Rain Finally Dents Six-Month Dry Spell

Slaton and area residents welcomed a much-needed rain Sunday -- moisture which ended a six-month stretch with no appreciable amounts recorded.

A light shower added to the tantalizing total Tuesday, and skies were overcast again Wednesday as farmers hoped for more rain. Forecasters gave a 20 percent chance Wednesday. Tuesday was the first day of spring and weathermen said the surprise showers were touched off by a flow of moist Gulf air, raising hopes for a real drought-breaker.

Only small amounts of rain were reported Tuesday, but amounts ranging from showers to at least one-half inch were recorded Sunday, Slaton reported. .50 of an inch as did points close by to the north, east and southeast. A farmer southwest of town reported "just a good shower." Light hail was also reported.

The Sunday rain was accompanied by high winds and some light hail in the area. In other areas to the north, damaging winds were reported along with possible tornado sightings.

Lubbock Weather Bureau reported .31 Sunday, surpassing the entire amount of .28 recorded from Sept. 18 last year to March 18 this year. The rainfall thus made a dent in one of the driest winters in the area's history.

At least an inch of rain was reported around Halls and Crosbyton -- tops in the area. Halls also covered the ground in these areas.

★★★★ INDIAN SIGN: BUMPER CROP

If the signs are right, we're due a bumper crop this year!

According to the ancient Indian art of crop forecasting by the direction of the wind at sunrise March 22, the Slaton area will have a bumper year. The Slatonite checked with E. L. Brosch, who lives five miles southeast of town, Wednesday for his evaluation. Brosch is known for keeping close records on the weather.

"The wind was out of the northeast between 6:30 and 7 this morning and, according to the legend, wind from the east or northeast means a bumper crop," Brosch said.

He added, however, that the wind was out of the southwest on the same date last year. According to the Indian legend, this meant

Phylliss Thomas Shows Champ Steer

A member of the Lubbock County 4-H Club, 16-year-old Phylliss Thomas, exhibited the grand champion steer of the 34th annual South Plains Junior Livestock Show in Lubbock Monday night at Fair Park Coliseum.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Troy Thomas of Rt. 2, Slaton, she is a junior student at Roosevelt High School. She won the coveted honor with a 1,008-pound Hereford named "Pepper".

A loud cheer went up when Dr. Calvin Drake of Kansas State University, who judged the steers, slapped Pepper to designate him as the best of 222 steers brought here for the three-day exposition.

It was the first time in about

six years that a Lubbock County steer has won what is regarded as one of this region's top livestock honors.

The blocky grand champion was bred by Arthel Henson, Tuscola. Phylliss has been feeding beef animals for only about two years. She had shown the steer in three other shows, placing eighth at Odessa, fifth at Fort Worth and eighth at Houston.

Wilson FFA'ers also took high honors at the show. In barrow judging Tuesday, Don Alan Steen showed the champion Duroc, besting an exhibitor from his own chapter, Mandi Lee, who had the reserve winner.

BUS FOR ATHLETIC TEAMS

'Tiger Special' to SHS

"Tiger Special" -- a shiny red and black bus for athletic teams -- was unveiled at Slaton High School Tuesday following a special school assembly just before noon.

It was a dream come true for students and Tiger fans when Tiger Club President Johnnie Moore handed over the keys of the bus to Athletic Director Ernie Davis.

Realization of the project was attributed much to the Tiger Club -- adult boosters of athletics, and to the Slaton Lions Club which assumed the financial obligation. But others--

including the school board and the students themselves, helped make the dream come true.

The school had purchased the government surplus bus some time back, but not enough funds were available to renovate the vehicle and put it in operation. The Tiger Club didn't want to wait, and neither did the Lions, so the drive was launched.

In the special assembly Tuesday, Moore pointed out that the project was accomplished because "adults wanted to be a part of the fine spirit emerging at Slaton High." Davis ex-

pressed appreciation of the coaches and students for the support of the boosters.

About 15 Tiger Club and Lions Club members went to Lubbock Tuesday morning to pick up the bus and ride it back to Slaton. Students flocked to the auditorium and went outside to view the bus following the assembly.

The bus is a bright red, trimmed in black, and has huge Tigers stretching across each side. Bill Ball created the original Tigers which were transposed onto the bus. On the front of the vehicle are the words "Tiger Special".



Sketches Given on 6 Trustee Candidates

With none of the incumbents seeking re-election, three new faces will be selected as trustees for Slaton Independent School District in the upcoming April 1 election.

Six men have placed their names on the ballot, and the three top voter getters will be named to the board by school district voters.

The men, in order of filing, are: Ted Swanner, Jack Clark, Don Sikes, Pete Williams, Calvin Lamb, Dr. M. Jay McSween. Absentee voting is already underway and will continue to

TED SWANNER
A native of Slaton, Swanner is a graduate of Slaton High and of New Mexico Military Institute. He also attended Texas Tech and served in the Navy during World War II. He is manager of W. B. Hestand Grocery Co. in Slaton.

