ABSENTEE VOTE ENDS WITH AMAZING RECORD OF 542

Wet-Dry Vote Due Saturday

With a record absentee vote behind and last-minute charges still flying, voters in Slaton and Justice Precinct 2 face the day of decision Saturday on the fate of alcoholic beverage sales in the area.

Latest developments saw the absentee voting close with a record 542 ballots cast on the wet-dry question, with 405 of the votes coming from the special box in Slaton.

The total absentee votes was six times more than counted in the December, 1960 local

option election. County officials think the record absentee vote total will stand for a long time.

Another development saw County Judge Rodrick Shaw Tuesday appoint poll watchers for the hotly-contested election.

A near-maximum voter turnout is expected over the controversial issue. County officials report all six boxes in the justice precinct have a potential of 2,897, based on the number of poll tax receipts, and voter registration certificates issued. This does not take into account persons over 60 who do not have to register.

Voters approved the legal sale of liquor on a package-store basis by a small margin more than six years ago, and this is the first test since that time. Wet forces won by a 206-vote margin in the 1960 election--1,260 to 1,054.

As far as can be determined, Slaton itself will remain dry regardless of the outcome of the election. According to an attorney general's ruling in the last election, the city remained dry. Too, County Atty. Fred West was reported in Lubbock to have informed the county judge that he received word from the attorney general's office that the city would remain dry regardless.

The 1960 election marked the end of what has been one of the largest traditionally dry areas in the entire nation. If precinct residents vote legal liquor sales out, Lubbock once again will be put in the position of being the largest dry metropolitan area in the U.S.

Liquor passed across package store counters Dec. 20, 1960, marked the first legal sale of alcoholic beverages in Lubbock County in more than 50 years and wrote an end to the widespread bootlegging practices in evidence here.

Saturday's election was called Dec. 15 by Lubbock County commissioners, finally settling and issue over qualification of signers of a petition circulated in Justice Precinct by a group called The Drys of Justice Precinct 2.

Wet forces contended that at least 150 signers of the petition seeking the local option election lived outside the precinct. The petition finally certified by Mrs. Flow Swenson, county clerk, as containing the proper number of signatures, was the second submitted by dry forces.

A petition submitted in mid-November failed to contain a sufficient number of qualified

School Board Approves Audit, Study Project

Slaton School Trustees, in regular session Monday night, approved the 1965-66 audit report, approved a project to be conducted through the West Texas School Study Council, made final arrangements for purchasing five lots in the football field parking lot, and signed an easement to the City of Slaton.

After study and discussion, the board approved a plan in which the school will become the fiscal agent for a project conducted through the WT Study Council located on the Texas Tech campus.

This project will make comprehensive studies related to the various teaching fields -- such as social studies, language arts, mathematics, and science. Curriculum guides will be written over the next few years covering the various grades and areas of education.

The board also gave its approval for the purchase of a language laboratory to be used in the foreign language department at Slaton High School.

Trustees also approved an easement to the City of Slaton for a strip of land 20 feet wide by 74 feet long which will become part of an alleyway immediately south of high school and north of the Plaza Apartments.

This alley will provide an outlet for service by the city for people living in the adjacent area.

The manner in which the Fair Labor Standard Act will apply to the school district was discussed by the board. The act becomes effective Feb. 1, 1967. A preliminary survey shows that the school district meets the minimum wage standards at this time.

Polling Place Closed, Opened

The highly controversial wet-dry election erupted in Slaton last week when an absentee voting incident, coupled with reports from County Atty. Fred West that "undue pressure and threats" had been made, caused the absentee polling place in the city to be closed.

The box was closed Thursday evening, when West ordered deputies to come pick up the boxes. Following a plea from Slaton Mayor Jonas Cain, the box was re-opened Monday and remained open through the final absentee voting day Tuesday.

