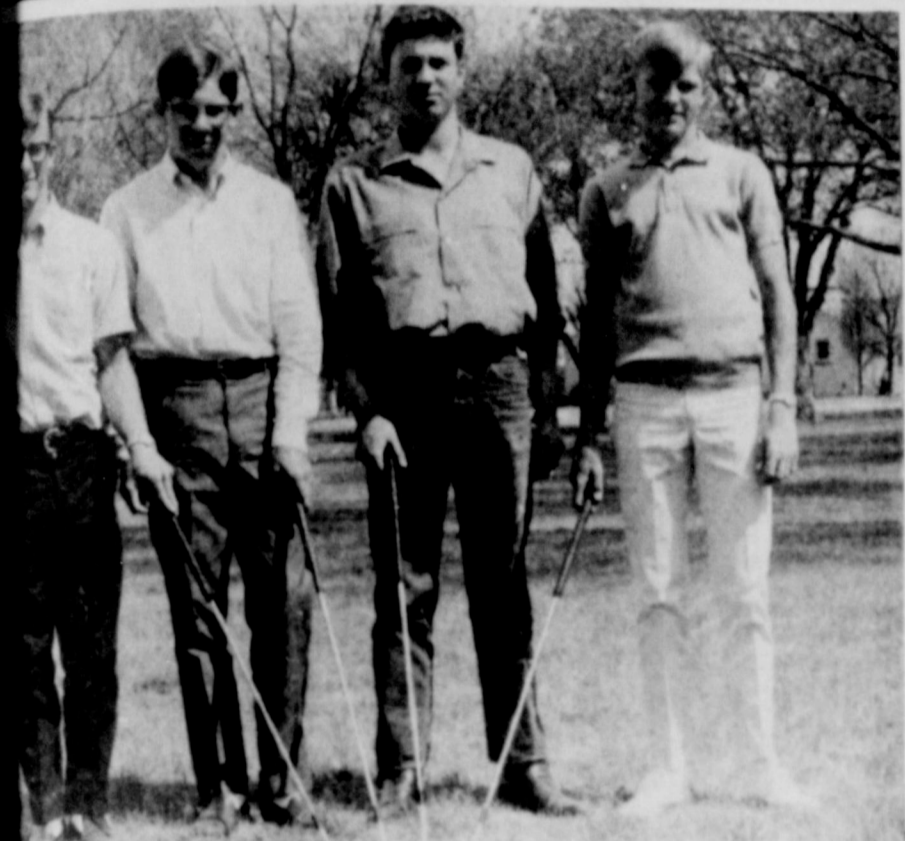

COLD FRONT HITS AREA

The temperature dropped to 30 degrees in Slaton early Wednesday morning after a cold front brought springtime blizzards in the Rocky Mountains and threat of snowfall in the Texas Panhandle. For a high reading of 81 here Tuesday, the mercury skidded below the freezing mark early Wednesday, causing local residents to dig out light coats which were already put away for the year. Low temperature Tuesday was 60. The gusty front whipped up dust from Amarillo to El Paso, Slaton had been teased by potential rain clouds Sunday and Monday with a few drops of moisture falling Monday.

Absentee Vote Now Underway

Absentee balloting in the May 7 Democratic and Republican party first primaries opened Monday and will continue through May 3. The absentee voting is being conducted in Slaton at Kertan Studio, 112 S. 9th St. Ballots may also be cast at the county clerk's office in Lubbock. All eligible voters who hold poll tax receipts, exemption certificates or receipts showing registration without payment of a poll tax and who will be out of the county election day, or who are unable to go to the regular polls for reasons of health, may vote by absentee ballot. No votes had been cast in Slaton through noon Wednesday.

