City Okays Lights to Overpass

Action to "light up" entranceways to Slaton was taken at Monday night's City Commission meeting when city dads approved street lights at the north US-84 overpass and on the west end of Division Street. Commissioners felt the move would promote safety and enhance the night-time appearance of Slaton. A number of citizens had suggested lighting up the overpass, which is difficult to see when coming from Lubbock at night.

Lights will be placed from FM-400 on west to the overpass and, on Division Street, from N. 20th to the 84 bypass. New building activity on the west end of Division was a major factor in approving lights there.

In other action, the commission moved ahead on the city's master plans for water and sewer lines, approved on second and final reading the annexation of some 200 acres of

land northwest and west of the city, and held an informal discussion on the drainage problem on Division Street.

The meeting, scheduled to start at 7:30 p.m., didn't officially get underway until 8:30 when Jack Smith arrived to make a quorum.

However, Commissioner Earl Reasoner held an "off the record" discussion on the Division Street drainage problem to pass the hour. City Engineer Bennet Reeves recommended the city approach the highway department about helping alleviate the problem.

He explained that a culvert and ditch on the southwest side of the US-84 and FM-41 intersection was not carrying

water on south to the Roche Lake as it was engineered to do. Consequently, when a hard rain falls, almost all of the water is being funnelled down

Division. With a large tract of land being officially annexed at the meeting, commissioners moved fast in showing good intent on extending water service and fire protection to businesses in the area.

At City Administrator Buford Duff's suggestion, commissioners approved extending water lines from the intersection of FM-400 and north US-84 to the Slaton Veterinary Clinic.

Other businesses in the new city tract include Slaton Implement, Tucker Butane, Slaton Wrecking, Triangle Manufacturing. Duff estimated some 2,800 feet of pipe will be required and city crews will lay the lines.

The commission approved a bid notice on 7,700 feet of pipe. Other lines were in the master plan and include four blocks on Garza, four on Scurry, four on Jean and four on Powers.

Bid notices for sewer pipes were also approved. This project in south Slaton includes a lift station and extension of lines to the US-84 bypass. The line starts near the Shamrock station at 9th and goes to the Texaco station on the bypass. Total cost of the project is

tabbed near \$30,000 with funds provided for the improvements in a recent bond issue.

Reasoner inquired about the cost of the project in relation to the number of people served. He pointed out only seven property owners would be served at present, but the city engineer explained that future development could be taken into consideration.

Reasoner also pointed out that two property owners refused easements across their property, saying that no development was planned for the

Slaton police worked with the Texas Highway Patrol to apprehend a hit-and-run driver in a dark blue and white truck. The incident happened near the Caprock close to Post.

Slaton police stopped and held two suspects for the Highway Patrol. Patrolmen took the men into custody and Slaton police have the truck at the station.

Mike Williams, 1400 Crosby, reported the theft of one wire spoke hubcap. Williams valued the hubcap at more than \$25.

Southwestern Bell Telephone reported the theft of \$150 of equipment that had been chained to a pole. The chain was cut and a tank, regulator and section of hose were taken.

C of C Project Aids Customers

The retail trade committee of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce has initiated a new "customer service" program -- a project designed to offer customers a service not available at any other shopping center.

Questionnaires were sent to all seniors of Slaton High School, compiling information on the students' sizes and likes and dislikes.

War Against Mosquito Starts

The war against the mosquito has been started. After several calls concerning the mosquito problem this week, The Slatonite checked with City Administrator Buford Duff to find out if action is being taken.

Duff explained that the Lubbock City - County Health Unit handles the spraying operation for the entire county, and reported the unit had sprayed Slaton twice last week.

The health unit covers the entire county, making scheduled rounds, or going to an area sooner on request. The unit reports that mosquitoes "hatch out" in large numbers several days after a rain, and most of them are the non-disease carrying type.

Disease-carrying mosquitoes are most prevalent in places where water is trapped or stands for a long period of time. The unit has about 90 lakes or ponds in the county which are sprayed regularly.

Mrs. Cone is a graduate of Slaton High School. The bridegroom is employed by the Irrigation in Ulysses, Kan. A high school graduate.

