School Tax Valuations Go Up 15 Percent

DEPOSITS AT RECORD HIGH

A band call at Citizens State Bank and a mid-year report from Slaton Savings Loan this week showed record high deposits for both financial institutions in the city.

The bank call for the close of business June 30, showed CSB with deposits of \$5,977,295.91 -- an alltime for this season of the year. Deposits at this time last year were \$5,533,079.-Loans and discounts totaled \$4.6 million compared to \$4.47 last year. Total resources were listed at \$6,704,000.

Slator S&L shows savings and investment accounts totaling \$5,929,-311,94 at the close of business June 30. This is also a record figure for the Savings & Loan As-

Fourth of July Holiday Quiet

The Fourth of July was a quiet day in Slaton. Marking the observance of

our nation's birthday, the special day was noted in Slaton by the close of most businesses. the flying of flags, the sounding of the fire siren at 1 p.m., and the occasional sound of fireworks through the day.

It was one of the coolest Fourth of Julys in history as rain soaked the area early Tuesday morning, and the skies remained overcast until the afternoon. Baseball games were cancelled due to wet fields, leaving little activity planned here during the day.

More Rainfall **Drenches Area**

With one of the wettest Junes on record, Slaton and the area watched as July started with more beneficial rainfall covering the area and brightening crop prospects.

Farmers celebrated July 4th by watching a rainfall of various recordings fall over fields already soaked by moisture. Slaton recorded about .50 to .70 Tuesday morning, while re-

A Saturday - night rain left about half an inch of moisture in Slaton, and the rainfall was apparently fairly general, Almost an inch of rain was measured on farms south and southwest of the city.

was the coolest Tuesday Fourth of July on record in Lubbock, which recorded a low of 60 and a high of 80, In Slaton, the temperature readings were logged at 84 for the high and 58 for the low.

The entire South Plains overcame a winter drouth with repeated thunderstorms during June, and actually became the wettest area in the state. Of 20 weather bureau stations reporting, Lubbock showed an above - normal rainfall total of a whopping 7.95 inches in June. For the year, Lubbock's station totaled 14.58 inches. The annual average rainfall is just over 18 inches.

Crow and Carroll McDonald. B. B. (Doc) Castleberry, outgoing president, and Bruce Pember, past district governor, had charge of the installation ceremonies. Castleberry presented Hughes with the president's pin, and made a brief talk thanking the members for a successful year.

He mentioned the club highlights of the year as being the Teacher Appreciation Banquet, hosting the District Rotary Assembly, and sponsoring a school traffic safety program.

Hughes moved up from the vice president's post to take the club reins. Charlie Barron was the retiring secretary.

"Dear Tax Payer and Pat-ron: Would you believe a 15 percent increase in taxes?" It didn't read exactly that way, and it's no joking matter, but the message was there when taxpayers of the Slaton Independent School District received their "greetings" this

The letter outlined three factors leading to the increase in taxes: (1) State salary increase for teachers, with the local district paying 20 percent; (2) Operational costs on the rise, and (3) Additional revenue to retire bonds on capital improvements.

The letter from the school district office also pointed out that Slaton schools have been operating "on the lowest per pupil cost of any school in its class on the South Plains" and, after the tax hike, "will continue to operate on one of the lowest per pupil cost on the South Plains,'

Taxpayers were also notified that the board of equalization will meet on July 17 and 18 at the school tax office to hear any protests and to determine valuations. The meetings will start at 9 a.m. each day.

The notices also included valuations for tax purposes of the property for each taxpayer. The 15 percent increase will come on valuations -- thus a property owner with property valued at \$1,000 will find his property hiked to a value of \$1,150. After operating with in-

adequate facilities for several years, the school district asked for and received voter approval for a \$500,000 improvements bond issue in February, 1966. Already added under the project have been a new high school gym, a new west side stadium at the football field, and a new cafeteria at West Ward, A new band hall at high school is scheduled for completion in the near future. A new elementary building in west Slaton is on the drawing board when the need arises.

The tax rate was hiked from \$1.85 per \$100 valuation to \$2 per \$100 after the bond issue was voted in 1966.

BABSON BUSINESS & FINANCIAL FORECAST

A MID-YEAR REVIEW

BABSON PARK, MASS, (July 6) - Here in the northeast corner of the U.S., we frequently warn that it is not wise to "review the bid," But then, we know that there is always an "antidote" for every aphorism. So we counter with: "Confession is good for the soul," And that is precisely what we plan to do today ... at the midway mark of 1967. Hence, we turn back to our extensive forecast of things to come in 1967 published here on Dec. 29, 1966. Also, as we go along, we shall adopt a three fold policy aimed at (1) exulting a bit where we were 'on the nose," (2) admitting our guilt, and (3) adjusting our course with an eye to the remaining months of the

FOREIGN DEVELOPMENTS As 1966 ended, we warned that "the greatest danger for the year ahead does not exist on the domestic front," Throughout the first half of 1967 the direst developments surely have been in the military and political areas abroad, As all eyes were firmly fixed on the increasingly bloody conflict in Vietnam, the Middle East burst

into flame. G. A. Nasser of Egypt, egged on by the trouble makers in Moscow and surfeited with Russian armament, screamed for a "holy war" to wipe out Israel, But his zeal soon cooled, as did Goliath's when David moved resolutely forth to meet the danger. As we review the events of recent weeks we recall our December statement; "Heavily armed with Soviet weapons, the Arabs of the Middle East -

squared off against Israel present a grave threat to world peace.'

