City Studies Access Road On Bypass, Rejects Sewer Bids

Bids were received on Slaton's proposed sewer project; Bill Jenkins discussed business development of the Slaton South Subdivision; a dump truck was bought; a quick claim deed was granted; an offer to destroy the old drive - in theater was accepted; and action was taken during the Monday night Slaton City Commission meeting to employ an Austin law firm to collect delinquent city taxes.

Contracts were not awarded Monday night due to unexpected increases in the cost of the sewer project. The Commissioners agreed to study several cost-cutting measures before continuing discussion at a special meeting to be called within the next two weeks.

Low bid for the project was Hemphill Construction Company of Lubbock with a bid of \$39,284.70. The bid included an additional city project in east Slaton that was bid at \$5,473.70.

The commissioners originally expected costs to be near the available city funds of \$31,000, earmarked for the sewer project.

Commissioners hope to acquire a 20 by 20 foot plot of land on S. 9th St. The city could save \$3,500 in additional pipeline provided the small piece of property is available for a sewerage lift station.

In other major business coming before the Commission, Bill Jenkins asked that the city of Slaton request the state to build an access road from FM-400 to FM-41.

Jenkins, planning extensive business developments in the area, explained that land development could not begin until the state had assured completion of the access road along the US-84 bypass.

Among projects Jenkins plans are a \$100,000 truckstop complex and a 32-unit motel. Bennett Reeves, city engineer, pointed out to Commissioners that the service road will be needed when the proposed elementary school is built in the area.

Reeves considered the request a good move for future needs and for present Slaton business development. It was agreed to request the state to complete the frontage road from FM-400 to FM-41.

Manuel Hernandez of Slaton came before the Commission to discuss grievances with the police department. No action was taken by the group after the hearing.

During the meeting the commissioners moved to purchase a 1963 dump truck from Smith Ford, Inc. The city already owns two older dump trucks. City Administrator Buford Duff, absent from the meeting while attending a convention in South Texas, recommended the Commission buy the used truck.

He noted future needs of the sewer and sanitation department and the cemetery department. Duff said that buying the truck would delay further purchases for the departments for several years.

It was agreed that the truck would be purchased for \$1,395. The cemetery department has agreed to take the older truck and pay \$900 on the 1963. The water and sewer department will pay the balance.

Onas Ray appealed to the City Commission to grant him a quick claim deed to one foot of property in the alley and one foot of street property. Two sides of his garage rest on the one foot strips.

The quick claim deed is necessary for a clear title and sale of the property. Commissioners agreed to grant the quick claim deed provided Ray pay legal expenses involved.

Cecil Scott's offer to demolish and clean up the drive-in theater property was accepted by the Commissioners. Scott will clean away debris for the salvage value of the movie screen.

Following a recommendation by Duff, the commissioners acted to employ the Austin law firm of Huey and McCreary to handle the city's delinquent tax matters.

Final business of the evening authorized City Secretary Gerald Kendrick to transfer \$10,000 of the water and sewer funds to the general fund.

City Receives Portrait

A portrait of Q. L. Slaton, the man from whom the city of Slaton took its name, was formally presented to the community Saturday afternoon by Mr. and Mrs. Q. L. Slaton III.

The painting of Mr. Slaton, who died Feb. 7, 1946, was accepted for the city by Wayne Cooper, Slaton Chamber of Commerce manager, and by City Commissioners Jack Smith and Earl Reasoner, Mayor Jonas Cain was out of town.

Mr. Slaton's portrait will be prominently displayed in the City Hall. Appropriately

enough, the painting was presented to the city on the eve of its 55th anniversary. Official opening of the city occurred on June 15, 1911. The city was incorporated Oct. 26, 1912.

Mrs. Bill Smith, who is Garden Club president and active in the women's division of the chamber of commerce, was instrumental in obtaining the large, framed portrait of Mr. Slaton. She had come across the painting during the Garden Club's flower and antique show.

Mrs. Smith borrowed the painting for exhibit in the show and, at the same time, became acquainted with Mr. and Mrs. "Happy" Slaton. He is the grandson of Q. L. Slaton and is employed with Hancock Manufacturing in Lubbock.