PROJECTS BRING IN \$2,000 Youth Center Campaign Underway In Slaton

With a formal fund-raising drive still to be launched, the independent campaign to build a youth center in Slaton has already netted some \$2,000, it was announced this week by Mrs. Bob Ayres, chairman. The Slaton Youth Center Assn., which received its charter last week, will hold a meet- ing of the finance committee tomorrow night at 7 in the Slaton S.A.L. board room. Definite plans for a fund drive are expected to come out of this meeting. Mrs. Ayres appeared at the regular weekly meeting of Slaton Lions Tuesday to report progress to date, and to thank the Lions for a donation of \$125 from a benefit basketball game. She said teenagers have raised about \$1,200 of the total amount so far, working on projects to help raise funds for the center. One project -- selling subscriptions to The Slatonite -- netted about \$86 for the teenagers. A group of youngsters met Tuesday night and discussed tentative rules for the center, and by-laws are in the process of being drawn up. Mrs. Ayres said the association is planning a Citizens' Governing Board for the center. The adult board would work with a Teenage Board in controlling activities and rules for the center. She said tentative plans call for membership to include area high school youth. Other contributions to date include: Daughters of the Pioneer Study Club, \$300; VFW Ladies Auxiliary, \$100; Home Demonstration Club, \$40.18. Although definite plans and specifications for the youth center have not been approved, early estimates on the project were tabbed around \$30,000 for the building and furnishings. It is proposed for construction on the west side of the city - county park.

Police Report 16 Arrests for Week

City police reported 16 arrests, investigated two vehicle accidents, and checked a number of complaints during the past week. Fourteen of the arrests involved alcoholic beverage violations -- eight for drunkenness, three for possession by minors, two for making alcoholic beverage available to minors, and one for being drunk in car. One was arrested for using abusive language and another for vagrancy. Police point out that, under a new law passed in January, persons who make alcoholic beverages available to minors can be fined in corporation court and fined from \$1 to \$200. Complaints included a forged check passed at a local grocery, two minor thefts, two vandalism cases, and one person being bit by a dog. The Dairy Bar reported someone threw a rock through a window there Monday, breaking the window and hitting an ice cream machine. Damage was estimated at \$105. Ethel Lewis, 900 S. 1st, reported a dog got in a chicken pen and killed five of her hens. Officials at Santa Fe Railway reported a battery stolen from a company truck Monday. In an accident Monday about 5:10 p.m., cars driven by Lloyd McCullough, 740 S. 21st, and Mary L. Wilson, 1155 W. Garza, collided at Scurry and 9th streets. No injuries were reported. Damage was estimated at \$250. A more serious accident occurred about 5:30 p.m. April 13 when cars driven by C. L. Smith, 520 W. Lynn, and Rita M. Munger of Sudan collided at Panhandle at Lynn. The Sudan woman was taken to Mercy Hospital for treatment. Damage was estimated at \$690 to \$700 for each vehicle.

Dr. Lee Vardy, superintendent, and T. C. Martin, principal, both expressed appreciation to the past slate of officers for a job well done.

