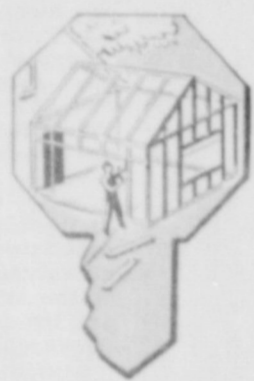

CHICKEN TACO PIE
1 2-3 lb. chicken or 2 cans boned chicken
1 10oz. can enchilada sauce
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 large onion, diced
1 cup chicken broth
1 cup grated cheddar cheese
1/2 tsp. garlic salt
Dash of pepper
1 11 oz. pkg corn chips
Boil chicken till tender (retain broth). Remove bones and

cut chicken into bite-size pieces. Combine chicken, enchilada sauce, mushroom soup, onion, garlic and pepper.
Grease 2 1/2 quart baking dish and line with half the corn chips. Add chicken mixture, sprinkle with grated cheese and cover with remaining corn chips. Pour chicken broth over all. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes. Serves 8-10. May be put into two smaller baking dishes and one frozen for future use.

AVOCADO DRESSING
1 ripe avocado, mashed
1 tsp. lemon juice
1/2 cup dairy sour cream
1/3 cup salad oil
1 clove garlic, crushed
1/2 teaspoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon chili powder
1/4 teaspoon salt

MEXICAN SALAD
Make salad of lettuce, fresh tomatoes, sliced ripe olives, and sliced green onions. Just before serving add 1 ripe avocado, chopped and 1 cup slightly crushed corn chips. Moistens with Avocado Dressing.

