TRAGIC MISHAP CLAIMS 8TH GRADERS

Two Youths Die After City Crash

A joyous moment of life ended in tragedy here Friday night when two eighth-grade students were fatally injured in a grinding two-car collision at 15th and Division streets.

Dead are Edith Lynn Swanner, 14, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ted Swanner, and Joe Harlan, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sammie Harlan, all of Slaton.

The two teenagers were reported enroute home from an eighth-grade graduation party when the accident occurred. Miss Swanner died Saturday afternoon in Methodist Hospital at Lubbock. Harlan, the driver, died Sunday of injuries from the accident. He had also been taken to Methodist Hospital. Driver of the other car involved in the mishap was Douglas McCullough, 19, of Slaton. He was given emergency treatment and released from Mercy Hospital.

The traffic fatalities were the second and third in Slaton within a week.

The tragic accident stunned the community. Two school functions--a band concert and an open house at the new gym--were postponed until next week. Babe Ruth league baseball games were cancelled Monday and Tuesday nights, since Harlan was a member of one of the teams. The flag flew at half-mast in Little League Park for the former player.

Police records show the accident was reported at 11:54 p.m. Friday. The McCullough car was headed west on Division, and the Harlan vehicle was traveling south on 15th. The Harlan car was hit broadside on the driver's side, and after the impact, came to rest on the driver's side. Both youths were seen in the wreckage.

Both vehicles were heavily damaged. Police reports showed damage estimates at \$1,800 on the McCullough car and \$2,200 on the Harlan vehicle.

No charges had been filed in the accident, a check revealed Wednesday morning.

Lynn Swanner Rites Monday

Funeral services for Edith Lynn Swanner, 14, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ted Swanner, 900 S. 19th, were conducted here Monday afternoon in the First Methodist Church.

Miss Swanner, an eighth-grade student, died at 5:25 p.m. Saturday in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital of injuries suffered in a two-car collision Friday night in Slaton.

Officiating funeral services at the packed church was the Rev. Rollo Davidson of Phillips, assisted by the Rev. David Binkley, pastor. Burial was in Englewood Cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Miss Swanner was born in Slaton April 19, 1953. She was a member of Slaton Junior High Band and also played basketball.

She had won numerous twirling awards as a member of the Matador Twirling Club and was scheduled to accompany them to Mississippi this summer for a national contest. She was a member of the First Methodist Church here.

Survivors include her parents; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Cook and Mr. and Mrs. Howard Swanner; and a great-grandmother, Mrs. F.A. Cuyus, all of Slaton.

Harlan Service Held Tuesday

Last rites for Joe Harlan, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sammie Harlan, 1010 Hockley, were held Tuesday at 4 p.m. in the First Methodist Church of Slaton.

A student at Slaton Junior High, Harlan died Sunday in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital of injuries sustained in a Friday night two-car accident in Slaton.

Officiating funeral services for the youth was Rev. Jerry Young, Church of God pastor, assisted by the Rev. Bruce Coker, former pastor. Burial was in Englewood Cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Harlan was a member of the Church of God. He was a stand-out football and track athlete in junior high, and was currently a member of the Comet baseball team in Babe Ruth League.

He was also a former Little League player and was on the all-star team as a 12-year-old. He was born in Midland Sept. 25, 1951 and started to school in Slaton as a third grader. Harlan is survived by his parents; a brother, Steve; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Mitchell of Weatherford and Mrs. Sam Harlan of Monday.

Permits Climb In March, April

Building permits for the first four months of 1967 have climbed to a value of \$133,801.

April's total was \$47,351 with the major portions of the new residential structures. Both permits were issued to Slaton Lumber -- one for an estimated \$24,500 for a house at 800 S. 23rd, and the other for the First Christian Church parsonage for \$19,300 on 22nd street.

March is the "big" month this year with permits totaling \$77,850. Permit for a Shamrock station at US-84 and Cemetery Road was estimated at \$50,000. Accounting for most of the remainder was a residence for Lois Rogers at 1505 W. Crosby in the amount of \$25,000.

Permits totaled only \$8,600 for January and March. The four-month total is slightly behind last year's figure. Through April of 1966, permits had totaled \$182,248.

