### TEMPORARY HIKE, THEN RE-EVALUATION PLANNED

## Tax Increase Necessary, Says Board

An increase in taxes in the Slaton Independent School district, both temporary and permanent, was discussed and approved during a regular meeting of trustees Tuesday night in the school business office.

The temporary solution will apparently be an "across the board" hike in values, with the percentage to be determined soon. This would take care of what Supt. Lee Vardy calls "imperative needs" for the upcoming school year.

The board approved a professional re-evaluation of property as the method for a permanent solution. Trustees plan to approach the City of Slaton on the possibility of a joint re-evaluation project. This could not be put into effect until the 1968-69 school term. The last valuation program was in 1946.

In discussing the need for a tax reorganization, Dr. Vardy spelled out four factors which would necessitate the need for more revenues. These included:

An anticipated deficit of \$9,100 for the 1966-67 school year, based on increases in staff members (band and athletics) and increases in salaries of coaches and vocational agriculture teachers.

A state salary increase for teachers, based on bills in the Texas Legislature with the local need ranging from \$8,000 to \$17,000.

Additional funds needed to retire \$60,000 in new bonds, for band hall at high school and other improvements.

Another deficit of some \$1,200 for the 1967-68 school year, based on this year's increased salary schedule.

While studying the tax situation, trustees also looked at a cost comparison per pupil of schools in the area. Slaton's cost per pupil figures \$303.23 -- the lowest of any school around. Comparisons included: Tahoka, \$408.12; Abertown, \$409.49; Floydada, \$410.05; Denver City, \$556.45; Frenship, \$345.69; Post, \$435.41; Morton, \$466.79.

In other business Tuesday night, trustees noted acceptance of the new high school gym last week, with minor corrections to be completed, approved payment of bills; approved a sewer line easement for the City; discussed watering of grass on school grounds; discussed an "open house" at the new gym and football stadium on May 16; and planned high school graduation ceremonies in the new gym on May 29.

Dr. Vardy announced that the new cafeteria at West Ward School was near completion. The school will wait until summer to move into the building with kitchen equipment.

In face of an anticipated total

deficit of \$37,300 for the upcoming year, the board attempted to find a temporary solution to provide additional (See TAX Page 7)

### C-C Directors Hear Reports

Committee reports highlighted a meeting of Slaton Chamber of Commerce directors April 27 at Slaton Municipal Building.

Jake Wendel gave a report from the retail trade committee on the upcoming Western Day observance, and announced plans to focus attention on Mother's Day and graduation for Fabulous Friday dollar day on May 12.

Directors approved the employment of Coach Ernie Davis as manager of the swimming pool this summer. Carroll McDonald reported that application for a charter on the Slaton Industrial & Development Foundation has been sent to Austin.

David Hughes reported on attendance at a special Legislative Breakfast in Austin by himself, Tommy Wallace, Earl Eblen, Bruce Pember and Wayne Cooper. A report on the West Texas C of C convention in Del Rio was given by manager Wayne Cooper.

Planning sessions and activities of the ag committee, the beautification committee, and highways and transportation group were also presented.

Directors announced that blue blazers being worn with Slaton emblems on them would be available to any chamber member who wants to purchase one.

The next chamber directors meet will be held at 8:30 p.m. Attending the session were Wallace, McDonald, Hughes, Wendel, Coy Biggs, Jay Gray, Don Kendrick, Dee Bowman, Willie Heinrich and Cooper.

### Cold Front Chills Area

A record-breaking cool front hung over the Slaton area this week, with freezing temperatures reported by some after an Arctic swept the Great Plains and moved southward.

The mercury tumbled to 30 degrees at Lubbock, while the thermometer at Pioneer Gas Co. in Slaton showed 35 Tuesday morning. There were reports of ice on open water in the city Monday and Tuesday mornings, however.

The low was up to 42 degrees Wednesday morning with a warmup predicted. Expected high Wednesday was 76. The high readings Monday and Tuesday were 68.

### MEET SLATED

Glen H. Mitchell has been elected superintendent of the Wilson Independent School District, according to Jiggs Swann, president of the Wilson School Board. Mitchell will replace Leroy Scott who has taken the position of superintendent of the Lorraine Public Schools.

Mr. Mitchell has served as principal of Henrietta High School for the past six years. Prior to that time he was principal of Union Independent School and counselor at Brownfield Junior High School.