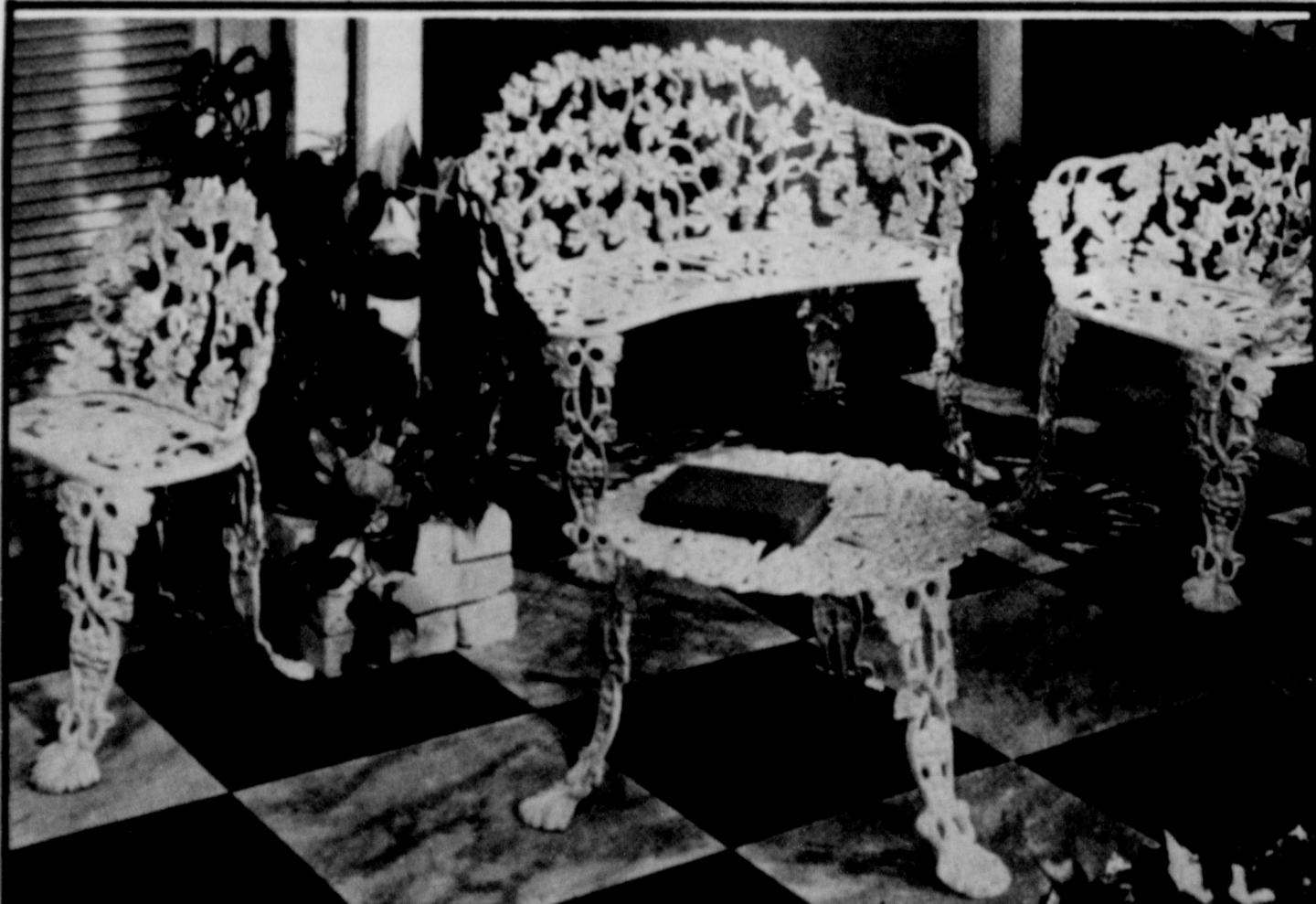

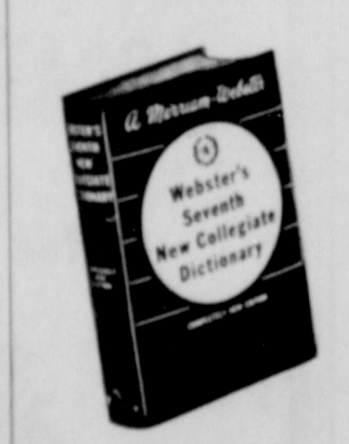

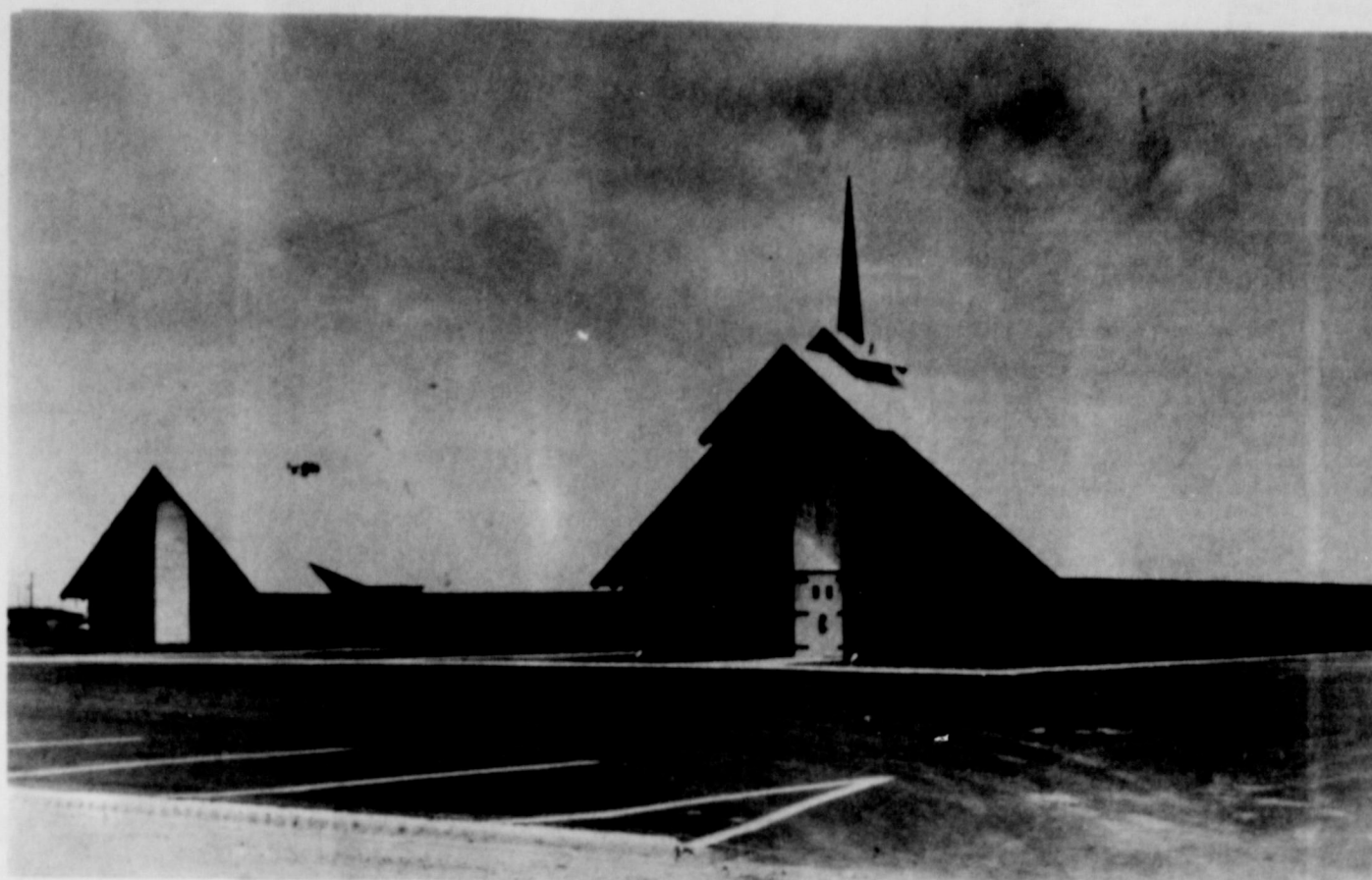

New FM Road Work Slated Near Acuff

The Texas Highway Commission today approved the spending of \$105,000 for construction of new farm to market road mileage in Lubbock County as part of the 1966 FM Road Program.

District Engineer Oscar L. Crain said five miles in this county will be involved. The work will be under the supervision of James Johnston, supervising resident engineer, whose headquarters office is in Lubbock.

The project will be accomplished east and south of Idalou. The road is located four miles east of Idalou and extends south from US - 62 & 82 to FM-40.