Later Mrs. Smith approached the couple about presenting the painting to the city, and they happily agreed that this was the place for the portrait. Mr. and Mrs. Slaton and their two sons -- Rich, 4, and Mike, 3, were here Saturday for the presentation.

Attending the presentation, and later an informal coffee at the Smith home, were: the Slatons, Mrs. Smith, Cooper, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Smith, Earl Reasoner, Mrs. August Klitten and Mrs. Joe Miles.

According to stories concerning the founding of Slaton, the city was named in honor of Mr. Slaton because he was influential in getting Slaton named as a division point for Santa Fe Railway.

Slaton was a nearby rancher and large landowner and he later became a banker in Lubbock, serving as president of Lubbock State Bank. Slaton was also an active civic worker for Lubbock, later serving on the board of city development there. The city's namesake was born in Lebadon, Ga., Nov. 21, 1867. Well educated, he was reported to have degrees in English, law and education.

Mr. Slaton had two children -- Oscar and Ruth. Oscar had two sons -- Q. L. III and William. The latter is attending college in Colorado.

The city owes its existence to Santa Fe Railway with a number of representatives of the system helping establish the town. An old engineer in Chicago reportedly laid out the plot with a "hub" base, imitating the plan of Washington, D. C. J. W. Walter, a rail engineer, was the actual surveyor.

A charge of negligent homicide "while in the performance of an unlawful act" was filed against Edward Spencer, Lubbock, involved in an accident resulting in the deaths of two Slaton women, Sunday, June 5. Spencer, 1916 Ave. K., was charged with driving without his headlights turned on. The rear end collision occurred southeast of Lubbock about 1:25 a.m. on June 5.

Olivia Vasquez, 16, and Marsela Vasquez, 19, a cousin, were killed in the early morning collision.

Officers said the victims were pushing at the rear of their car. Three other women of the Vasquez family were witnesses and two gave statements to investigating police that they heard the car but did not see any headlights.

Coaches Leaving SHS

High School's two top coaches have resigned their positions and will be moving soon, announced by The Slatonite.

Chastain, athletic director and head football coach, has accepted a coaching and teaching position at Coronado High School in Lubbock. He will move soon since he and his wife will be enrolled in summer school at Texas Tech. Doug Duncan, assistant football coach and head track coach, has accepted the athletic directorship and football coaching job at Lorenzo High School.

No announcement had been made from SHS officials on either coach's resignation. Dr. Lee Vardy, superintendent, was out of town and not available for comment. Two school board members, contacted by The Slatonite, said neither resignation had been discussed yet.

Chastain accepted his new job about two weeks ago, while Duncan informed he had accepted the job about a month ago. Chastain, 34, came to Slaton in August, 1954 from Ralls. He will be head sophomore football coach at Coronado and will serve as scout for the varsity team. His wife, Jerri, will also teach in one of the Lubbock schools. They have two children, Chastain graduated from Tech and has his master's degree.

Duncan coached at Wilson two years before coming to Slaton in May 1965. He had previously been an assistant under Chastain at Ralls. He and his wife, Sherry, have two children. His wife is presently attending summer school at Tech, and Duncan is employed with a Lubbock motor freight company.

Chastain, questioned about the upcoming move, said he had "enjoyed my stay here and working with the kids, other coaches and the Tiger Club." He also expressed appreciation to the interest shown by the newspaper and radio station in the football program.

Hatchett Gives Golf Report At Rotary Meeting

Don Hatchett, chairman of the Slaton Golf Course Assn., was guest speaker for the regular weekly luncheon meeting of Slaton Rotary Club last Thursday at the Clubhouse.

Hatchett reported on the progress of the golf course since its opening the first week in May. The course has been averaging 31 players a day, not counting members who pay by the year. There was a high of 80 players on Memorial Day.

Hatchett praised a number of local citizens for helping make the golf course possible. Included in the "appreciation list" were the Chamber of Commerce, Mayor Jonas Cain, golf course association directors, Carl Lewis, Bill Ball, Citizens State Bank, and all men who signed the note for the association's loan.

Bill Wilson, golf shop manager and pro, was introduced by Hatchett. Wilson said the course was in fine shape for a new course, and predicted that next year "we'll have the finest nine-hole course anywhere in the area."