He is a graduate of North

Texas State University and Texas Tech. The Mitchell family plans to move to Wilson the first of July. His family includes his wife, the former Willa Johnson of Brownfield, and two children, Regina, eight, and Kevin, five.

They are members of the First Baptist Church of Henrietta where Mitchell serves as a deacon, Training Union director and men's Sunday School teacher. His wife is director of the Girls' Auxiliary and works with the primaries in Training Union.

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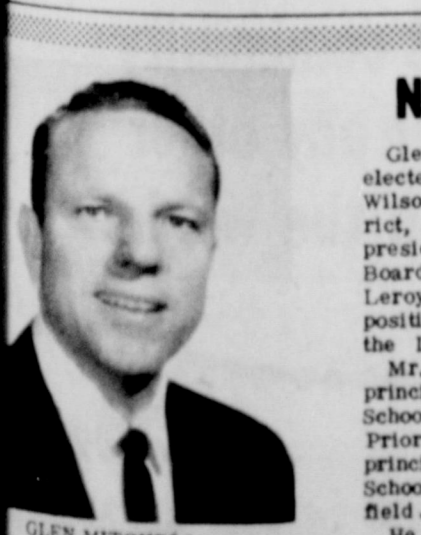

### Lions Capture District Honor

Slaton Lions Club was named as the outstanding club of the district, and Queen Vicki Nowlin was first runner-up in a District 27-2 contest at Lamesa Friday and Saturday.

The Slaton club received a huge plaque on being named the top club of the district, winning the award on the basis of community projects and other activities. The local club won over 56 Lions clubs in the district. Club President Carroll Mc-

Donald was present to accept the plaque. Hack Lasater also was awarded a plaque for his work with the district cabinet.

McDonald presented the plaque at the club meeting Tuesday at Bruce's. Program for the day was presented by Clark Self Jr., who introduced the "Blue Notes", a group of six girls from Lubbock Christian College. They sang a variety of selections.

The Slaton club had previously been named the city's outstanding club at the recent Slaton Chamber of Commerce banquet. Projects the past year, aside from regular activities, included work on securing an athletic bus -- raising about \$967, donation of \$225 to Tiger Town's new youth center, sponsored a Peace Essay contest and gave a \$25 Savings Bond to the winner, sponsored two boys to Boys State and two more youths to the attorney general's youth conference, sponsored safety signs around schools.

Annual services range from providing eyeglasses for needy students to providing gatekeepers at football games. The club now has 27 members.



### Beautification Planning Starts

The beautification committee of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce held a planning session last week with chairman M. G. Davis presiding.

Discussed at the meeting were plans to designate a week or month for a "clean-up, fix-up, paint-up" period. The group also discussed ideas to stimulate and interest citizens in participating in the program.

Mayor Jonas Cain, a member of the committee, pledged the city's cooperation in any clean-up program. The group also suggested some method of recognizing citizens who do outstanding jobs in beautifying yards and areas.

"I Am for Beautifying Slaton" was the slogan adopted by the committee. There is a possibility of focusing attention on 9th street the first year, since this street is seen by most visitors to the city.

Another suggestion was to have litter bags made up for distribution, possibly with a slogan imprinted on them. Members of the committee are Davis, Cain, Ray Dickie and Mildred Page, C of C President Tommy Wallace and Manager Wayne Cooper also attended the meeting.

### DEPOSITS HIGH

A bank call at the close of business April 25, 1967, found Citizens State Bank with all-time high deposits for this period of the year, it was revealed this week.

CSB showed deposits of \$6,225,053 and loans and discounts of \$5,084,560. Last year, at this date, deposits were at \$5,825,313 while loans and discounts were \$4,583,547. The deposit figure this year appears even more healthy when it is considered that it came after the April 15 tax deadline.

CSB deposits had topped the \$7 million mark at the beginning of the year.

course, some fears are healthy; they warn us against danger. But too many fears can keep a child from developing into a mentally stable adult.

Parents must strive to give their children a feeling of confidence and reassurance. Fears should be replaced by intelligent caution. Good growth and development come about when fears are minimized.

Children, as well as adults, need the feeling of achievement. A child needs to develop a feeling of personal worth, some sense of recognition, and a sense of accomplishment, if he is to have an inner security.

All of us need praise; all of us need attention; all of us need a feeling of independence. If we don't get it, we tend to feel inadequate and inferior. Everybody must be given this chance to prove himself with something he can do well.