No trouble or problems were reported Monday or Tuesday, but two acts of vandalism were aimed at the polling place, located in the Kertan Studio building. Monday morning red paint was thrown on the plate glass window and door, then early Tuesday morning eggs were thrown at the building.

Acutally, most Slaton officials didn't think there was sufficient reason for closing the box in the first place.

Among these was Mayor Cain, who initiated the move to have it returned. He claimed the matter "was blown out of proportion and the decision to close the box was made at the courthouse without even checking with local officials."

Miss Beverly Kercheval, election judge at the Slaton box, confirmed that she didn't

New City Judge Named Here

Charles L. Tanner, former Santa Fe Railway foreman, was formally appointed as City Judge during a regular meeting of Slaton City Commission Monday night.

Tanner succeeds E. C. Hunt who resigned the post Jan. 1 because of "insufficient salary." Tanner was appointed to the city office last Friday by Mayor Jonas Cain, then received approval of the commission Monday.

In other business at the first meeting of the month, the commission executed a contract with Parkhill, Smith & Cooper

for engineering work on Slaton's municipal airport; reappointed three men to the city electrical board; approved lease renewal with Davis Olds for a lot at N. 9th and Crosby; and approved several speed zone limits recommended by Police

Chief Robert Breedlove. Tanner, who retired from Santa Fe Oct. 31, 1966, had been general foreman of bridge, building and water service on the Slaton division. Born in 1898 at Hartsell, Ala., Tanner (See TANNER Page 6)

Joel Ellis Herrera was born at 5:12 a.m. on Jan. 9, 1967 and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eulogio Herrera of Rt. 2, Wilson. Slaton merchants welcomed the city's first baby with a shower of gifts, ranging from baby food and diapers to a savings account.

Two other babies were born at Mercy Hospital earlier this year but were born to Tahoka and Post couples and did not qualify as Slaton's first baby. The Herrerias have lived here since 1946 and have been work-

ing on the Walter Maeker farm since December of 1965. They moved here from Tahoka.

This was their fourth child to be born in Mercy Hospital. Their other children are Jody, 2; Eulogio, Jr., 3; and June Eve, 4. Dr. S. H. Jaynes delivered the baby.

The second baby that would have qualified for the gifts was a son born to Mr. and Mrs. George Eakin, Jr. of Wilson. He was born at 2 a.m. on Jan. 10.

Green was the dean of county commissioners, having served eight years longer than any other such official. He won the

