Two Almost Hit Jackpot In Grid Contest

Two entrants almost hit the jackpot in the Slatonite football contest last week, both picking all 12 winners over the weekend but missing the total points of the Slaton - Tahoka game by a touchdown.

In a week which saw A&M upset Texas Tech and a few other games not go according to the "experts", Jimmie Rogers and Ronnie Rogers picked 12 of 12 in the Slatonite game, Jimmie guessed 28 on the total score of the Slaton-Tahoka game, missing a jackpot prize of \$25 by just six points.

With Jimmie taking first-place prize of \$5, Ronnie guessed 27 on the total score to capture second prize of \$3. Nine other entries had only one miss, including Dale Rich, who hit the tie - breaker total of 34 right on the nose. He missed the Tech - A&M game and took third prize.

Others missing only one game included Gregg Nowlin, Michael Morris, Harry Brown, Lucille McMeehan, Gerald Kendrick, Kenneth Davies and Onetta White.

Oleta Bednarz, Slaton 4-H Club, and Jimmy Davis of Acuff are the two local persons to be recognized. Mrs. LaVerna McKenamy of Shallowater was the other award winner.

Oleta has been named the state's outstanding 4-H member in leadership and will receive an all - expense trip to the 45th National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, Nov. 27-Dec. 1. Donor for the award is the Sears - Roebuck Foundation which also provides medals for county winners and 12 college scholarships for a national blue award group. National winners will be selected from among the state winners.

Davis and Mrs. McKenamy were winners in the 4-H Alumni Recognition Awards program. Davis was a 1965 state winner in the program and is being nominated this year for national honors. He is a former Lubbock County 4-H member and a strong supporter of 4-H.

Mrs. McKenamy will receive, as one of four state winners, an Alumni Recognition Plaque from the Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation, donor for the program. She was an outstanding 4-H member in Oklahoma and has maintained a strong interest in 4-H throughout her adult life. She helped to organize a 4-H Club at New Deal and has served as a leader for the past four years.

The new state leadership winner is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bednarz, Route 1, Slaton; a senior in Christ the King High School and is completing her fifth year of 4-H work.

In addition to her outstanding work as a junior leader, she has completed major demonstrations in clothing, gardening, public speaking, home improvement and food preservation. She has won blue ribbons in the county dress revue and favorite food show; is a member of the statewide Talent Club and in 1965 was named Gold Star girl for Lubbock County.

Her work in getting new members for her club and providing leadership and assistance for younger members has been outstanding. Her experience gained through public speaking has been put to use in her efforts to promote 4-H and its membership. She has appeared on radio and television and made many talks on 4-H subjects before 4-H.

Tigers Host Springlake

Striving to even up their record before starting district play, the Slaton Tigers hope to sharpen their claws against the Springlake Wolverines here

Friday night. Kickoff time is 8 p.m. at Tiger Stadium for the non - district contest the Class A Springlake squad. The Tigers have a 1-2-1 won-lost-tied record, while the Wolverines are 3-1 on the season.

Slaton fans will get to see a new scoreboard, if everything goes according to schedule. The new electric clock and scoreboard has been donated by Citizens State Bank, Slaton Co-Op Gins, Supreme Feed and Ray C. Ayers & Son, Inc.

Coach Ernie Davis announced only one casualty Wednesday, that being tackle Roy Green who injured a leg in the Tahoka game. Green is the largest lineman and a standout middle guard on defense. Davis thinks he'll see limited action, if any.

With tackle Bobby Ball returning to full speed, the lineup will be about the same as usual, with Johnny Lakey set to start in place of Green. Lakey started last week in place of Ball. Davis anticipates the Springlake team to give the Tigers' pass defense a stern test. The Wolverines have used the pass attack as a big weapon in winning three games. Quarterback Doug Messer, a southpaw, guides the pro - style attack of the Wolverines.

The Springlake team scored 64 points in its last two outings, beating Dimmitt by 31-12 and whipping Friendship by 33-8. Hale Center scored a 31-8 win over the Wolverines, and

Springlake beat Amherst by 6-0 in the first game of the year.

