## Local Marine Receives Bronze Star

Lance Corporal Gary Bailey, who is spending the remainder of a 25-day leave here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W.M. Bailey of 1040 W. Dickens, was recently awarded the Bronze Star for heroic achievement while serving in Vietnam. He has also received six air medals.

Corporal Bailey has been in the Marines for 3 1/2 years and spent 12 1/2 months in Vietnam stationed at Marble Mountain Air Facility. His official capacity was that of crew chief for a helicopter squadron. He will report back to El Toro, Calif. next Monday to serve the remaining six months of his enlistment in the States.

Corporal Bailey attended Slaton High School, and graduated in 1963 in Rawlins, Wyo. He has a brother, Glen, who was discharged from service some 18 months ago, and an older brother. When asked about the situa-

tion in Vietnam, Bailey remarked, "I think they should throw away the rule book and get it over with." He added that although he would not volunteer to return to Vietnam, he would go willingly if he were sent.

He was previously awarded the Navy Commendation Medal with Combat "B" for service in Vietnam July 15, 1966. However, after his recommendation was reviewed by the Navy Department Board of Decorations and Medals, the Navy Medal

was recalled and cancelled, and in lieu thereof "he be awarded the Bronze Star Medal with Combat 'V'...a much higher award, with the recommendation being approved by the Secretary of the Navy.

The citation accompanying the medal, reads in part: "The President of the United States takes pleasure in presenting the Bronze Star Medal to Lance Corporal Gary L. Bailey, for heroic achievement while serving as Crew Chief with Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 164 during Operation Hastings in Vietnam July 15, 1966. Corporal Bailey went to the aid of his comrades injured in a forced landing, pulled them free of the wreckage and carried them to safety."

"When his aircraft landed to assist the downed crew, he ran through heavy enemy fire

### Showers 'Tease' Slaton, Vicinity

The Slaton area received only "teasing" amounts of rainfall the past few days while violent thunderstorms rumbled around the South Plains.

Heavy amounts of rain were reported at Tahoka Tuesday night -- where 1 inch was reported in a 15-minute deluge, and north to Abilene, Hereford and Quitaque. Slaton and Lubbock measured only token amounts.

Lubbock recorded .87 of an inch Monday night, while Slaton had only light showers and traces. The Monday night rain was the only moisture recorded in the state. The Slaton residents awoke Tuesday morning to overcast skies and a dense fog, but little moisture.

The only appreciable amount of rain in Slaton the past week occurred Sunday morning, when a shower of short duration left less than .1 of an inch. No moisture was predicted Wednesday.

"If there are any differences between Mayor Cain and myself, they are of a personal nature and will be settled privately between us. "I am sure that I have caused some people some unnecessary trouble in this matter, and for this I am sorry."

Martindale also added his congratulations to Hugo Mosser, who took his place on the city commission, and thanked the commission for hearing his statement.

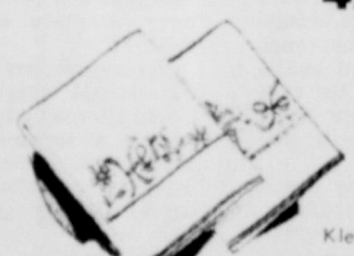

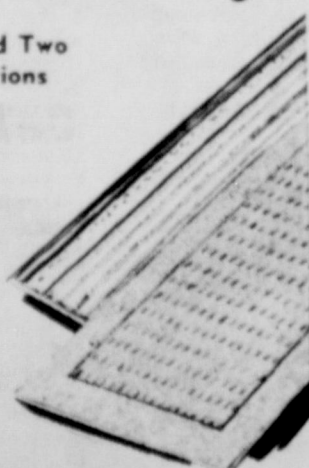

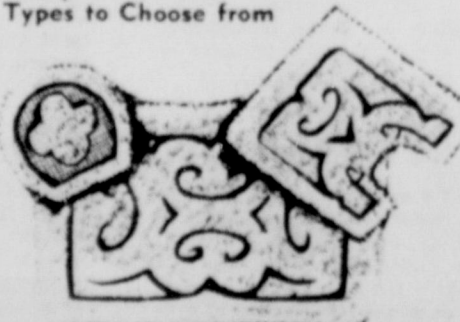

Since the first months of 1967, over 1200 persons have received the measles vaccine from public health nurses at Lubbock City - County Health Department. Hundreds more were administered the vaccine in private doctors' offices.

A measles fact folder, prepared by the Lubbock City - County Health Department for information of all citizens, is now available to the public. The folder contains pertinent facts about measles and measles immunization.

Immunization emphasis is now being extended to the polio vaccine (trivalent) which normally is started at the age of two months, with subsequent boosters.

While the trivalent has reduced considerably the number of polio cases, this illness is still a constant threat to anyone not protected by the vaccine. Any Lubbock County child or adult in need of polio immunization or boosters, is urged to see his family physician.

Families who do not have a doctor, or cannot see a doctor, should contact the Lubbock City - County Health Department for more information or actual administration of the trivalent. Call Lubbock City - County Health Department at PO2-6411, extension 344.

Clinics included for administration of measles vaccine and polio trivalent include: Triumph Baptist Church of Slaton, first Thursdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., and weekly in Lubbock at Arnett - Benson Baptist Church and Messiah Presbyterian Church.

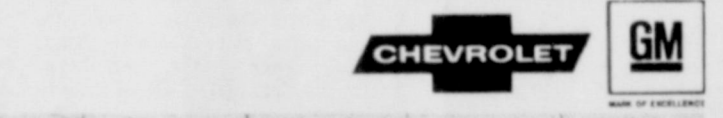

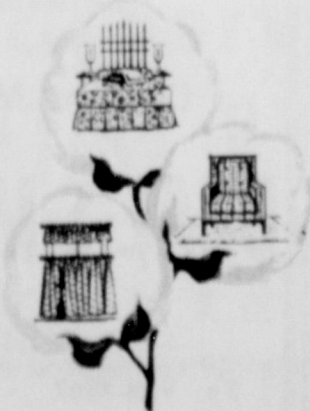