McMurry Chanters In Concert Jan. 21

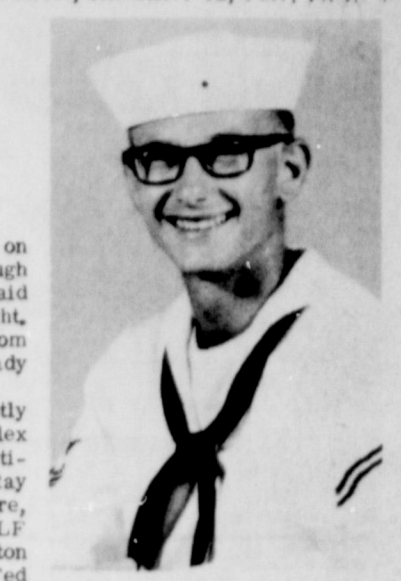

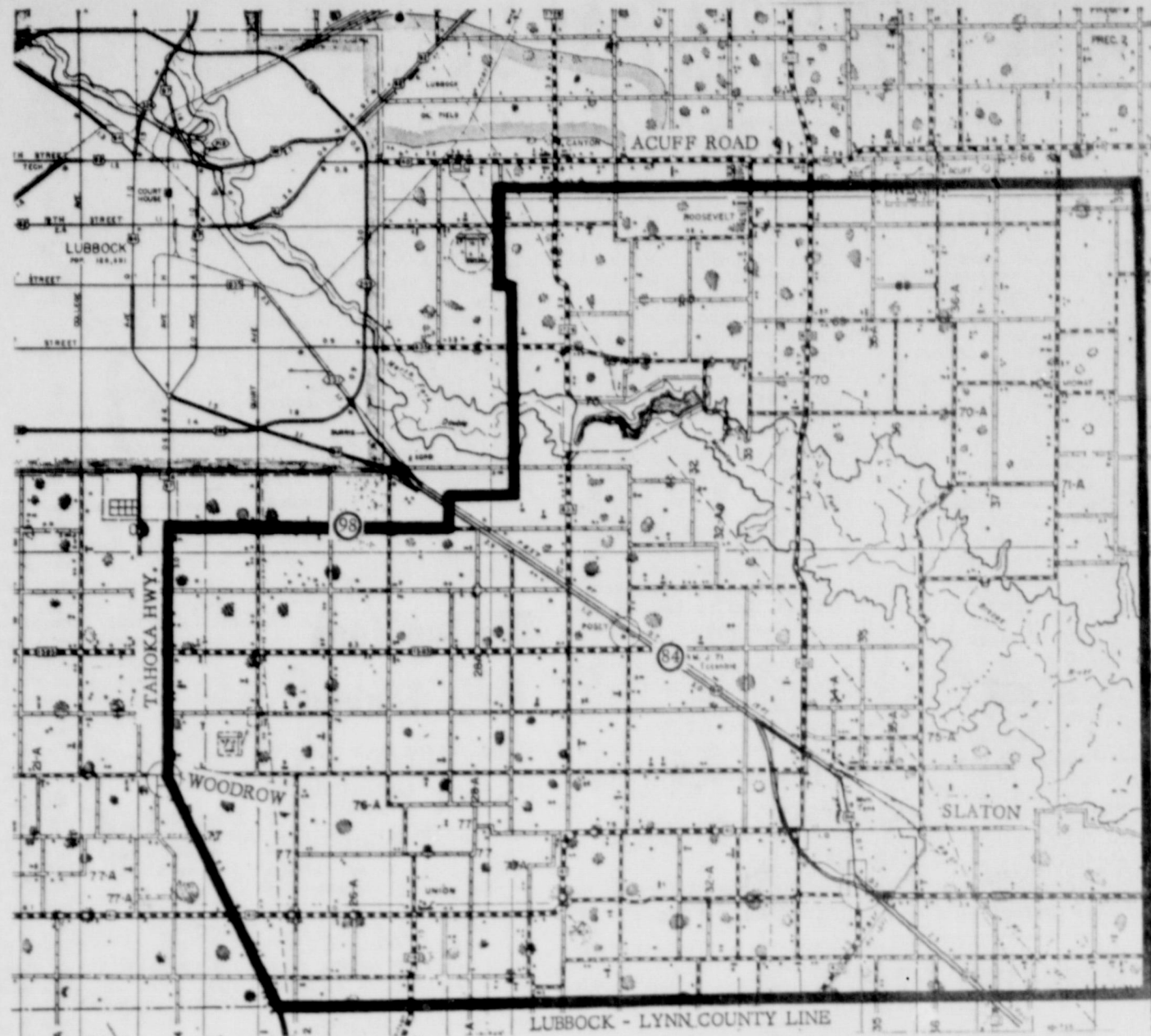

County Okays Sale of City Lots; Appoints Slaton Woman to Board

Lubbock County Commissioners Court Monday approved the sale of three lots in Slaton to the Slaton Housing Authority.

The court also side-stepped a request on re-opening the absentee ballot box here, and in other action appointed a Slaton woman to the new City-County Library Board.

Commissioners held the formal authorization to reopen the ballot box was unnecessary since the county clerk had already been authorized to operate any special absentee voting boxes needed in the local option liquor election.

Mrs. Bob Kern was named to the library board, along with Bill Wilkerson of Idalou and several Lubbock citizens.

Slaton Housing Authority is securing lots for a site to build housing for low income families.

