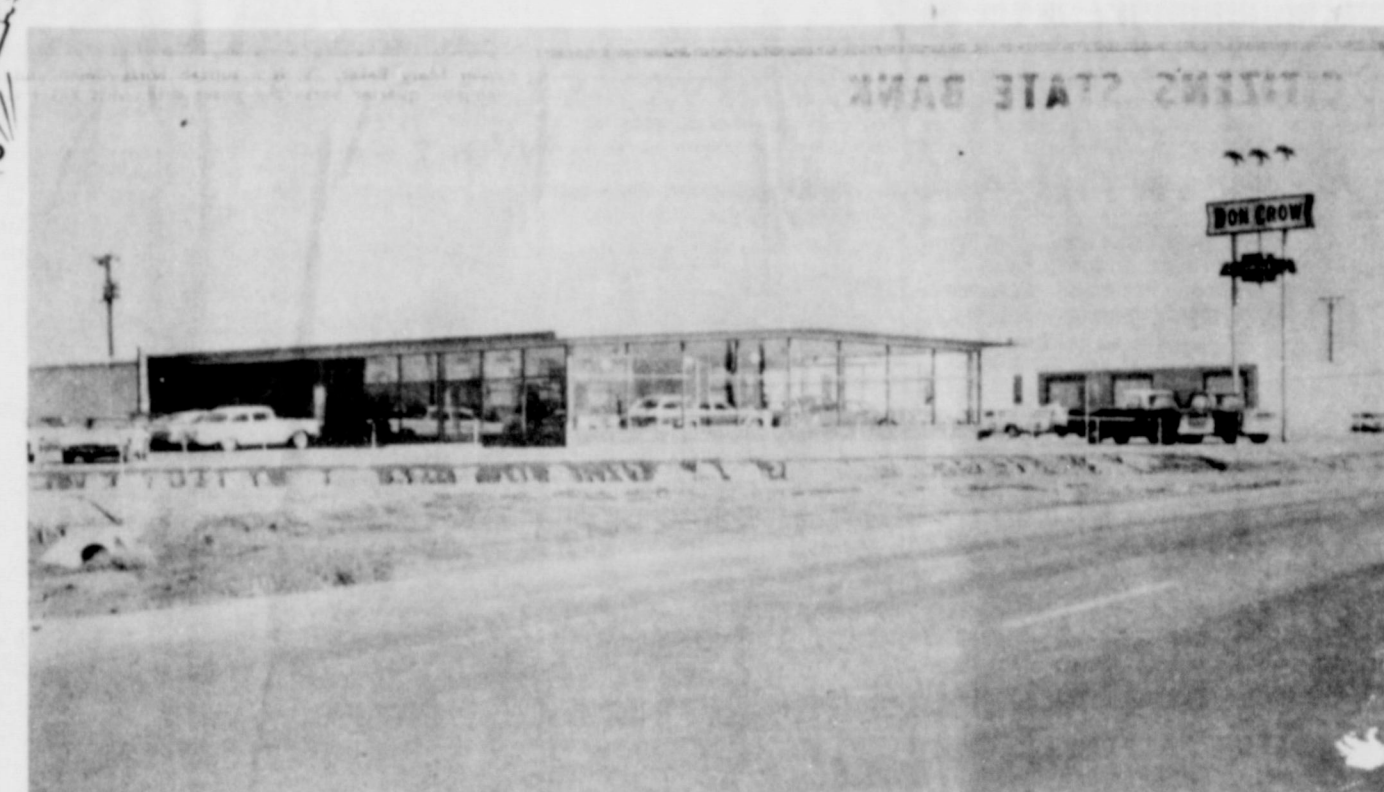

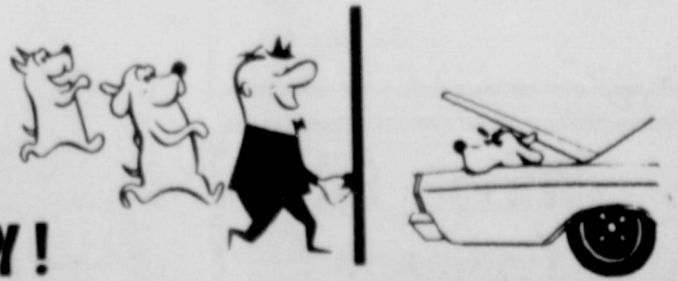

Burial was in Lawn Haven Memorial Park Cemetery under direction of Steed Funeral Home of Clovis. Masonic graveside rites were conducted.