Swanner and his wife, the former Mary Evelyn Cook, have one daughter, Lynn, 13. This is his first time to seek office. He formerly served in various capacities in the Chamber of Commerce and the Jaycees.

JACK CLARK
A rural mail carrier, Clark was almost a native of Slaton. He was six months old when his family moved to Slaton, and he's been a resident ever since. He and his wife, Jo Ann, have three daughters and a son. His wife is the former Jo Ann

Tefertiller. One daughter is married, while Cheryl is a senior and Jackie a sophomore in high school. Brad is a first grader. Clark is a member of the First Baptist Church, and is a Army veteran, serving in the South Pacific during World War II. He served one term on the school board about 15 years ago.

DCN SIKES
A native of Slaton, Sikes is also a graduate of Slaton High School. He is associated with Deal's Machine Shop and active

in Church of Christ activities. He attended Texas Tech.

Sikes and his wife, the former Eva Williams of Southland, have three children -- Donna, 9, Debbie, 8, and Deana, 5. He makes the following statement: "Without itemizing the many complaints of one who would be against everything and without offering the many 'back pats' of one who is completely satisfied, I would like to place my name before the voters of our school district. I can offer only my integrity, my reputation of being a hard worker, and a sincere desire to serve as a member of your school board. If elected, I will do my utmost to be an asset to this school system that so greatly effects each of our lives--yours, mine and our children."

PETE WILLIAMS
A native of Slaton, Pete Williams is a car salesman with Smith Ford, Inc. He is a graduate of Slaton High and attended West Texas State one year before going to the Army, where he was a combat engineer in the Korean war. He is a Methodist.

He and his wife, the former Jo Ann Havens, have two children -- Chris, a 4th grader, and Regina, a 2nd grader. Williams is a longtime volunteer fireman and serves on the Slaton

Youth Council advisory board. This is his first time to seek office and Williams states: "I am very interested in the overall school system, including a

Pair Charged In Death Here

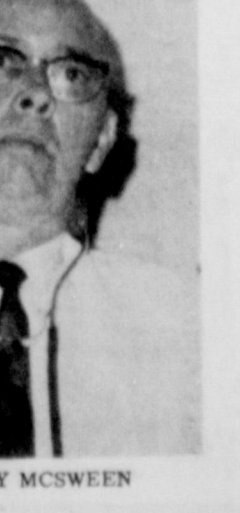

The defendants remained in county jail in lieu of \$7,500 bond each, set by Justice of the Peace F. R. Land.

Recipe Of The Week

With the Easter season here, and the possibility of Easter egg hunt parties, two recipes are being shared with us this week that would be good to serve at such an occasion.

Mrs. Joe H. Baker, 935 W. Crosby, won ribbons at the Panhandle South Plains Fair last year on the cookies and third place on the muffins.

Mrs. Baker enjoys sewing and cooking, but with a new baby in the family, most of her time is spent caring for the three children, William, 5, Melanie, 3, and Stephanie, 5 weeks old. Her husband is secretary to the superintendent of the Slaton division of Santa Fe Railway.

The bakers attend the First Methodist Church where she teaches a class in the kindergarten department; she is a member of the Women's Society of Christian Service and president of the Cuba Circle; is vice - president of the Slaton Home Demonstration Club and is past 4-H leader in foods and clothing.

Following are her prize-winning recipes:

LEMON REFRIGERATOR COOKIES
(This crisp cookie recipe makes seven dozen cookies)

1 cup soft margarine
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
2 to 3 Tablespoons lemon juice
1 egg
4 cups sifted flour
1/4 teaspoon soda
1 Tablespoon lemon peel
1/2 cup finely chopped nuts

Cream margarine and sugar together. Add lemon juice and egg. Beat well. Sift flour and

soda together and add to mixture. Add lemon peel and nuts. Mix until blended. Shape into four rolls and wrap in foil, chill until firm. Cut chilled rolls into 1/8 inch slices. Place on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 400 degrees for nine minutes or until lightly browned.

LOVELIGHT YELLOW CHIFFON CUP CAKES

Prepare muffin tins by greasing or putting in paper liners. Sift together in bowl:

2-1/4 cups cake flour
1 cup sugar
3 tablespoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
Add:

1/3 cup cooking oil or soft butter
1/2 cup milk
1-1/2 teaspoon flavoring
Beat one minute
Add:

1/2 cup milk
2 egg yolks
Beat one minute more.
Fold in very stiff meringue of 2 egg whites and 1/2 cup sugar. Pour in prepared muffin tins and bake at 400 degrees for 18 to 20 minutes or until tests done.

