

City Considering Paving Program

To be or not to be... that is the question concerning a number of Slaton streets in the 1965 paving program, and the decision on which streets are to be included is scheduled Monday night in the regular City Commission meeting.

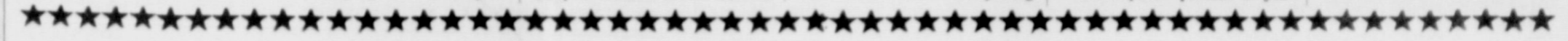
Action taken at the special meeting also included approval of a change-order on the curb and gutter contract on Division Street at an additional cost of \$4,266.85. This represents the additional cost over what the county will pay for strip paving.

Drainage and traffic problems are major factors which caused the inclusion of some streets in the proposed paving project. Streets proposed for the paving program are outlined on a map reproduced on page 4 of today's Slatonite.

More than 50 percent of the property owners on a street must sign up before the street can be petitioned into a paving program. The city can, however, proceed with paving on streets which it deems necessary for the public welfare, then the owners are assessed for their portion of the paving.

Estimated cost of the paving program to property owners is about \$4.80 to \$5 per running foot. The exact cost will not be known until bids are let.

A large portion of Dayton Ave., from 23rd to 6th Street, has been recommended for paving but only one block—between 16th and 17th has been signed up. Geneva Ave., from S. 9th to Thomas Street, has been recommended for paving but none of the stretch has been petitioned by property owners.

City Christmas Dinner Tuesday 'Operation Yuletide' Launched

The annual City of Slaton Christmas Dinner will be held in the junior high school cafeteria next Tuesday night with all city employees, board members and their husbands or wives as special guests.

'Operation Yuletide', a community project initiated by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce, was launched this week as contributions started to roll in and officials began to prepare a list of needy families.

Purpose of the program is to give all citizens an opportunity to help make Christmas brighter for less fortunate families. Any individuals, church groups, civic clubs or other organizations who want names of needy and deserving families are asked to call the Chamber office.

Also, anyone who plans to help a family is asked to call the Chamber office so that a checklist might be maintained to avoid duplication. Last year, one family received five baskets of food and toys while other deserving families were missed.

Names of many needy families have been given to the Chamber, The Lubbock County Welfare Supervisor has also provided Mrs. George Green, chairman of the Ministerial Alliance welfare committee, with a list. These two lists will be compared to avoid duplication.

Any business firms, clubs, church groups or individuals who wish to contribute money for food or toys may do so by calling the Chamber office. All contributions of \$5 or more will be listed in the 'Operation Yuletide' report in The Slatonite and announced over KCAS Radio.

Persons who have toys to donate are asked to take them to the Hoffman building, 117 N. 8th St. The key will be in the Hoffman Real Estate office.

Contributions totaled \$180 up to Wednesday morning. The Slaton VFW and Auxiliary will pack and deliver 12 Christmas baskets (estimated value \$100), and the Jayceeettes will be preparing boxes of food and toys on Dec. 21, 22, and 23.

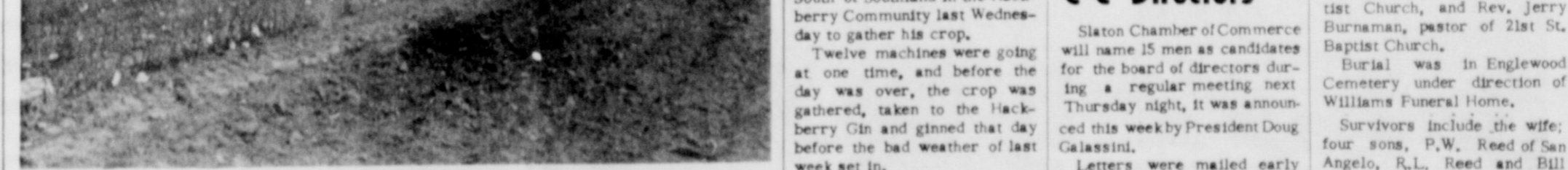

Beef is still a bargain, with various cuts serving as special features in many stores. Ground beef also is a popular choice, and is economically priced and versatile to use.

Pork counters are well stocked with a variety of cuts. Loin and rib end roasts, shoulder steaks and sausage are among the more popular cuts.

