Bond Vote Called on Airpark

No Tax Increase Says Commission

Slaton City Commission took a giant stride toward developing industrial and aviation facilities for the community during a regular meeting Monday night at City Hall, calling for an \$85,000 bond election for the purpose of building an industrial airpark.

The decision will be up to taxpayers in an Aug. 9 election. The industrial airpark project is estimated at a cost of \$186,000 with matching Federal funds and state aid tabbed for the remainder of the total. Total cost would include purchase of land and installation of runway facilities and lights. Proposed site is about two miles north on FM-400, where the city has obtained an option on 320 acres.

The land, owned by four Lubbock men, runs a mile along FM-400 and is bounded on the north by Gentry Lane, a paved road also. Purchase price of the land is \$300 per acre-- a total of \$96,000 if the bond election carries.

Before calling the election, commissioners heard a report and analysis from Joe Smith of First Southwest Co., the city's financial advisor. He assured the commission that no tax

raise nor increase in valuations would be necessary to pay off the bonds.

It was his opinion that a repayment schedule of 15 years could be set up without causing a burden, and that "it is a workable plan whereby the city can stay within the financial requirements set up by the commission and an advisory group in 1964."

Commissioners Curly Mardindale, Earl Reasoner and Rudy Dominguez all expressed favor with the plan. Mayor Jonas Cain said he thought the airpark would be "a great asset to our community." Jack Smith was not present for the meeting.

All commissioners agreed that if voters turn down the bond issue, the project would be dropped. If matching funds were not approved, the project also would die. Mayor Cain pointed out that matching Federal aid, along with a state grant, would enable the city to build the airpark for "50 cents or less on the dollar."

Slaton Chamber of Commerce initiated the project and made extensive studies and planning before presenting the matter to the commission for its consideration several weeks ago. At that time, the commission agreed to send in an application for Federal funds, since the deadline was July 15.

Members of the Chamber industrial committee, headed by Tommy Wallace, emphasized the potential benefit to be derived from having industrial sites available. The airstrip is expected to take about 100 acres, leaving 220 acres for industrial tracts.

This also presents a possibility of the airpark paying its way in years to come. Smith, in reporting on the financial situation, said Slaton was in "good condition", pointing out that warrants on fire equipment had been paid off. He added that Slaton was in a unique position compared to most Texas towns in that it had no water and sewer revenue bonds outstanding.

With the bond election set for Tuesday, Aug. 9, the absentee voting will begin July 20 and continue through Aug. 5. Voting place will be in City Hall.

To be qualified to vote, citizens must be real or personal property taxpayers and have poll tax receipts or voter registration slips. Citizens must be a resident of Texas one year, of Lubbock County six months and a qualified resident of Slaton on the day of the election.

In other business Monday night, the commission discussed the sewer project in south Slaton, and authorized City Administrator Buford Duff to prepare an ordinance on "junk" houses.

