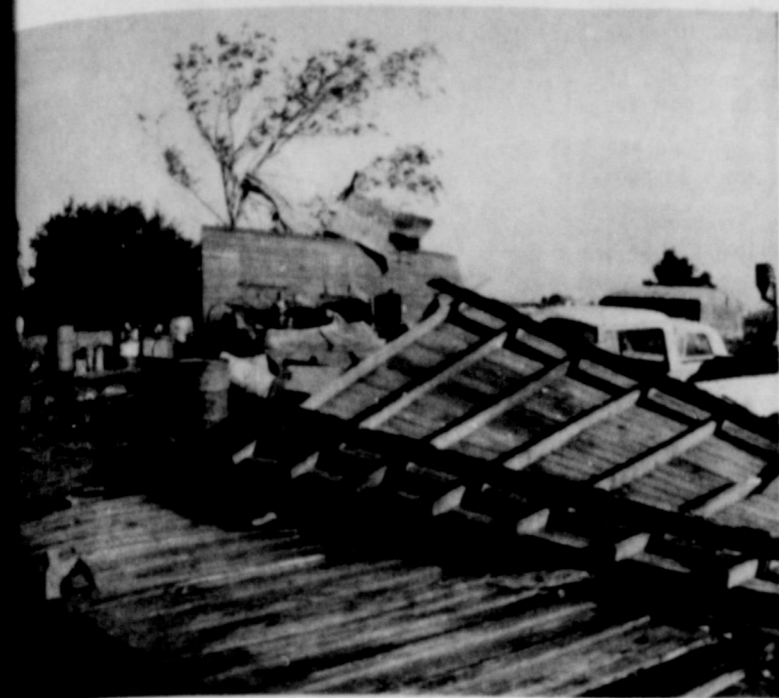


# Tornadic Winds, Hail Hit Area

A violent thunderstorm, accompanied by tornadic winds, dust and hail, swept across the Slaton area Tuesday evening, causing a large amount of property damage and leaving the city without power for about 40 minutes.

What was believed to be a small twister left its mark west of town, demolishing some farm buildings and snapping highline poles between Slaton and Posey. Eleven poles were down Tuesday night, some falling across Santa Fe tracks. No injuries were reported.

The damage toll was still being added up Wednesday morning, but crop damage was believed heavy west of town. Slaton apparently was on the edge of the thunderstorm, as little violent weather was reported to the east. Only a slight amount of moisture was recorded.

It was believed that much cotton was hailed out by the storm to the west, southwest and northwest. Apparently a number of farm homes also sustained wind and hail damage.

Norbert and Bill Kitten, who farm four miles west of town

on the Union Road, reported a chicken house and tool house completely demolished. REA lines were down in the area, and the Southwestern Public Service poles were bowled over on US-84 in a path directly northeast of the Kitten farm.

Another Kitten, James, who lives 1 1/2 miles northwest of Slaton, reported several farm buildings were destroyed, leaving only his house.

The front did little to cool off temperatures, which soared to over 100 degrees four days the past week. High Tuesday was 102, and the reading dipped to 66 Tuesday night. Readings of 104 were recorded here Saturday and Sunday. A high of 100 was predicted Wednesday.

Numerous windows were

knocked out by the hail in Slaton, with no count available early Wednesday. The hail, ranging up to golf-ball size, didn't last long or the damage might have been much worse.

The storm front moved into Slaton just before 7:30 p.m. The power was knocked out about 7:25 and could not be restored until a few minutes after eight.

An electric clock at the Bill Kitten house stopped at 7:20 p.m. He was alone in his home, while Mrs. Norbert Kitten and seven children were in the other house on the Kitten farm.

"It blew in so fast and the dust was thick that we didn't make it to the cellar," said Mrs. Kitten. Then the hail

### Contract Let on SHS Gym

Contract for a \$172,848 high school gym was awarded by Slaton School trustees in a special meeting last Thursday night, marking the first bid to be let on a \$500,000 school improvements project.