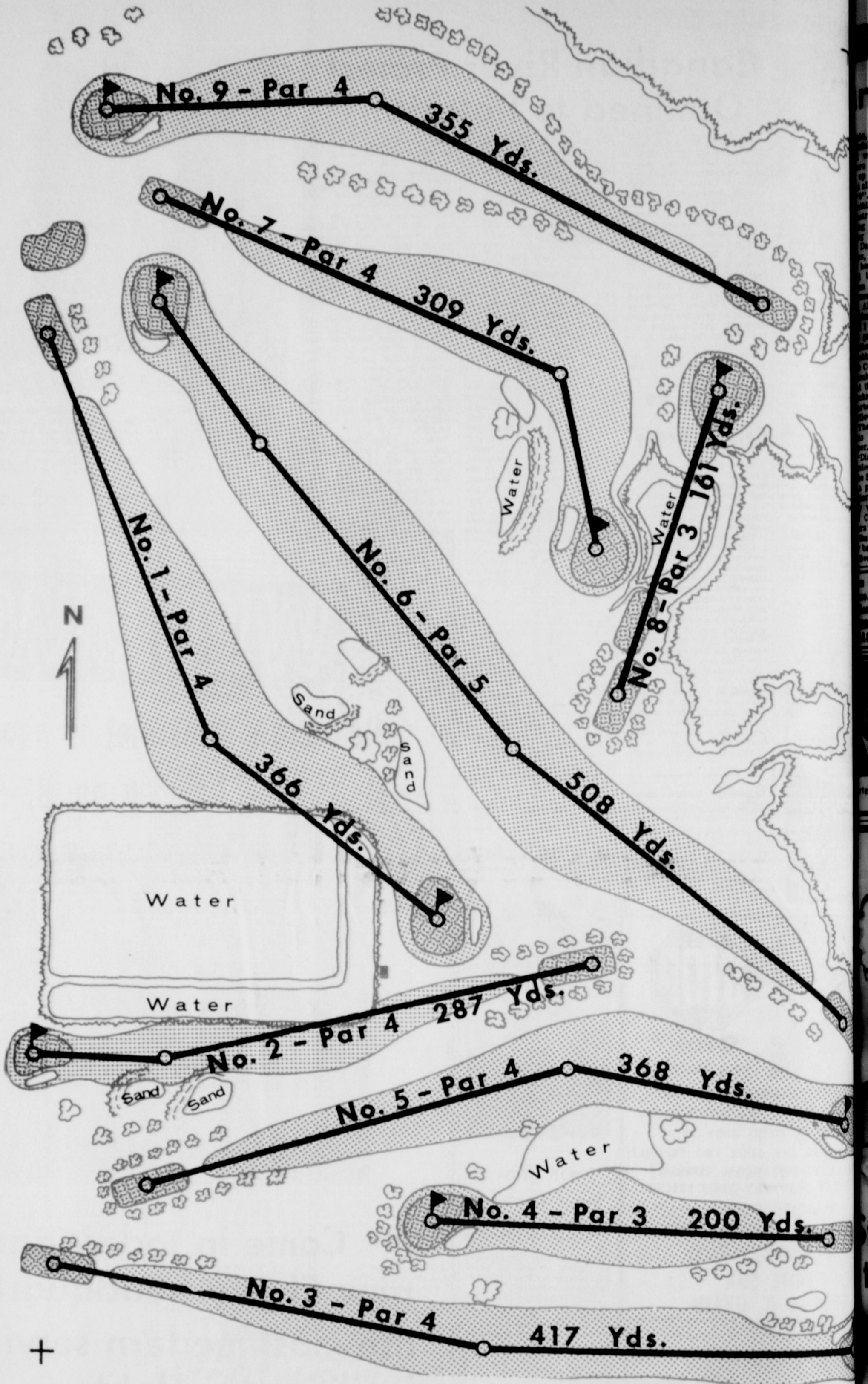

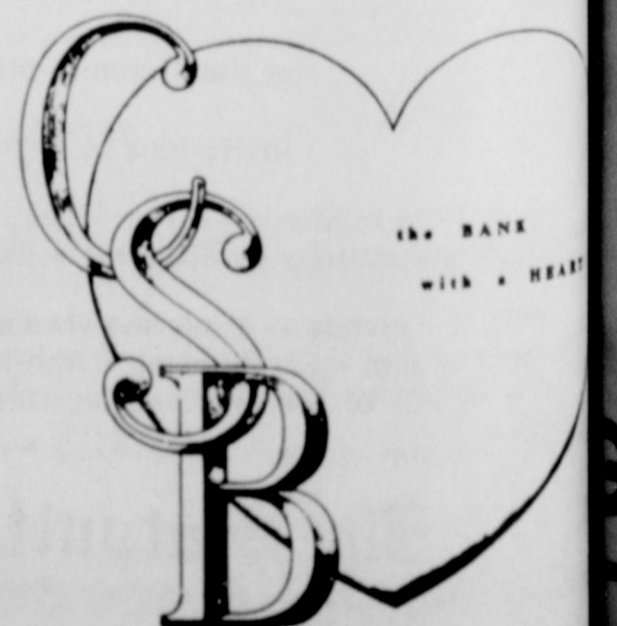

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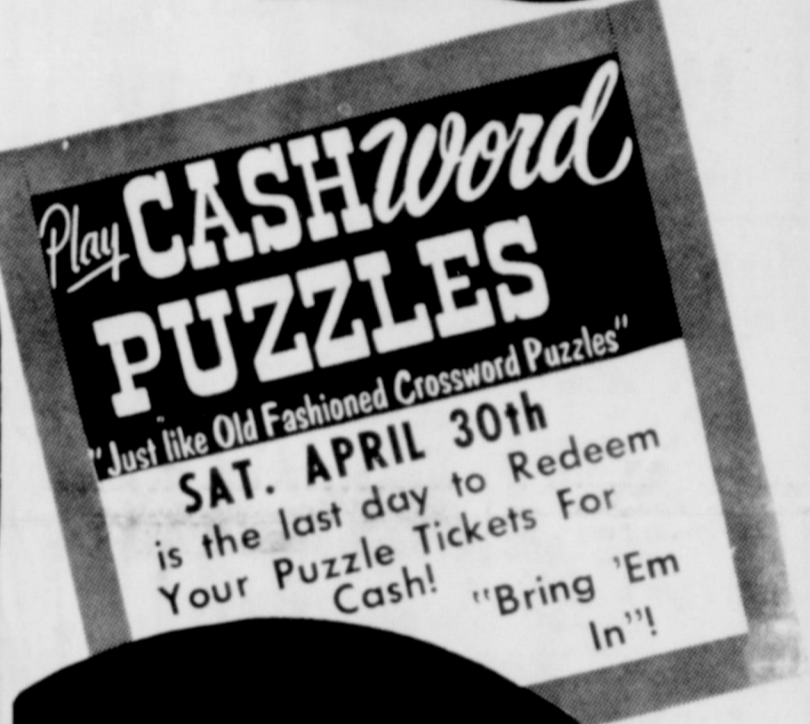

Flowers On Mother's Day Dates To Greeks

While you may be among the thousands of Americans who will be sending flowers by wire to honor Mom on her day, you might be surprised to learn how far back in history the custom of observing the occasion with flowers extends.

Ancient Greeks and Romans paid tribute to a universal mother -- Mother Earth, by wearing leafy garlands as they danced in the streets on the Ides of March. According to information compiled by researchers at Florists' Transworld Delivery Association, some historians contend that the germ of Mother's Day was sown thousands of years ago when the people of the Near East and Mediterranean regions worshipped an Earth Mother by decking themselves with flower garlands at woodland festivals.

During early celebrations of Mother's Day in the U.S., sons and daughters wore flowers instead of giving them as gifts to Mom. Miss Anna M. Jarvis, who sponsored a church service in 1907 to honor her late mother and other mothers of the community, requested those who attended to wear a white carnation. However, as the custom spread throughout the country, with Mother's Day being officially proclaimed a national holiday in 1914, celebrants stopped wearing flowers themselves and started giving them in the form of corsages and bouquets.

Setting a special day aside to honor "real life" mothers isn't new, however. A similar custom existed in England centuries ago. The day, which fell each year on the fourth Sunday in Lent, was called "Mothering Sunday," and began as a

festival honoring "Mother Church." It wasn't long, though, before people seized the same occasion to honor their own mothers with a gift of flowers and a rich cake baked specially for the day. It was also customary for many churches to hold services for children on this day, and these observances were marked by the bringing of flowers to the altar for a blessing.

The carnation -- white, red or pink -- is the official Mother's Day flower in the United States, because that was Anna Jarvis' mother's favorite flower. But while carnations are still a popular flower to give on Mother's Day, any seasonal flower is considered appropriate in a Mother's Day corsage or floral arrangement.

Is Mother's Day a strictly American holiday? Hardly! The more up-to-date version of the occasion is celebrated, according to the National Committee for the Observance of Mother's Day, in such far-flung places as Mexico, Canada, South America, China, Japan and Africa.