The work authorized for this county is part of a 903.8-mile statewide farm-to-market road - building program for 1966 as approved today by the Texas Highway Commission.

The Commission action raises to more than 38,200 miles the State's designated FM System -- roads approved for construction or already completed. Projections call for an ultimate 50,000-mile system.

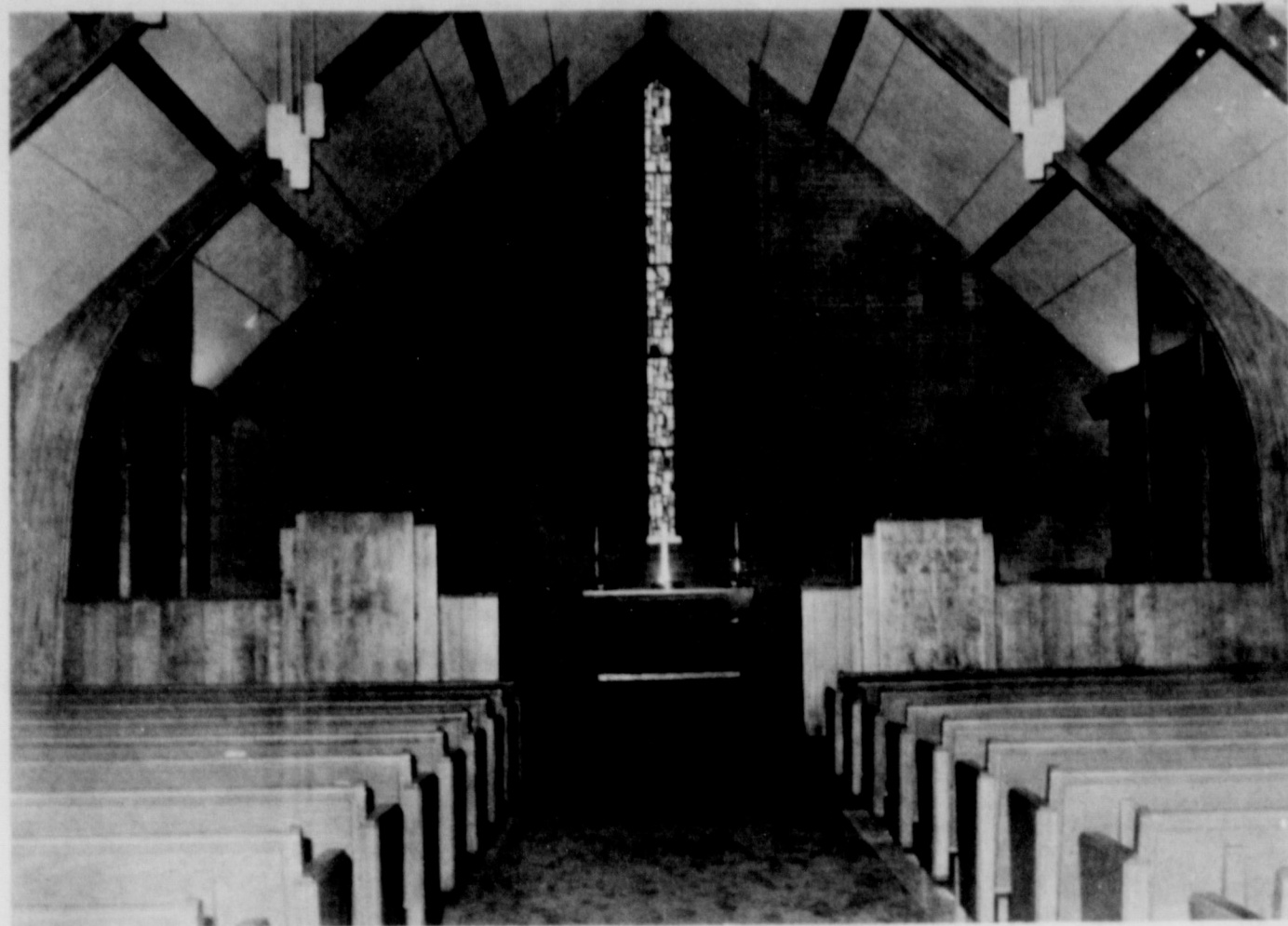
The Texas Farm to Market Road System is one of the most highly developed rural highway networks in the United States and exceeds in mileage the entire highway systems of most states.