Good vegetable selections are art turnip greens, collards and mustard. Other good buys are eggplant, cauliflower, carrots, celery and sweet potatoes. Grapefruit is now in relatively good supply, and is being sold by the bag at slightly lower prices. Apples, cranberries, tangerines, tangelos, bananas and grapes are good fruit choices.

December marks the beginning of the egg and boiled custard season. These two favorites are easy to serve and are sure to please the family and guest, regardless of the occasion.

Recipe Of The Week

MRS. PHILLIP'S BEEF STEW
3 lbs. raw beef roast
1/2 gal. chopped potatoes
1 qt. chopped onions
2 cans tomatoes
1 small can (Wolf brand) chili
1 t. salt
1/2 t. pepper
carrots and peas if desired

Method: Cut beef roast into 1/2 inch cubes. Add seasoning and water. Cook until tender in presto cooker, or covered pan. Add other vegetables, with lid off, and simmer until tender.

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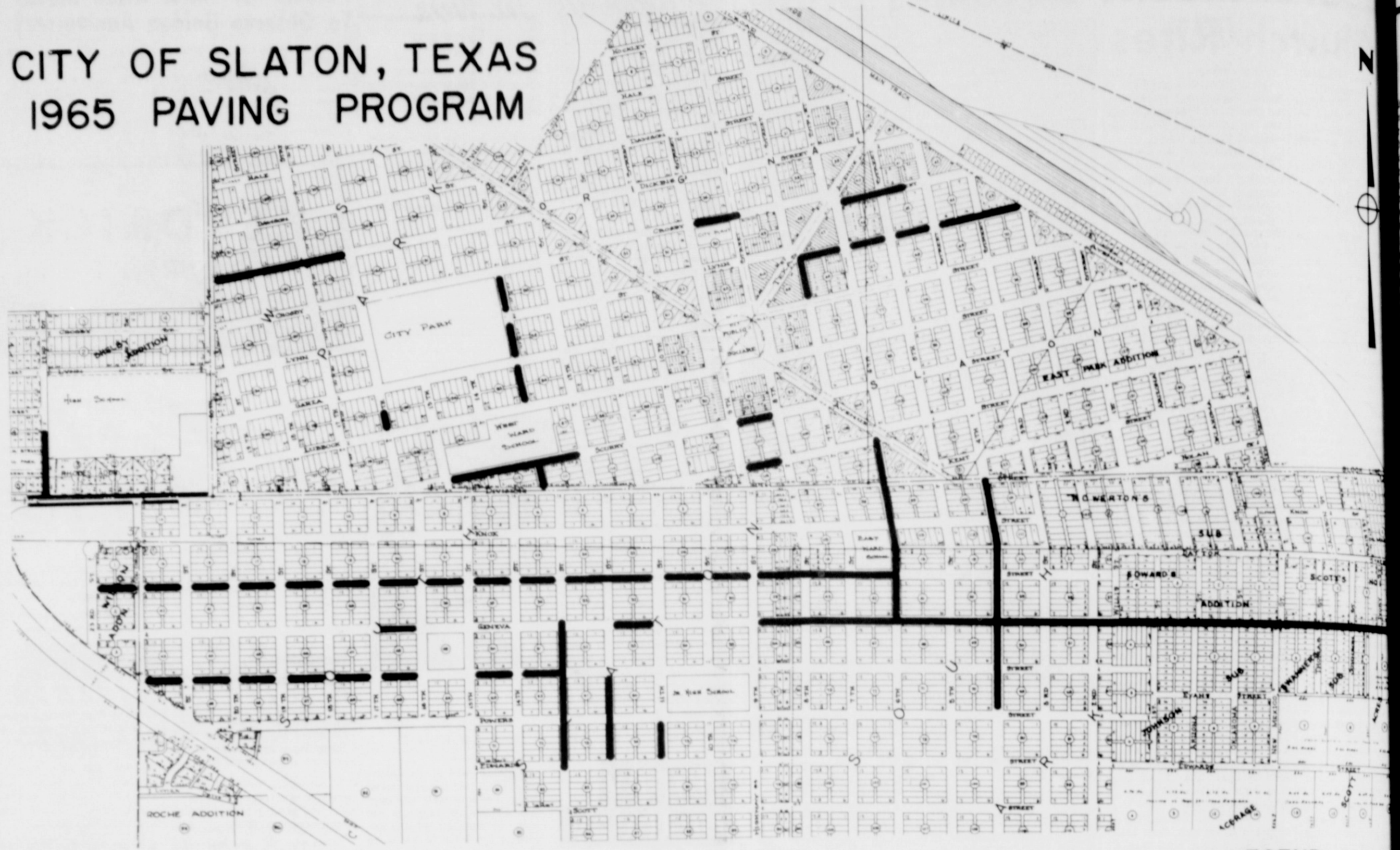
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CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS 1965 PAVING PROGRAM