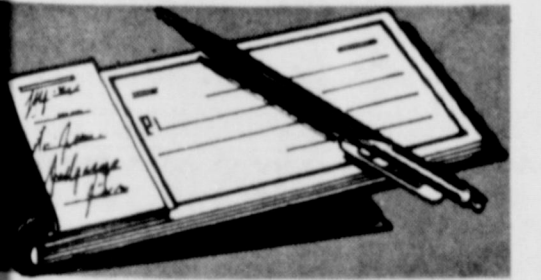

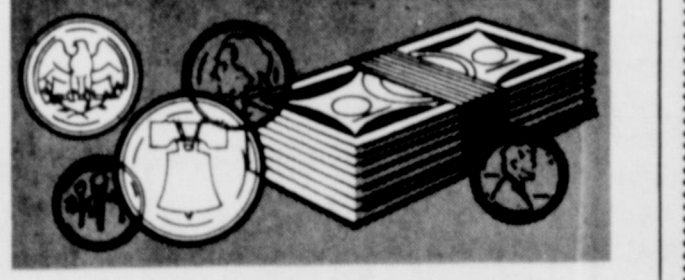

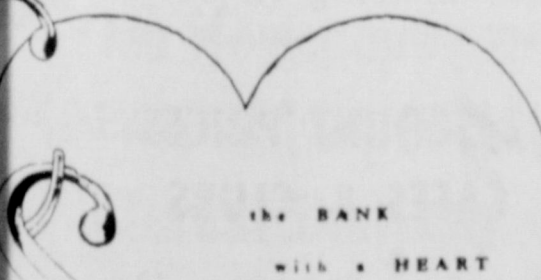

Cain Appeals For Support of Savings Bond

Mayor Jonas Cain today appealed to residents of Slaton to buy more U.S. Savings Bonds as a means of fighting inflation and supporting the efforts of American forces in Vietnam. The Mayor's appeal came in response to a letter from Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey which stressed the part savings can play in lessening inflation. The Vice President's letter was sent to the mayors of some 1,600 communities and was a follow-up to President Johnson's appeal, made at the recent Washington Conference of the National League of Cities, for local leadership in the battle against inflation.

The President told the Washington conference that he had

already discussed the inflation problem with business and labor groups, as well as with state governors, and was now extending the same invitation to municipal officials to exercise leadership in keeping pressures on the economy within manageable limits. His list of suggestions included price and wage restraint and the postponement of purchases for capital expansion.

The Vice President, in his letter to Mayor Cain, added to this list the encouragement of Savings Bonds purchases by the public as an important anti-inflationary action for municipal officials to take.

In commenting on the Vice President's letter, Mayor Cain said he endorsed the practice of systematic thrift with Savings Bonds. "For the individual they are a safe and sure method of accumulating reserves for the future," he said, "and for the nation, Savings Bonds play a vital part in the wise management of the public debt."

1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

Make a sauce of butter, flour and milk. Add remaining ingredients. Cook 5 minutes. Cool and shape in cutlets. Roll in fine cracker crumbs then slightly beaten egg, then again in crumbs. Federal Budget Lays A \$731 Load On Each American

Each American has a \$731 "share" of the \$145 billion the Federal government will spend in fiscal 1967 (beginning next July 1) through its cash budget, says Tax Foundation, Inc. The cash budget includes the "regular" or administrative budget, plus spending from trust funds such as the Old-age and Survivors' and Disability Trust Fund, and Highway Trust Fund.

On a state-by-state basis, spending through the cash budget in 1967, says the research organization, will range from \$339 per resident of Mississippi to \$1,408 per resident of Delaware.

BY THE OLD TIMER

From Mrs. Leslie Putnam, Linton, N.D.: "I remember when the 'flu epidemic' of 1918 hit the country. There were about 518 people in our town. Eleven people died in one week. Dad used his car to drive the doctor almost day and night after 'Doc's' team played out. The tragedies they saw were terrible and I particularly remember how sadly Dad told Mother of one family. The family consisted of parents and six children. Dad and the doctor were there the night the mother died and Dad had to lay her out for burial.

So many people were sick and dying that the undertaker could not keep up and help could not be found. Later, the father of the six children died, and all of the children were sick. The oldest, a twelve-year-old, took care of the youngest, a year old, until they went to live with three families of relatives.

Doc was not a young man and, when he could go no longer, an Army doctor was sent in by the Government to help him. He was a younger man, but he insisted on having his rest.

Our high school principal was a woman, Mrs. Phipps. When things got so bad school was closed, she and her assistant went from house to house, helping wherever they could -- and neither of them got the flu.