The 1966 program proposed improvements on 904 miles of FM roads at an estimated cost of approximately \$23 million. Of the roads added by the new program, 75 per cent are school bus routes and 66 per cent are mail routes.

Today more than 8,000 busses travel more than half a million miles each school day to take more than 450,000 Texas youngsters to classes. The Texas Education Agency estimates that most of these youngsters travel over FM roads for part or all of their daily trip to school.

It is estimated that rural mail carriers travel almost 50,000 miles over farm-to-market roads each day.

The Texas Highway Department spends about \$47 million a year on the construction, betterment and maintenance of the Lone Star State's Farm-to-Market System.

Gala 3-day Grand Opening Set Here

A gala three-day grand opening will be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday at the modernistic Don Crow Chevrolet Co.

Located on a 2 3/4 acre tract of land on US-84 bypass, the automobile center, completed late in April, is acclaimed as one of the most complete and up-to-date plants on the South Plains.

Open house hours are set from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., with conducted tours of the sprawling plant planned. Sunday hours are from 1-6 p.m.

"All Slaton and area residents are cordially invited to visit the Chevy Center Friday, Saturday or Sunday to inspect our new headquarters," owner Don Crow said.

Even though the company has been in its new home since the last week of April, official grand opening and public open house festivities were delayed until this week.

Ground was broken for construction Nov. 3, 1965 with Norman Leo as contractor.

Built at a cost "exceeding \$150,000," the automobile center includes one large steel and mortar building, featuring a total floor space of 16,000 square feet, and one smaller steel building for body shop and reconditioning center.

Another feature is more than 50,000 square feet of parking space accommodating 240 automobiles without interrupting traffic flow to the main building.

The plant has more than doubled in size in comparison to its former downtown headquarters and all departments have been expanded to offer fast and efficient service, the owners pointed out.

The center's brilliantly lighted show room, service department, parts department and business offices, all centrally air conditioned, are housed in the main building.

Features of the modern show room, measuring 30x70 feet and enclosed by plate glass windows and doors, are tile

floors, fluorescent lighting, acoustical ceiling and private sales rooms attractively decorated.

Located behind the show room are offices for the owner, sales manager and a 18x20 foot conference room to accommodate 20 persons for sales meeting and staff sessions. The company's business and bookkeeping office also is located off the show room. One feature of the business office is a 8x6-foot, fireproof vault

room, where records are kept.