Police Record Accidents, Make Several Arrests

Two women were treated at a doctor's office following a collision at 13th and Powers at 9:55 a.m. Friday. Ollie Wright, 61, driver of one car, and a passenger, Dorothy Price, were injured. Driver of the other car was Marvin Tate Fondy, 15. Damage was estimated at \$350 to the Wright vehicle and \$450 on the Fondy car.

Police checked one prowler report, arrested two for investigation of false reports, three for drunkenness, two for possession of alcoholic beverages by minors, one for making alcoholic beverages available to minors, one for a liquor law curfew violation, and two for other police departments.

TAX HIKE COMING School Revenue Needs Outlined

Following a decision of the Slaton School Board last week to increase taxes in the district, Supr. Lee Vardy explained some of the factors which made the action necessary.

Trustees approved a temporary increase the next school term, and a professional re-

evaluation as the permanent solution.

Following is an explanation by Dr. Vardy of the school's minimum foundation program and some of the factors which cause an imperative need for more revenue:

"The Minimum Foundation Program of Texas provides funds for the operation of most of the schools of Texas. Slaton Schools are one of the many schools that participate in this program. This fund is provided for the various school districts through a legislative formula. This formula provides that the school district pay a certain amount of money toward its own support.

"In the case of our school, the state statute provides that Slaton furnish \$92,000 from local taxes for the support of its school. The amount of money is based upon three factors: 1. Assessed evaluation of county, weighed by 20. 2. The scholastic enumeration of the county, weighed by 8. 3. Income for the county listed as follows: Agricultural products, mineral products, payrolls, and manufacture products weighed by 72.

"Hence, it is easily seen that county income and assessed evaluation of the county are the major determining factors in establishing a fixed amount for each school district to provide. The local assessment has been increased from \$23,000 in 1950 to the \$92,000 in 1966-67.

"These sources of money, State and local, will pay the salaries of the teachers and \$43,000 of operation costs. Since it is essential that Slaton Schools be competitive in the area of physical education, athletic programs, band programs, and some vocational programs, additional allotment of money is provided to pay salaries above state schedule.

"These people are required to devote much additional time to the services rendered the Slaton Public Schools. Such as, before and after school work out for band and athletic programs and a continuous demand

of time before and after school for vocational agriculture programs. The \$43,000 allotted for operation is insufficient to provide all of the other necessary services demanded for a school such as ours. These include four bus drivers, six custodians, one maintenance person, custodial supplies, upkeep of buildings, operation of a transportation system, teaching supplies, library books, audio - visual materials, expenses for vocational people, and insurance.

"However, \$43,000 is not sufficient money to provide for all these services. As an illustration, it takes \$30,000 a year to provide utilities, custodians, custodial supplies; it takes the remaining \$13,000 to operate our transportation system. Therefore in addition to the \$43,000 allotment, the Slaton Schools must provide money for additional teacher salaries, maintenance supplies, audio-visual supplies, insurance, upkeep and maintenance, and expenses of the tax office.

"From the records of the Texas Education Agency it is found that the operation of Slaton Schools is lower than any other school of comparative size on the south plains.

"For the past several years all costs have risen and this same increase in prices of products and services has had its impact on the Slaton Schools. As these costs have risen the Slaton Schools has attempted to absorb as much as it possibly could without any change in its financial structure.

"Finally, this continuous rise call for an increase in revenues to take care of the schools' operations.

Lubbock Postmaster Speaks to Rotarians

Earnest Ohnemus, postmaster at Lubbock, was guest speaker for the regular weekly luncheon meeting of Slaton Rotary Club last Thursday at the Clubhouse.

Ohnemus outlined some of the problems of the postal department, gave some statistics on local and national mailings, and predicted some of the developments to come in mail service.

The post office department is the largest non-profit organization in the world, pointed out the postmaster. It has a budget of \$120 billion a year, and there are 33,000 post offices in the United States.

Ohnemus said smaller post offices are being eliminated, as well as rural routes. He said "combination stops" are

the coming thing, with a carrier handling some 100 patrons at one stop in a rural area.

The postmaster revealed that 39 percent of the nation's postmasters are women. He also said the department employed 95,000 Negroes, or 20 percent of the total workers in the department.

Ohnemus expects a rate increase soon, predicts all carriers will eventually be on wheels, and that politics will be removed from the department. Turnover of personnel is a major problem in the postal service, he added.

The Lubbock postmaster was introduced by Rotarian Rush Wheeler, Slaton postmaster. Several visitors were introduced at the club meeting.

