Slaton's Tigers, with new ammunition, begin the 1966 football season by hunting Buffaloes Friday night.  
 The "new ammunition" comes in the form of a new coaching staff and, thus, new offensive and defensive formations. Coach Ernie Davis, seeking his first victory as a head coach, hopes his Tigers will have the "guns" to down the Petersburg Buffaloes Friday.

Game time for Slaton's first game will be 8 p.m. at Petersburg.  
 Davis pronounced his team in good physical shape Wednesday with only the "usual bumps and bruises," the new Tiger mentor has been pleased with workouts and thinks the team is coming around good on defense. He is concerned, however, about the scoring punch. In a scrimmage session with Seagraves last Friday, the Tigers were unable to cross the goal. Slaton also held Seagraves away from the end zone. At Abernathy the previous week, Slaton's first unit didn't score and held the strong Antelopes to one touchdown on offense.

Overall, the Tigers are young and inexperienced this season and it'll be a rebuilding job for Davis. This is reflected in the probable starting lineup for Friday night.

Davis lists five seniors on the offensive lineup, four juniors and two sophomores. The line averages about 175 pounds per man, the backs about 160.

The tentative starters: ends Tommy Donaldson and Claud Stricklin, tackles Roy Green and Bobby Ball, guards Joe Olague and Buddy Pettigrew, center Tom Davis, quarterback Jim Williams, halfback Larry Pickens, tailback Charles Fisher, and wingback Doyle Ethridge.

Davis plans only a few changes on defense, Steve Harlan is tabbed for a halfback. (See TIGERS Page 11)

## Trustees Get Projects Report

A construction report was of high interest when the Slaton School Board met Tuesday night, approved the tax roll for 1966, paid bills, and discussed policy concerning supervision of junior high students during the noon hour.

Tentative completion date for the new football stadium section on the west side of the field was reported as "the latter part of October", while tentative completion date on the new high school gym was tabbed "soon after the first of December."

The tax roll, totaling \$12,295,531 was approved by trustees. Tax roll valuations last year were \$12,078,000, indicating an increase of over \$200,000 in valuations.

Supt. Lee Vardy reported that tentative plans are being made to set up temporary bleachers on the football field for the first few home games. They would be placed on the west side and occupied by visiting fans.

"Every effort will be made to accommodate our football crowds," said Vardy.

The superintendent also announced that season reserved football tickets would be placed on sale Monday, Sept. 12. They can be picked up at the business office beginning Wednesday, Sept. 14.

Slaton's first home game is Sept. 23 against Crosbyton. Tickets are the same price as last season -- \$1.50 per game.

All footing and about four feet of walls have been completed on the football stadium seats. Floors have been poured for the dressing rooms, concession stands and dressing rooms, and all plumbing has been "roughed in."

Installation of new poles and lights for Tiger Stadium will be made this week and next, according to Vardy.

At high school, the erection of pre-stressed concrete beams will probably start this week, then the building will progress rapidly. The dressing room section is beginning to take shape and walls are practically complete there.

Final plans are also shaping up for re-letting a bid on the cafeteria at West Ward. The first bid letting was rejected by trustees as being too high. Bids may be let within the next 10 days, said Vardy. Changes in engineering plans are in the final completion stage, and architect's plans have already been revised.

Trustees briefly discussed policies regarding supervision of junior high students during the noon hour, but no action was taken. All board members were present for the regular September meeting.

### ENROLLMENT TOTALS GIVEN

Enrollment in Slaton Public Schools was reported at 1,895 students on the first day of school Tuesday, according to a check at the superintendent's office.

The total was about 100 less than the total on the first day of school in 1965, but it is expected to climb above the 2,000 mark by next week.

A breakdown on the enrollment included 485 in high school, 455 in junior high, 540 in West Ward, 190 in Austin and 225 in Evans.

The high school enrollment was the only total which was ahead of last year. A decrease of about 50 students was noted at Austin, but this total is expected to rise within the next week.

### City Sprayed For Mosquitoes

Slaton residents, seeking relief from an assault of mosquitoes, are hoping that a city-wide spraying Tuesday night will rid the town of a host of the pests.