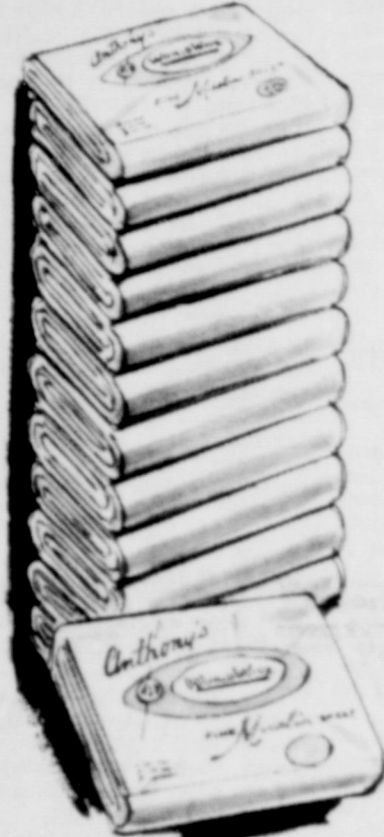

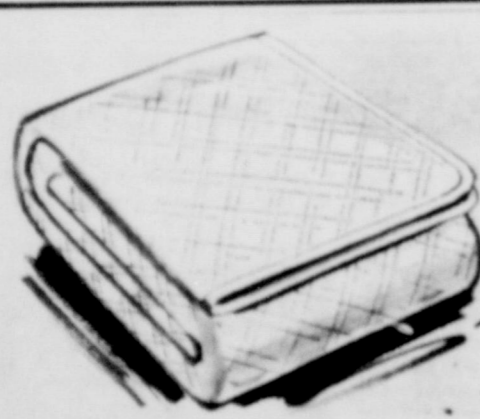

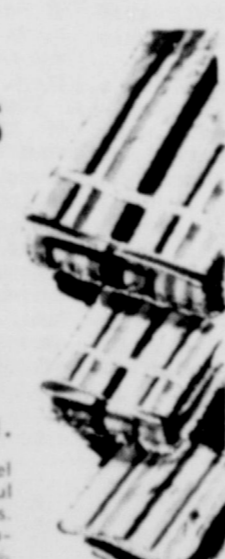

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Foster Attends Leaders' Meet