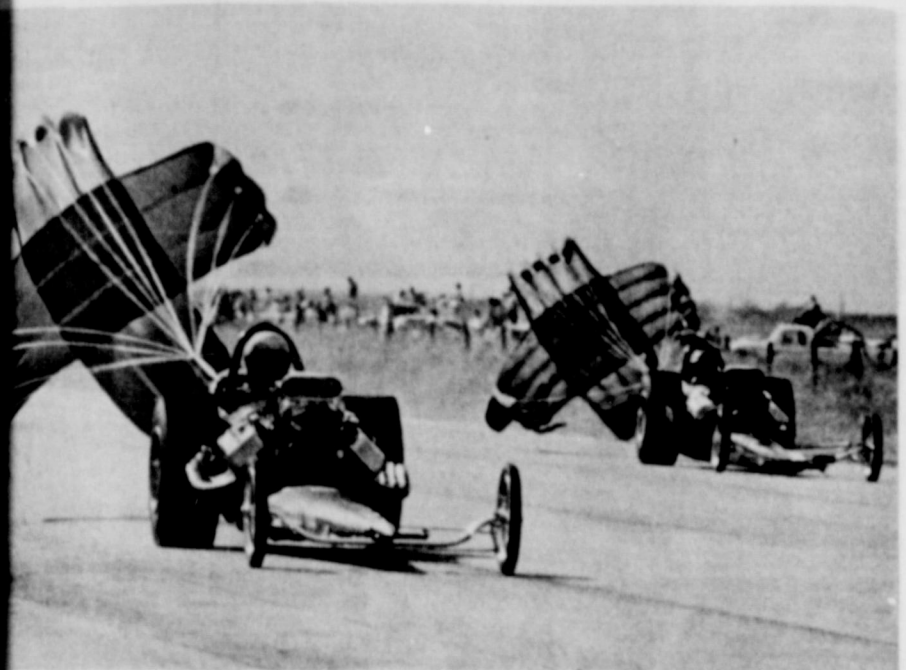

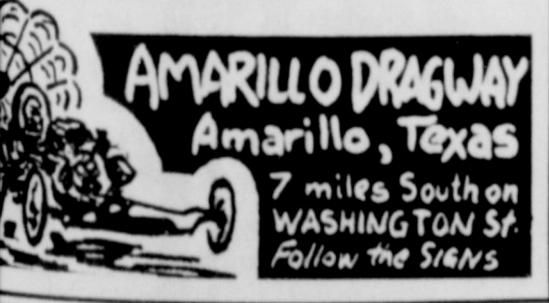

Highway Rest Areas To Be Upgraded Soon

AUSTIN -- The Texas Highway Department added considerable zip today to its continuing program of driver convenience. The Department disclosed an initial plan to build rest rooms and unmanned information centers in safety rest areas throughout the State.

The initial plan involves nine rest areas which have been approved by the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads. Eight of the rest areas are in preliminary planning stages while one is ready to be let to contract.

When work is complete on the rest areas, they will be the first in Texas to be equipped with comfort stations and information centers.

The information centers will contain a large bulletin board to provide state - wide and local travel information and dispense maps and other materials. The centers are designed to promote travel and tourism in Texas.

All of the rest areas involved in the plan are located on Interstate Highways. Eventually, virtually all rest areas on Interstate routes will be equipped with comfort stations and information centers.

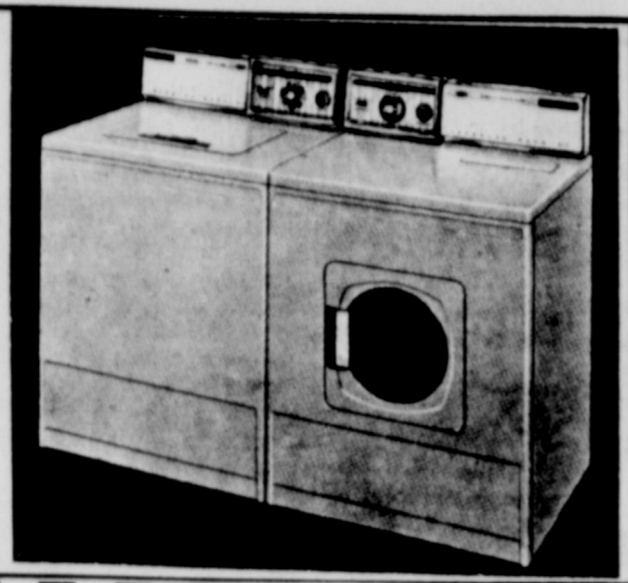