Wilson said the interest was high for golf here, pointing to the fact that a ladies' golf group has already been formed. The pro gave free group lessons to women and was surprised at the large turnout. He also plans to offer free group instruction to youngsters in the 9-14 age bracket on June 28-30.

Slaton police were plagued with numerous reports of thefts, a shooting incident within the city limits, and a rash of minor car accidents during the past week.

Theft over \$50 was reported by Charles Carroll. A Bassett bound, valued at \$75, was reported stolen near his home. The dog was returned later unharmed.

Burglary was investigated at Whittington Grocery and Service Station, 1205 S. 9th. The cash register had been looted and several pounds of bacon, along with almost 20 cartons of cigarettes were taken in the burglary.

Police, responding to an emergency call Sunday, found a Mrs. Martinez, 955 S. 4th, shot in the right foot.

Anselmo Vasquez Jr. was arrested in connection with the shooting which witnesses said occurred after Vasquez had been involved in a street fight with another man.

Bo Linn reported that dogs killed eight of his chickens Saturday night. Police were unable to catch the dogs and Linn called to report that the pack

of four dogs returned Sunday night and killed the rest of his chickens.

Several car accidents occurred in Slaton during the week. No injuries were reported.

On FM-400, cars driven by Clyde Morgan and Jack Brown collided. Morgan's car received \$150 damages and Brown's car sustained \$10 damages.

Cars owned by Paul Brasfield and Elmer Pettigrew collided at a Slaton intersection resulting in light damage to both cars.

An intersection collision at 9th and Division resulted in \$150 damages to Edsel Clemons' car and \$100 damage to Albert Grigsby's car.

Jail arrests for the week involved four liquor violations including two arrests for making liquor available to minors and two charges of possession of liquor by minors.

Two arrests were made for drunkenness, two for disturbance of the peace and one arrest for simple assault. Police also made one arrest on charges of discharging firearms in the city limits.