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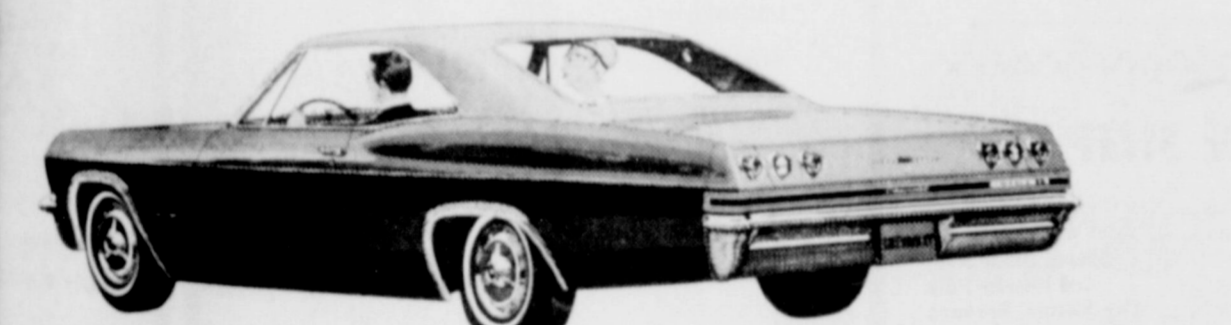
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EDITOR'S CORNER

