ITEM: If you're looking for a change-of-pace in trailing plants for hanging baskets or window boxes, try one of the many varieties of ivy-leaf geraniums available in porous clay pots at your garden center or florist.

ITEM: Next time you shop for nonfat dry milk, notice the amount of quarts the contents will make. You'll find this can save you money. Size of package is not always indication of a better buy.

ITEM: Children aren't the only ones who track mud into the house—everyone does when the weather is bad. Many homemakers take care of the situation with a mudroom, located at the back or side entrance, usually with at least a lavatory and water closet. The mudroom traps mud before it gets into the living area of the house.

ITEM: If you are redecorating, you can mix both warm and cool colors in a room, but don't use too many colors in it. Remember to study color swatches in both daylight and incandescent light because colors tend to change under artificial lighting. Don't use colors in equal proportions in any one room as this tends to dull the overall effect. And, for a smooth, visually pleasing color flow from room to room, use harmonious colors in rooms that adjoin.

Vacation Care

Spiced crabapples, of which the canned variety does nicely if you don't have your own, can be placed on pineapple slices for a meat platter.

Have you tried filling pear halves with cherry preserves and placing under the broiler until the fruit is heated? This goes well around a meat platter.

Make a platter of your vegetables if you have several. Surround with stuffed baked potatoes, cut in half the long way so they look like cups and top with butter and paprika.

Fresh fruit like strawberries, blueberries and peaches take nicely to a dollop of dairy sour cream and a sprinkling of nutmeg.

Place pickle chunks, pickled onions and plum tomatoes on a wooden pick for a sandwich kabob garnish.

Top melon slices with assorted, cut-up fruits or fruit cocktail, drained. Serve with balls of cream cheese rolled in chopped nuts.

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Slaton Firemen Attend Special School at A&M

Slaton Fire Chief Don Kendrick, Pete Williams, assistant, and Leroy Poer are attending a firemen's school on the Texas A&M campus this week. The volunteer firemen were accompanied by their families to the five-day school.

Kendrick explained that Slaton profits in two ways from the firemen school. Better fire-fighting methods will be learned at the school, thus better fire service for Slaton. At the same time, residents realize a five per cent credit on the city fire insurance key rate as a result of the course.

Williams and Poer will be taking fire-fighting courses, considered the backbone of the school program. Kendrick will attend five days of eight-hour lecture sessions designed for fire marshals.

In the fire-fighting course, Williams and Poer will participate in actual fire-fighting practice. They will confront house, car, plane, and oil-pit fires.

New chemical fire fighting

methods will be taught. Rescue methods will be practiced in actual burning buildings. Technique involving fire hoses and nozzle sizes will be covered in the school.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

Dependency problems are the greatest source of income tax audits at the Internal Revenue Service. Only one person can claim a dependent. The tax folks find, however, that two taxpayers often claim the same dependent.

This is especially true in divorce cases. There are also many cases where the taxpayer has not provided principal support for the dependent, or does not qualify to claim the dependent.

If you have a dependency problem, read the instructions carefully or call the Internal Revenue Service for help. You may avoid a tax audit.

how best to perform the duties of fire marshal. Lectures will cover insurance laws, key rates, and detection of the origin and cause of fires.

Expert fire fighters from the larger fire departments in the state will instruct the courses. The instructors fight the fires and help in rescue missions as on-the-spot instructors to point out faster and safer methods for firemen.

Kendrick said firemen from Texas and surrounding states will attend the school. Students come from across the nation and even from Mexico to attend the fire school.

The school offers 12 courses and is sponsored by the State Firemen and Fire Marshals Association. More than 1,500 attend the school, sponsored by the Engineering Extension Service of A&M.

The Slaton firemen will return Saturday after final examinations are held.