Numerous complaints had been received about the large number of mosquitoes which had invaded Slaton. The Lubbock City - County Health Department sent its spraying and fogging equipment over Tuesday night in an effort to eliminate many of the insects.

Burford Duff, city administrator, said there may still be a problem as two citizens refused permission for their "lakes" to be treated. Both are in the city limits and prime mosquito - breeding places. Duff encouraged residents to keep their vacant lots cleaned in order to cut down on mosquito - breeding places.

An official of the Lubbock department said the mosquitoes are mostly the common type and do not carry encephalitis. The Culex mosquito, which can carry encephalitis, is very low in numbers, according to the official.

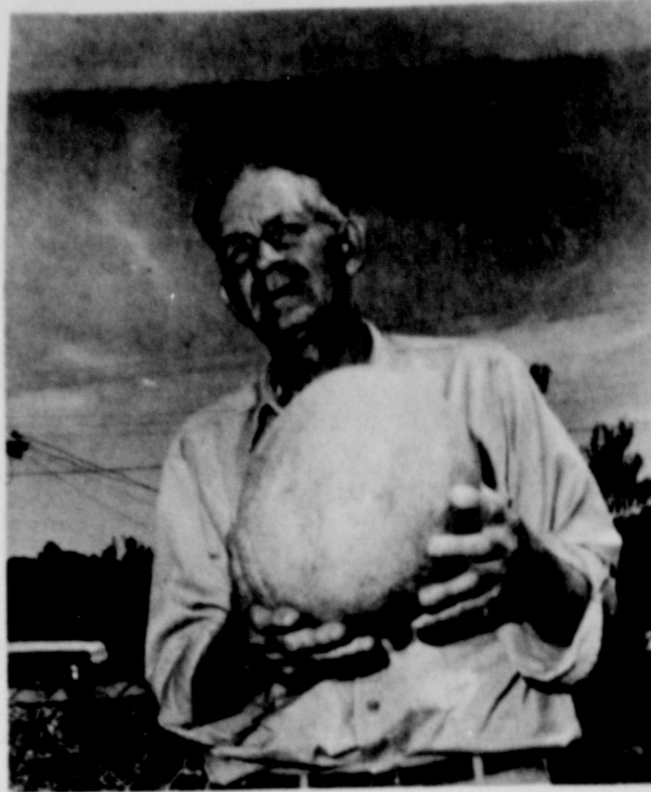

### Health of the 'Runner' Is Factor In Education Race Teachers' Group Reminds

BY EDUCATION NEWS SERVICE

AUSTIN--Robust intellects are not always situated atop the healthiest bodies. But the health of a school child can play a crucial role in the success of his educational attainment, says the Texas State Teachers Association.

If a child is healthy and stays healthy he will be better able to meet the increasing pressures of today's education than his out-of-shape counterpart, TSTA asserts.

"The race for better education has to depend to a great degree on the health of the runner," TSTA declares.

The 102,000-member teacher organization offers parents some tips on how they can help keep their children up to best physical par:

- Food--A well-rounded, well-planned diet at home is super-essential.
- Medical Care--Physical and dental checkups at regular intervals are good forms of preventive medicine. His eyes--take him to an ophthalmologist--even if you can't pronounce or spell the word.
- Exercise at home--Keep the child active by assigning chores around the house. Doing the "Watusi" at a Saturday night teen dance may be one kind of exercise but it will never replace mowing the yard, weeding the flower garden or helping wash walls as good muscle-toners.
- Sleep--Many children will set their own pace on the amount of shut-eye hours they require but they still need parental guidance for proper rest.
- Walking--It's a wonder that grandpa survived those ten mile hikes to school through 10 feet of banked snow. But today's pupils will surely survive a six or seven-block hike to school. Traffic conditions along the way should be a guide. And the trusty bicycle might also be encouraged as a way to get to class and back.
- Physical education classes--Encourage junior to put his heart into getting the best he can out of PE classes and other organized athletic programs.
- Fresh Air--Encourage him to realize how sweet and good it really is.
- Driving--The student who drives to school is an ever-increasing occurrence. Parents must clamp down hard and build in their car-conscious children a healthy respect for safe driving. A heavy foot on the gas pedal may win the healthiest child a scholarship to the local cemetery.