Chalres Fisher is Slaton's leading ground gainer to date, chalking off 236 yards in 64 trips for a 3.6 average gain. Larry Pickens has 160 yards in 42 carries for a 3.8 average, while Doyle Ethridge has hit for 106 yards in 24 attempts and has the best average at 4.4.

Scouting reports show Springlake has two big tackles, and good runners in fullback James Thomas and halfback Logan Armstrong. The Wolverines are about the same size as the Tigers.

The Tigers will have only two more home games after this encounter.

Third bale of cotton for the Slaton area was announced Wednesday morning when W. R. Singleton, Rt. 2, Slaton, had a 495 - pound bale ginned at McClung Co-Op Gin.

Singleton will receive the Slaton Chamber of Commerce's cash prize of \$50 for the bale. Prizes of \$150 and \$100 were presented to Boyd Bryant and Stonewall Jefferson, respectively, for the first and second bales of the season.

Singleton planted the dryland cotton the last day in May. He has been farming at the present location since 1953. His farm is located about a mile east of the Forrest Ranch house and three miles south of McClung Gin. The seed cotton for the bale weighed 1,900 pounds, according to gin manager Max Jackson.

Cool weather, coming on the heels of unusual amounts of moisture, has slowed crop maturity in the area. Slaton's first "norther" of the autumn season blew into the city Friday, kicking up dust, dropping the mercury to 52 and a high of 56 for the day, threshing some sudan that hadn't been cut, and sending residents to the closet for light coats.

Heavy overcast skies followed the arrival of the cold front. The temperature climbed back up to highs of 90 Sunday and Monday, but the high was back at 60 degrees Tuesday as another cool front moved in. A trace of rain was noted early Wednesday.

3 cups flour
1/2 t. salt
2 T. cocoa
2 t. soda

2 cups buttermilk

The contest is sponsored nationally by the Ford Dealers of America and the National Football League.

Slaton boys will be tested for their ability to punt, pass and place-kick a football for distance and accuracy. First-, second- and third-place winners will receive distinctive Medal of Achievement awards on plush velvet ribbons. Top award has a blue motif, second-place award is red, third award is white. There will be 18 medal awards in all. Scores

throughout the country then will be compared to determine the six top winners in each of the 360 Ford zones -- a total of 2,160 zone winners.

Zone winners will meet in 37 Ford District competitions at which 228 district champions will win trophies. The 228 runners-up will receive certificate awards. All 228 district champions will compete for area championships to be held in 15 NFL-city areas.

The 42 western NFL-area champions will compete in Baltimore, Maryland, on Saturday, Dec. 10, to determine the six western division champions (one for each age group). The 48 eastern NFL-area champions will compete in Dallas on Sunday, Dec. 11, to decide the six eastern division champions (one for each age group).

The six eastern NFL division champions, and the six western division champions, accompanied by their mothers and fathers, will go on a "Tour of Champions" to Washington, D. C. They then will travel to the Orange Bowl in Miami, Florida, site of the annual NFL Play-off game, for half-time competition to determine the six National PP&K champions.

All 12 finalists go on the "Tour of Champions."

Raiders, TCU Clash for WT Football Title

LUBBOCK - Texas Tech invades Fort Worth to battle Texas Christian University for the unofficial championship of West Texas Saturday night.

At stake will be a small saddle emblematic of the "title", donated by the Lubbock Avalanche - Journal and Amon Carter Jr. Texas Tech currently holds the saddle, by virtue of a see-saw 23-14 triumph at Lubbock last fall.

Team records aren't imposing. Texas Tech is 1-2, TCU 0-3. Tech opened with a 23-7 win over Kansas, then dropped games to Texas 31-21 and to Texas A&M 35-14. TCU's losses were squeakers to highly-rated Nebraska 14-10 and Ohio State 14-7 before a 21-0 white-washing by Arkansas.

In the defeat by the Razorbacks, however, the Horned Frogs piled up more total yardage and five times penetrated the Arkansas 18-yard line.

Texas Tech goes into the game in possible its worst physical shape in several years. Three more men may have been lost in the A&M contest -- center Jerry Turner, tackle Stanley Edwards, and halfback Alan Schriever, all with knee injuries.

Starting defensive guard Mickey Merritt, who hurt a foot in the Texas contest, may miss another, as will defensive guard Marc Bryant and probably safety Guy Griffin. Doug Young, starting in the place of Bryant, played only sparingly against A&M because of an injury against Texas.

