

THIRD STEP IN BIG IMPROVEMENTS PROGRAM

# Bid Accepted for New School Cafeteria

Third step in a \$500,000 school improvements program was taken by the Slaton School Board last week when a contract in the amount of \$66,375 for the construction of a cafeteria at West Ward Elementary was awarded to T. E. Shelburne & Sons, Inc., of Snyder.

Equipment was being moved in this week and the project is scheduled for completion in 150 days.

Construction is underway on two other projects in the half-million dollar improvements program -- a new high school gym and new west side concrete stands at Tiger Stadium.

In other business last Thursday night, the board passed a resolution expressing thanks to Citizens State Bank, Slaton Supreme Mills, Ray C. Ayers & Son, and Slaton Co-Op Gin for the football scoreboard presented to the Slaton Public Schools. The new electric

scoreboard was seen by fans for the first time in the Spring-lake game Oct. 7.

The board also authorized the painting of the exterior trim and interior walls of the high school field house, and decided to complete the walk from the new band hall at junior high to the street on the south side.

Bids on the cafeteria were opened for the second time last Thursday night. Trustees had rejected all bids when the first bid - opening was held in July

and determined to be too high. The board instructed the architect to make minor changes and call for new bids.

Supt. Lee Vardy indicated that minor changes were made in the interior wall coverings, heating system and rest rooms. The cafeteria will be located on the southeast side of the West Ward building, joining onto the present school building.

The three projects represent

total contracts of approximately \$296,000. The gym contract went for \$172,848 last June; the stadium project was let in July on a base bid of \$54,789 with a sound system and water-proofing of masonry being added.

It was hoped the new 1,200 seating - capacity stadium would be ready at least by Homecoming, but bad weather threw the schedule way off base. The gym is scheduled for com-

pletion around the first of the year.

A new elementary school building was also proposed in the improvements program, but it was not planned for construction in the near future.

The new west - side stadium will include team dressing rooms, rest room facilities, and concession stands -- enclosed at each end. The stadium will be 11 rows high and some 170 feet in length.

### Slaton Seeks Loop Win Over Frenship

They're pepping up Homecoming at Slaton High this year, planning some events for exes and honoring classes of 1960-66 in hopes of getting a larger participation and better response to the annual reunion.

Besides honoring exes from classes of 1960 through 1966, a reception is planned for all exes following the game Friday night, and a dance is scheduled Saturday night in St. Joseph's Hall.

Homecoming activities actually start tonight at 6:30 when a huge bonfire and pep rally is scheduled on the parking lot at Tiger Stadium. Class competition will be held for the bonfire, and a "Mr. and Miss Flame" will be named as spirit leaders.

The Slaton - Frenship football game, climax of Homecoming activities, is scheduled to start at 7:30 p.m. Friday, but pre-game events will be launched at 7:10 p.m. when the Tiger Football Sweetheart will be crowned to reign over the Homecoming event.

Candidates for the sweetheart title, as selected by the football team, are seniors Cheryl Clark, Jan McCoy and Vicki Nowlin.

Coffee and brownies will be served to exes at the reception following the game. It will be held in the junior high cafeteria with the Slaton Young Homemakers chapter sponsoring the reception. Exes are invited to meet in the cafeteria for refreshments and to talk about "old school days."

Candidates for the title of Mr. and Miss Flame at the Thursday night bonfire are: freshmen -- Allen McDonald and Patti Neill, sophomores -- Jimmy Williams and Debbie McWilliams, juniors -- Doyle Ethridge and Ava Harrell, seniors -- Steve Harlan and Jacque Edwards.

Tiger Town will sponsor a dance for SHS students Friday night after the game until 1 a.m. in St. Joseph's Hall. It will be for high school students only, while the Saturday night dance is scheduled for exes.

The Tigers battle the Tigers here Friday night, but it's not an intrasquad game. It'll be the Slaton Tigers taking on the Frenship Tigers in a District 4-AA contest starting at 7:30 p.m.

The game will also mark Homecoming festivities at Slaton High, with activities at Tiger Stadium actually beginning at 7:10 p.m. Friday. Pre-game events include the crowning of the Tiger Football Sweetheart.

For the home-town Tigers, the game will mark the second in district competition after losing a hard-fought contest to the strong Denver City team last week. Slaton will be seeking to even its district record and, at the same time, bring its season mark to the .500 level.