NO WORLD WAR YET Despite our forebodings of

late last year, we then felt that the smoldering fires evident in the Middle East would not erupt into World War III. At the same time we flatly predicted that the issue in Vietnam would not be resolved in 1967. Today as we weigh more recent developments, we are still convinced that neither Russia nor the U. S. views a head-on collision as inevitable. As a nation we are hopeful that the Soviets will gradually give up their aim of world conquest; while the Politburo is persuaded Americans are drifting steadily leftward and that we will eventually capitulate to Communism without nuclear war.

To be sure, the danger is ever present when two strong men armed to the teeth confront each other. Should we overwheim North Vietnam, the provocation would be heightened. Had Egypt liquidated Israel, the West would have been pushed toward massive intervention. But apparently our State Department is thinking more of holding action in South Vietnam. And Israel's valor saved the U. S. for the time being in the Middle East, Consequently the day of great evil has been put forward ... hopefully beyond the end of this

year. TURNING TO BUSINESS There was much more on possible foreign developments in our Forecast for 1967, A rereading would be highly exents. But we devoted even more space to trends and probable happenings in business and finance. We foresaw that military spending would be raised in 1967, softening "the impact of any easing in the private sector of the economy." Flatly we forecast a "definite deceleration in business activity." We correctly outlined the threat to profits arising from "increased productive capacity" and "the inflation in labor and other operating costs," Most important, we predicted "an abrupt switch in 1967 from a policy of inventory accumulation to one of inventory liquidation."

On credit, we expected enough easing to "permit more orderly monetary conditions," On housing we thought it would be' midyear or after before this important part of our economy can contribute much strength to over-all business." We viewed labor as standing "at the crossroads" with "more likelihood in 1967 of restrictive labor legislation than at any time since Taft-Hartley was put on the books." We correctly pegged the sales lag in autos and other durable goods. The hike in living costs, and the "lethargy" in retail trade. But we missed the bad slump in farmers' net income and the difficulties that farm implement manufacturers have been encountering.

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





How Do You Interpret Death To Your Children?

parenthood are that of helping children meet different experiences in life in ways that will help them mature and grow stronger. But perhaps the most difficult task of all is that of interpreting death to children,

Many parents avoid the subject in hopes that the child may never be faced with a death in his immediate family. But children face death everyday! They hear it in the news, see it on television, a neighbor down the street may die, or a play-

A child's pet dies, or his plant produces no fruit, or his grandparent or close friend meets death, And your child will want to know why. In order for him to developinto a healthy personality, parents must furnish him the correct answers.

There are no foolproof formulas that can be applied to such situations. Because children and parents differ, no one rule can be followed in every case. But there are two significant topics which can assist a parent to help his child cope with death; first, what are children's ideas about death, and second, what interpretations should NOT be used.

After an extensive study, Maria Nagy revealed that children tend to pass through three different phases in his ideas about death.

First, the younger childfrom three to five denies death as a natural and final process. To this child, death is like sleep; you are dead, then you are alive again, Just as on a journey, you are gone and then you come back again, Consequently, children of this age may seem to be callous when they are told of the death of a member of the family. They will usually express an immediate sorrow, but soon forget about it.

In the second stage, roughly

A third kind of interpretation attributes death to God through such statements as "God took him" or "Jesus wanted him". Sherill, in his article, "Interpreting Death to Children", points out that such an explanation runs the risk of building in the child fear, resentment, or even hatred toward the God who, in the child's mind, can be the enemy who may strike down without warning. The words used, the tone of voice, and PAST religious teachings will determine whether or not a negative reaction develops.

So what can a parent do?? Osborne says "it is better to explain the immediate causes rather than to try to give philosophical interpretations. which the child rarely understands,'

Thus, in talking about a death caused by an accident, emphasize the need for good judgment and care in protecting ourselves against mistakes. Or in discussing sickness as the cause of death, the lack of scientific knowledge or the need for better preventive measures can be emphasized. And when old age is the cause of death, parent should stress the fact that everyone's body eventually grows old and tired, and that there comes a time when the

heart can no longer do it's work. "As for as the physical body is concerned, we should make it very clear that life has stopped, that the person cannot return, and that the body has been buried in a specific place. Anything short of this is apt to result in some kind of confusions and misinterpretations," say Osborne, in his article "When

You Lose a Loved One". Parents must realize that children react differently to death than do adults. A young child can handle things by action better than through talking and thinking. Parents can be grateful for this; immediate expression of grief is always much more healthy and satisfying than locking feelings up inside oneself.

There are ways of preparing children for deaths. For example, many parents rush too quickly to replace a pet that has died, never giving the child the opportunity to experience a loss of any kind. Telling a child that a pet has "run away" is a very poor explanation that a dog or cat has really died. Many psychologists suggest that children be given the chance

AUSTIN, Tex. --- Air pollution is the prime topic of conservation in the Capitol at the moment. After taking a look at the air pollution law just put on the books this year, members of the new Texas Air Control Board say the Texas law permits 80 times as much air pollution as do similar laws

in some of the other states. Elbert Hooper of Austin, the Board's attorney, told the directors that an exemption from control supposed to apply only to cotton gins (limiting air emissions to a maximum of eight per cent of the process weight of an agricultural product) may exempt many industries.

He named the following as possibles: lumber mills, rice mills, grain elevators, paper mills, cotton oil mills, produce plants, food processing plants, citrus processing plants, cotton seed delinting plants, flour mills, soybean oil mills, corn syrup plants, slaughter houses, wool scouring plants, nut processing plants and, possibly,

rendering plants. "We might as well fold up and go home," said Board Mem ber Henry LeBlanc of Port Arthur, "Maybe it would be easier for you to tell us what's left that we can control," he

told Hooper. Some members observed that cotton gins would have to produce 50,000 to 60,000 micrograms of particulate matter to get to eight per cent concentration -- and gins at best are not likely to exceed 40,000 to 50,000 micrograms.

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
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
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
