City Changes Bid On Airport Project

A contract on the airport paving project was voided and the next bidder awarded the job in a special meeting of Slaton City Commission last week. The low bidder, C.W. Zahn & Son, was unable to bond the bid submitted and requested to be released from the bid. The company also offered to purchase the bid bond.

The commission relieved the bidder without payment of bid bond, since the city was able to award the contract to the next lowest bidder without additional expense. Pioneer Pavers, Inc., of Lubbock was awarded the airport improvements contract for the sum of \$85,485.50 subject to the concurrence of the Federal Aviation Agency.

Both bids, Pioneer deducted about \$2,000 from the street program, leaving a contract total of \$88,712.02 for the street paving. Both bids totaled \$174,197.52. Contract on the airport calls for runway, taxi-way and apron improvements. The street program includes about 24 blocks around the low-income housing project.

OPEN MEETING SET HERE ON IMPORTATION OF WATER

When a person talks about the future of West Texas, water tops the list of needs for the growth of all cities and communities in the area.

And, with the need for water comes the idea for importing water into West Texas. This will be the subject for an important public meeting at 8 o'clock tonight in the junior high cafeteria. Tom McFarland, executive director, High Plains Underground Water District, will present the program under sponsorship of Slaton Chamber of Commerce's agriculture and research committee, Ed Moseley is chairman of the group. Moseley emphasized that the meeting is open to all interested persons. McFarland is expected to discuss the hows and why of importing water and the method of paying for it, and is scheduled to show slides on how a similar project was accomplished in another area of the United States.

Beauty Campaign Hits Final Week

There's just one more week left in "Beautification Month". Have you joined the campaign to help make Slaton a more attractive place in which to live?

The Chamber of Commerce spearheaded the month-long campaign, and the City of Slaton has given full cooperation to the program. Mayor Jonas Cain proclaimed a "Beautification Month" at the start of June. City crews have been at work around the square, and their work is apparent. Flower beds have been planted around the Municipal Building lawn; the parking area has been improved and curbing has been repaired around the square. Slaton Schools have also joined the act, beautifying campus grounds, planting trees and putting the water to the grass. M.C. Davis, chairman of the C. of C. committee, has urged residents to join in the program by cleaning up and fixing up. The committee has ordered plastic auto litter bags to be distributed around town. The city invites citizens who have large items of junk to call them. Property owners are urged to clean off lots and to eliminate mosquito-breeding areas. Davis expressed appreciation to citizens who have joined in the spirit of the drive by making their yards more attractive this month.

Uranium Lease Set in Garza

POST (Special)--Uranium mining is scheduled to return to Garza County this week after a 10-year absence. A total of 4,400 acres--located nine miles north of Post on the Ralls highway--has been leased to an independent mining operator. It was this same lease from which Garza County became the first government-approved uranium mining point in Texas in the fall of 1957.

Reports indicate that one of the major companies in the uranium field which was seeking a 25,000-acre uranium lease block in northeast Lynn County has secured leases on approximately half of its sought acreage. Lease scouts have apparently suspended leasing for the summer. It is reported the firm will begin testing for operations if 80 percent of the lease block is obtained. The proposed block extends from west of Southland 10 miles south to beyond Gordon.

Slaton Rotarians were host to a District 573 Assembly last Thursday holding business sessions at the First Methodist Church and feeding about 125 club members at a Community Clubhouse luncheon.

Historical Marker Placed at Wilson

Wilson's past history was in the spotlight Saturday afternoon as Wilson Mercantile was officially designated as one of the state's points of interest. About 150 persons witnessed the unveiling of the marker at Wilson Mercantile, and the Texas State Historical Survey Committee also designated two other markers for Green Park, west of Wilson.

After the dedication ceremony, many more persons visited Wilson Mercantile to hear old time tunes from a western trio and help themselves to refreshments of sausage on buns, caramel corn, donuts, coffee and cold drinks.