A LARGE two-lane covered carport is situated on the east side of the building, where customers cars are checked and repair work orders are written. Near the drive-in area is an entrance to a customer lounge and cashier's desk, which is adjacent to the parts department section.

Biggest feature of the new headquarters is a commodious service department area measuring about 70x120 feet. 16

work stalls are housed in the maintenance area.

Work stalls are equipped with twin post hydraulic lifts and the latest equipment, including front end alignment machine to handle the smallest wheel base of a passenger car to medium truck models.

THE SHOP area employs electrically controlled doors and modern electric mechanical equipment, including electric impact wrenches, a "snap-on analyzing" machine for motor tune-ups, drills, buffers, grinders, battery charger, valve machines, armature lathe, brake lathe, and generator tester.

Also housed in the service department area is a tool room for special equipment, an enclosed transmission repair room.

The body shop features 5 work stalls and also includes an enclosed paint room.

Industry Payroll \$4.3 Million in County

Lubbock County celebrates its 100th anniversary as an oil-producing county. The county's development that has made it the first Texas county to produce more than one million barrels of oil is a source for a booming civilization.

During Texas' first century of oil production (29 billion barrels), Lubbock County has contributed approximately 7.1 million barrels, its record dating from 1941.

The latest U. S. Bureau of Mines figures (1964) show Lubbock County produced more than 309,000 barrels of crude oil valued at \$915,000; and 19 million cubic feet of natural gas worth about \$2,000. The 1965 output would be approximately the same, preliminary estimates indicate.

Lubbock County ranks 165th among the Texas counties producing oil and gas.

payments are some of the ways by which oil and gas revenues are injected into the Lubbock County economy.

One of the most important "crops" harvested by Texas ranchers, farmers and other landowners is the royalty income from oil and gas operations. These payments are at the rate of approximately \$115,000 a year in Lubbock County. Many more thousands a year are paid in lease rentals and bonuses on acreage which operators hope will some day yield oil or gas.

In addition to sharing the tax load for local schools and levels of government, oil and gas producers and royalty owners send some \$42,000 a year to the State Treasury in severance taxes. Oil taxes account for \$42,000; gas \$165,00.

Triggered by the first discovery in 1941, the search for oil in Lubbock County is still under way. The Oil and Gas Journal reported 4 wells were drilled in the county last year. Two of these were "wildcats" seeking new fields or production from new strata. Results: 3 oil wells; 1 dry hole. Oil men and other investors risked an estimated \$299,000 in Lubbock County to drill 29,000 feet of hole. Some \$69,000 disappeared forever in dry holes.

The Texas Employment Commission reports an industry payroll of about \$4.3 million a year for Lubbock County who are directly employed by oil and gas firms. This, of course, is only part of the total employment created by petroleum operations for many others work in related service and supply jobs.

Agent Offers Tips On Use Of Fertilizer

Lawn fertilizers and pesticides are often purchased with little or no consideration given to the square footage to be treated. For the most economical purchase, and efficient use of any lawn materials, Assistant County Agent Jerry DeBord suggests that the lawn be measured and the square footage determined.

This job can easily be done by multiplying the length of the lawn by the width. For example, a lawn 60 feet wide and 80 feet long will contain 4,800 square feet, if a fertilizer recommendation calls for 20 pounds per 1,000 square feet, then it would be necessary to purchase approximately 100 pounds of the fertilizer.

It is a good idea, says the county agent, to mark off the lawn in plots of approximately 1,000 square feet each when herbicides or pesticides are being applied. This enables the homeowner to apply the correct amount of the material much more accurately than by estimating the area to be covered. In the case of herbicides, this can be extremely important since many herbicides applied in excess of the amounts recommended will cause burning of the turf or if applied in less than recommended amounts will not give proper weed control.

The county agent says he has considerable information available at his office on many subjects dealing with lawns and home landscaping and that they are free for the asking.

ITEM: Bleach in tablet form needs small storage space, is easy to handle, has no danger of spillage, is time and product saving because it is premeasured. A possible higher cost per washer load may offset these advantages, but if you're inconsistent in measuring bleach, the tablet form could be saving in spite of added packaging cost.

ITEM: When muffins are flat and shiny on top instead of rounded and rough, you have overmixed the batter. Stir the dry and liquid ingredients just until they are combined — the batter should be lumpy.