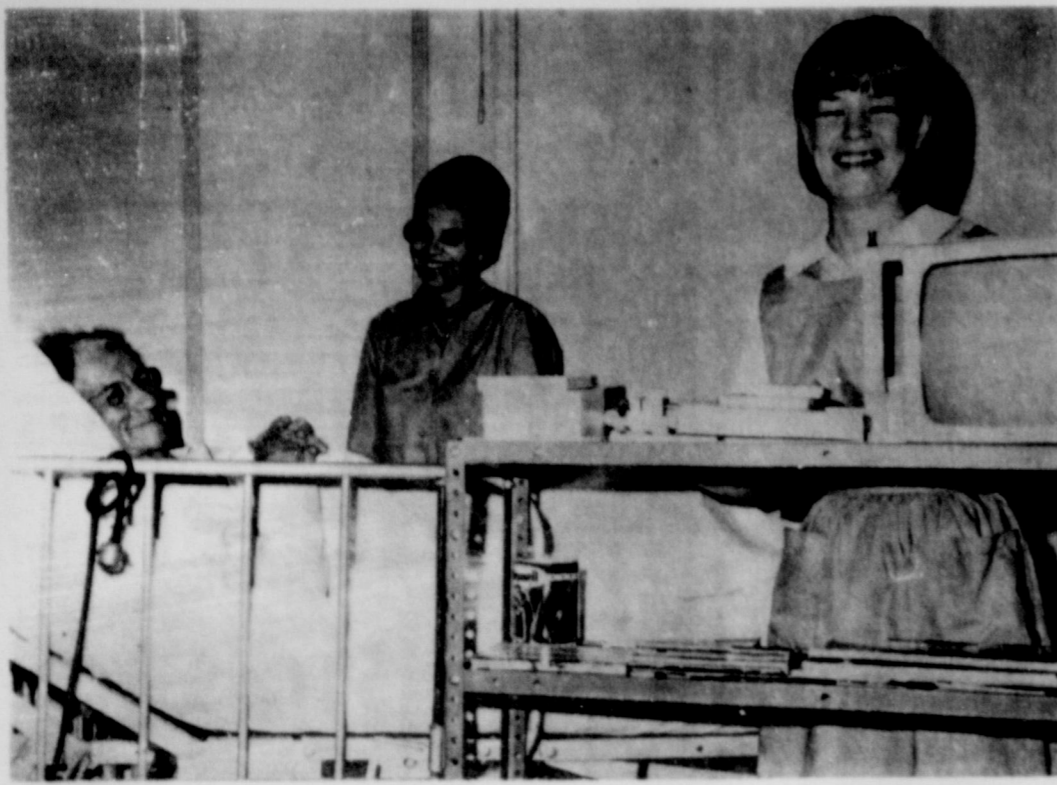

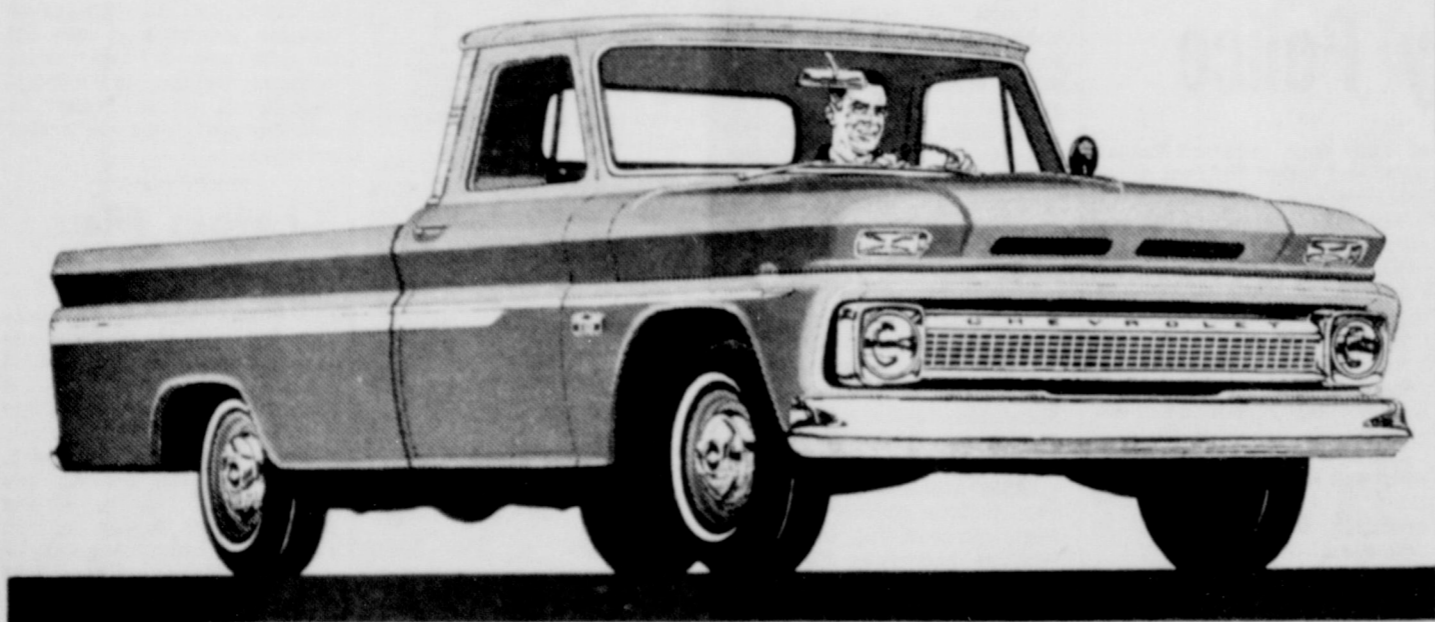

She and the late J. Finis Oliver, who died in 1954, were married Nov. 12, 1901, in San Saba. She was a member of the Methodist Church.

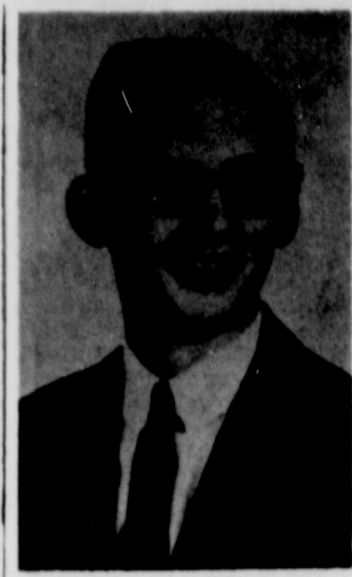