Claude Cravens, Slaton attorney, appeared on behalf of the sale of lots. He explained the lots were acquired about five years ago by the Slaton Independent School District, Lubbock County, the State of Texas, and two water districts in the county as a result of a tax suit.

No one submitted a bid on the property when it was offered for public sale and, since the Slaton school district has held the lots on behalf of the taxing bodies.

The court authorized County Judge Rodrick Shaw to execute a quitclaim deed to the lots for an appraised value of \$750. From this amount, legal costs are to be deducted before past due taxes are paid and the remainder divided between the taxing bodies.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

There has been a swearing going on at the state capital. It seems like almost everyone has been sworn into one type or another of the 200 mark. The judges, then the executive officials, then the state senators and 150 members of the House.

No doubt about it, a lot of swearing is going on in the Texas capital. And more to come. A cab of swears is up in the drive-in halls, there's likely a lot of unofficial swearing, a bit stronger in some places. This is bound to happen now when so many people get to work, and especially when the legislature is in session. It's expected that some 2,500 oaths will be sworn during the lawmaking session.

IS ON THE ROAD -- A session of the Legislature is underway. How long it will last is anybody's guess.

Officials in a position among the state's best are predicting it will be a long session. The income tax is being discussed for a regular session. It's expected to be a long one, with a mountain of bills to be resolved. The speaker of the house, Dan Barnes, as the session begins to assemble, he emphasized "I want to finish on time."

John Connally has voiced his view. Lt. Gov. Preston is even more strongly in favor of special sessions of the legislature.

COLLEGE GRANTS -- Twenty-eight Texas colleges and universities have been recommended for \$812,094 in teaching grants from the federal government, says the Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Public senior colleges scheduled to receive \$375,499 are Angelo College, Stephen F. Austin State, Sul Ross State, East Texas University, Sam Houston State, Southwest Texas State, Midwestern University, Texas College of Arts and Industries, North Texas State University, Texas Western College and University of Houston.

Nine public junior colleges to receive \$177,280 are San Antonio College, Cisco, Wharton County, Lee, Laredo, Del Mar, Cooke County, Southwest Texas and Panola County.

Private schools receiving \$259,315 will be South Texas College, University of St. Thomas, Abilene Christian College, Jarvis Christian College, Texas Christian University, Bishop College, University of Dallas, and St. Edward's University.

Schools must match federal money on at least a dollar-for-dollar basis.

Federal approval is expected within the next few months.

AIRPORTS INCREASE -- Municipal airports in Texas increased from 219 to 226 the past year, says the State Aeronautics Commission.

Texas still leads the nation in the number of air strips even though the total decreased from 895 to 870.

INSURANCE RATES CHANGED -- A 7.3 per cent across-the-board increase in title insurance rates, the first jump since 1962, has been approved by the State Board of Insurance.

Increase, which became effective on January 1, is based on a formula that board actuaries worked out in 1962.

At the same time the Board approved a general statewide reduction of four per cent in crop-hall insurance rates.

Reduction was approved when the Board okayed a filing by the Crop-Hall Actuarial Association of Chicago proposing rules, rates and forms for the 1967 growing season.

SLANT - WELL SUITS SETTLED -- Slant-hole oil well lawsuits involving millions in possible penalties were settled by the state against 30 defendants in the Longview-Tyler-Kilgore area for \$391,925.

Settlements were requested by defendants after Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin hinted he may not go along with the earlier formulas used for disposing of such cases.

Twenty-six other slant-well cases still are pending.

WATER, WATER EVERYWHERE -- A dramatic plan for solving West Texas water problems by transporting huge amounts across the state from the Mississippi River and other sources is undergoing cost studies by the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation here.

Included in the survey will be water transportation from the Amistad Reservoir near Del Rio to El Paso and the Trans-Pecos area.

Bureau expects to have its cost estimates assembled by May 15.

Its findings will be incorporated into the Texas Water Plan, which is now being finalized by the Texas Water Development Board.