Hormone Boosts Cotton Yields

Producing high quality cotton with less water will be possible in the future with the use of a growth regulator in the form of a hormone. Dr. Arthur F. Gohlke, senior soil scientist and administrative assistant of the High Plains Research Foundation, has been conducting research in this field at the Foundation and at Michigan State University.

Cotton yields under limited rainfall and light irrigation conditions can be increased 15 to 50% over the non-treated cotton. This has been shown by the use of a growth regulator

hormone. The application of this principle may also favorably influence production in other crops.

This research study has been underway at the Foundation in the laboratory, greenhouse and field. This growth regulator hormone is still highly experimental for general use by the Federal Food and Drug Agency. The research will be continued at the Foundation on the effect of cotton and other crops including grasses.

The yield of the cotton treated with 1/2 pound of the hormone per acre was 676 pounds, while

the non-treated cotton produced only 504 pounds of lint per acre under the same limited water application. The efficiency of soaking seed and applying hormone to the soil at planting is also being investigated.

The Paymaster 111 variety of cotton was seeded in 20-inch rows at 72 pounds of acid desiccated seed per acre on May 8, 1965. The hormone was sprayed with three rates on July 31. The irrigation during the season consisted of a pre-plant and one very light irrigation on August 5th.

All plots were fertilized uniformly with an 80-60-0 rate from 11-48-0 (Ammonium phosphate and anhydrous ammonia). The height of the cotton sprayed cotton was 8.5 inches and the untreated 16.5 inches.