A child has a need for acceptance. He needs to believe that his parents like him for himself, just the way he is. He must know that his parents like him all the time, not only when he is good and acts according to their wishes, but also when he acts in a manner which is not desirable.

As adults, we must slow down and take time to enjoy our children. A baby is like a car bottom up -- the more gas you give it, the faster its wheels spin. Let's take time to "refuel" ourselves.

Let's take the time to discover how a baby grows, what makes him learn, and how we can guide him so that he will mature and develop into a more well-rounded, healthy individual and responsible citizen. I think you will find that children are fascinating people.

## Farm Bureau Style Show

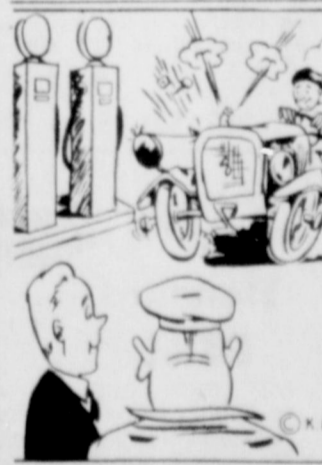
The Lubbock County Farm Bureau will hold a family night party at the Slaton clubhouse tomorrow night (Friday) from 8 to 10 p.m.

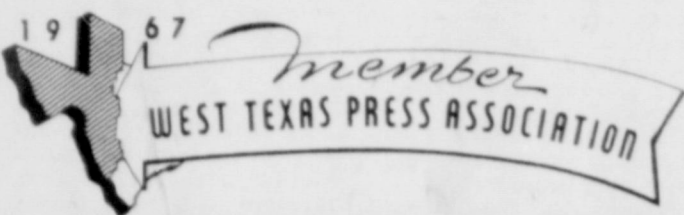

## Children's Clinic Conducted Sat.

The Crippled Children's Clinic for South Plains children will be conducted this Saturday, May 6, from 12-5 p.m. at St. John's Methodist Church, 15th and College Avenue, Lubbock.

The clinic is free to cripple children of Lubbock and the surrounding area through the co-operation of doctors and the sponsor, Fellowship Class of St. John's Church. Four orthopedic surgeons will be present to examine the children Saturday. City - county health nurses from several counties are to assist.

The clinic has been financed by contributions. Clinic personnel will arrange for braces and further care when necessary. Braces and appliances for 100 different patients and approximately 350 pairs of shoes have been donated.

More than 600 children have received free examinations since the first clinic in April, 1963. Children being taken for the first time are to be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

## Registration For Pre-School Children Set

Preschool registration day for children who are six or seven years of age and will be entering school for the first time in September will be held tomorrow, May 5 at West Ward Elementary School.

Parents are requested to bring their children to the school auditorium at 1:30 p.m. After a brief orientation about school procedures and policies, children will be assigned tentatively to teachers and classrooms where they may become acquainted with school life. They will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m.

During the orientation, Dr. P. L. Vardy, superintendent, will discuss in general the policies of Slaton Public Schools; T. C. 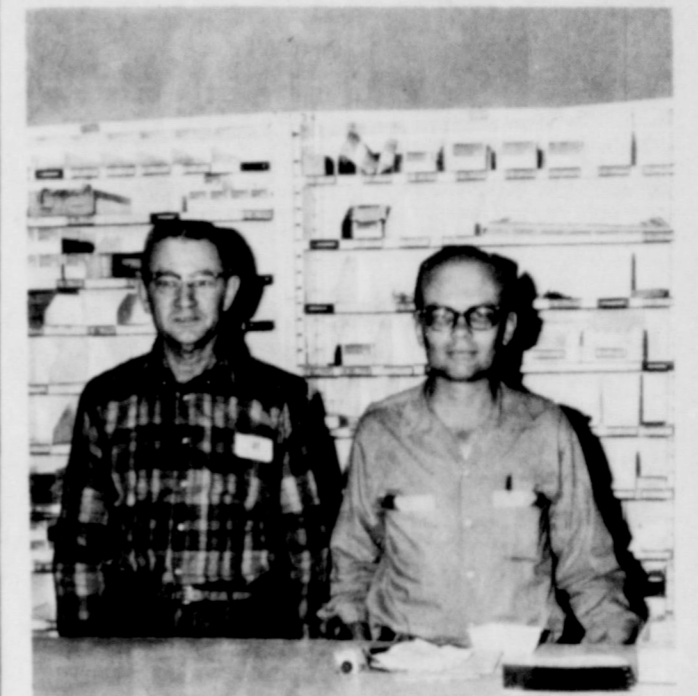

 funds for imperative needs, in discussing the tax reorganization, Dr. Vardy pointed out that State support of Slaton Schools amounts to some \$454,000 per year while local sup-

port totals about \$140,000. However, the state provides only \$43,000 for operations of a minimum program, and the actual cost is double that, according to the superintendent. These costs include operation, maintenance and upkeep, insurance, utilities, library books, teaching supplies, bus operation and other expenses incidental to operation of schools. Additional salaries for special teachers is also included.