Texas Tech's next game will be against Florida State at Lubbock Oct. 15.

The cards will carry a message from Postmaster General O'Brien advising that ZIP Codes

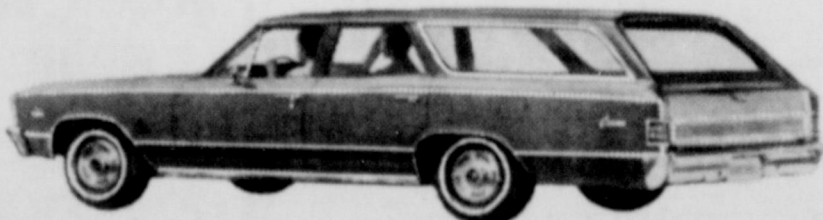

PICKENS RETURNS KICKOFF 82 YARDS

Tigers Lose Thriller, 20-14

Slaton's hustling and improving Tigers put a scare into the undefeated Tahoka Bulldogs here Friday night before finally yielding a hard-fought 20-14 decision to the visitors.

The spirited Tigers controlled the first half of play, and the Bulldogs were lucky to be trailing by only one point, 7-6, at halftime, but two pass interceptions and two fumbles

were big handicaps for the Tigers.

Led by Cliff Thomas, all-state halfback candidate, the Bulldogs rallied for a 20-7 lead in the second half. However, Slaton was in the game all the way as Larry Pickens returned a kickoff 82 yards for a score and closed the gap to 20-14.

The scrappy Tigers bottled up Thomas in the first half, holding the hard-running back to 40 yards in 11 carries. But the Tigers didn't have the ball enough in the second half, and Thomas carried 22 times for 76 yards in the final two quarters. Thomas, who has broken for long touchdown runs in every game, got loose on a 49-yard gainer in the second half to set up a score.

Thomas carried the ball an amazing 33 times for 115 yards, but his average figured out about 3 1/2 yards per trip -- way below his season's average. His 49-yard run, which carried

to Slaton's 15, was the only time he broke for long distance. Pickens scored both Tiger touchdowns, going in from five yards out in the first half, and dashing 82 yards with a kickoff in the fourth period. Steve Harlan booted the extra point after each score.

Statistics revealed a big factor in the game -- Slaton got only 16 offensive plays in the second half compared to 36 for the Bulldogs. Slaton had the statistical edge in the first half while running 26 plays to 25 for Tahoka. Two pass interceptions and a fumble gave the ball to Tahoka in the second half, and Thomas kept pounding away to kill much of the time.

Tahoka scored first in the second quarter on a 21-yard pass from Mitchell Williams to wingback Doyle Schneider. He caught the pass between two Tiger defenders on a clutch fourth-down situation. Slaton had stopped Tahoka on the 7-yard line, but a fumble on the 22 gave the Bulldogs another shot. Richard Washington blocked the extra-point kick. The Tigers roared back, moving 74 yards in nine plays to go ahead by 7-6. With Charles Fisher, Doyle Ethridge and Pickens making good gains, and Williams hitting Ethridge and Pickens on two key pass plays, the Tigers moved to the 5. Pickens swept left end from there for the score.

The long run by Thomas sparked a Tahoka drive in the third period, with the big back crashing the final five yards, a pass to Schneider tucked on two points for a 14-7 Bulldog lead.

A pass interception started Tahoka's other scoring drive from the Slaton 46. Thomas blocked the extra-point kick. The Tigers roared back, moving 74 yards in nine plays to go ahead by 7-6. With Charles Fisher, Doyle Ethridge and Pickens making good gains, and Williams hitting Ethridge and Pickens on two key pass plays, the Tigers moved to the 5. Pickens swept left end from there for the score.

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Ethridge turned in a great defensive game from his defensive end position and also clipped in some good ground gains. Fisher led the rushing department for the Tigers with 39 yards on 11 carries, while Ethridge got 33 in 7 trips and Pickens got 32 in 8 attempts.

Tom Davis, Roy Green, Tommy Donaldson and Joe Olague also were standouts on defense for the Tigers. Green was hurt late in the game and couldn't return to action.