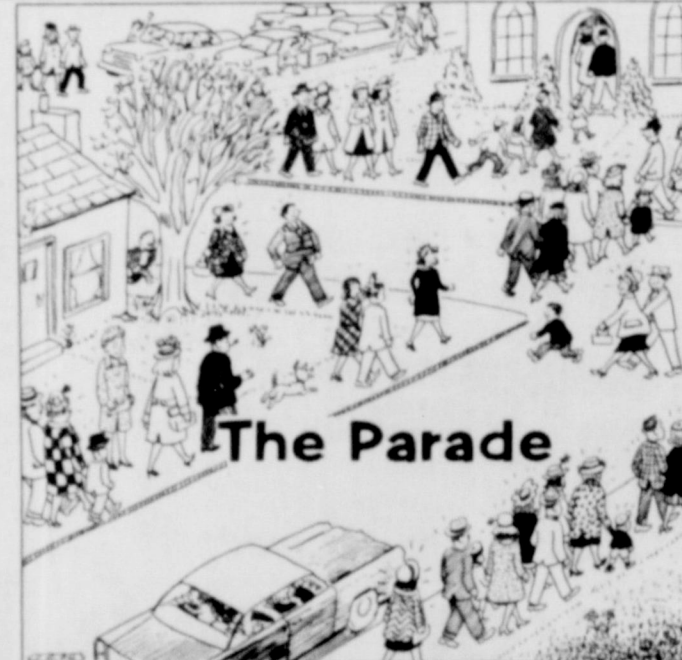

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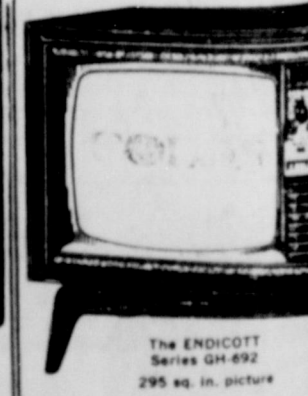
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Pattersons To Visit Son In Germany

'Independent Sector' Cited By Kay at Rotary Club Meet

The importance of the "independent sector" was the topic for Dr. C. L. Kay, assistant president of Lubbock Christian College, when he spoke to Slaton Rotarians last Thursday in the Clubhouse. Dr. Kay's explanation and evaluation of the independent sector amounted to the importance of "people doing what they want to do."

The work of the "private sector", Dr. Kay said, ranged from helping your neighbor to being the driving force behind a large community project. Dr. Kay pointed out that the "independent sector" raised \$2.5 million in Lubbock last year for worthwhile causes. Then, he proceeded to outline some things the independent sector had done in Slaton.

"Add them all up and you'll see there are many people in Slaton doing things just because they want to," he emphasized.

These included: building a golf course (with special recognition to 20 backers and Carl Lewis); Operation Yuletide, a community program to aid the needy at Christmas; the academic sweater awards sponsored by Daughters of the Pioneer Study Club; Lions Club projects -- from eye glasses for needy children to helping renovate an athletic bus for the school; the P-TA projects to aid the schools; the

Garden Club work, including taking on a triangle park on Division; the American Legion --Boys State, baseball and other fine programs; the VFW with its flag project and other programs; The Hospital Auxiliary, providing extra services for the hospital; the Hospital Advisory Board; the Federated Church Women and their welfare clothing program; the Ministerial Alliance, help for transients; formation of the new Youth Center (with special recognition to Lucille Ayers); Slaton Chamber of Commerce

for its parks and recreation projects; Rotary Club, with special mention for the Teacher Appreciation Banquet; Little League and Babe Ruth baseball, with special mention to managers and volunteer workers, and fund drives for organizations and charities -- carried on by people who care. "This, gentlemen, is the American dream ... the independent sector at work," Dr. Kay concluded. Howard Hoffman introduced the speaker. Max Arrants was a special guest at the meeting.

The Tigers, under Coach Kenneth Housden, finished third in the district race. Slaton upset Stanton in the final game to break and tie between Post and Stanton for the title.

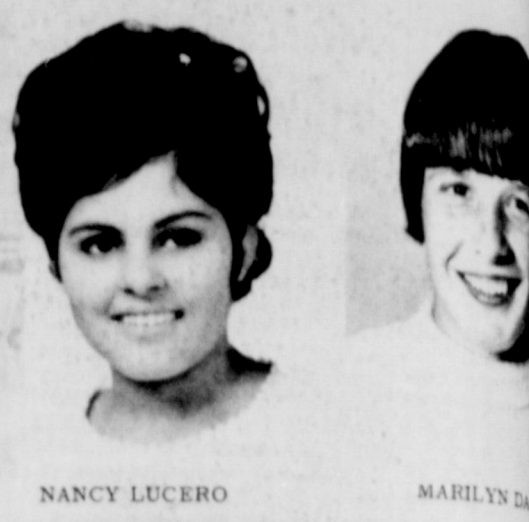
TIGERS 5TH IN TRACK MEET