The Tigers have won 2, lost 3 and tied 1 this season and

they're still aiming for a winning season. Coach Ernie Davis' scrappy crew is still hoping for a share of the title if the occasion presents itself.

Slaton lost a regular starter last week when junior end Claude Stricklin sustained a fractured arm in the Denver City game. Stricklin will be out for the remainder of the season, and his services will be missed on both offense and defense. Except for the major injury to Stricklin, the Tigers came out of the D. City game in good condition.

Coach Davis had tabbed sophomore Larry Allison, 155, to fill in for Stricklin on offense, and halfback Richard Washington may also see action at the wing. Halfback Larry Pickens is expected to move in on the defensive end position.

The only other change from last week's lineup might see junior Dale Harris taking over a defensive guard's position. Harris had an outstanding game against the Mustangs last week. Bobby Ball would man the other guard post on defense, with Roy Green taking a rest on defense while going at offensive tackle. Green is slightly hampered with a knee injury.

Halfback Charles Fisher continues to be the top ground gainer for the Tigers with Larry Pickens and quarterback Jim Williams giving strong support. Wingback Doyle Ethridge is the team's top pass receiver, and Pickens is also a favorite target for Williams.

## COOK OF THE WEEK

Seems this is a year for "big things" in the Slaton area. The Slatonite has taken pictures of the largest cantaloupe we've heard of being raised here, the biggest sweet potato and now the "tallest" tomato vine.

The tomato vine in the yard of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Wilkins is about 13 feet long and Mrs. Wilkins said if she had a ladder she could have extended it six feet on up the trellis. Some of the tomatoes they have taken off the vine have weighed up to one pound.

To give credit where credit is due (and for all you oaks), the plant was brought here from Ada, Okla. by Mrs. E. N. Pickens and given to Mrs. Wilkins. She planted it the middle of May.

When Mrs. Wilkins was asked what some of her favorite hobbies were, she said she had so many she'd have to think. She enjoys collecting plates from different states and ole' timey ones.

The Wilkins are members of Westview Baptist Church and they operate the Wilkins Laundry at 330 So. 9th St.

They are the parents of twin sons, Ray and Raymond, who both are married and have families, and one daughter, Vicki Jo, who is 10 years old, and six grandchildren.

The Wilkins moved from Boonville, Ark. to here in 1947. Mrs. Wilkins' parents still live there.

A recipe Mrs. Wilkins is sharing with us this week is one she is using with her tomatoes for Sweet Crisp Lime Tomato Pickles.

**SWEET CRISP LIME PICKLES**  
7 pounds green tomatoes (or cucumbers)  
1 c. slaked lime  
8 c. sugar  
1 T. salt  
1 quart and 1 pint vinegar  
1 T. pickling spices  
1 T. celery seed

First Day -- Wash and slice 1/8 to 1/4 inch slices of tomatoes. Soak in lime water 24 hours (1 cup lime to 7 pounds tomatoes water to cover). Do not use metal pan for soaking.

Second Day -- Rinse tomatoes thoroughly two times in very cold water or until lime is removed. Drain and soak in cold water 2 or 3 hours or overnight.

Mix spices, celery seed, salt and sugar in a large pan and add tomatoes. Boil for 55 minutes. Let simmer along while filling hot sterilized jars with tomatoes. Cook vinegar 5 minutes, pour over tomatoes and seal.

**COCONUT LAYER OR LOAF CAKE**  
2 sticks oleo  
1 1/4 c. sugar  
5 eggs  
2 c. flour  
3 t. baking powder  
1/2 t. salt  
2/3 c. sweet milk  
1 t. vanilla

Cream together oleo and sugar; add eggs one at a time, beating after each. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt. Add milk and vanilla to oleo and eggs. After this mixture is well mixed, add flour and mix well. Pour into three 9" pans. Bake at 375 degrees for 25 minutes or until done.

**FROSTING**  
1 1/2 c. sugar  
1/2 c. water  
1 1/2 t. vinegar  
3 egg whites  
Few grains salt  
1 t. vanilla extract  
1 can coconut

Boil together sugar, water and vinegar to 238 degrees (or until syrup spins long thread when dropped from tip of spoon). Beat egg whites stiff; gradually add syrup, beating constantly, until frosting holds shape. Add salt and vanilla. Makes enough to fill and frost 3 - 9" cake layers.

