# Tornadic Winds, Hail Hit Area

The damage toll was still being added up Wednesday morning, but crop damage was believed heavy west of town. Slaton apparently was on the edge of the thunderstorm, as little violent weather was reported to the east, Only a slight amount of moisture was recorded.

It was believed that much cotton was hailed out by the storm to the west, southwest and northwest, Apparently a number of farm homes also sustained wind and hail damage.