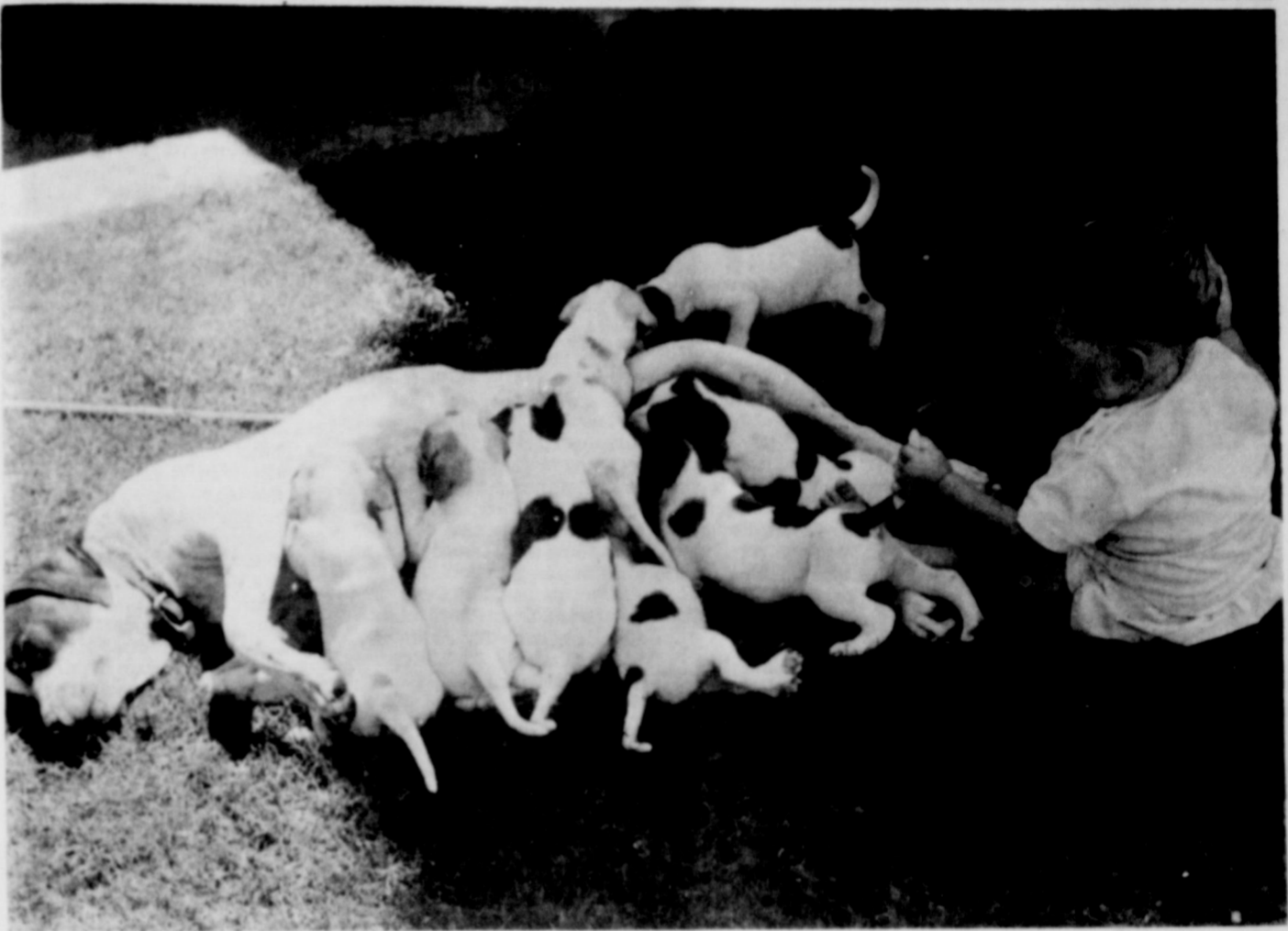
Elmer R. Burns Services Held

C-C Directors Hold Meeting

Slaton Chamber of Commerce directors held a regular monthly meeting Tuesday night, with the session highlighted by discussions of upcoming activities. The chamber board went on record as endorsing the bond election for an industrial airpark, after city commissioners called the issue for Aug. 9. The C of C was responsible for advancing the proposal through its industrial and airport committees.

Directors also approved a \$1,500 allocation to Slaton Golf Course Assn. The C of C had pledged the funds, if needed, when the golf course project was launched last year.

A monthly bulletin, published by the chamber, was shown at the meeting. Chamber Manager Wayne Cooper got the first issue of the press this month, and it was sent to all businesses in the city. An industrial brochure is due to be published soon.

Willie Heinrich and Jay Gray were named as co-chairmen of the annual Farmer-Merchant Barbecue which is held each September. A committee is scheduled to start making plans soon.

