### Cold Wave Hits Area Tuesday

A new cold front swept into the Slaton area Tuesday, arriving about 3 p.m. and dropping the temperatures by 30 degrees in one hour's time.

Propelled by high winds, the Canadian cold front kicked up dust and sent residents to the closet for heavier coats. The mercury was at 66 when the front his Slaton about 3 p.m., but an hour later the reading had skidded to 36 degrees.

The temperature dipped on Tuesday, then a low of 12 was recorded here Wednesday morning. Estimated high for Wednesday was 44. This was in contrast to a high of 89 and low of 42 on Saturday,

A cooling trend started Sunday when a high of 66 was recorded. A light sleet greeted residents Monday morning, but only a trace of moisture was

No precipitation was predicted on the South Plains behind the cold front, although snow flurries hit in the Panhandle. The cold wave was expected to yield to a slight warming trend.

previous releases, have pointed to four basic principles which such programs must follow if they are to be successfu. They are: (1) Planting seed which is

varietally pure and reasonably well adapted to the area, planted to sufficient acreage to produce at least 500-bale lots;

(2) Cultural practices - including fertilization, irrigation and the use of harvest-aid chemicals - which will help, not hinder the production of the maximum length, strength and fineness potential of the

(3) Harvesting with quality, not speed, in mind, and (4) Ginning in such a menner as to preserve quality characteristics, which again, means sire for overall quality.

Producers of course want to know if such a program will guarantee a market for their cotton at premium prices.

First, it is next to impossible to guarantee markets, much less market premiums, so long as Commodity Credit Corporation is holding a cot-

ton surplus. But it can be said that there will ordinarily be no markets or premiums for cotton not grown with quality and uniformity in mind, and that the market potential is greatly enhanced by the adoption of lint block programs.

Further, it has been repeatedly proven that cotton produced from pure seed under recommended sultural practices and kept varietally pure at the gin will yield greater returns to the farmer, even

## CANDY STRIPERS AT MERCY TO

Hospital lately and have seen a teenage girl dressed in a red and white striped jumper and white blouse, and most likely with a smile on her face .... then you have seen one of the new members of the Mercy Hospital Candy Stripers.

The Candy Stripers have recently been reorganized by the Mercy Hospital Auxiliary and the administrators at the hospital. An organizational meeting was held Dec. 26 and the group of girls elected officers for this year.

Officers for the organization are Kris Richardson, president; Linda Johnson, vice-president; and Darlene Hlavety, secretary. Other members are Laurie Green, Roni Kitten, Terri Hilbers, Debbie White, Toni Mel-Georgia Geer, Vicky Tumlinson, Becky Ratliff, Kathleen Mary Woods and Susan

These 13 girls are the charter members since the Candy Stripers have been reorganized. "other girls may make application", said the administra-Sister Amadeus, "but members will be taken in to the organization only once a year." Following membership, the girls undergo a training period conducted by the administrator. To be a member, girls must be in the ninth grade or

Sister Amadeus said they had considered taking only older girls, but Kris Richardson asked so many times to become a member and get organized that she consented, And it seems more minth graders are interested than the older girls.

At present the Candy Stripers are volunteering two hours each week at the hospital, During the summer months, it is possible, they will volunteer longer hours.

"The need for young people to fill the 900,000 new job positions which will become available by 1970 is urgent in the medical field, and this gives interested teenagers an opportunity to see if they really like hospital work and would like to make a career of it". Sister Amadeus said, "It is especially rewarding for us to watch them doing their duties". Among the duties these 13 girls have at Mercy Hospital are making beds, discharging patients, filling water pitchers, answering lights and serving meal trays.

At the age of 16, interested girls may become nurse's aides and are then paid a sal-



### Not Too Dry To Plant Now

Mrs. Katie Nieman

Too dry to plant? Charles Owens and Clyde Benn who farm west of Abernathy don't think so. They are preparing to plant sideoats grama grass now. They feel that it is time to plant regardless of moisture.

Under dryland conditions, grass should be planted on a firm seedbed not over one-half inch deep. A dead litter cover is recommended to aid in the prevention of crusting, which is a major problem in establishing grass. When the grass seedlings are

emerging they are very hard to see. In contrast, the weeds are growing at an alarming rate. Weeds should be controlled by mowing, shredding, or with chemicals. When the grass has been established, weeds will no longer be a problem. You can obtain assistance

and information through your local Soil Conservation District by contacting technicians of the Soil Conservation Service. They will be glad to discuss seeding and management of grasses with anyone who is

WASHINGTON, D. C.-Texas could receive an estimated \$68.4 million in federal funds in fiscal 1967 to improve education for children of low-income families and other deprived

The \$68.4 million includes \$1.7 million for children of migratory workers and \$219,896 for neglected children and juvenile delinquents in state-operated institutions.

Estimated state allocation for education programs for low income and handicapped children will be \$65.8 million. The remaining \$678,125 of the state allocation will be for admini-The funds are provided for under Title I of the Elemen-

tary and Secondary Education Act. Total estimated appropriation for the nation under Title I is \$1.05 billion - \$95 million more than for fiscal year 1966.







AUSTIN -- The Texas Highway Department reported today that more than 6.7 million motor vehicles will be registered in Texas in 1967 and urged car owners to buy their license plates early.