CORPS TO LET CONTRACTS -- Southwestern Division, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers will let contracts in 1967 representing well over \$60,000,000 worth of construction on Texas projects.

Texas lettings are included in \$240,000,000 scheduled for a five-state area. This is a 50 per cent increase over 1966 contract values.

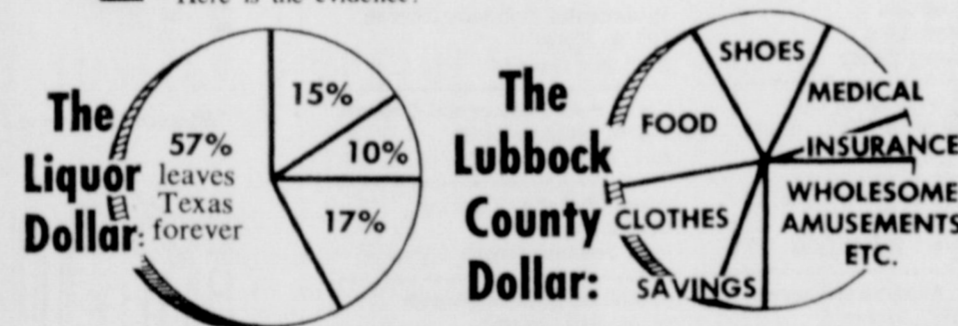
SHORT SNORTS -- Jesse James, State Treasurer who took the oath of office on January 3, has served the state longer than any other Treasurer, having first been appointed to the office in 1941 to replace Charley Lockhart, who resigned. Judge K. K. Woodley has been appointed Presiding Judge of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals by Governor Connally. Revenue from cigarette, liquor and wine stamps dropped nearly \$1,000,000 in December from the same month in 1965. Republican State Executive Committee will meet here Friday and Saturday to adopt its budget for 1967 and discuss possible 1968 campaign opportunities. State Water Development Board has lodged an objection to the cost allocation for part of a federal dam on the Red River below Shreveport. Merchants Park Bank of Houston is seeking a charter from the State Banking Department.

signatures.

The election, which involves six election boxes in Precinct 2, requires voters to vote: "For the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption only," or "Against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption only."

Polling places include box 34 at the Woodrow Glen, Woodrow; Box 35 at the Posey School Clubhouse, Posey; Box 36, Slaton Clubhouse at 700 W. Garza St., Slaton; Box 37, West Ward School, 600 W. Lubbock St., Slaton; Box 38, East Ward School, 700 S. 7th St., Slaton, and Box 39, Roosevelt Clubhouse, Roosevelt.

Saturday's election will be the 16th local option election in the history of the City of Lubbock and Lubbock County.

The first local option vote ever taken here was May 28, 1910, when dry forces won 391-88.

Other votes were taken in 1911 and 1919, and there were three local option elections in 1933 when nationwide prohibition ended. Votes then followed in 1934, 1935, 1946 and 1950, and again in 1959 there were three elections.

There were two 1960 votes, one for the City of Slaton on Nov. 5 and then the Dec. 10 election.

Slaton residents, voting 1,086 against and 924 for, turned down the bid for off-premises liquor sales.

Then in an attorney general's ruling following the Dec. 10 vote, it was found that the city of Slaton would remain legally dry and that all liquor stores in Justice Precinct 2 must be located in rural areas.

Slaton, although located within the wet precinct, must remain legally dry in accordance with the November election inside the city only, the attorney general said.

Answering three questions posed by then-county attorney Alton Griffin, now district attorney, the attorney general's office said that residents of a town - in this case, Slaton - are entitled to vote in a precinct local option liquor election, despite having participated in an earlier town vote.

Even should all the boxes in the town vote wet in the precinct election, however, the results of an earlier dry vote in the town would be binding, the ruling continued.

Thus, the City of Slaton in this case remains dry, the attorney general ruled.