Directors approved the enrollment of Cooper in an industrial institute at the University of Oklahoma next month. Attending the meeting were Cooper, President G. G. Nieman, Jake Wendel, Lee Vardy, Tommy Wallace, Ellis Schmid, J. S. Edwards, Jr., Earl Eblen.

Building Permits Climb

Building permits for Slaton appeared headed for a big total after construction for the first six months of 1966 totaled \$377,824.

The figures were highlighted by several major building projects, including a permit of \$172,848 to Slaton Independent Schools for a new high school gym. The June total, highest of the year to date, was \$181,648.

ahead of last year's figures for the first six months when the total was \$139,600.

With more school construction on the drawing table, it appears city construction will surpass the 1965 total of \$522,472. Record year for Slaton occurred in 1960 when the total was \$947,600.

Bustiest month of the year, thus far, was April. Seven building projects were recorded for the period, totaling \$122,050 in issued building permits. Smith Ford Co. was issued a permit for a \$108,000 structure at the intersection of FM-41 and US-84 bypass.

February figures jumped to \$40,000. A \$35,000 building project by Southwestern Bell Tele-

phone dominated that month's building activities.

Southwestern Public Service pushed March figures to \$34,847 with their construction permit for a \$25,847 building. Reports for January and May were not as impressive. Construction in January totaled \$2,375 and consisted of frame structures and other minor building projects.

Only two building permits were issued in May for a total of \$1,400. Figures for the first two weeks of July totaled \$2,500. A \$2,000 permit was issued to N. P. Tate, 650 S. 15th, for a wood structure. R. L. Kincheloe received a \$500 building permit for a frame structure at 955 W. Dickens.

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Police business was light during the past week. Slaton police were called on to handle an incident of aggravated assault, simple assault, burglary, theft and one dog bite incident.

Pearl Stator, 990 Johnson, was treated for a four-inch cut on his right shoulder blade. The assault incident occurred after an argument over a shirt. Mail Deposit Change Made

A change in mail deposits on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays will be instituted Saturday, July 16, it was announced this week by Slaton Postmaster Rush Wheeler.

The important thing for postal patrons to remember is that all mail deposited after 2 p.m. Saturday should be put in the outside drop box at the post office. No mail will be picked up around the square after that time. The letter drop inside the post office will be closed at 2:30 on Saturdays.

Also, mail deposited on Sundays or holidays after 8 a.m. should be placed in the outside drop box. No mail will be picked up around the square after that time. The letter drop inside the post office will be closed at 8:30 a.m.

The new arrangement will not delay mail delivery, according to Wheeler. He pointed out that the new arrangement would be convenient for postal patrons, in that they can deposit mail on these days in the outside drop box without having to leave their car. The change will also benefit the work schedule at the post office.

Any questions should be directed to the post office.

Farm Outlook Termed Good

The overall agricultural outlook for Slaton and the surrounding area continues to brighten after the region's cropland received more beneficial rainfall Sunday.

The moisture, along with hot days and warm nights, have made prospects bright for cotton and grain crops. These factors have led to a current optimistic forecast by most farm observers.

Spotted thundershowers left rainfall readings ranging from "a shower" up to almost four

inches in the area Sunday afternoon. Heaviest moisture was between Wilson and Slaton and east of Wilson.

Alvin Kitten reported about 3.5 inches of rain on his farm about four miles south of Slaton. R. C. Standefer, six miles south, reported about 3 inches of rain.

Slaton measurements ranged from .2 to .4 of an inch. Southland and New Lynn communities reported .50 of an inch. Scattered showers left light amounts of moisture in some areas, heavier in others. While cotton acreage is off some 25 percent this year due to the new government program, some ag observers are looking for better grain crops and increased cotton yields to produce a bumper year.

While the expectations are bright, a number of factors could change the picture suddenly. An early frost could cut the anticipated production, as could too much rain or hail before harvest time.