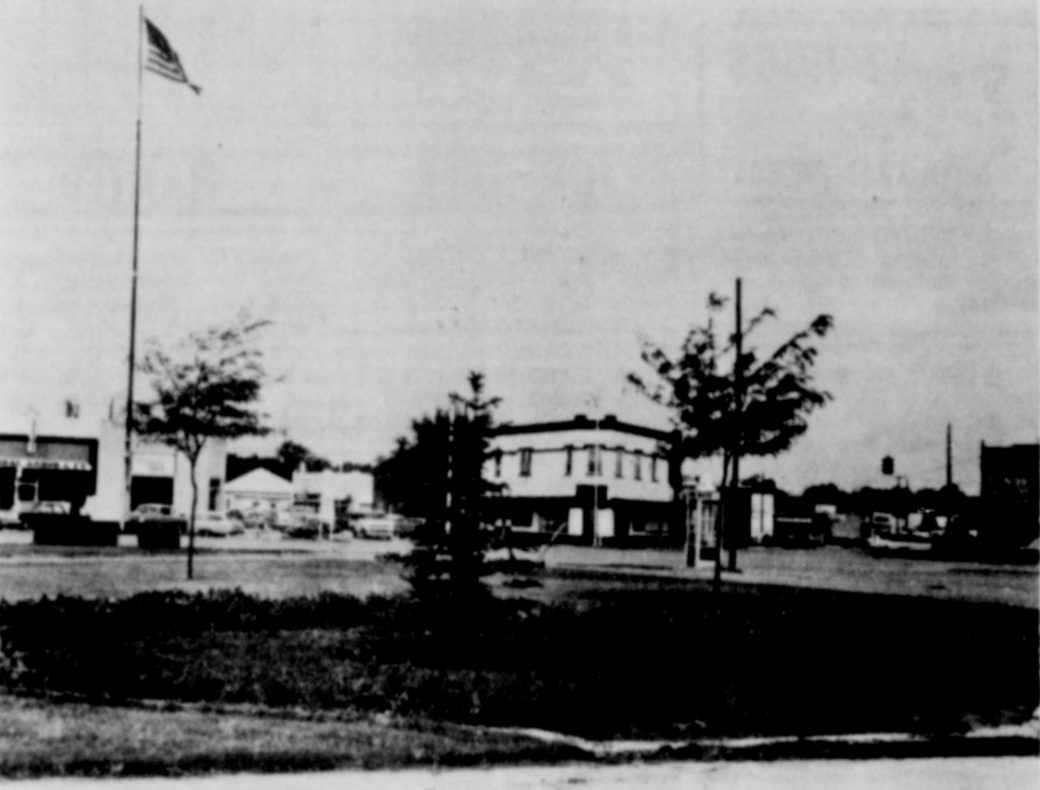

"The student's day at school is becoming filled more and more with additional coursework and less and less with assigned periods of study at school," Gilliam declared.

Get the child's homework for him. Help is permissible and in certain cases very beneficial. But the parent should, like the good teacher, lead the child toward personal discovery of the facts--the truth. It may require much patience but the parent should always avoid answering the child's insistent demands when he says "Yes, yes, but what's the answer to the problem!"