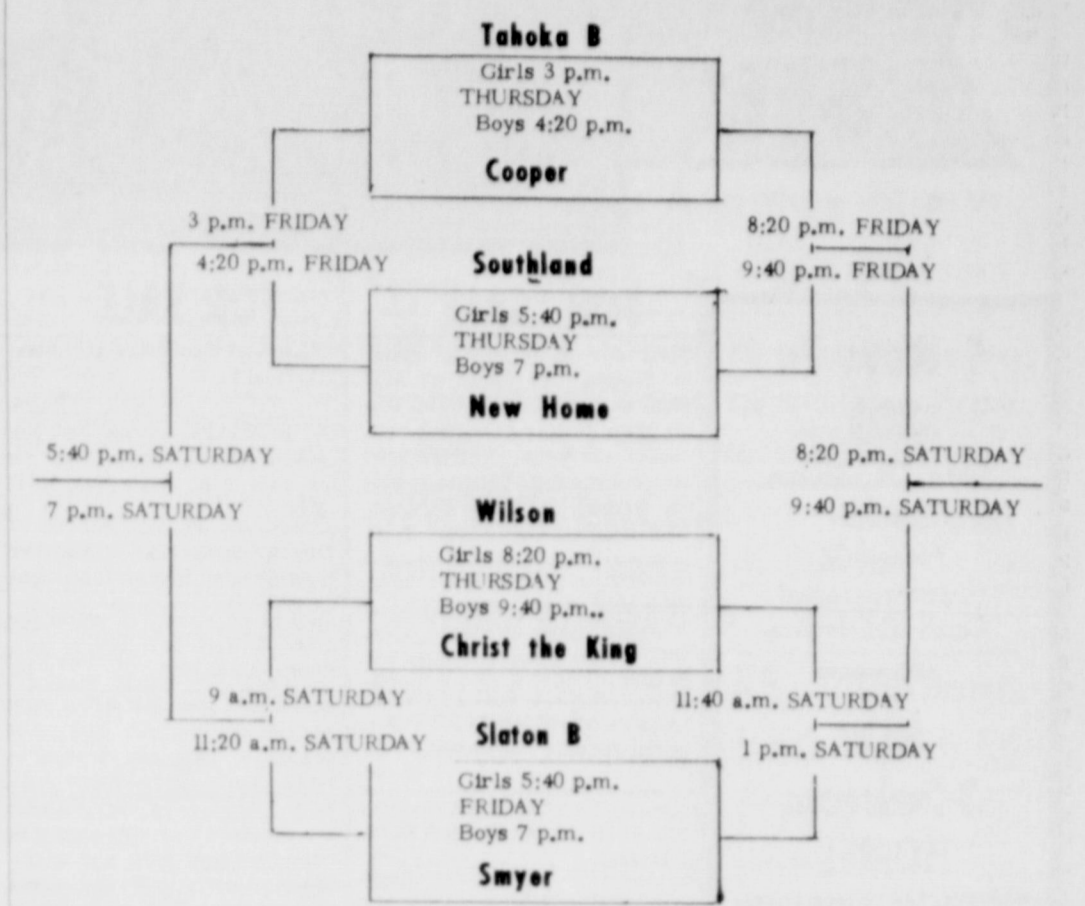

Texas Tech lost in three Sun Bowl games--to West Virginia 7-6 in 1938, to Tulsa 6-0 in 1942, to Miami of Ohio 13-12 in 1948--before downing College of the Pacific 25-14 in 1952. The Raiders went again to the Sun Bowl in 1956, bowing to Wyoming 21-14.

Tech's other bowl victory came in the 1954 Gator over Auburn 35-13 (when the outstanding back for the losers was Vince Dooley, the present Georgia coach). Also, Tech lost in the 1939 Cotton Bowl to St. Mary's 20-13 and in the Raisin Bowl of 1950 to San Jose 20-13.

Staple Length Reported Lower

Average staple length and micronaire readings were lower last week, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Office.
Volume of cotton received at the three South Plains U.S. D.A. Classing Offices was the highest for any week this season. The adverse weather conditions on Thursday and Friday temporarily halted harvesting activities, but the three offices continued receiving a heavy volume of cotton because of the backlog at gins and warehouses.
The three U.S.D.A. Offices on the South Plains classed 240,400 bales during the week ending Friday, Dec. 4, bringing the season's total to 678,100. At this date last year the three offices had classed 725,100 samples.
During the past week 71 per cent of the cotton classed at the U.S.D.A. Lubbock Classing Office was in the White grades and 29 per cent in the Light Spotted grades. Midding-cotton made up only 5 per cent of the total, Strict Low Middling Plus 1 per cent, Strict Low Middling 50 percent, Low Middling Plus 6 percent, Low Middling 8 percent, Strict Good Ordinary Plus and Strict Good Ordinary 1 percent, Middling Light Spotted 16 percent, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 12 per cent and Low Middling Light Spotted 1 per cent.
Average staple length was down slightly from the previous

week. Seventy-seven percent of all cotton classed was 15/16 of an inch and shorter. The previous week 72 percent was 15/16 of an inch and shorter.
Micronaire readings declined sharply during the week. Seventy-two percent of all cotton tested in the Lubbock Office was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. The previous week 81 percent of all cotton tested was in this category.
Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities were: Strict Low Middling 29/32-26.85, Strict Low Middling 15/16-27.35, Strict Low Middling 31/32-27.80, Middling Light Spotted 29/32-27.25, Middling Light Spotted 15/16-27.65, Middling Light Spotted 31/32-28.20, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 29/32-26.25, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 15/16-26.75, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 31/32-27.00.
Prices paid farmers for cotton tested remained steady the past week with prices ranging from \$45 to \$55 per ton.

Cotton Quota Up Slightly

Base cotton allotments in the Slaton area will be about the same in 1965, with token increases seen in a number of South Plains counties.

Lubbock County's base allotment is up slightly from 215,704, to 216,198. Lynn County's base rose from 176,865 to 177,315, and Crosby's was hiked slightly from 115,982 to 116,114 acres.

Most county ASCS offices mailed out individual farm allotments Friday. The base total for the area had been expected to remain about the same, since the 1965 national allotment was announced earlier at 16 million acres for the third consecutive year.

The slight increases in most counties comes from a state acreage reserve distributed among counties with a record of heavy base allotment plantings. Minor fluctuations in base cotton allotments were due partially to changes in planting "history" formulas used in computing base acreages.

The state ASCS committee held a 10 percent reserve from the Texas allotment and distributed it among counties which have planted more than 75 percent of their base allotments in recent years. Growers in some parts of Texas don't use their full allotments and turn them back to the ASCS committee for distribution to other growers under a release and re apportionment program.

Growers on the South Plains usually plant their full allotments and file large requests for unused cotton acres from other areas. The South Plains this year received about 140,000 cotton acres released in other parts of Texas. It's too early to predict the size of this potential acreage for next season.
