



LET'S ARRANGE THINGS **How To Arrange Flowers**

As an art, flower arrangement most closely resembles painting, adhering to the same principles of scale, color, rhythm and composition to achieve beauty.

The side triangle, crescent, half-circle, S-curve, full circle, perpendicular, oval and triangle are basic forms. These compositions, or eight basic plans, are your simple guide to turning flower arrangements into living paintings.

Flowers are lovely in any circumstance, but to bring out all their natural beauty they should be arranged in containers which complement their colors and contours. The container's suitability not its intrinsic value, is really what matters.

Since experts agree that over-decorated highly colored vases detract from the beauty of the flowers, any container made of clear or light-tinted glass is a good choice. Many unique and original compositions -- formal or informal -- can be made with such standard pieces as the vases and bowls in every household.

Tumblers, stemmed or footed goblets, brandy inhalers (miniature or mammoth). cocktail mixers, candy dishes, beer stein or tall Pilsner glasses, apothecary jars or jars that once held bath salts -- these are but a few examples of the household glassware you can borrow to make sparkling flower arrangements.

No matter what piece of glassware you choose, nor which of the eight basic plans is most appropriate to it, you'll start by deciding on the scale of the arrangement. Scale is the relationship of the flowers to the size and shape of the container. Most visually satisfying is an arrangement whose proportions are at least one and a half times tall container's height -- or about one and a half times a low container's width.

Color rules are simple. Since dark or heavy flowers tend to give the feeling of weight, they look least heavy when used at the bottom of an arrangement. Buds and lighter, smaller blossoms may be placed at the top and outer sides. Try to use color in groups -- "family" colors like pinks and reds together -- to lend coherence and harmony to the over-all effect.

eye is led to a natural center of interest.

Experience of feeding, showing, and marketing an animal will help a boy all through his life. As to the money made on supervised farming projects, let us look at a current report from the Cooper FFA.

This group is a Vocational Agriculture III class of eight students with a total of 24 projects and a total labor income of \$2,264.80; this is a average of three projects per student with an average labor income of \$283.10 per boy. Florida and Texas show the largest increase. Winter pear production is also set at well above average, with D'Anjous making up 80 percent of the supply. Grapefruit stocks are up

about 10 percent over last season and 31 percent above the recent 5-year average. Florida, California and Texas show across-the-board increases. Broiler production is expect-



AUSTIN, Tex. -- Grocery bills of Texans are increasing. And there isn't much anybody can do about it except shop more thriftily.

That's Gov. John Connally's conclusion after studying a special committee's report on food prices.

While the cost of marketbasket items is going up faster here than for the nation as a whole, food still is a bargain, the committee advised.

Connally requested the study by representatives of the University of Texas, A&M University and Texas Technological College.

These conclusions lighted the report:

*Consumer food costs in Texas during the last two years jumped 10.5 per cent, com-pared with 8.7 per cent for the nation. Retailers' marketbasket costs rose 6.8 per cent here, compared with the U.S. average of 6.4 per cent.

*Today the average Texas family of four spends \$1,134 a year for groceries. This is \$108 more than two years ago. Nationwide food - basket cost rose \$89, for a total expenditure of \$1,116 a year.

*An overall price increase of 12.5 per cent for Texas farm products the past year (September to September) contributed to 71 per cent of the hike in retail food prices.

*Net profit levels of food retailers actually declined fractionally from 1.91 per cent of gross sales in 1964 to 1.63 per cent this year. Increased labor and equipment costs were cited as major contributing factors.

*Farm prices, which lagged for 17 years, began to move forward the last two years, and consumer demand exceeded farm supplies.

*National growth and economic development, together with inflationary price rises in all items, were held basically responsible for the long-term upward trend in food prices. Connally found no special legislation or executive action warranted. He pointed out that "A lot of food costs depend on the individual tastes of people and wise shopping on the part of the housewife.'

He suggested \$1,073,535,894 for the total program for the two years, of which \$749,948,061 would be for construction. (The Department asked \$1,081,431,236 -only \$7,895,342 more than Connally recommended. Current budget is \$987,605,621.)

*Doubling the current appropriation for the General Land Office's supervision and regulation of exploration, leasing and development of state -owned land in Gulf of Mexico. (Currently, it is getting \$75,000 and, if Connally's recommendation is adopted, it would get \$150,000, as compared to the

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
