Dr. Ray's remarks were concerned primarily with growing long staple varieties of cotton such as Acala and Del Cerro, He reviewed the aspects in growth of the cotton plant, emphasizing the fiber maturity and thickening factors.

"Generally speaking," said Dr. Ray, "good production practices you have been using are also good with long staple varieties."

He then outlined some important factors in planting, fertility, watering, and harvesting. Planting good seed is important, but the use of long staple varieties puts even more of a "premium on good seed", he added.

Talking about the time for planting, Dr. Ray remarked that "it may be too late for me to talk to some of you." He pointed out that the area's soil temperature had already reached the 60-degree mark generally accepted as okay for planting.

He added that he saw no need in hurrying when the temperature reached the point this early. Dr. Ray favored" waiting out" the weather for a short time. In general, he said long staples require more space than other varieties. "You need a good, uniform stand, of course, but shouldn't over crowd the plants," he added.

On the point of fertility, Dr. Ray said a good balanced program was needed, regardless of the type cotton planted, Water, he said, can be the most imment of quality fiber.

He showed charts on the use of irrigation water and optimum times to water the cotton. On Acala and Del Cerro, he advised farmers to hold off on watering until the white blooms appear, He also said farmers should consider alternate - row irrigation, especially on the first watering. In connection with this, Dr. Ray said that Acala responds well to skip - row

patterns of planting, also. Dr. Ray cautioned farmers to "be careful" with harvest aid chemicals. "If you kill the plants too soon, it will stop the growth of maturity in the fiber." He said it was his opinion that this area is a "once-over" harvest country.



Taxpayers who keep good records are less likely to overlook deductions to which they are entitled, says Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue in northern

Those who itemize their deductions on page 2, Form 1040, should keep cancelled checks, receipts, statements and other data to support them.

One way to keep records is to get a supply of large envelopes or folders, label them according to the types of income and deductions you have, and accumulate the information, Mr. Campbell said.

Area figures were compiled by PCG from figures released by the State Agricultural Stablization and Conservation Service Office at College Station. The sign-up period for the 1967 cotton program extended through March 17.

Of the total acreage available for planting in the area, producers indicated they would divert 750,846 acres to conservation uses. This is 34.4 enrolled in the program, and compares with a 32.7 per cent rate of diversion in 1966.

Accounting for most of the 17,678 acres not enrolled in the 1967 program are allotments signed up in the Cropland Reserve or Cropland Adjustment Program, but there are also some small acreages which producers simply didn't bother to enroll and probably won't bother to plant.

Original cotton allotments on the Plains in 1967 totaled 2,-165,872 acres. The additional 036 acres in the total "available for planting" came to the Plains through purchases or leases of allotments or from

With this economic incentive almost every county on the Plains this year will come close to diverting the maximum 35 per cent. The low level of diversion in Deaf Smith County is probably accounted for by the large number of allotments below ten acres in that county. 