Vardy said that custodial services and utilities alone cost the Slaton schools approximately \$30,000 a year. Teaching supplies would take care of the remainder allowed, leaving additional funds to be raised for the other expenses. One area is additional salaries for coaches and vocational ag teachers.

Vardy pointed out that "for our school to be competitive in the area of athletics, extra pay must be provided for coaches who devote extra time after regular school hours. In August of 1966, he added, the board was confronted with the employment of an athletic director and sufficient assistants to enable him to field a representative team in various sports provided by Slaton schools.

The additional costs to meet this demand, including employment of an additional coach,

upset the 1966-67 budget. An increase in salaries for coaches enabled Slaton schools to be in line with other schools, but this resulted in a deficit for the school year since the budget had already been set, added the superintendent.

In order to maintain a salary schedule competitive with other schools, additional money must be raised for the 1967-68 year. The recent sale of bonds for a band hall and other improvements calls for an increase of some \$6,000 a year to retire such bonds.

Vardy said any increase in teacher salaries voted by the State must be paid partly on the local level. In the opinion of most, the Legislature will approve increases, and Vardy estimated the local need will be about \$15,000 a year.

The Slaton superintendent said he felt teacher salaries need to be improved for Texas to "maintain a desired teaching staff for the children of the state." He added that a teacher shortage looms in Texas for the upcoming school year.

