City Okays Lights to Overpass

Action to "light up" entranceways to Slaton was taken at Monday night's City Commission meeting when city dads approved street lights at the north US-84 overpass and on

the west end of Division Street. Commissioners felt the move would promote safety and enhance the night - time appearance of Slaton, A number of citizens had suggested lighting up the overpass, which is difficult to see when coming from Lubbock at night.

Lights will be placed from FM-400 on west to the overpass and, on Division Street, from N. 20th to the 84 bypass. New building activity on the west end of Division was a major factor in approving lights there.

In other action, the commission moved ahead on the city's master plans for water and sewer lines, approved on second and final reading the annexation of some 200 acres of

land, If and when lines are needed further west or across the bypass, they can be tied into this system, the engineer explained.

race, and this has traditionally diminished interest in the second primary.

A final warning sign was the rumor immediately following the first primary on May 7 that some counties without locally contested races weren't even going to hold a second primary. The State Democratic Executive Committee responded with a resolution calling attention to the fact that every county is required by law to hold a runoff election, and the penalty for failure to do so can be a fine or imprisonment

for party officials. For want of the votes of Texans who don't care enough to go to the polls, June 4, a very small minority of the citizens could elect some of its most important office holders. And the big battle to get the majority of Texas voters to exercise their responsibility as citizens would be lost!



Additional Funds Go To Canadian River Project

Congressman George Mahon announced today that the additional sum of \$3,500,000 is being made availabe for the continued construction of the Canadian River project for the current fiscal year.

Congress had appropriated \$17,000,000 last year for the project and the additional funds have been made available as a result of the unanticipated speed of construction which has taken place.

Mahon, who heads the House Appropriations Committee. said that the Budget estimate now before the Committee for continuation of the project next year totals \$14,215,000. This will bring total appropriations for the project to about \$83,-000,000 and will substantially complete it.

Mahon said he anticipated no serious difficulty in securing approval of the funds requested. When the project was

begun several years ago it was anticipated that the total cost would be \$90,000,000, but it is being built for the lesser figure. The project is expected to be in substantial operation by about June 1967.

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

Chairman of the building committee, Howell Sammons made the presentation of the building during the ceremonies. Acceptance of the presentation was made by Robert Davis, official board chairman.

A brush arbor, using gin bagging for a roof; the Slaton Club House; the Palace Theater; and City Hall were used as meeting places after the 1923 signing of a charter to establish the First Christian Church of Slaton.

Of the 82 original charter members only five remain as members. They are Mrs. Alex Shelton, Mrs. E. A. Gentry, Mrs. C. C. Wicker, Mrs. J. D. Norris and Roosevelt

A basement building project in 1925 gave the members a place to meet officially. In 1932 a floor was added and in 1933 ceiling was placed over the facilities.

August 9, 1942, marked dedication of a sanctuary on East Panhandle. At that time the basement facilities were remodeled to include classrooms, kitchen and a fellowship hall.

The church's first library was dedicated in 1958 during rededication ceremonies of the remodeled sanctuary. The rededication marked the completetion of redecorating and refurbishing the sanctuary. Only a sign marked the pro-

posed sight for the First Christian Church until ground breaking ceremonies were held on November 16, 1965. The sign had been erected, October 1, 1960, after the church purchased the six and one - half acre tract of land as a building site for their new facilities. Five and a half months later

on May 8 the first services were held in the new church