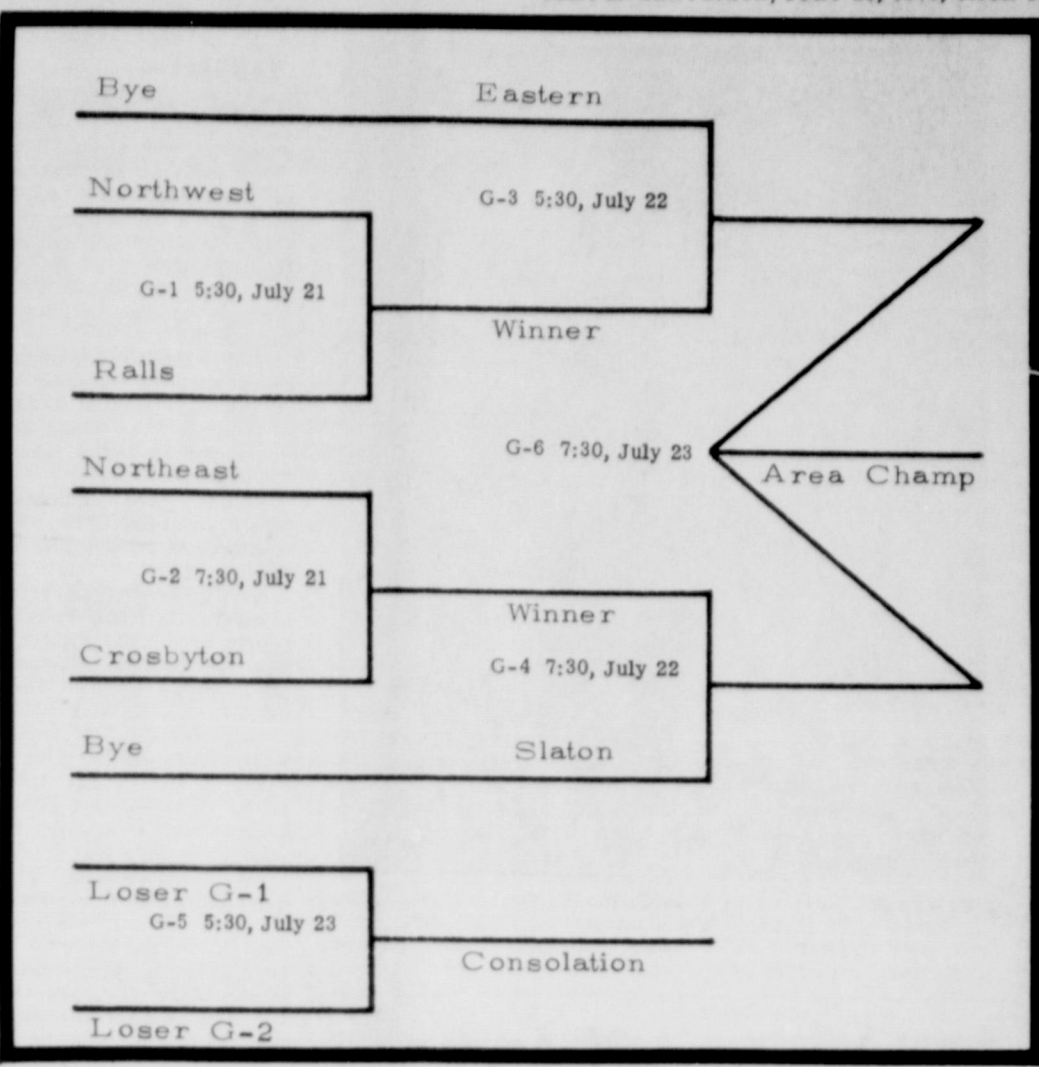
Rural Phones

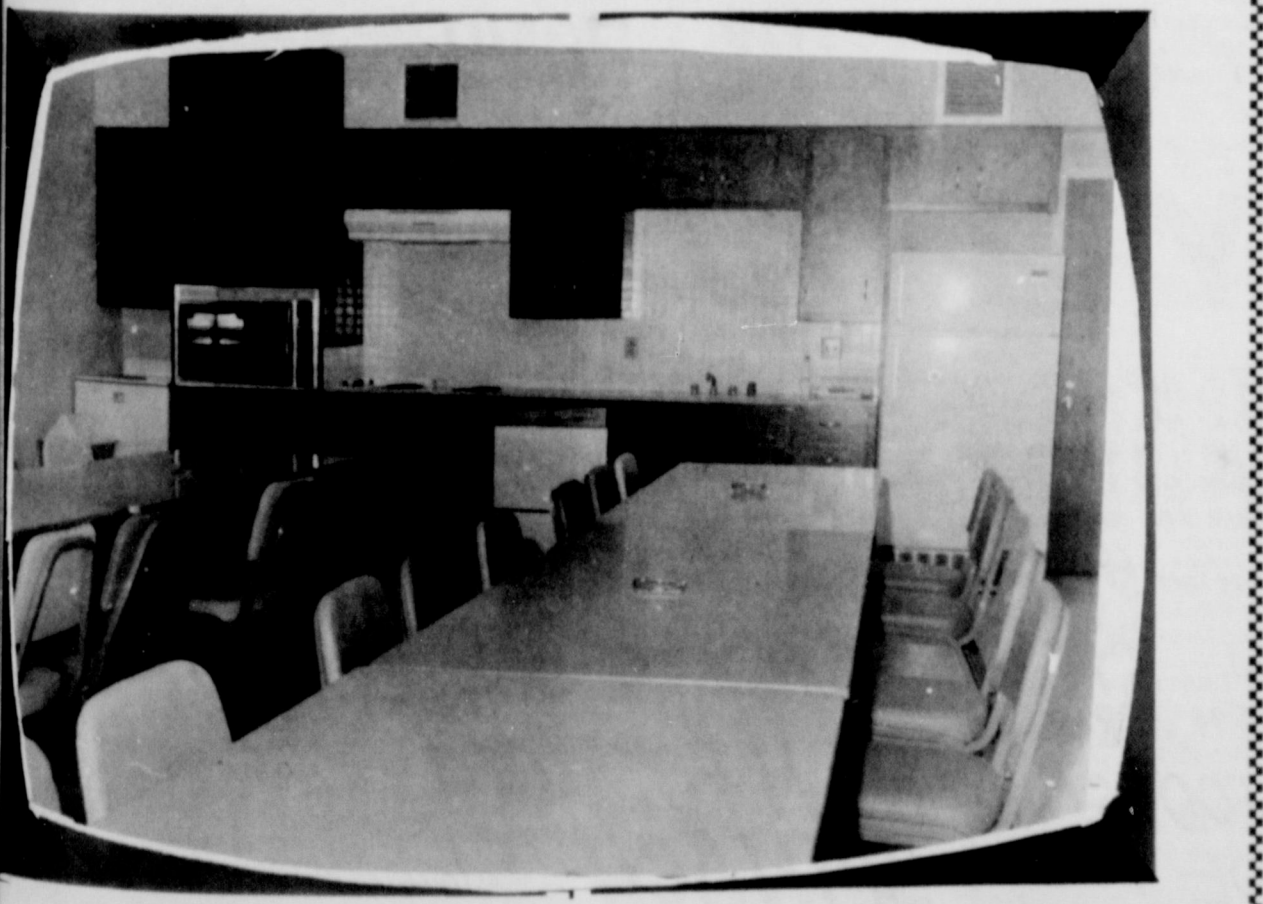

Farm Safety Week Slated

AUSTIN -- The Texas Safety Association today urged Texas farm families to join in observing National Farm Safety Week, July 24-30.

J. O. Musick, TSA general manager, also urged all persons and organizations allied with agriculture to unite in the nationwide effort to reduce the number of accidents among farm families.

Accidents kill some 8,300 farm residents each year, and an additional 760,000 or more are victims of disabling injuries.

"This is an alarming situation, not only because of the grief to loved ones, the expense and unnecessary suffering, but also because of the monetary loss to the nation," Musick said. "Farm families and rural leaders must make a joint effort to eliminate hazards --- at work, in the home, at play and on-the-road."

The 1966 farm safety campaign will place special emphasis on the prevention of highway accidents involving slow-moving farm vehicles.

Farm residents are being urged to use the new SMV emblem on all slow-moving vehicles, such as farm tractors. The emblem, a fluorescent yellow-orange colored triangle with a dark red reflective border about 14 inches high and 16 inches wide, is placed on the rear of a slow-moving vehicle so it can be easily seen by other drivers, day or night, from a distance of 500 feet or more.

The motoring public is being urged to stay on the alert for the emblem.

"The average motorist does not realize how slowly the vehicle ahead of him is moving until it is too late to avoid a collision," Musick explained. "Under normal conditions, recognition of the emblem would provide ample time for the motorist to safely reduce his speed."

36 Accidents Go on Records

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 36 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of June, according to Sgt. G.C. Guthrie highway patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in sixteen persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$20,955.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1966 shows a total of 232 accidents resulting in six persons killed, 145 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$172,895.

The number of traffic deaths in Texas continues to rise. For the first six months of 1966 there have been 1,470 traffic deaths compared to 1,325 traffic deaths for the first months of 1965.

This 11% increase is very alarming, and chances are it will become very critical because of vacation months and holiday periods still ahead to intensify the magnitude of the accident picture.