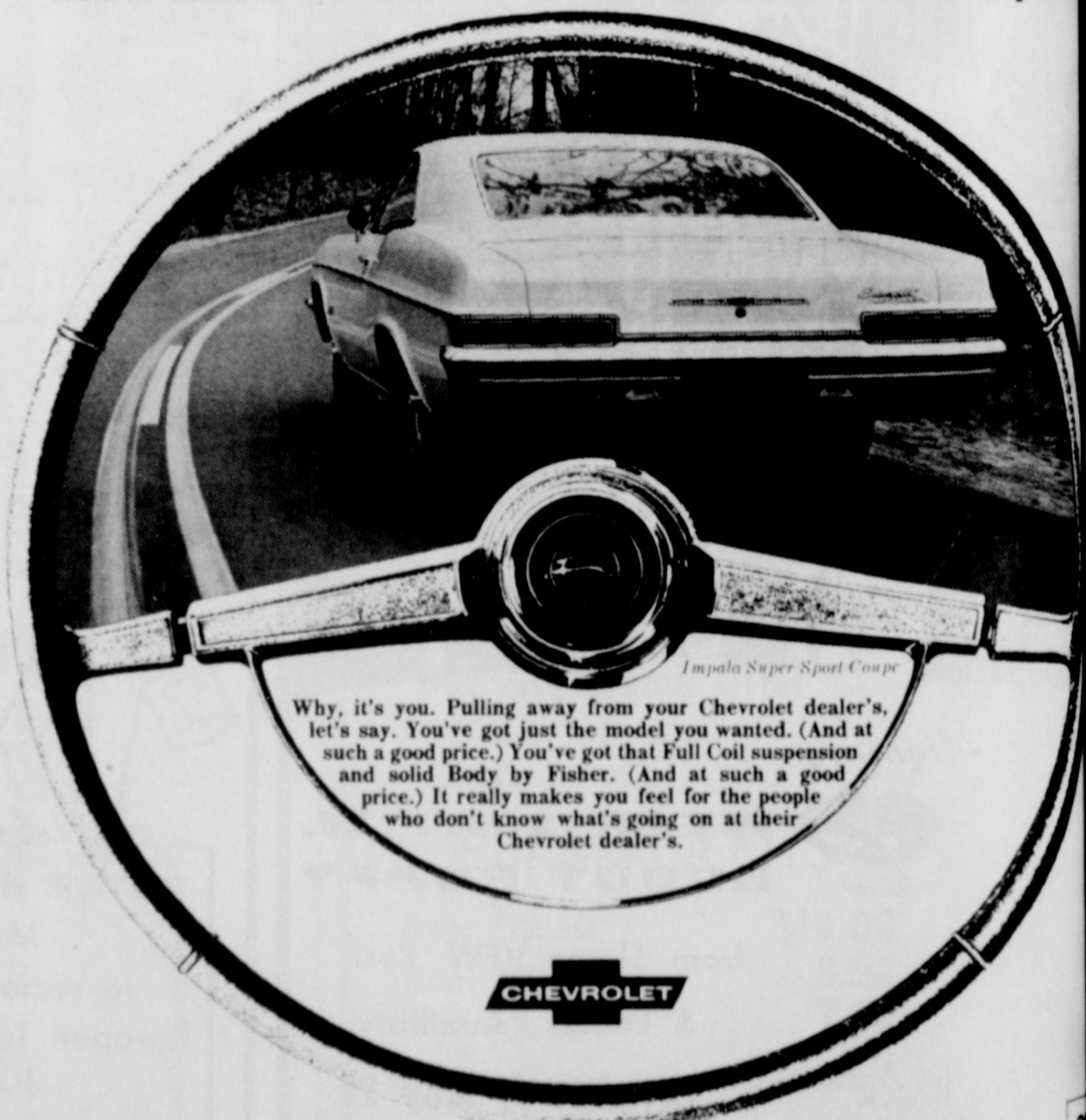

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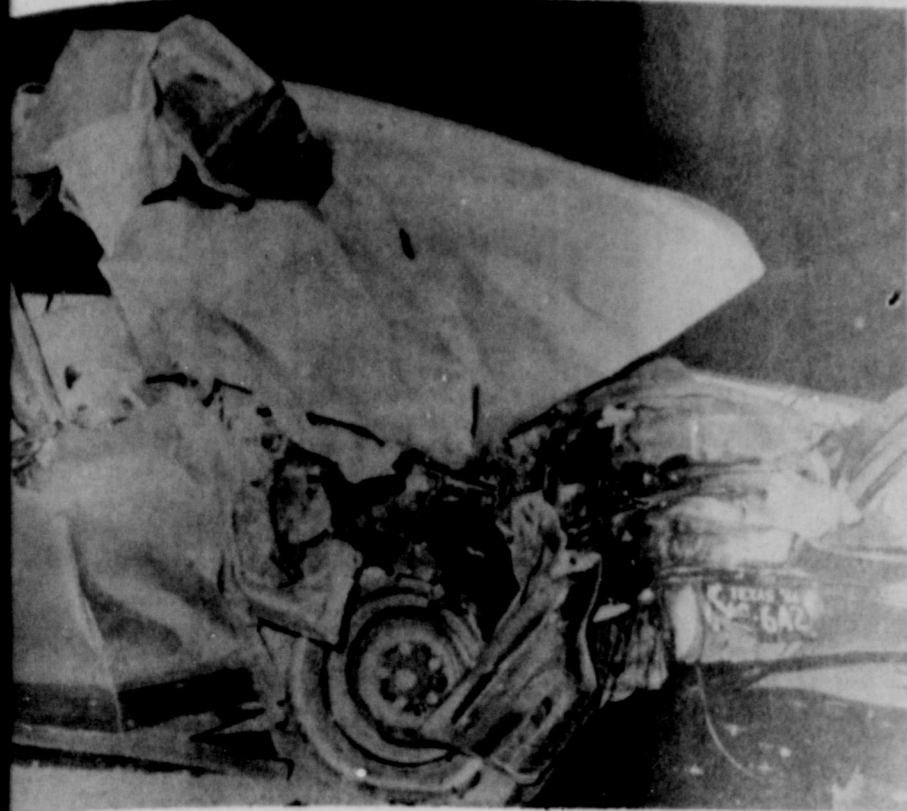

MY TURN

If you have ever watched children at play, you know that a youngster denied "my turn" will desert the game and go home. "My Turn" may be at bat in the ball game, on the pitcher's mound, on the new bicycle, or jumping rope.