Trustees recently approved preliminary plans for a new cafeteria at West Ward School. It will be located on the south end of the east wing of the present building and will have some 5,000 square feet of floor space. Football stadium improvements and a new elementary school in southwest Slaton are also included in the overall program which voters approved earlier this year.

Low bidder on the new gym was Tom McAbee of Lubbock. Contract calls for the building to be completed within 190 working days, indicating it will be ready during the next basketball season. The new gym will be located on the southwest corner of the high school. The gym will have a seating capacity of about 1,350 -- about double that of the junior high gym which has been used by high school athletes. The structure will include some 17,300 square feet of space, and will be constructed of pre-stressed concrete beams, acoustical tile and face brick. Features of the gym include four dressing - room facilities, ample storage space, a spacious lobby with a trophy case and concession stand, a coach's office.

Permanent seats will be installed on the west side of the gym, seating 750 persons, and folding bleachers will be put on the east side to take care of another 600 people. Plans call for two scoreboard-clocks, Players' bench areas will be recessed on the west

### Two Girls Die In Freak Crash

Two Slaton teenage girls, helping push a stalled car just inside the Lubbock city limits early Sunday, were killed when another car smashed into the rear of the disabled vehicle.

Killed in the 1:30 a.m. Sunday crash were cousins Olivia Vasquez, 16 and Marcella Vasquez, 19, both of Rt. 1, Slaton. Olivia was dead at the scene of the mishap, near US-84 and Ash Ave., while Marcella was reported to have died about an hour later at a Lubbock hospital.

Investigating officers said both girls were at the rear of the car. The driver, Apolonia Vasquez, 21, of Slaton, told officers the car ran out of gas. Four passengers got out of the car to push while she steered. Her mother and another sister were on the side of the car, while sister Marcella was with Olivia at the rear.

Driver of the other car, Edward Spencer of Lubbock, was injured but not hospitalized, according to the accident report.

Combined funeral services for the girls were held at 4 p.m. Wednesday in Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in Slaton with the Rev. James Erickson officiating. Williams Funeral Home was in charge of burial at Englewood Cemetery.

Marcella is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Vasquez, who work on the Joe Gamble farm; also three sisters and a brother.

Olivia, an employee for Blue-bonnet Laundry in Slaton, is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Josea Vasquez of Rt. 1, six brothers and four sisters.

### Banks Named Sears Manager Of Slaton Store

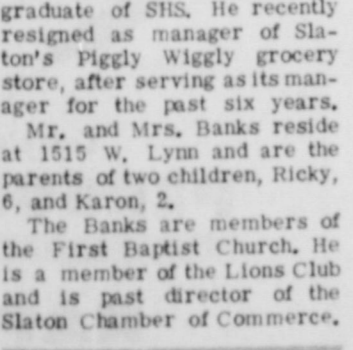

### Martin, Tarbox Win Here, Too

Slaton voters followed two trends in last Saturday's second Democratic Primary -- they favored the winning nominees and they stayed away from the polls in large numbers.

Crawford Martin won the Demo nomination for attorney general in the runoff primary, while Elmer Tarbox, former Tech football hero, won the nomination for State Representative, Place 2 -- the only local - level race in the second primary.

Tarbox, who defeated attorney Bill Gillespie in the Saturday runoff, had the same four - vote margin in Slaton's three boxes as he had in the first primary. Tarbox won by a 138 - 134 count Saturday, while he was favored by a 343 - 339 count on May 7.

Martin's margin was lower here, polling 169 votes to 108 for Franklin Spears. Slaton favored Martin by a 358 - 244 count in May, Lubbock County

3,994 votes to 2,691 for Gillespie.

Slaton's three boxes totaled just 280 votes, compared to 855 in the May Demo primary. With only two races on the runoff ballot, about two-thirds of the first primary voters chose to skip this one. There were no Republican runoffs, and the Martin-Spears clash was the only statewide race in the second Demo primary.

Voting interest is expected to pick up again in the November general election when Republicans concentrate their efforts on returning Sen. John Tower to office. He will be opposed by Texas Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, the Democratic nominee in the May 7 primary.

Three foot - two and eyes of blue! What better way is there to describe Slaton's newest and prettiest naturalized United States twin - citizens, Carol Lynn and Cheryl Ann Heinrich.