Cotton, which needs hot days and warm nights, appears to be thriving under present conditions. Hail damage caused some replanting in June, and cotton growth is running a little later than usual.

Temperatures have been around the 100-degree mark for the past two weeks. After Sunday's high of an even 100, the mercury climbed to 98 on Monday and Tuesday and was expected to be a little cooler Wednesday. Low reading the past week was 69 Thursday morning.

Water Usage Climbs Upward

As summer temperatures climbed into the 100's, Slaton's water usage soared into the million gallon-plus pumped per day.

June figures of 28,372,000 gallons marked a 10-million gallon increase over the preceding 30 day period.

Final figures for the June 21 to July 20 pumping period are expected to show another sharp rise in water usage. The city water pumps flowed 1,788,000 gallons to thirsty Slatonites July 6 when temperatures reached 102.

Figures such as the July 6 figure and the July 1 figure of 1,680,000 with a mercury reading of only 97, indicates a possible water record for Slaton in the remaining summer months.

On-Job Training Set For Slaton Vo-Ag Students

A new on-the-job training program for high school students will be launched this fall at Slaton High School, according to Dr. Lee Vardy, superintendent of schools. An "off-farm" agriculture occupations curriculum has been developed by the Vocational Agriculture Department and the school officials.

This program will give students an opportunity to spend part of their school time in on-the-job training with local agricultural businesses. Students participating will enroll in regular high school courses, including one period of related agricultural instruction, during which time they will study information related to their on-the-job training.

They will spend a minimum of three hours each weekday on the job, learning the skills and management practices involved under the guidance of a skilled instructor selected from the firm in which the student is working.

This phase of the vocational agriculture program is designed to offer training to all high school students who have an interest in an agricultural occupation. This training can lead to in-school employment and immediate employment after completion of the high school program, or serve as a background for post high school study.

A survey conducted recently reveals 252 agricultural related jobs will be available in the Slaton Independent School District within the next three years. Further information concerning the program may be obtained by contacting Mr. E.D. Gilliam, vocational agriculture instructor, or Dr. Lee Vardy, superintendent.

Wards to Far East

The globe-trotting Ward family of Slaton is on another global hop, this time to the Far East. Mrs. Claude L. Ward and sons, Steve and Stan, left this week for Okinawa where they will join CWO-W3 Claude L. Ward, an Army engineer on a tug boat at Okinawa. His military duties have taken him to Europe, Korea, Viet Nam and several Army posts in the United States since his enlistment in 1953.

Preparations for the trans-Pacific flight were arranged in four steps, according to Mrs. Ward.

Small appliances, 750 pounds of them, were shipped by air to the Okinawa base. Major household appliances and furnishings were sent by ship.

Mrs. Ward said the 2,250 pounds of items—such as washer, dryer, television and winter clothes—will arrive in six weeks.

The third shipment to leave for Okinawa was a live cargo. Pept, the Wards' white poodle, left July 4th by military air transport. Pept gained a day by crossing the international date line. He arrived in Okinawa the day he left on the 8,000 mile flight.

The last shipment to leave Slaton was the Ward family. The threesome flew to their San Francisco departure point where they joined other Army families on their way to Okinawa.

The Far East tour will be the second such overseas experience for the Wards. In June, 1957, the Wards went to France for a three-year tour of duty. While in France, their second son, Stan, was born.

Mrs. Ward said their first tour was "a wonderful experience." They toured France, Italy, Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Holland, Luxembourg and Belgium, where they attended the 1958 World's Fair at Brussels.

The Wards' home in Okinawa will be a part of the U.S. transplanted in Okinawa. The Americans live in the Machinato Housing Area. The Army provides housing and shopping, recreational and entertainment facilities.

Mrs. Ward said they will be living in a three-bedroom home in the housing area. Ward is stationed at nearby NAHA Air Base.

Life in the Far East will be drastically different from their Slaton surroundings, Ward wrote that a total of 72 inches of rain have been recorded since January.