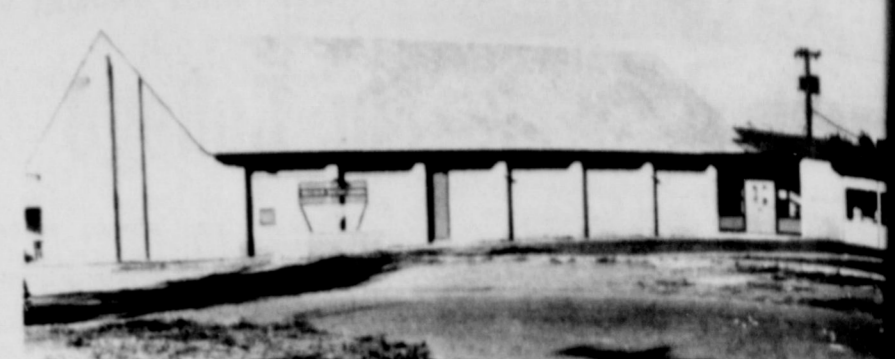

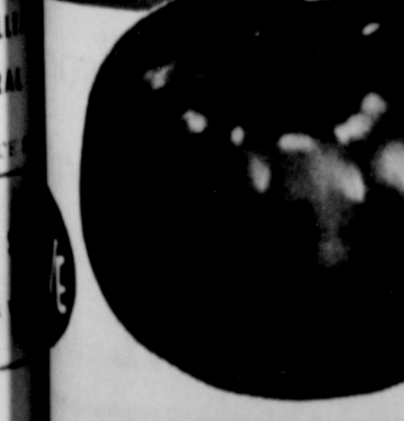

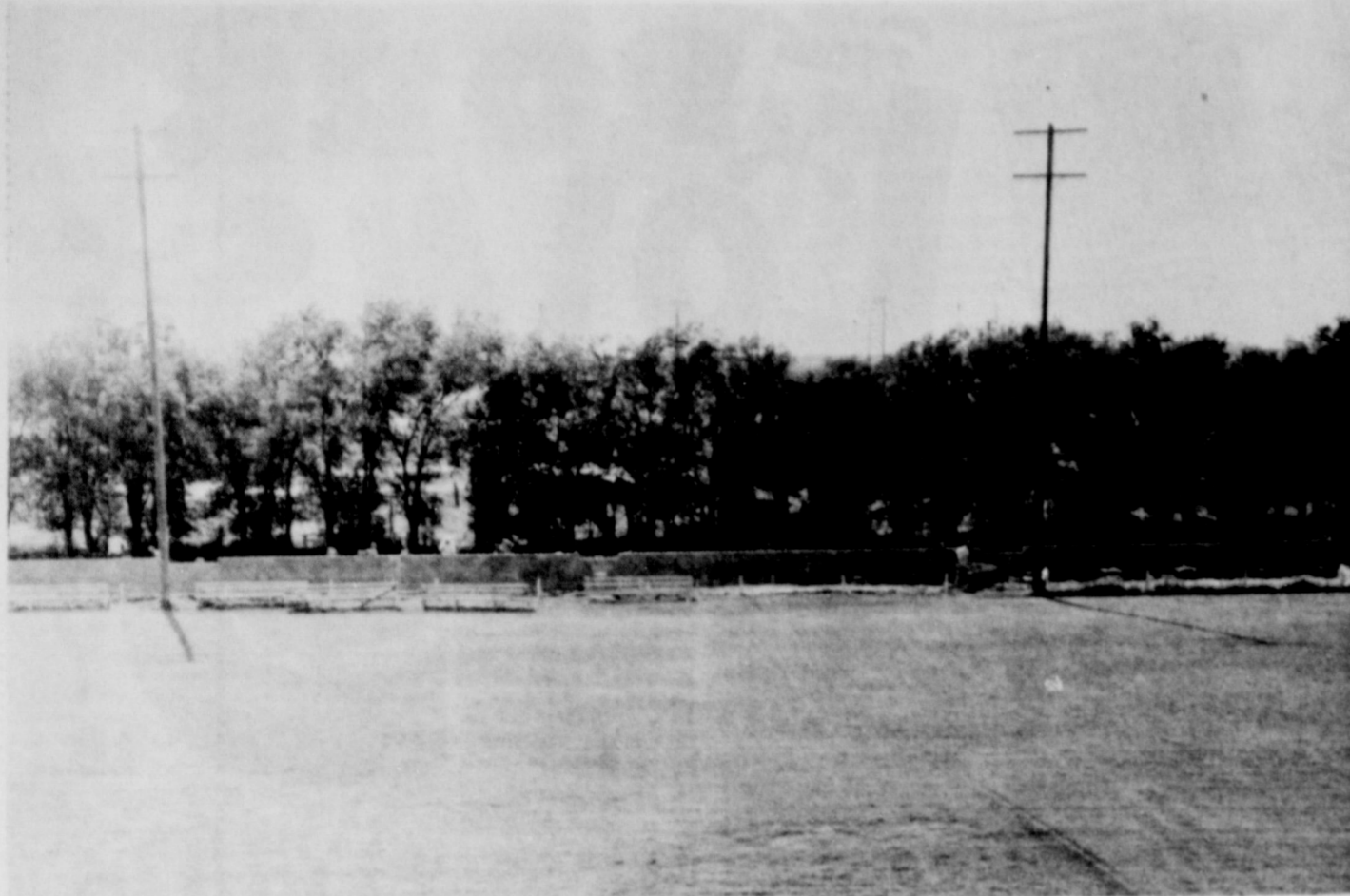

## Water Board Hearing Set Friday in Lubbock

The Texas Water Development Board will be in Lubbock September 9 to hear the views of West Texans on its proposed "Texas Water Plan." The hearing will begin at 9:30 a.m. in

the Municipal Auditorium on the campus at Texas Tech.

According to Joe Pate, Jr., chairman of the Water Committee of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., "This will be the final opportunity for High Plains people to voice their opinions to the entire Water Board, and they shouldn't miss it."

Pate, who will present the testimony of Plains Cotton Growers, is concerned that with other important agricultural

functions flanking the water hearing on either side of September 9 there will be small attendance, and that the Water Board might construe this to be the result of complacency on the Plains toward water.

"Those of us now in the short water areas already know what it means when a well drops to half a pipe or stops pumping altogether. And virtually all of the High Plains could be in a similar position in not too many years unless a way is found for us to share in some of the nation's surplus surface water," he said.

This is the reason he says we cannot afford to miss the chance to present testimony to the Texas Water Board. "There are many people on the Plains with a vital stake in water who are not all familiar with the current water plan, but these people should at least attend the hearing in support of those who have studied it and will present statements."

Pate went ahead to point out that water from any out of state source, according to the experts, would be at least 25 or 30 years in coming, and that West Texas' irrigated economy will begin to go downhill long before that time. Therefore every possibility of bringing some of our state's own surplus water to this area should be thoroughly explored.

The Texas Water Plan as now envisioned doesn't even consider the possibility of this area ever getting any of the state's surplus water. It would take water from the Sulphur River Basin in northeast Texas, through a 980 mile canal, to South Texas. And a huge part of it would be used to irrigate land which has never before been in cultivation.

Pate is careful to say that it