The Italian - born, adopted daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Cletus O. Heinrich arrived in Slaton three happy years ago. That memorable Sunday, May 7, 1963, held many "firsts" for the twins.

The twins celebrated their first birthday on their first day in a new home in a new nation with a new American family. There was also a twin-sized first taste of strawberry ice cream.

Last Friday marked another first for the twins when ceremonies in U.S. District Court made the fair - haired Heinrich charmers naturalized U. S. citizens. Carol and Cheryl were part of a group of 34, including 27 adults and 7 children, who became citizens at naturalization rites presided over by Judge Joseph B. Dooley.

Cheryl Ann proudly displayed the small American flags given them by the Nancy Anderson Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Himmm, let's see, was it Cheryl or Carol that had the flags? Oh, well, the Heinrichs weren't too sure themselves!

The arrival of the twins at Love Field, Dallas, in 1963, meant the end of a long and disheartening 3 1/2 years of waiting. The twins had crossed the Atlantic to New York City with only airline stewardesses to care for them.

Catholic Charities case-worker, Mrs. Hilda Porter, accompanied the twins on the flight to Dallas.

"We had almost given up hope," said Mrs. Heinrich of the long period before the Catholic Committee for Refugees of the National Catholic Welfare Conference told the couple of the bonus they were to receive for such patience - twins! They were - stunned and thrilled. They were to get twice as much as they had ever hoped to receive. After they were notified there were clothes to be bought - two of everything!

Carol Lynn and Cheryl Ann are the American sounding names given them by the Heinrichs. The Yugoslavian parents of the girls had named them Cinzia and Serena.

"They are very active and play together all the time," said Cletus Heinrich of the four year olds. They tire us down sometimes, even Danny can't always keep up with them."

Danny, 16, will be a senior at Slaton High School Next Year

This reporter found him to be very polite, very friendly, and very good at giving directions to help a newcomer locate the Heinrich home.

The Heinrichs are life long residents of Slaton. He is a relief roundhouse foreman for the Santa Fe Railway, where he has worked for more than 25 years.

After visiting with and watching the Heinrich five at play, this writer's impression was that the Heinrichs are a very happy twin - sized American family.

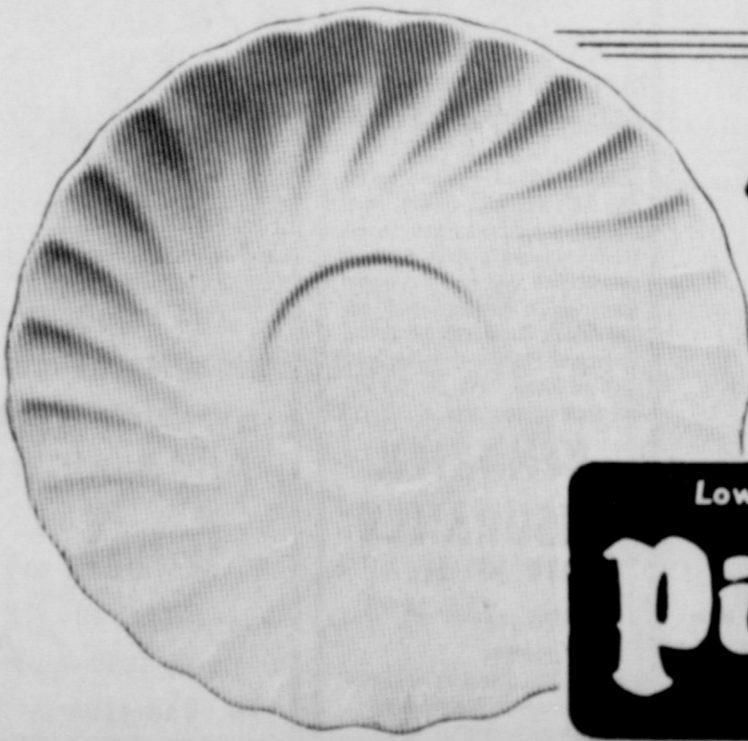