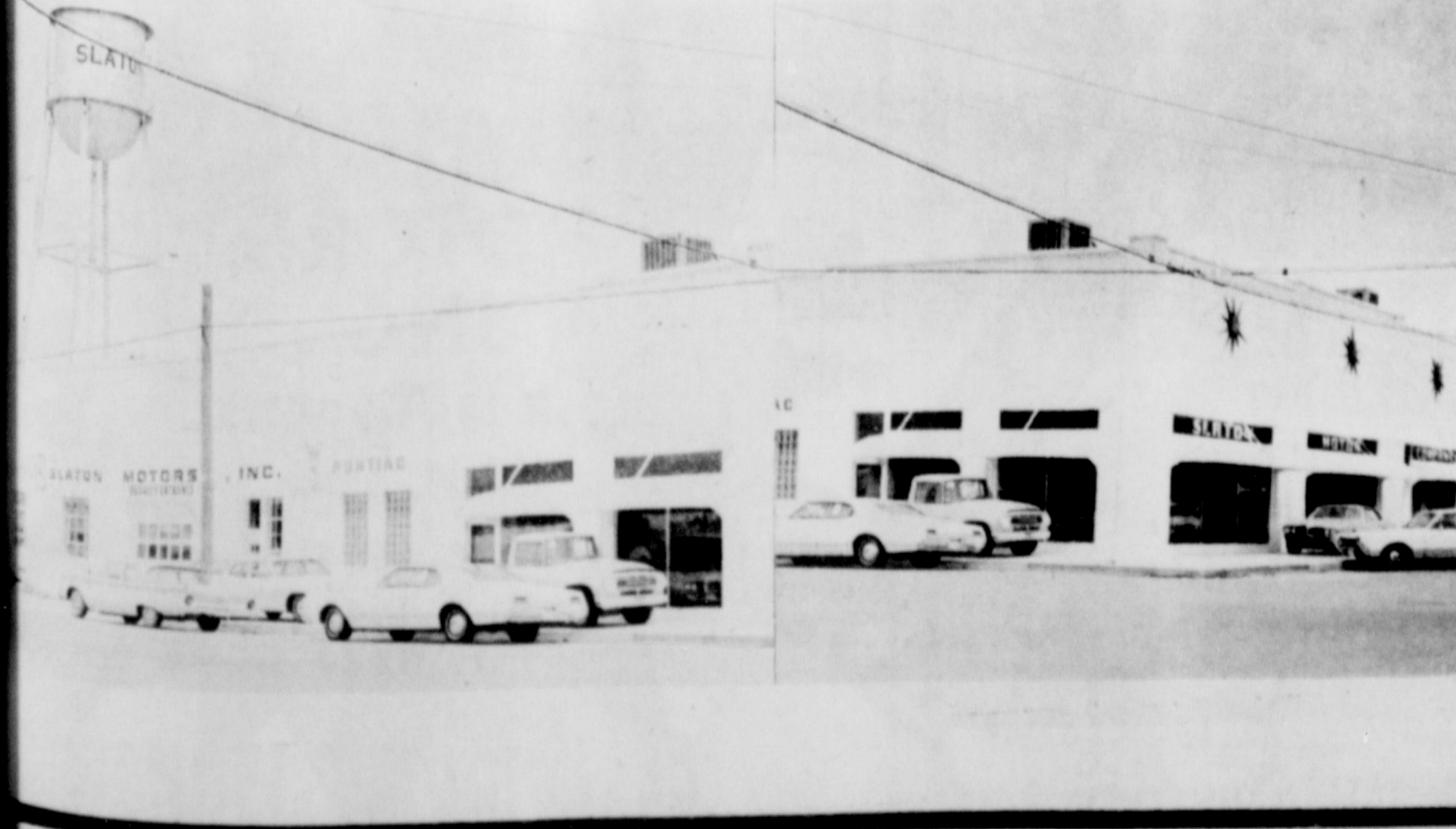

Two-thirds of a hospital's  
operating costs go for wages and  
salaries of hospital personnel.  
In industry wages and salaries  
account for only about one-third

Hospitals throughout the  
country are taking positive,  
concrete steps to stem the ris-  
ing trend of costs. Group pur-  
chasing, shared services, co-  
operative planning to prevent  
duplication of services, uniform  
accounting procedures, and co-

steps hospitals are taking to  
effect economies.

Because hospitals have to  
compete with industry for per-  
sonnel, hospital salaries will

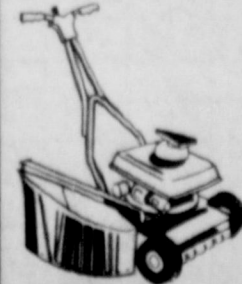

Starting May 26 and continuing through Labor Day, the Park will be open seven days a week from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Following Labor Day and until the season closes October 29, Six Flags will operate on Saturdays and Sundays only from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.

The Run-A-Way Mine Train ride, key project in the \$1,000,000 expansion of the Boom Town Section of the Park which was begun last season, has been completed over the winter months.

An attendance milestone will also be reached during the forthcoming season, as Six Flags anticipates welcoming its ten-millionth visitor sometime during the month of August.

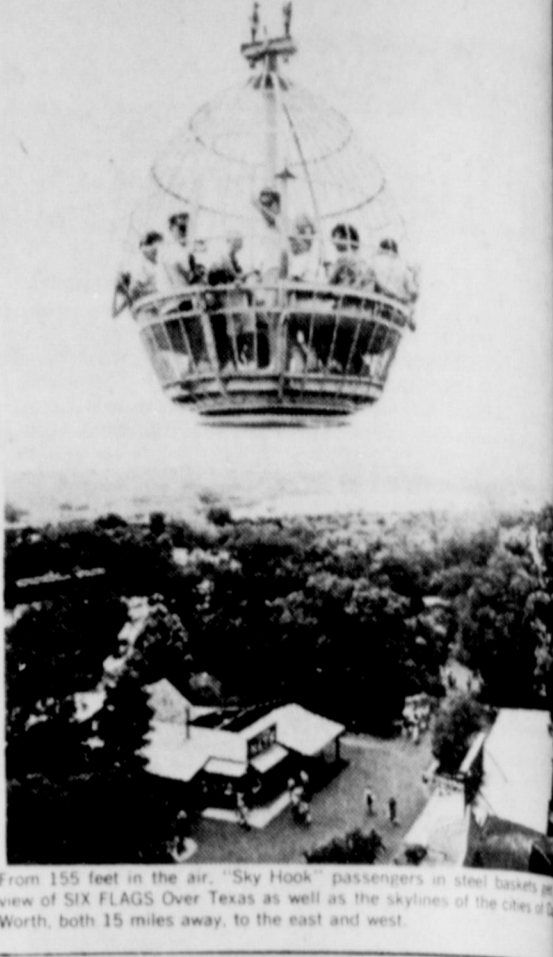
The Park, which opened in 1961, has already counted over 8.5 million visitors.