Social Security Facts Given

Recently a man who was earning \$2400 per year reached age 65 and filed a claim with the Social Security Administration so that he could establish his entitlement to medicare.

He had no intention of retiring because he enjoyed his work and felt he had many good years left.

Consequently, he was surprised when he started receiving social security checks about the middle of the year.

What he did not realize was that he did not lose all of his social security checks because his earnings were over \$1500 per year.

The law provides that one dollar for every two dollars earned between \$1500 and \$2700 is deducted for the total social security payable each year. An additional one dollar for every dollar earned is deducted for any earnings over \$2700.

Thus, the man who earned \$2400 would have only \$450 deducted from the total social security benefits payable to him for the year.

Even if a person's earnings exceed the limit for possible payment for the year, he can still draw a check for any month he does not earn more than \$125 or, if self-employed, does not render substantial services in a business.

Vegetable Variations

Backed acorn squash halves are popular. Try serving them with cooked sausage balls in the center and glazed apple slices as a fruit garnish. The apple slices may be tinted with cinnamon candies cooked in the syrup.

Carrot circles and cauliflowerettes make a pretty vegetable combo. Cook them separately, serve together.

Serve a vegetable plate with color in mind: breaded, sauteed eggplant slices, broiled tomatoes, cooked broccoli spears and creamed potatoes.

When you want to get fancy, bake spinach souffle in a well-buttered ring mold. Serve with creamed mushrooms in the center.

Make vegetable kabobs to put around the meat platter: thread small artichoke hearts with tomato sections, brush with butter and broil for 6 to 8 minutes.

Sweet potatoes, cut in pieces, pineapple chunks and pecans with brown sugar make a wonderful casserole.