Mr. and Mrs. Ward are native Slatonites. She is the former Joyce Sexton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F.B. Sexton. Ward is the son of Mrs. Eunice Ward. Both Wards graduated from Slaton High School.

Ward and Pept will be on hand at NAHA Airbase to greet the rest of the family. Mrs. Ward said they hope to send an open letter to Slaton after settling in their new home in a new land.

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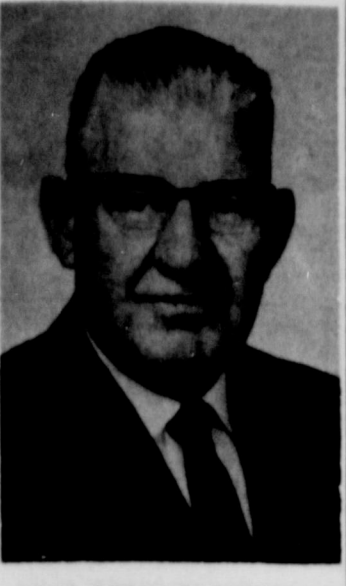

Lubbock made a serious threat in the final inning, loading the bases on a walk and two singles. Kitten got the next batter to fly out to center, then struck out the final two batters.

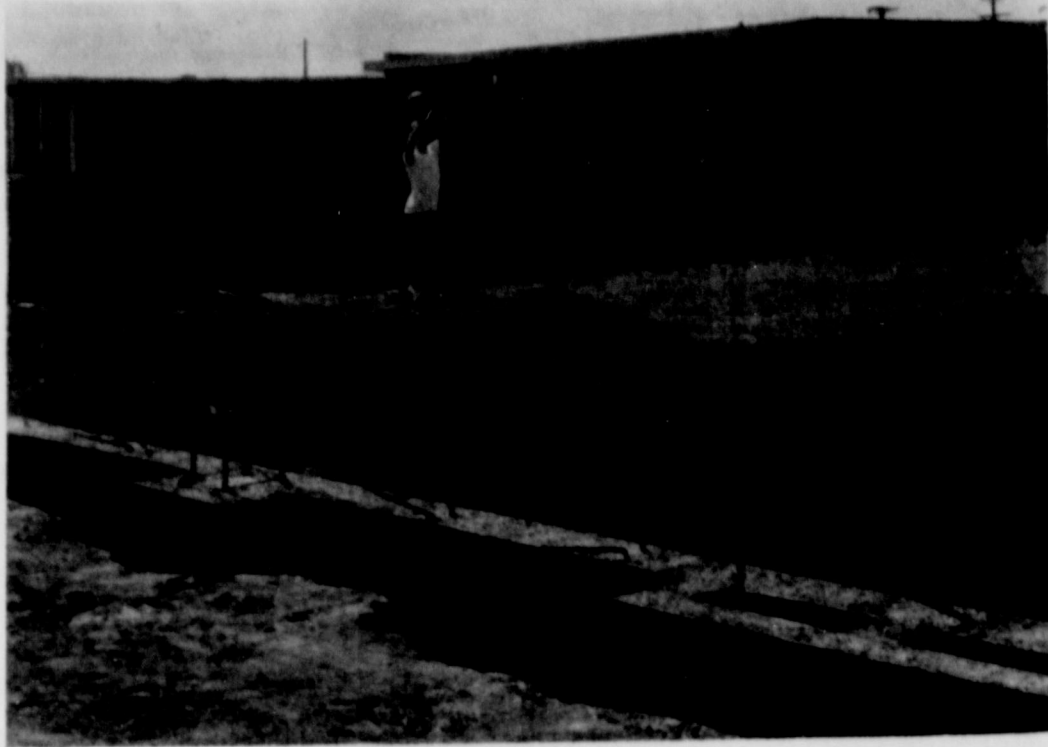
Slaton reeled off double plays in the third and fifth frames to cut off minor threats.