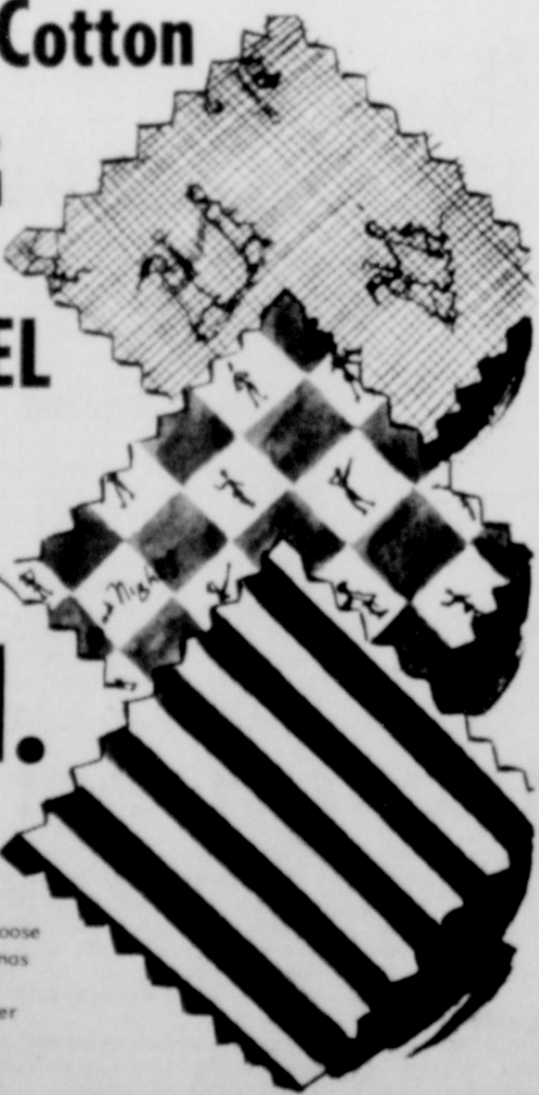

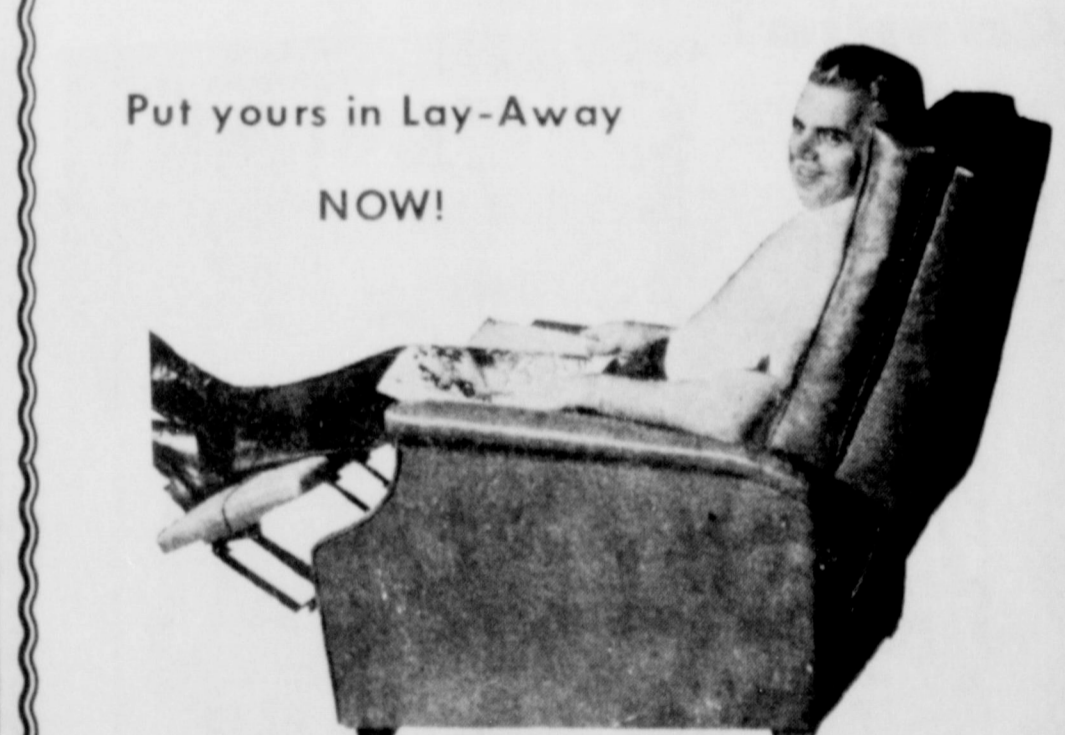

**Veterans' Land Sale Scheduled**

AUSTIN -- Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler announced that a Veterans' Land Board Forfeited Land Sale would be held on Nov. 15, 1966, in the General Land Office. He pointed out that the program has exceeded all expectations in its success and value to the people of Texas.