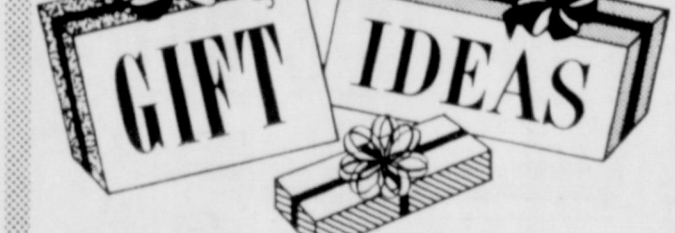

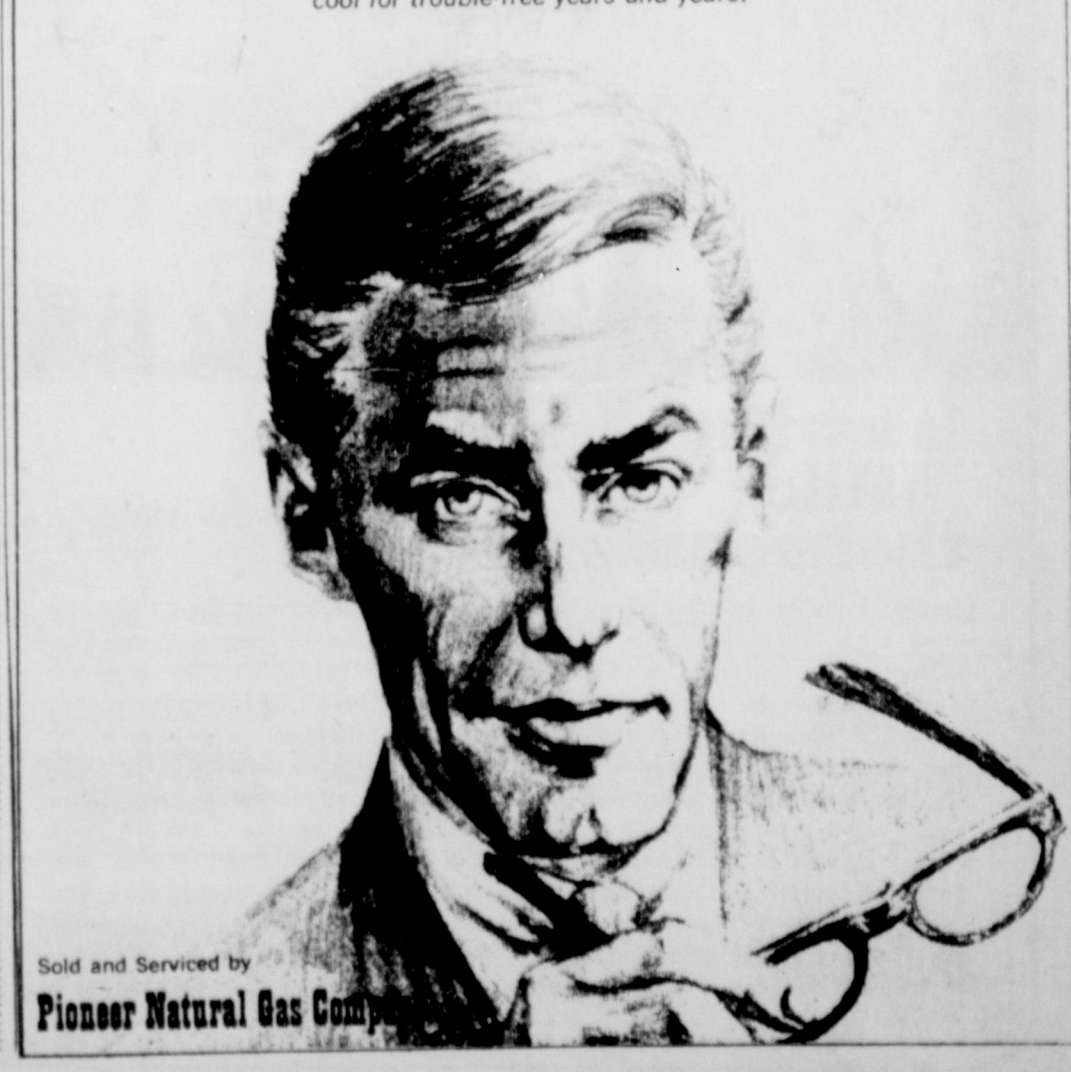

Figures Show 1 of 8 Snore While Sleeping

About one out of eight Americans snore.

This means something like 25 million snorers, women as often as men.

The comic literature about snoring is endless. Plays, movies, vaudeville skits and comics in general have poked fun at snoring down through the years.

There's a good chance that there's a snorer in your family. If so, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association, you are well aware that it's not very funny.

The assorted hisses, gurgles, buzzes, snorts and raspings of the snoring nuisance hold the seeds for the ruination of an ostensibly happy marriage. Many married couples find it necessary to set up a schedule wherein one spouse tries to precede the other in sleep.

Other couples proceed to separate rooms and possibly even the divorce courts.

For the most part snoring is generated while breathing either in or out during sleep by several structures in the nose and throat. The sounds are due to vibrations in the soft palate and other soft structures of the throat in response to inflowing and outflowing air.

The frequency of the vibrations depends on the size, density and elasticity of the affected tissues and on the force of the air flow.

A number of causes of snoring can be helped and even cured. Most cases of snoring in children are cured by removal of enlarged adenoids and tonsils. A blocked nose may lead to mouth breathing and snoring. Sometimes this can be corrected by minor surgery.

If snoring is caused by nasal congestion due to the common cold, sinus trouble or hay fever, nose drops or antihistamines sometimes can bring relief to the sufferer and may stop snoring.

Many people snore only when sleeping on the back. Any method that keeps the sleeper on his side or face can help.

There are factors that may affect the tone of the tissues of the throat and result in snoring. These include too much smoking, overwork, fatigue, obesity and general poor health.

The largest group of offenders are the elderly, presumably because they lack tissue tone.

If there is a snorer in your family who is disrupting the sleep of others, send him to the family physician. If there is a definite cause - and effect relationship, possibly something can be done about it. If your doctor cannot help, the listener can wear earplugs, when everything else fails.

One of the prime topics of discussion in cotton circles today, from producers through the textile industry, is the possible need for increased cotton production in 1968.

The subject is slated for its first formal treatment by producers on May 23 when American Cotton Producers Associates meet in Washington. ACPA is made up of representatives from virtually all of the nation's regional and state cotton producer associations, including Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

Shippers, mills and some producers began calling on the Department of Agriculture to permit additional production in 1967, basing the need on a possible shortage of good quality cotton stapling 1-1/16 inches or longer.

The stock of such cottons in Commodity Credit Corporation is just about gone and those advocating increased acreage for 1968 contend that privately held stocks plus 1967 production will be inadequate to meet market demands.

