THIRD STEP IN BIG IMPROVEMENTS PROGRAM

Bid Accepted for New School Cafeteria

Third step in a \$500,000 school improvements program was taken by the Slaton School Board last week when a conin the amount of \$66,375 for the construction of a cafetorium at West Ward Elementary was awarded to T. E. Shelburne & Sons, Inc., of

Equipment was being moved in this week and the project is scheduled for completion in 150 days.

Construction is underway on two other projects in the halfmillion dollar improvements program -- a new high school gym and new west side concrete stands at Tiger Stadium.

In other business last Thursday night, the board passed a resolution expressing thanks to Citizens State Bank, Slaton Supreme Mills, Ray C. Ayers & Son, and Slaton Co-Op Gin for the football scoreboard presented to the Slaton Public Schools. The new electric

scoreboard was seen by fans for the first time in the Springlake game Oct. 7.

The board also authorized the painting of the exterior trim and interior walls of the high school field house, and decided to complete the walk from the new band hall at junior high to the street on the south side.

Bids on the cafeteria were opened for the second time last Thursday night, Trustees had rejected all bids when the first

and determined to be too high. The board instructed the architect to make minor changes and call for new bids.

Supt. Lee Vardy indicated that minor changes were made in the interior wall coverings, heating system and restrooms. The cafetorium will be located on the southeast side of the West Ward building, joining onto the present school building.

The three projects represent

total contracts of approximately \$296,000. The gym contract went for \$172,848 last June; the stadium project was let in July on a base bid of \$54,-789 with a sound system and water-proofing of masonry being added.

It was hoped the new 1,200 seating - capacity stadium would be ready at least by Homecoming, but bad weather threw the schedule way off base. The gym is scheduled for completion around the first of the year.

A new elementary school building was also proposed in the improvements program, but it was not planned for construction in the near future.

The new west - side stadium will include team dressing rooms, rest room facilities, and concession stands -- enclosed at each end. The stadium will be 11 rows high and some 170 feet in length.

1 c. slaked lime

8 c. sugar T. salt

quart and 1 pint vinegar T. pickling spices T. celery seed

First Day -- Wash and slice 1/8 to 1/4 inch slices of tomatoes. Soak in lime water 24 hours (1 cup lime to 7 pounds tomatoes water to cover). Do

not use metal pan for soaking. Second Day -- Rinse tomatoes thoroughly two times in very cold water or until lime is removed. Drain and soak in cold water 2 or 3 hours or overnight.

Mix spices, celery seed, salt and sugar in a large pan and add tomatoes, Boil for 55 minutes. Let simmer along while filling hot sterilized jars with tomatoes. Cook vinegar 5 minutes, pour over tomatoes and

COCONUT LAYER OR LOAF CAKE

2 sticks oleo

1 1/4 c. sugar eggs

2 c. flour 3 t baking powder

1/2 t salt

2/3 c. sweet milk 1 t, vanilla

Cream together oleo and sugar; add eggs one at a time, beating after each. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, Add milk and vanilla to oleo and eggs. After this mixture is well mixed, add flour and mix well. Pour into three 9" pans. Bake at 375 degrees for 25 minutes or until done,



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

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

AUSTIN -- Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler announced that a Veterans' Land Board Forfeited Land Sale would be held on Nov. 15, 1966, in the General Land Office. He pointed out that the program has exceeded all expectations in its success and value to the people of Texas.

Sadler said that the delinquencies on veteran contract payments are lower today than at any time in the history of the program. Land prices are higher and the program is making a \$2-1/2 million profit per year for the taxpayers of Texas, in addition to helping veterans own a tract of land hat they fought to preserve.

The land office has purchased ome three million acres of and placed some \$243 million in circulation to boost the economy of this State. Although new purchases under the program are no longer possible, a vast amount of work remains to be done in servicing veterans' contracts. Carving out homesites, issuing fractional severance deeds and paid-infull deeds, approving oil and gas leases, and issuing easements have to be performed

You who are not farmers might think we should have a good income from cotton, but the situation is getting so the farmer just about breaks even, and more and more of them have to seek jobs in some other