is not the desire of anyone in this area to kill the water plan. On the contrary, he feels there is probably no greater need in the state than a water plan that will trap all of the state's surplus water and put it to the best possible use before it spills into the Gulf. "But," he adds, "we would like to see a complete engineering and economic study of all aspects of the situation -- including all areas in need of water and all possible water sources within the state -- before the final plan is adopted."

No such study was made in the formulation of the currently proposed plan.

Among the advantages present on the Plains for making maximum and economic use of imported water are (1) large storage capability, both on the surface and in the underground formation, (2) widespread underground irrigation systems already in place and (3) an 18 inch annual average rainfall, with which this area perhaps can produce as much with six or eight acre - inches of supplemental water as some other areas could produce with two acre - feet.

In presenting PCG testimony at the hearing, Pate will emphasize that we are not necessarily talking about water with which to raise surplus cotton. "In 15 years," Pate says, "the U. S. will badly need the productive capacity of the Plains for food crops, and there is every possibility that we will be raising potatoes and beans at that time. And with that in mind no one can rightly say at this time just how much we might be able to pay for imported water."

Hunting regulations, procedures and areas for Sanford Recreation Area during the 1966 seasons were announced today by Superintendent M. J. Becker. Key item in the hunting program, as outlined by Becker, was an area in the Northeast end of Lake Meredith which is closed to all hunting. This closed portion encompasses all Recreation Area land and water areas downstream from and including Harbor Bay on the South shore and Blue West on the North, except for Blue Creek above Chimney Hollow.

Maps showing the closed and open hunting areas are available at all local National Park Service and Bureau of Reclamation offices, from National Park Service Rangers in the field, and they are posted on area bulletin boards at launching ramps and post offices in the Lake Meredith area.

Becker also emphasized that hunting is prohibited in or closely adjacent to any