Sadler said that the delinquencies on veteran contract payments are lower today than at any time in the history of the program. Land prices are higher and the program is making a \$2-1/2 million profit per year for the taxpayers of Texas, in addition to helping veterans own a tract of land that they fought to preserve.

The land office has purchased some three million acres of land for 35,300 Texas veterans and placed some \$243 million in circulation to boost the economy of this State. Although new purchases under the program are no longer possible, a vast amount of work remains to be done in servicing veterans' contracts. Carving out homesites, issuing fractional severance deeds and paid-in-full deeds, approving oil and gas leases, and issuing easements have to be performed

Charles Fisher was again the top ground gainer for Slaton, but he got only 49 yards in 16 trips against the tough Mustang line. The Tigers netted only 72 yards for the night. After missing three passes in the first half, Williams hit 7 of 11 in the second half for 108 yards.

The Mustangs had to grind out yardage the hard way against the scrappy Tiger defense. Linebacker Joe Olague turned

in his top game of the season, and Ethridge was again a stand-out at defensive end. Tom Davis, Dale Harris, Bobby Ball, Tommy Donaldson and Roy Green made it tough for the Mustangs in the forward wall.

The Tiger secondary was stingy, too, with Steve Harlan, Richard Washington, Williams and Fisher sharing the defensive roles. The Mustangs hit only two passes for 19 yards, and the longest run went for only 15 yards.

The Tigers lost the services of end Claude Stricklin, who sustained a fractured arm just before the end of the first half. The junior wingman had been an outstanding defensive performer this season.

The Mustangs scored early in the game, stopping Slaton after the opening kickoff then returning a punt 25 yards to the Tiger 37. In just six plays the Mustangs crunched over for a 6-0 lead.

The Tigers tied it up before the first period ended, however. Ethridge recovered a fumble on the D. C. 16, and four plays later Washington ran over from the six-inch line.

Denver City went ahead just before halftime when a 4th-down pass set up first down on the Tiger 10. The Mustangs covered that distance in two plays for a 12-6 advantage.

The Tigers retaliated quickly in the third period after Williams intercepted a pass at the Mustang 32. In five plays, Slaton moved in for the score as Fisher slammed over from the three. Harlan's kick put Slaton on top, 13-12.

The aroused Mustangs came marching back, however, using an off-tackle power play to grind out most of the yardage in a 70-yard scoring drive. Biff Hatfield, cousin to quarterback Gary Hatfield, did most of the damage, then John Powell dived in from two yards out for an 18-13 D.C. advantage.