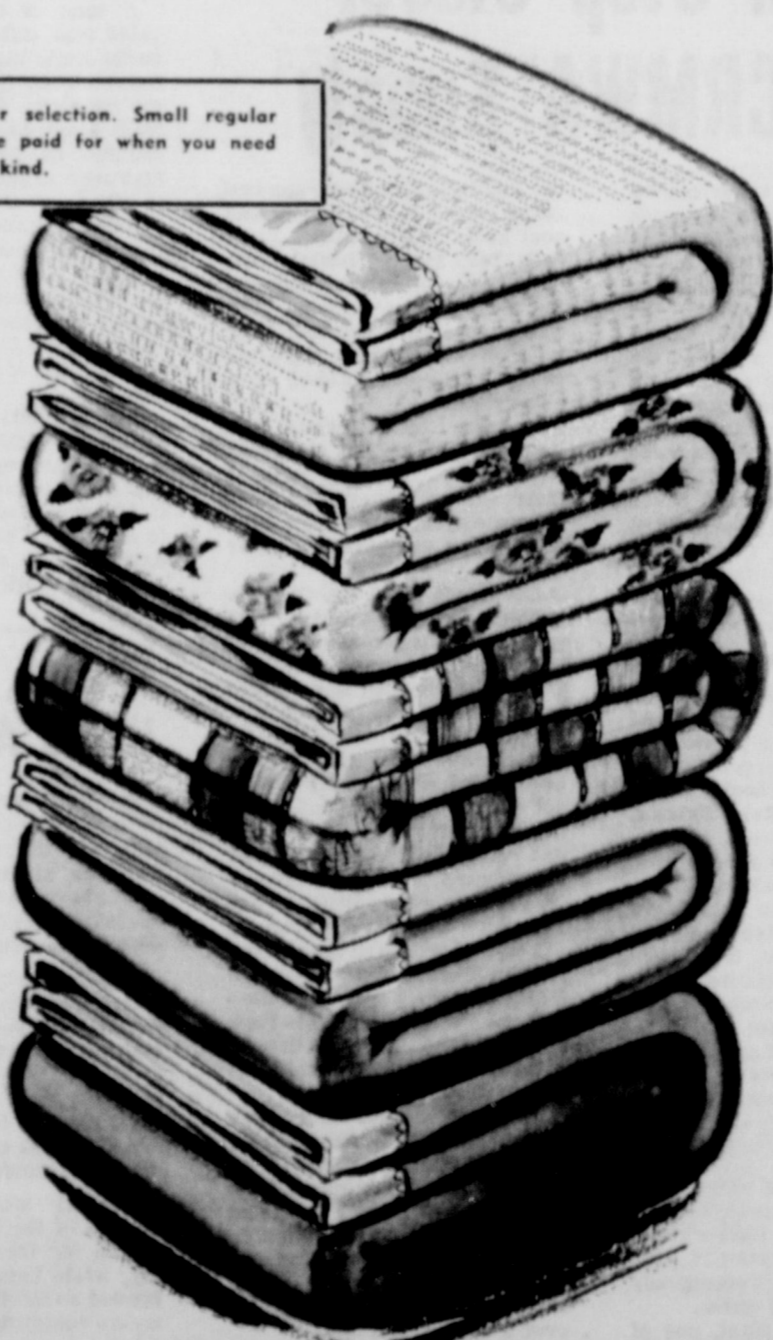

Tuesday morning, a group of Slaton Home Demonstration Club members gathered at the rest home to help Aubrey W. Dewees celebrate his 66th birthday.

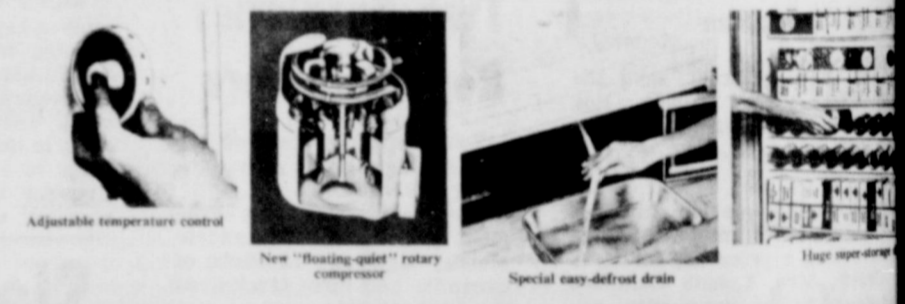
"Uncle Bill" as he is known there, lived with his daughter, Mrs. Rush Wheeler for several years before moving to the rest

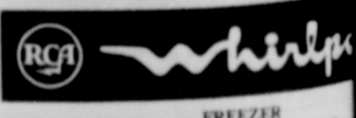

How does it feel to win \$150? Up until a few days ago I had no idea, but I guess you can call me "Lucky", cause I received a check in the mail for that amount this week. It was sent to me by the Ford Motor Co. in Dearborn, Michigan as a "Cash Award Check".

The way it all happened...after subscribing to Post Magazine for almost 15 years and Look for many years also, for the first time I tore a coupon out of the magazines and took them to Smith-Ford to see if my coupon might be the lucky one.

Well, Pete Williams seemed almost surprised as I was when he put it in that computer AND IT COMPUTED.

I'm not really pushing magazines advertising, but I would advise you if you still have your issues of Post, Look and Life that these coupons were in it might mean some money to you.

In a release from the National Institute of Drycleaning and article urges citizens to give to charity more clothes and better quality clothes than ever before. A new incentive for this giving is that the gifts are tax deductible. Deductions can be based on NID's Fair Claims Guide formula for determining "fair market value" of used clothing.

The guide sets up a "residual value" for clothing which has served its normal period of usefulness to its owner but still has some "wear in it". This "residual value" amounts to 15 percent of what it would cost today to buy a new garment like it. It is this 15 percent "residual value" which the "Clothing for Charity" steering committee suggests as a reasonable tax deduction when such a garment is given to charity.