Grownups are pretty much the same. If we believe we aren't getting a fair shake, we quit the game. The job of the organization is the bridge group or whatever.

In one respect, however, children are probably different. The child knows, for example, that getting his turn "in the spotlight" means taking his turn elsewhere. Grownups often believe it isn't necessary to play in the outfield in order to get a turn at the pitcher's mound. If the game doesn't suit, they just don't play.

land, if and when lines are needed further west or across the bypass, they can be tied into this system, the engineer explained.

Duff also reported that a request for a federal grant to aid in the project had been turned down, with the government explaining that the city's sewer system was not up to specifications. City Engineer Reeves said the treating plant was designed for about 5,200 people and was overloaded.

Duff reported that the city's ditch digger was in poor condition and gave estimates on what a new machine would cost. Commissioners decided the cost was too high, that ditches for large projects could be contracted and the present machine used for minor jobs.

A request for a street light on S. 6th and Powers was tabled until a study could be made.

Commissioners discussed, at Jack Smith's suggestion, long-range plans for a "service center" for city equipment and for maintenance work. Commissioners apparently were in favor of such a shop and will if it can be worked into next year's budget.

Duff requested and received approval to attend a state city manager's convention at McAllen in June.

race, and this has traditionally diminished interest in the second primary.

A final warning sign was the rumor immediately following the first primary on May 7 that some counties without locally contested races weren't even going to hold a second primary. The State Democratic Executive Committee responded with a resolution calling attention to the fact that every county is required by law to hold a runoff election, and the penalty for failure to do so can be a fine or imprisonment for party officials.

For want of the votes of Texans who don't care enough to go to the polls, June 4, a very small minority of the citizens could elect some of its most important office holders. And the big battle to get the majority of Texas voters to exercise their responsibility as citizens would be lost!

Mahon said he anticipated no serious difficulty in securing approval of the funds requested. When the project was

begun several years ago it was anticipated that the total cost would be \$90,000,000, but it is being built for the lesser figure. The project is expected to be in substantial operation by about June 1967.

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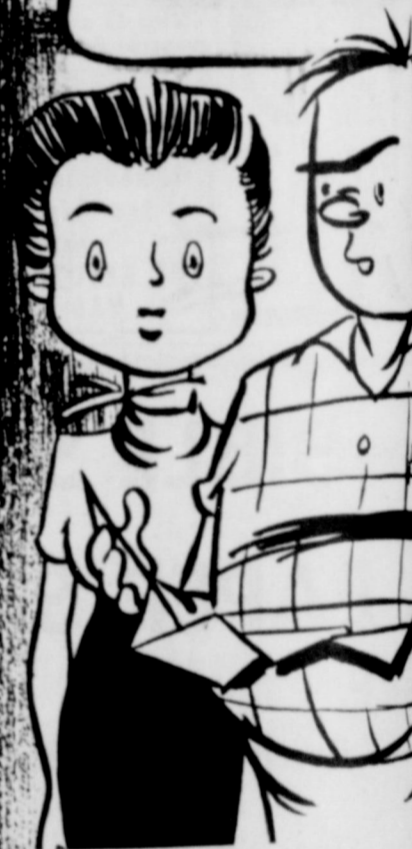

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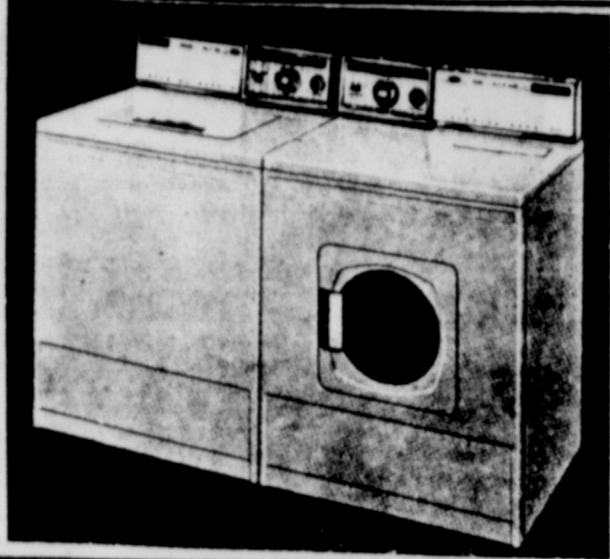