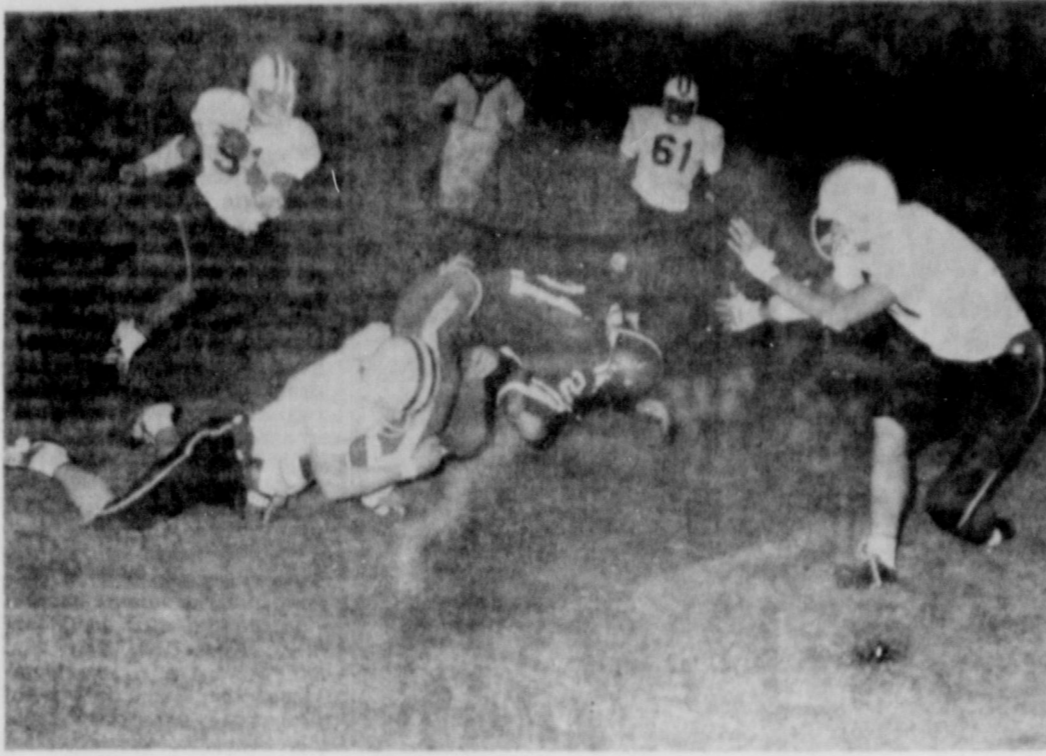
# Mustangs, Meadow at Wilson, 14-9

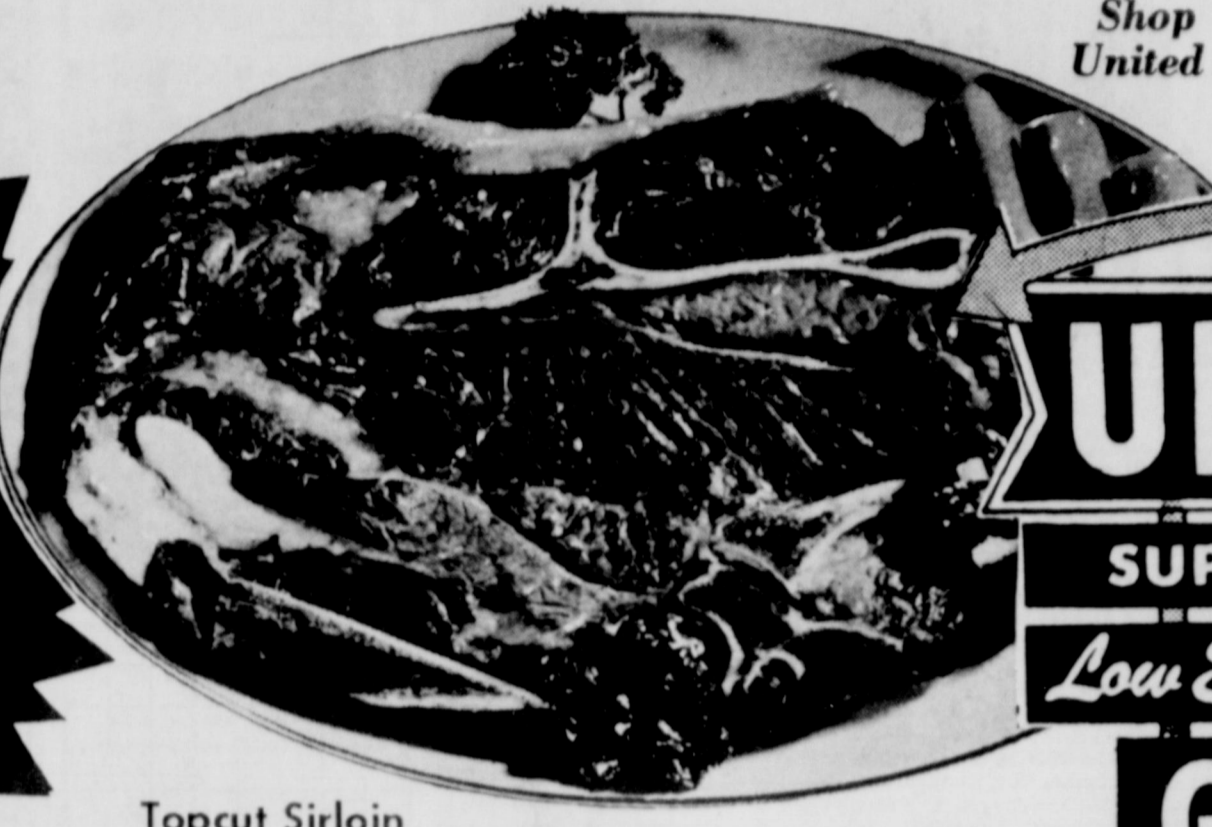
