DITORIALLY SPEAKING

Observations and Potpourri

Are the American people passing through a stage where they are so "sophisticated" that they cannot be challenged through direct approach, but rather must be reached through subtleties and allusions?

We think a lot of organizations and individuals are doing a good job in extolling "patriotism". "honor" "rugged individualism" and "integrity". But with all this, an adamant attitude is detectable.

Could it be that we must take a lesson from the successful salesmen who "sell the sizzle, not the steak"?

In glancing over a popular magazine this week-end, we noted the advertisments prepared by the wizards on Madison Avenue. . . and few of them bluntly sold the product on its own appeal alone. In scanning the art appeal, we found that cool springs of water were utilized to sell beer, pretty maidens to sell everything from hosiety to Hawaiian vacations to hardware, cowboys to sell cars, football heroes for everything from correspondence schools to cigarettes, and even a huge canine utilized to sell a soft drink.

In a few instances were the actual products given top picture billing; in some ads the products illustration was even omitted.

Now, big advertisers figure all the angles. They recognize the habits of the reading and buying public. And they are not using a direct approach.

So, must we do the same in selling Americanism, deocracy, and self respect? We don't like the idea, but possibly our attitudes must change from an "old-fashioned" direct approach to the detour that finally comes back to the correct ending. In such case, we'll preach the benefits and rewards of integrity - instead of integrity for its own sake.

And we'll explain how Disneyland, the soap-box derby, and the South Plains Fair add to enjoyment of American life — these pleasures impossible in totali-

Shall we sell the frills and sizzle, not the product?

The Russian diplomats and high officers of state, at every opportunity proclaim the superiority of communism over our capitalistic free enterprise system. By comparison, our own public officials are woefully silent in broadcasting the merits of our private enterprise economy.

Commenting on this shortcoming David Lawrence says: "What is needed is a courageous avowal of the merits of the American system and a constant reiteration of the fact that with all its faults, it still has produced a higher standard of living and greater personal freedom for more human beings than has any other system for any other people in the history of the

Instead of exaggerating our faults, let's lay a much heavier emphasis on our virtues.

Farm and Ranch magazine says: "There are an estimated 36 per cent fewer farms, 20 per cent fewer people on them, now compared to 1954. But it isn't the successful farmer who has headed for town. Those who have stayed on the farm are buying more than ever before. The per-capita income, as well as farm expenditures, is at an all-time high. Value of land and buildings is up 81.6 per cent."

Every day we read of the importance of commerce and industry in our lives. Our system of free enterprise produces more than enough to take care of our needs in all respects, and to help supply deficiencies in other countries. By way of contrast, the "planning" in the communist sphere is not good enough to even furnish its people with sufficient food.

The blessings of a government of, by, and for the people are many. Not the least is freedom of worship, guaranteed in our Constitution.

The 22nd annual observance of National Bible Week takes place Oct. 15-21, sponsored by the Laymen's National Committee, Inc., an all-faiths organization. This year's theme for the Week is as timely as it is significant: "The Bible Builds Bridges - Not Walls." The eternal goal of the people of this nation must be to keep building the bridges, and to see that the walls that destroy freedoms -- religious economic, political - can never be erected.

"Explaining" the current escapade ending in gunpoint arrest, the girl told of a rendezvous with Keup only a day or two ago at a popular "toughie" restaurant in Alberquerque, leaving with him on the spur of the moment to "get away from everything" but planning to return within a week, so she asserted, as her mother had threatened her with a beating or worse if she ever ran away again.

A story of crime and a wild cross-country trek unfolded as she talked freely of a trip on Monday to a town she believed was called Clovis. There she and her companion, together with three other young men, rented two motel rooms, and she alleged a full night of argument, threats of murder and attempted rape. She referred to the three companions as "Carl, Paul and John", and stated that they related tales of multi-state law infractions since their escape from a Florida jail. She stated the trio carried an arsenal including a Thompson sub-machine gun, other arms and "2,000" rounds of ammunition.

Expressing reaction to the wild flight from Lubbock through Slaton in a flashy stolen red Corvette, she stated her driver companion appeared very calm and sure of himself, though " was sure scared when we speeded through that bunch of school children; - I have two little brothers, and I sure wouldn't want anyone plowing into them with a car. Kenneth said he could outrun the cops but he stopped when the shooting began because he said he was afraid I might get killed. He seemed unafraid

And then the interview ended. Her future? Who knows? From Slaton the destination was Lubbock, under guard, then to juvenile authorities. But what of the years ahead. . . . what road will she be travelling tomorrow.

Another vignette of crime, teenage confusion and home life with much left to be desired had been presented to a number of Slaton viewers who cannot help but wonder of her future and the future of the hundreds of other teenage girls in similar cir-