Historical Marker Dedicated

Wilson has been put on the new Texas maps that will be distributed throughout the U.S., marking the site of three Texas historical markers.

Wilson, made the welcoming address. William Parsley, Vice-president for development, Texas Tech, was master of ceremonies. The Honorable Joseph Ratcliff, commented for the State of Texas. Distinguished guests were recognized.

land from native grass to productive fields.

"The Indian left a heritage little recognized and all but forgotten," Holden said. "He developed the upland variety of cotton which is the basis of the economy of this community, in addition to developing many of our food cereals and vegetables raised here," he continued. "The Spaniard explored and mapped the southern High Plains, named our streams and watering places, and left his imprint on our language, architecture and food habits. Tahoka lake, a few miles south of this spot is a Spanish adaptation of an Indian designation for a land mark known and used for centuries."

"Into our more recent Anglo-American heritage there has been introduced a rich German-American influence. All of these antecedents - Indian, Spanish, Anglo and German, have met and blended here in this community," Holden said.

Holden said the plaques "will be a constant reminder to all who live now and to those to come in the future, that this community has a heritage worthy of preservation. School children will realize that history is not confined to Jamestown, Gettysburg, or the Alamo. They will be constantly reminded that important events have taken place within the environs of Wilson, Texas."

Holden commented Mrs. Green for initiating and developing the concept for the marker, and also recognized Mrs. Lumsden "who has witnessed the transition of this land from cattle range to fertile fields."

Two other markers also were dedicated in Wilson at the event. One of the markers commemorates a site of Mackenzie Calvary Camp, and the other denotes a Spanish explorers' route.

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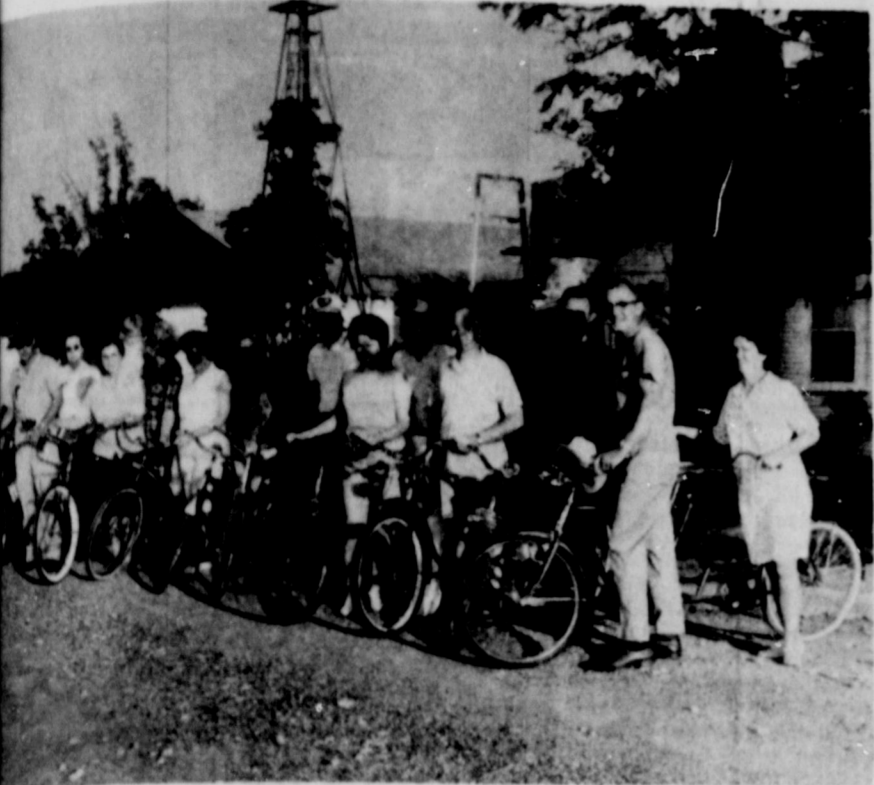

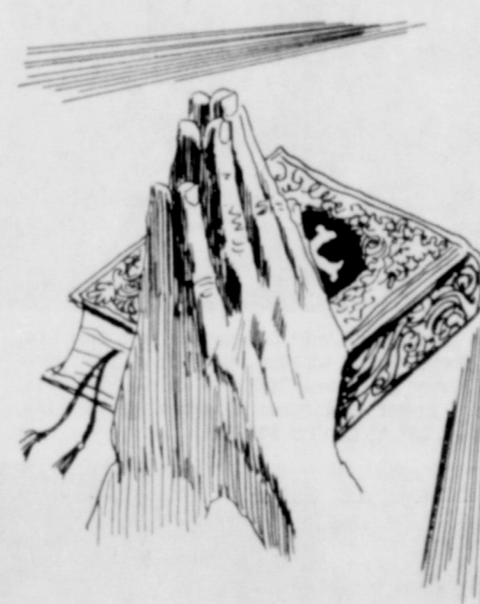