V. A. Maudr, president of the Houston Cotton Exchange, said last month "The surplus of longer staple cotton is desirable micronaire is now nearly exhausted and we are faced with an extremely serious problem for this coming season.... Not only shall we not have enough desirable cotton for our domestic mills but also for export to our traditional customers...."

"These markets will turn to the foreign growths because the prices of American cotton will be prohibitive due to the fact that our domestic mills will be forced to pay such high prices in order to secure the needed quantities out of the very small crop."

USDA staff economist Frank Lowenstein views the situation in a slightly different light. Speaking to the Cotton Buyers Division of the South Carolina Textile Manufacturers Association about two weeks ago, he said "During the 1966-67 season we estimate that about 39 per cent of our supply will be 1-1/16 inches and longer. This is the smallest proportion of the supply in these staple lengths since 1958 and represents about 10.2 million bales."

After stating that the 1966-67 supply of shorter staples, under one inch, was about 32.6 per cent of the total, or 8.5 million bales, he said "These proportions are significant, but they do not spell a shortage for the longer cotton during the current season. We expect the carryover of cotton which is 1-1/16 inches and longer to be well over 2 million bales on August 1, 1967, but CCC will own little of this cotton."

Lowenstein went on to say that the proportion of longer staple cotton in the 1967 crop is expected to be greater, and that together with the carryover should "provide a sufficient supply of cotton 1-1/16 inches and longer."

Even so, at the conclusion of his address he conceded that the 1968 cotton program would likely be modified. "If developments next season (consumption developments) are as good as in the current season, a larger cotton crop and more acreage may be needed in 1968," he said.

Producers naturally favor acreage and production increases if they can be had without disrupting the anticipated benefits from declining surplus

stocks. So their greatest concern is that the method or methods used to achieve an increase be one which will not adversely affect income, if and when such an increase is found desirable.

Under the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965, there are various routes USDA could take. It is generally accepted that an administrative revision of the rules to permit skip-row planting without penalty would bring about a larger crop as well as an improvement of overall quality, and some observers feel such a change is definitely coming.

Reducing the current 12.5 per cent of allotments which producers are required to divert in order to participate in the program might also lead to greater planted acreage. But there would be no guarantee of increased plantings unless this move were coupled with a reduction in the payment for diverted acreage to make them economically attractive.

Another method which has been mentioned would be reducing the payment rate on only that acreage, between the minimum 12.5 per cent and the maximum 35 per cent, which producers may voluntarily divert. This would be a substantial blow to producer income and many believe would create serious administrative problems.

The law requires that payments on mandatory diversion be at least 25 per cent of parity, which this year comes to 10.78 cents per pound times projected yield. On acreage voluntarily diverted, the Secretary may set the payment rate anywhere between zero and 40 per cent of parity.

It is considered possible, but not very likely in view of the language of the law, that the domestic allotment percentage, now 65 per cent of total allotments, could be raised. In effect this would reduce the maximum permissible diversion with payment. But it is difficult to see just how the Secretary would justify such a change under the formula he has been given. 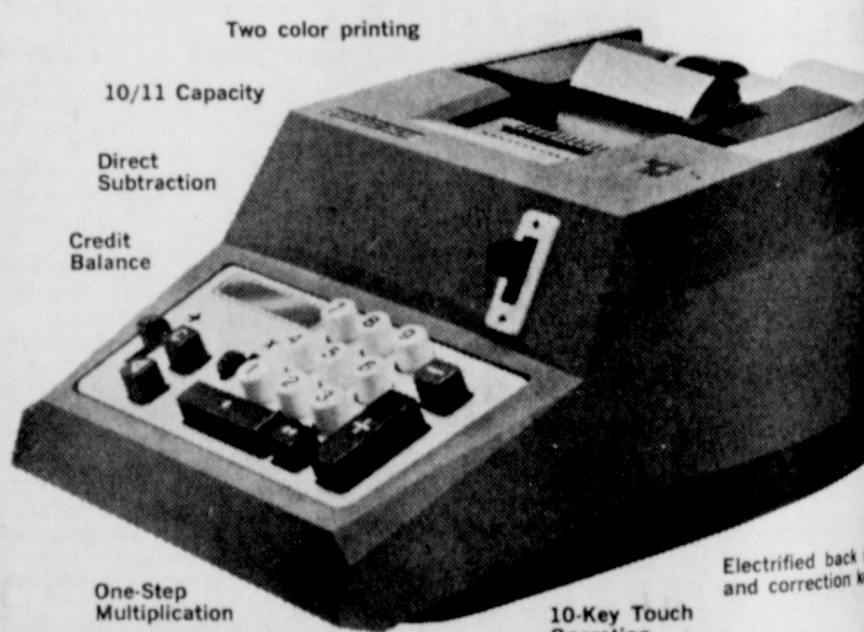