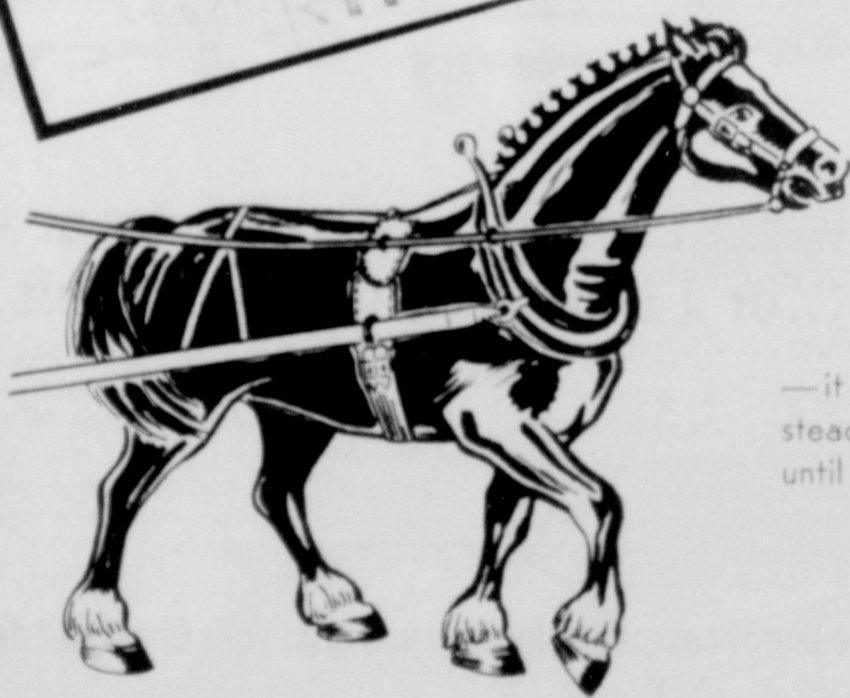

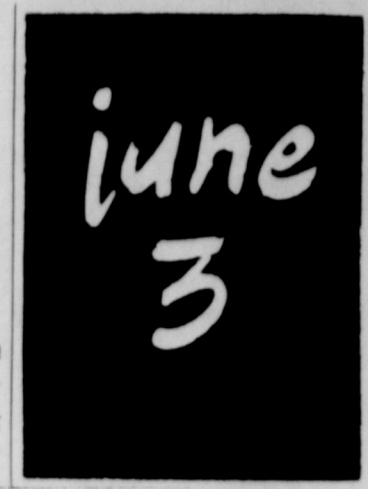

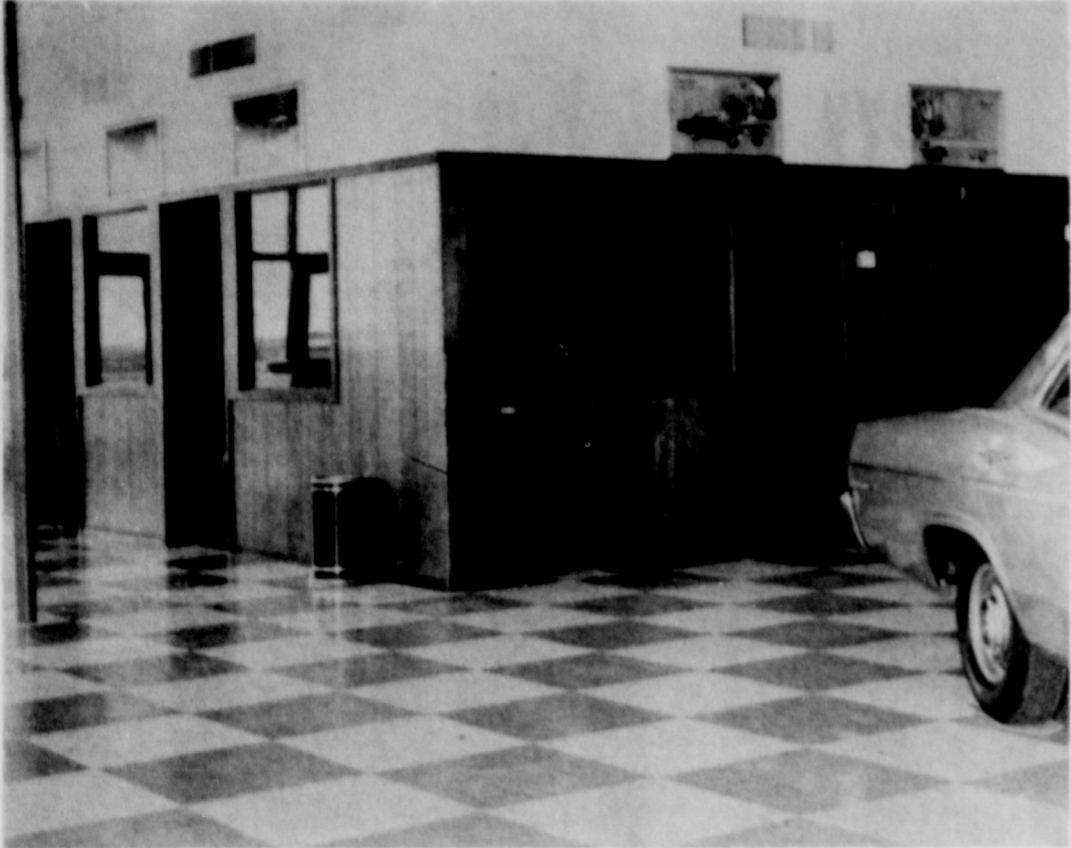

Modern Communications Boost Chevy Service

Nerve center of the new Don Crow Chevrolet Center is a dispatcher area system designed to speed up work operations through a centrally controlled communications set-up.

As customers drive into the plant's two-lane covered carport on the east, the vehicle is "diagnosed" and repair work orders are written.

Equipped with a master console to enable employees to speak over loud speakers with each mechanic -- individually or collectively -- the small master control actually provides "for the best control possible for fast, efficient service with no loss of time," the owner stated.

For example when a mechanic needs to talk with the service manager or parts department, he merely presses a button in his work stall, goes on about his work and requests a part. Or he advises the service manager he is ready for another car and to send a driver after the one he has completed.

Each mechanic's work stall is equipped with a master switch connecting with the company's elaborate communications system.

In the past, a paging system was necessary to call workers away from their location of work in various parts of the building. Now, with the dispatcher system, workmen can go about their work without leaving the area for parts or to advise the head office repair jobs have been finished.

"The automobile is a complicated and costly piece of machinery and its maintenance is of real concern to a owner," Don Crow emphasized.

"Good service is vital to business and in order to maintain the car of today, in the vast numbers we have in an area such as Lubbock County, it takes a highly specialized and organized service department."

The owner stressed that with the new combined communications system throughout the plant, the efforts of a large number of employees can be organized and work carried out with efficiency.

Combined with the communications set-up is background music played over the paging system when it is not otherwise in use.
