# Slaton Step Closer to CRMWA Supply

step closer to Slaton last week with the dedication of a water treatment plant in Lubbock.

More than 400 persons, including many dignitaries and representatives from all 11 member cities, attended the June 13 ceremony at the plant site on the southeast corner of Lubbock Municipal Airport,

Attending from Slaton were Howard Hoffman, longtime director in the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, and Mayor Jonas Cain, City Admin, Buford Duff, City Sec. Gerald Kendrick, and city commissioners Hugo Mosser and Henry

Bollinger. The dedication marked another in a long line of milestones racked up by the \$84 million project to provide wa ter to Amarillo, Borger, Pampa, Plainview, Lubbock, Slaton, Levelland, Brownfield, Tahoka,

O'Donnell and Lamesa. The project was almost three decades in the planning stage, but took less than four years to complete, Finished a year ahead of schedule, the multipurpose project includes Sanford Dam and Lake Meredith north of Amarillo, the 322mile long aqueduct system, two regulating reservoirs, plus

Member cities south and southwest of Lubbock contracted with the Hub City to treat their water, rather than build separate treatment plants. Fixed charges are based on water

Construction of the CRMWA commenced with project ground breaking ceremonies at Sanford damsite on June 30 1962. The aqueduct was started early in1963. The portion between Lubbock and Amarillo and southwest leg already has been filled with potable water, but the southern extreme is now being cholrinated. The cleaning and refilling is expected to take two months, but firm delivery

of water to all 11 cities is not scheduled to begin until Jan. 1, The authority will operate the project except for recreation facilities, which will be administered by the National Park Service. The City of Lubbock will operate and maintain the treatment plant.

The CRMWA was the Bureau of Reclamation's first major project designed primarily to furnish water for municipal and industrial use. The repayment contract, between the authority and the federal government, provides for repayment of the supply obligation, with interest, over a 50-year period.


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

"The Indian left a heritage little recognized and all but forgotten," Holden said, "He developed the upland variety of cotton which is the basis of the economy of this community, in addition to developing many of our food cereals and vegetables raised here," he continued.

"The Spaniard explored and mapped the Southern High Plains, named our streams and watering places, and left hisimprint on our language, architecture and food habits. Tahoka lake, a few miles south of this spot is a Spanish adaptation of an Indian designation for a land mark known and used for cen-

"Into our more recent Anglo American heritage there has been introduced a rich German-American influence, All of these antecedents Indian, Spanish, Anglo and German, have met and blended here in this community," Holden said.

Holden said the plaques "will be a constant reminder to all who live now and to those to come in the future, that this community has a heritage worthy of preservation, School children will realize that history is not confined to Jamestown, Gettysburg, or the Alamo. They will be constantly reminded that important events have taken place within the environs of Wilson, Texas."