The new license plates may be purchased during February and March at county tax assessor - collector's offices or at authorized sub - stations. New license plates must be displayed after midnight April

Highway Department spokesman said motorists can help shorten waiting lines and speed up registration by buying license plates early and by presenting proper ownership doc-

Car owners are required by law to present certificates of title and last year's license plate receipts when renewing vehicle registrations.

In previous years there has been some confusion and misunderstanding about the ownership documents needed to obtain license plates.

In one Texas county, for instance, motor car owners were premitted to renew their vehicle registrations with their old license numbers written on the backs of envelopes or other scratch paper without proper proof of ownership.



### Alimony, Other Expenses Among Tax Deductions

Dallas -- Union dues, employment agency fees, alimony, and certain other expenses may be included among itemized deductions on Federal tax returns, said Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for northern Texas.

Also deductible are ordinary and necessary expenses in connection with the production or collection of taxable income and management of property held for the production of taxable income. This includes amounts spent for a safe deposit box for taxable securities, investment counsel fees, income tax counsel and assistance fees, custodian fees, clerical help, appraisal fees for establishing amount of casualty loss, etc.

Divorced or legally separated taxpayers making periodic payments of alimony or separate maintenance, or under a written separation agreement entered into after August 16, 1954, or under a decree for support entered after March 1, 1954, may deduct such payments.

The placement test requires no preparation and is non - competitive -- an applicant can neither pass nor fail.

The application form, not the Placement Test, is the most important factor in the selection of Volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the test. Applications may be obtained from local post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C., 20525.

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

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AUSTIN -- Legislative re- "There is abundant evidence districting reared its ugly head that six years is too late an suddenly and formidably from age to start children in school." House of Representatives. A U. S. Supreme Court decision invalidates the carefully - stuck - together reapportionment act of 1965 for representative districts.

This unexpected court action has changed redistricting from a routine cleanup chore into a major task. It could very well mean the end of the political line for some representatives and possible shaking of House unity.

Court found population variances among representative districts (up to 26 per cent) to great to meet its one-manone-vote standard and sent the 1965 districting plan back to Houston federal judges for re-

check. Representatives had figured all that was necessary this year was elimination of the 11 flotorial districts criticized by the Houston federal district court. Now, they are faced with wholesale redrawing of lines to equalize population discrepancies statewide,

Speaker Ben Barnes acknowledged "It is a difficult situation.

Big city lawmakers said they soon would introduce a bill to give Bexar, Dallas and Harris Counties one more representative each (high court held they were entitled to that) and adjust other variances.

Sensing that congressional reapportionment also might be struck down, redistricting acts in this area were introduced by Reps. R. L. Vale and Jake Johnson of San Antonio and Rep. Frank Cahoon of Midland, LIQUOR-BY-JIGGER--A bill to leagalize sale of liquor by the drink in Texas was introduced this week.

Reps. John Field and Dick McKissack, both of Dallas, are authors, Sen, Joe Christie of El Paso is the Senate sponsor.

Highlights of the bill are: \*Open saloons (banned by constitution) are defined as places devoted exclusively to sale of liquor for on-premise consumption. Bill would legalize mixed-drink permits for qualified hotels, private clubs, nesses or organizations NOT engaged exclusively in the business of selling liquor.

"Measure would authorize mixed drink sales in some 122 counties where on - premise consumption of beer and wine and package store sales already permitted. Provision is made for local elections in these areas on specific issue of mixed drinks. Failure of election would not affect status of other alcoholic beverages. In other areas, affirmative vote would be required for mixed drinks,

\*Drinks would be subject to five-cents-an-ounce tax, plus two per cent sales tax, Retail drink permits would cost \$1,000 at state level. Cities and counties could assess fees of \$500 each. Beverage servers would pay an annual fee of \$12, Private clubs in wet areas must operate under the same regulations as retail drink establishments and pay the permit fee. Those in dry areas will pay a special registration fee and a 10 per cent gross re-

ceipts tax. \*Texas Liquor Control Board would administer permits and enforce the law.

TIME MARCHES ON -- Legislators had time on their hands and their minds as House State Affairs Committee conducted the longest hearing of this legislative session on the bill to outlaw daylight saving time in

Committee heard witnesses for nearly seven hours, until after 2 a.m., arguing both sides of the proposed act by Reps. Will Smith of Beaumont and Ralph Wayne of Plainview.

Federal Uniform Time Act of 1966 will place all states on daylight saving time from May to October unless a state's special legislation exempts it. Lining up in favor of the bill

were restaurant and theater owners and the farm bureau. Opposing it were radio and television stations, investment bankers and some newspapers. STATE KINDERGARTEN -- Sen Don Kennard of Fort Worth is sponsoring a bill to provide free public education for fiveyear-olds, with the state shar-

1970-71. "A kindergarten program established under rules set up by the Texas Education Agency, is the most vital step Texas should take in improving our school system", the senator said. Medical Assistance Act of 1967 would authorize medical care benefits to inmates of state mental hospitals, under new state - federal "medicaid" program, says Atty. Gen. Crawford . Martin. However, inmates will remain ineligible for old age assistance benefits.