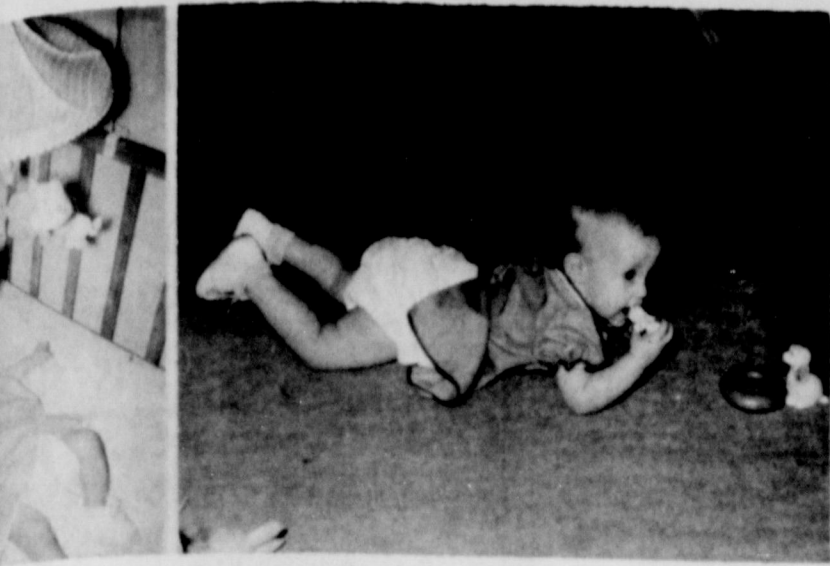

Consideration Needed In Selection of Toys

ject over his head -- he's learning to use his hands. Now, he is ready for the traditional rattle and small squeaky rubber toys. Parents must learn to look for their child's progress; a mobile is of no use to the baby who is eager to grasp things.

Once a baby learns the art of holding an object, then it is "look out Mom, here I come!" From now on the process will be -- from hand to mouth, from hand to hand. At this time a mother needs to take extreme caution in selecting toys for her baby.

The baby needs toys that are lightweight, washable, too large to be swallowed, and free from sharp corners, points, or rough edges. Examine the eyes of stuffed animals to make sure they are firmly sewn; a baby's toy should have no parts that can come loose and be put into the mouth. And also, take care to notice that painted toys are labeled non-toxic. Of course, a baby's toy should never be of breakable material, especially glass, nor should it be made of cellulose, which is highly flammable.

Hard plastic toys should never be given to small children; plastic can not be detected by x-ray, therefore a choking baby usually dies before the doctor can discover what the child has swallowed. Dr. Spock suggests that the metal whistles be removed from rubber toys, to lessen the danger of being swallowed.

What are the best toys for the infant? It is best to always include a string of large, brightly colored beads, wooden or rubber blocks, nested boxes

and cups, floating bath toys, and squeeze toys. And as soon as the baby reaches the climbing and walking stage, he is ready for simple takeapart toys, push-pull toys, small light wagons, and simple musical toys. Put a child into action by supplying him the "gas" he needs to get himself propelled!

Of course, there is one toy which should never be absent from an infant's toy box: the stuffed animal. Psychologists agree that a stuffed toy has no educational merit, but it does have great value when it gives a child emotional security. They are especially useful in bed at night, for they provide the sense of security needed as a prelude to sleep.

Parents will find it beneficial to keep all other toys out of a baby's bed. How else will he know that a bed is for sleeping and not for playing? Parents surround a baby's bed with toys during the day to keep him occupied, and then become irritated when the baby refuses to go to sleep in the vacant crib at night.

Children are born with a drive to understand the world around him; he uses his senses -- touch, sight, and hearing. The potential development is present in every normal baby, but the development must be stimulated by adults. As a parent, one must learn to find ways to develop all of the baby's senses.

Find things he can feel, see, hear, smell, even taste. Look for the stages of development -- when a baby finds his hands, put something in them to keep his mind growing! You won't be sorry you did!
