Absentee voting opened Wednesday for the \$85,000 industrial airpark bond election in Slaton, with election day coming up Aug. 9.

Eligible voters who will be out of town Aug. 9 or unable to go to the polls that day, have until Aug. 5 to cast absentee ballots at City Hall.

The total project -- including matching Federal funds if approved -- is estimated \$186,000 for acquisition of land and installation of an air strip. A state grant of up to \$12,000 is also anticipated if voters okay the issue.

Plans are for a paved runway of some 4,000 feet long, termed large enough for "all business aircraft," The airstrip would also be lighted.



Slaton Firemen Attend Special School at A&M

drick, Pete Williams, assistant, and Leroy Poer are attending a firemen's school on the Texas A&M campus this week. The volunteer firmen were accompanied by their families to the five - day school.

Kendrick explained that Slaton profits in two ways from the firemen school. Better firefighting methods will be learned at the school, thus better fire service for Slaton. At the same time, residents realize a five per cent credit on the city fire insurance key rate as a result of the course.

Williams and Poer will be taking fire - fighting courses, considered the backbone of the school program. Kendrick will attend five days of eight hour lecture sessions designed for fire marshals.

In the fire - fighting course, Williams and Poer will participate in actual fire - fighting practice. They will confront house, car, plane, and oil -

methods will be practiced in actual burning buildings. Technique involving fire hoses and nozzle sizes will be covered in the school.
