## - Clarification -

#### -Editorial Explanation-

Several telephone calls and personal visits of parents Tefertiller and Dowe Winches and merchants to the Slatonite this week revealed a situation wherein some supply lists distributed by the Slaton schools informed parents and students of merchandise needed for classroom use. The unusual aspect of this otherwise accepted service was that at least one of these lists specified a particular firm where some of the goods could be found.

Immediate investigation brought this statement from Dr. Lee Vardy, superintendent of schools:

"Due to an inadvertant error, one grade area in one of Nowlin. our schools suggested that two items that the individual student should purchase could be bought at one of our local merchants. When this situation was known, the teachers involved were asked to call all parents concerned, stating that these supplies could be purchased at any store that sells school supplies.

"It is not the policy of the Slaton school system to designate any specific store or place where school sup-plies should be bought.

"We apologize for this unfortunate error."

The Slatonite appreciates this clarification and attitude of Dr. Vardy. We agree with him that the incident was unfortunate and that the public has the right to buy where they choose.

Merchants of Slaton, as in most towns, are depended upon for contributions, for all-out support of local schools, churches and civic activities. We note with pride that Slaton businessmen go "all out" on most worthwhile projects, in the meantime trying to find time to improve their own business, studying methods of better service and consequently protecting the legitimate profit factor to which they are entitled. Neither are they to be overlooked as taxpayers, contributing to schools and community.

And we are glad that our school leadership, as outlined in the statement above, recognizes the teacher and school responsibility to the merchant.

We are confident no sinister intent was involved in the muchtalked of incident reported herein. The breach of ethics was rectified in the only manner we know possible, and was speedily attended to by school officials. Several local business firms have spent hundreds of dollars in stocking school supplies, all this at their own risk, without guarantee of anyone asking for their wares; certainly this risk never should be compounded with interference of any school-connected censor.

Coincidentally, just as we were gathering facts on the thorough local police action last week, we received a letter from J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation with the above quote carried therein.

"Effective law enforcement is not a commodity for political bartering; nor can it be achieved with cut-rate financial support. . .certainly, salary is hardly an inducement to a career in law enforcement.

There is no quick formula for gaining experience in police work, and few departments can afford to lose seasoned veterans to better paying jobs."

The good law officer has been elevated in recent years to professional status, thanks in large part to the example set by the FBI organization headed by Mr. Hoover, proven to be decidedly dedicated to his work and the edification of his profession. Phenominal progress has been made during the 30-year life of the FBI.

And we think local law enforcement groups are due the proper recognition and plaudits of the community. Their accomplishments are a matter of record; their diligence is evident to even the casual observer.

But we'll hazard the observation that the law enforcement bodies of any town are only as good, only as honest, only as effective as the town desires. The final responsibility lies on the citizenship for a progressive attitude conducive to integrity and performance in every sector of government. For this reason, we believe Slaton residents, too, merit a salute.



#### ARE WE IDIOTIC SHEEP?

The government, on occasion, must investigate. The government, on occasion, must regulate.

This is a duty of government, in pursuing ways and means to advance the public interest. But, if some officials have their way, investigation and regulation and other such weapons will become, so to speak, a way of life for government, and an end in themselves.

An officer of a leading American chain store company observes that some of our leaders "seem to be of the opinion that we retailers sell hazardous, dangerous food products; that the government must give consumers information to make them more competent shoppers; that Federal intervention is required in consumer credit; that retailers and their suppliers use deliberately deceitful packages to cheat the public and that everything can be solved by more and bigger government."

In other words, the idea is that retailing (and all other business, too) is chock-a-block full of crooks, that consumers are, in large part, just idiotic sheep, and that it's up to Big Brother to call the tune.

Well, that would be the way to bring about a stultified economy, in which every decision of any consequence was made by some bureaucrat with a handbook --- and in which freedom of choice and freedom of initiative would be meaningless phrases. -Bay City Tribune


From Human Events magazine: "In an address in India, Ambassador John Kenneth Galbraith, former Harvard economics professor boasted that already one-fifth of the American economy is planned by the government. He said that if we take into consideration all current resources 'fully controlled and disposed of by the state, about 20 per cent of the American economy is planned.' Ambassador Galbraith pointed out that, as the comparable figure for India was only 13 to 14 per cent, 'the market economy of the United States has a larger public sector than the Socialist economy of India.' Translated, that means that now we're even more Socialistic than Socialist India.
