ther Gregory resigned his position Monday night during a regular Slaton City Commission meeting, the action following a split vote by ward leaders to cut the judge's salary from \$207.50 a month to \$100. Commissioner Henry Bollinger introduced the issue into

the session when he reported hearing complaints about the judge's salary "for no more work than he does."

Bollinger moved and Robert Banks Jr. seconded that the salary for the city judge and assistant civil defense director be reduced to \$100. The pair voted for the action while Clark Self Jr. voted against, and Earl Reasoner and Mayor Jonas Cain

abstained. Gregory immediately offered a verbal resignation and requested the commission to act on the matter, Commissioners approved the resignation, to

be effective at 5 p.m. Dec. 31. Since the city will be without a corporation court judge tomorrow, the mayor will have to assume the duty until and unless another appointment is made. No mention was made of a successor Monday night.

Gregory had little comment to offer about the action following the meeting, except to say that "a couple of the members of the commission have been after my job s for some time." He had been city judge since December, 1961, succeeding the late O.N. Alcorn who was the city's first appointed corporation court judge. The mayor handled the job prior to that

Mayor Jonas Cain said Tuesday that the commission has no one in mind for the job, as far as he knew. Gregory's salary had been based on \$125 per month as city judge and \$75 a month as civil defense coordinator.
