COMMISSIONER RACE IN SPOTLIGHT

Primary Elections Saturday

The "moment of truth" arrives Saturday for candidates in county and state elections as the May 7 primary comes up for voter attention.

Holding the political spotlight locally is the Democratic primary election for County Commissioner, Precinct 2, where three men are vying for the post.

Incumbent George Green faces challenges Jim L. Benton and Harvey Griffith in the precinct race. Unopposed on the Republican side is C. C. "Cliff" Weaver.

Two state representative races are also drawing good voter attention. A three-man race is due for the District 76, Place 2, race where Elmer Tarbox, Bill Gillespie and Denzil Bevers are battling for the office. The Place 1 race pits Reed Quilliam against N. J. Murdock.

Absentee voting ended Tuesday with 42 ballots being cast here at Kertan Studio.

Polling places in Slaton are voting precinct 36, Slaton Clubhouse; precinct 37, West Ward School; and precinct 38, Stephen F. Austin School, Precinct conventions are also at the polling places at 2 p.m., and the county convention is scheduled May 14, 2 p.m. in the O. L. Slaton School auditorium at Lubbock.

Drawing much attention on the state level is the attorney general's race between Crawford (See ELECTION, Page 9)

SHOWERS DOT SLATON AREA

Light showers and cool, cloudy weather hung over the Slaton area from Thursday through Sunday, following on the heels of soaking rains which brightened crop prospects for the year.

A fast-moving cold front had knifed into the area early Saturday, leaving only a trace of moisture here but up to 1.5 inches was reported around the Post area. Rains measuring from 1.7 inches to 5 or 6 inches had fallen in the Slaton area the previous weekend.

As the cold front moved in here Saturday, the temperature dropped about 20 degrees -- from a comfortable 65 at 5 a.m. to 45 degrees around 11 a.m. Southland reported some rain and light hail showers and drizzling fog and mist.

The wet spell boosted crop prospects all around the area, with the near-perfect rainfall coming just prior to planting time. The moisture was highly beneficial to both dryland and irrigated farmlands.

Golf Course Open for Play

Rain and cool weather failed to dampen the enthusiasm Saturday when Slaton's new Municipal Golf Course was formally opened for play.

After Mayor Jonas Cain performed a ribbon-cutting ceremony about 9 a.m. Saturday and took a practice swing, six golfers braved the weather to officially record the first rounds on the course.

The first group was composed of golf association directors Don Crow and Max Arrants, who were joined by David Binkley, former Chamber of Commerce President Doug Galassini -- now of Lubbock, Carroll McDonald, and Harvey Howell of Lubbock.

Crow had the best first round -- a 79, thus setting a course "record." McDonald returned Sunday afternoon to shoot a 78, then Tech golfer Steve LeCrone came over Monday to post a three-over par 73.

A total of 16 golfers paid green fees Saturday, while 27 played under cloudy skies Sunday. The number of players rose above the 50 mark Monday and up around 60 Tuesday as sunny skies made conditions better.

Pro Bill Wilson announced this week that a free "ladies' beginner class" will start next Tuesday at 5 p.m. The class

will continue three more weeks and will be conducted on Tuesdays.

Interested ladies are invited to attend the instruction classes, and no equipment is necessary. Wilson said he would provide clubs and balls for the class.

Connally Warns Minority Group Seeking Control

AUSTIN -- Governor John Connally warned Texans here this week that failure to vote and to attend precinct conventions Saturday, May 7th could result in a take-over of the state Democratic party by a minority group.

"Frankly, a small, militant group of people is trying this year to take over the Democratic Party of Texas for their own purposes", Connally said. "The only way to prevent this is for conscientious citizens to turn out in mass at the polls, and at their neighborhood precinct conventions to make sure that the voice of the majority continues to shape our party and government."

"Voter apathy is the constant threat to good government," he said. "And if we like the kind of stability and progress we've had in Texas, we'd better guard it carefully on election day. The fellow who thinks his vote isn't important this year couldn't be more wrong, regardless whether some of the races may appear close."

"It is very important that all qualified Texans be certain to vote on May 7th. And I particularly urge them to attend their precinct conventions who will support my administration, and our program for continued progress in Texas." Delegates named in precinct conventions will attend county conventions May 14, and those conventions in turn select delegations to the state convention in September in Austin.

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FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY—When Reed Quilliam took office in 1961, the deficit in the Texas General Revenue Fund was over \$43 million. TEXAS TECH—For the biennium prior to Reed Quilliam's election to the House, Texas Tech's appropriation by the legislature was \$8.87 million. For the current biennium, six years later, Texas Tech's appropriation is \$20.5 million, almost two and one-half times the earlier figure. During the last session Quilliam played a key role in obtaining the funds for Texas Tech's new law school and has worked with tireless dedication for the future of the college.

AGRICULTURE—Realizing the vital role that agriculture plays in the economy of the area, Reed Quilliam has consistently supported legislation of importance to the farmers of Lubbock County, e.g. water legislation, cotton trailer exemptions, and sales tax exemptions for farm machinery. He was a co-sponsor of the constitutional amendment, to be voted on in November, limiting the assessment of agricultural land to its agricultural value.

HELP FOR TEXAS' OWN—Reed Quilliam believes that Texas have a responsibility for helping the state's own needy citizens. He has voted and worked for benefits for our indigent aged, and for an improved system of state hospitals and special schools to care for our mentally retarded, physically infirm, and others unable to care for themselves.

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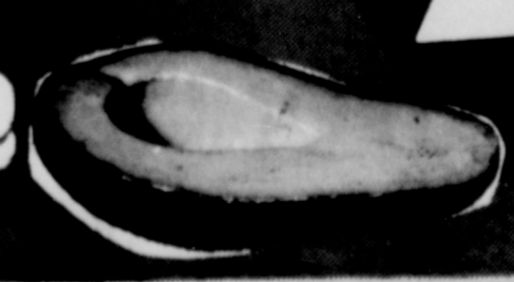
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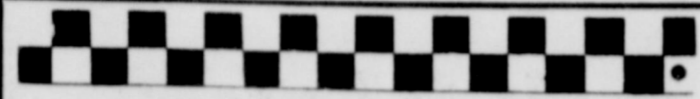
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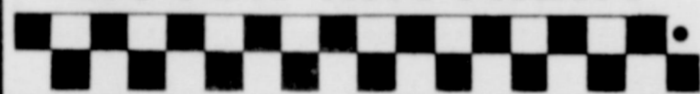
